21st Annual Carl L. Becker Memorial Lecture "Hidden Communes In Absolutist Theory"

Helen Nader's most recent book, Liberty in Absolutist Spain: The Habsburg Sale of Towns 1516-1700, received the Leo Gershoy Award for Best Book in Early Modern European History, awarded by the American Historical Association. In this book, she challenges well-established generalizations concerning the governance of Habsburg Spain, demonstrating that "absolutism did not mean centralization; rather, the kings invoked their absolute power to decentralize authority and allow their subjects a surprising degree of autonomy." Nader is pursuing this line of argument in a forthcoming work entitled "The more communes, the greater the king: Hidden Communes in Absolutist Theory." Her talk will thus provide the UNI community with an early opportunity to hear a leading scholar's contribution to an intriguing historical debate.
