The American Party vs. the Council of Crisis

During the fall campaign, I saw a bumper sticker that read, "I'm backing McGovern 1,000% (just like he backed Eagleton)." McGovern was a man who tried to get the youth vote. And even though this article is being written four days before the election, I think it will be safe to say McGovern, though he will probably lose, will still get a fair percentage of the youth vote. (Jimmy-the Greek-Snyder today predicted that McGovern might carry only Massachusetts, South Dakota and Wisconsin, and set the odds at 1,000 to 1 against him.)

Today's youth (along with most adults) want leadership they can trust. Yet, all the Democrats could offer was a proven hypocrite (McGovern backed down on his earlier surrender stand, before a crowd of angry and disappointed students—right at his national convention), and all the Republicans could offer was four more years of Tricky Dick, whose duplicity can not be cited here for a great lack of space.

The American Party, on the other hand, quietly pursued a course of trying to straighten out the mess.

The news media knew they couldn't attack us, for our candidates had totally unblemished records. Vice-Presidential candidate Thomas J. You never hear about the CFR because it controls the news media; NBC, CBS, the New York Times, Boston Globe, Washington Post, Denver Post, the Gallup and Roper Polls, and most major publishing houses are CFR controlled, just to mention a few.

Gardner Cowles, publisher of the Des Moines Register and Tribune, as well as the Minneapolis Star, is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Governor Nelson Rockefeller of New York is one of the CFR's most powerful members. Many Congressmen, from both houses, are CFR members.

The aim and objective of the membership of the Council on Foreign Relations is to establish a one-world socialist government, with themselves as its leaders.

Well, you say, what do we have to lose?

Nothing, except our freedom, initiative, standard of living, national sovereignty, and our rights. Our government would have to merge with Communists, socialists, and all other sorts of oligarchies. Here, they could not black us out or ignore us, for the time had been paid for. So instead they hurt us in the only way they could—by keeping the millions of viewers on the West Coast from learning of our need for campaign funds—funds necessary to circumvent the news media. Fortunately, sufficient funds arrived from the other time zones.
