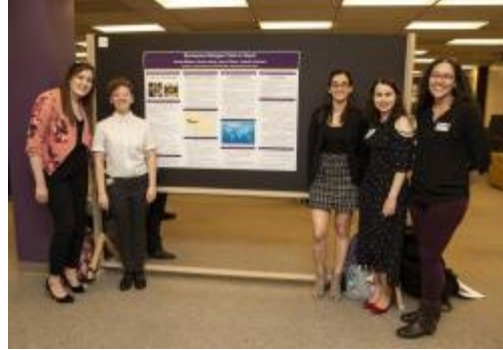

John Chase Memorial Scholarship

This award was established in 1989 and honors the memory and accomplishments of former UNI student, John G. Chase. After graduating from UNI in 1986, John Chase became a police officer for the Dallas, Texas Police Department. On January 23, 1988, he was killed in the line of duty.

DigUNI

UNI's Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminology (SAC) is conducting an excavation on the site where Central Hall once stood.

Originally built as an orphanage, this building would become the first

classroom building at UNI. Central Hall served students for nearly a century until it burned down in 1965. We started in fall 2018 and will continue in fall 2019.



Why are we digging?

A dig on campus raises awareness that archeology sites are everywhere. An excavation demonstrates that campus histories can't always tell the whole story of a university -- sometimes you have to dig to uncover the remnants of the past. This hands-on learning experience also provides students with the opportunity for developing the skills needed for their future careers.

How will we do it?

Excavation blocks are laid out over the area where the ruins of Central Hall's north foundation are thought to be. Excavation is done by hand with shovels and trowels while soil is sifted through screens to retrieve artifacts. Objects found in place are mapped and the soil studied to yield a better picture of what happened at Central Hall over the years.

FACULTY RETIREMENTS

Dr. Cyndi Dunn, who joined the faculty of the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminology in 2000, is retiring from UNI on June 30, 2019. Dr. Dunn earned tenure in 2006, and full professor in 2015.



Dr. Dunn combines linguistic anthropology (exploring linguistic variation in politeness systems, speech styles, and genre) and psychological anthropology (examining cultural models of the self and social relationships). Her work has

been published in journals such as the Journal of Linguistic Anthropology, Journal of Pragmatics, Ethos, and, most recently, the Annual Review of Anthropology.

Dr. Dunn has served UNI in many capacities, including serving on the CSBS Faculty Senate, the Dorothy Jean Ray Anthropology Scholarship Committee, been involved in the Women's and Gender Studies program, and most recently served the SAC department as PAC chair. She received the CSBS Outstanding Teaching Award in 2010. She regularly contributes to both the LAC and the anthropology major, including her signature course, Language and Culture.

Dr. Dunn is moving to Colorado Springs. In between hiking and wine tasting, she will also teach part-time at Colorado College. We wish Dr. Dunn well as she moves on to the next adventures in her life!

Dr. B. Keith Crew joined the faculty of the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminology in 1985, retired from UNI in March, 2019. Dr. Crew earned tenure in 1992, and full professor in 2016. Dr. Crew served as Department Head of SAC for ten years.

Dr. Crew's research centers on criminology and law, publishing and teaching widely in these areas. He was deeply involved in the sociology and criminology graduate programs at UNI (before their elimination), by chairing nine graduate theses, and member of eleven graduate committees.

Dr. Crew has served UNI in many capacities, including as Institutional Review Board member and prisoner advocate, Carver Institute workshop leader, CSBS Project Awards Committee, and the Liberal Arts Core Committee. He was Internship Coordinator for Criminology, and was on the Comprehensive Exams Committee in Public Policy. Dr. Crew contributes to the discipline of criminology, the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences, and has reviewed manuscripts regularly for nationally recognized journals. At the community level, Dr. Crew works with state and local agencies, and works as a public scholar, communicating with local media on occasion.

The Iowa Sociological Association, on April 26, 2019, has decided to name the ISA Research Poster Award in his honor: Now known as the ISA B. Keith Crew Research Poster Award.

We wish Dr. Crew well as he enjoys his retirement.
