Background Information

- •Purpose To collect, preserve and make available the research and scholarly output from the University of Northern Iowa community.
- •Began in February 2015 and has grown to over 47,000 works and has 6 million global downloads. Averaging over 1.5 million downloads/year and 3,500-4,000 downloads/day
- •Elevates the reputation of the University by demonstrating the reach and impact of the University, departments and programs, and individuals.

Background Information (Cont.)

- •The structure of the University is in the repository Global Readership Maps for departments, programs, and collections.
- •Top downloaded work Article by an undergraduate student, "Factors Affecting Economic Growth in Developing Countries," out of the journal *Major Themes in Economics* 81,000 downloads.



Variety of Content

Implementation of repository and Digital Scholarship Unit - Library expanded the types of services it offers to the UNI community.

- •Journal publishing platform [Journal of the Iowa Academy of Science (1887-2019); Iowa Science Teachers Journal, Pedagogy and Theatre of the Oppressed Journal, & UNIversitas, etc.]
- •Archives UNI related **conferences/events** [Open Access Week, Research in the Capitol, and Three Minute Thesis, etc.]
- Campus newsletters and magazines [69 titles]
- Datasets and Patents
- •Open Educational Resources [including Open Textbooks @ UNI]
