Press Information

The fall press book, supplying basic information on the State College of Iowa football and cross country teams for 1966, is designed to assist sports writers, radio and television commentators and other news personnel.

As you plan your coverage of the Panthers please note the following items:

PRESS BOX—The press box at O. R. Latham Stadium is located on top of the west stadium, providing working space for press, scouts, spotters and four radio teams. Telephone service is available. There is no reserved parking but a large lot is available immediately across the street from the west stadium. The press box opens one and a half hours before kickoff.

WORKING PRESS TICKETS—Applications should be made to the Sports Information Director at SCI. Tickets will be mailed or may be picked up at the Will Call desk.

WORKING RADIO TICKETS—Applications for tickets and permission to broadcast should be made to the Sports Information Director at SCI. Stations are reminded they are responsible for ordering their own lines and their own telephone if they wish to have that service in their booth. Tickets will be mailed or may be picked up at the Will Call desk. Please give one week's notice if you desire spotters.

PHOTOGRAPHERS—Application for side line passes should be made to the Sports Information Director at SCI. Tickets will be mailed or may be picked up at the Will Call desk.

WILL CALL DESK—The will call desk is located just off the main lobby of Men's Gymnasium.

PRESS BOX SERVICES—SCI will provide programs, three-deep rosters of both teams, starting lineups and pre-game information. Also, halftime statistics, play by play sheets, and final team and individual statistics.

The 1966 Outlook

Stan Sheriff's analysis of his 1966 football team hasn't changed much since those spring practice days back in April. The Panthers are still young.

Sheriff, starting his seventh season as head coach at SCI, has never had such a young team. All 51 members invited back for fall drills are Iowa boys. Ten of them are seniors (eight letterwinners), 23 are juniors (but only seven have lettered) and 18 are sophomores.

It seems even younger when you scan the starting offensive team Sheriff is likely to field. Only one senior, guard Bruce Mohr, in the line along with two juniors and four sophomores. The backfield will open with three juniors and a toss up at quarterback between senior letterwinner Dick Olin and junior Ed Mulholland.

There are pluses. Ray Pedersen, the young Cedar Falls giant is number one.

"Right now, as a junior," said Sheriff, "he ranks as one of the finest linemen we've had since I've been here. He ranks right with Dennis Remmert from the 1959 team. I'd say he's the finest guard I've ever had."

Pedersen's value is two-fold. "He's just as effective on offense or defense," Sheriff added.

Still growing, Pedersen is 6-2, 215 pounds and an honor student going into his junior year.

Potentially, Sheriff has the makings of a great tackle corps on his hands. He has three sophomores of equal ability who will take over. They may be a year away, but the potential is there.

His backfield? "Better overall speed and balance," he said. "One thing is for sure. Our opponents will have to concentrate on all of them. Randy Schultz is gone and after all of their moves on him for three years they'll have to change this fall."

Ralph Thomsen, a letterman linebacker, is the heir-apparent to Schultz' fullback job. Thomsen is a good average NCC back, a good blocker, but no Randy Schultz.

Terry Fox, John Stater, Dave Matthews and Mike Toom are all in the battle for the other running spot. Fox and Matthews are lettermen. All have good speed and the intra-family squabble for the starting job could produce the scrappy runner Sheriff is searching for right now.

Sheriff's best prospects lie on defense where three lettermen return on the forward wall and three in the backfield.

Backs are Pedersen (215) co-captain Phil Roberts (245), Basye (288) on the front line and top sophomore prospect Sam Shidler (233) will likely join them.

Co-captain Rick Price moves to an outside linebacker spot and will team with Bryce Hansen and the biggest spring surprise of the lot, Bob Anderson. Anderson, a transfer student from Mason City JC, earned Sheriff's praise for his spring performance and ranks as the number one linebacker in the camp.

Bill Strottman and Lynn King return at the corners to head up the deep defenses and three sophomores are leading the fight for the two safety spots.

Transfer students may play the biggest role yet in Sheriff's seven years. Three in particular are expected to make major contributions.

"In the line we'll get a real boost if two Norfolk JC transfers from Cedar Rapids come through," said Sheriff. "Dave Derehammer (215) should help us at center and Gary Herman (235) could be a real plus at either end or tackle. Bill Smith, who earned All-America honors for Ellsworth JC, should help us both ways but we're counting on him right off on defense.

The schedule, Sheriff feels, is as tough as its ever been. "They all appear to be improved with the two North Dakota schools and Drake having top notch clubs." An open date the second week of the season could be a blessing in disguise. "We're awfully young. After one game we get a break and this may be what these youngsters need to get their feet on the ground. They'll find out a few facts against a talented Northern Michigan team.



Head Football Coach

Stan Sheriff

Stan Sheriff became the head football coach at State College of Iowa in 1960 following two years as the squad's first assistant and line coach under Bill Hammer.

Few collegiate coaches have had the smashing debut Sheriff had. His first team went undefeated in nine games and then received and accepted the school's first post-season bowl bid. Sheriff's first loss as a head coach came in that Mineral Water Bowl game, a 17-6 defeat to Hillsdale College.

In six seasons Sheriff has produced a 41-14-2 overall record, has won or tied for the North Central Conference title four times, produced five first team Little All-America players and had 20 players on the first all-conference teams.

A native of San Francisco, Sheriff played his college ball at California Poly at San Luis Obispo where he was an all-conference center for three years and Little All-America as a senior. He played in the 1953 East-West Shrine game and Hula Bowl and later spent three seasons in the National Football League.

Sheriff graduated from Cal Poly in 1954 and received his Master's Degree from there in 1958. His first coaching experience came during a tour of duty in the U.S. Army as he guided the 4th Infantry Division team to the European service title with a 10-1-1 record.

Stan, and his wife Jane, have three young sons, Paul, Michael and Richard.

Assistant Football Coaches



DON ERUSHA—Starting his fourth season as Sheriff's number one assistant and line coach, Erusha has consistently molded solid forward walls together. This fall he faces one of his biggest challenges with only two returning starters back on offense. His defensive unit is in better shape with four returnees. Erusha is a Coe College graduate. He coached in prep circles at West Union, West Branch, Mt. Clemens, Mich., and Cedar Rapids Washington before returning to Coe as a line coach prior to his move to SCI. He's married and has one daughter.



DENNIS REMMERT—Remmert starts his third season as freshman coach for the Panthers. A former Little All-America tackle for SCI in 1959, he worked for two years as a graduate assistant under Sheriff before moving to Fort Dodge Junior College for one season. He will assist Sheriff as backfield coach in pre-season drills before taking over the freshman squad and a large portion of the scouting duties. He's a native of Mason City, Iowa.



R. C. JOHNSON—Johnson starts his second season as the SCI graduate assistant. In charge of the defensive backs, Johnson will also assist Remmert in scouting duties. He's an Iowa University graduate, Johnson comes from Ottawa, Ill. He coached the Iowa Frosh team following a playing injury.



GLEN HENRY—Henry, 26, is the newest addition to the Panther coaching staff. He will coach the ends this fall and then move in as head freshman coach for the 1967 season. Henry will also initiate a collegiate swimming program at SCI this year. Married and the father of three children, Henry is a graduate of Chadron State, Nebr., where he served the past year as swimming coach and assistant football coach.



ELMER KORTEMEYER—Kortemeyer became SCI's first full-time trainer one year ago and continues in that capacity in 1966. A former SCI student, Kortemeyer graduated from the University of Wyoming in 1957 and got his M.A. from the same school in 1962. He had high school coaching experience in Wyoming. He's married and has two sons and a daughter.

89—**RICK PRICE, 6-0, 200, Sr., Buffalo, Ia.** A seasoned veteran, Price is effective on offense or defense. He will open at a defensive end position. No one in the NCC plays the post better than he does. He caught three passes for 46 yards last year. A two-year letterman, Price was most popular man on campus as a freshman. He's a physical education major and prepped for Bob Liddy at Davenport West.



71—**PHIL ROBERTS, 6-1, 245, Sr., Reinbeck, Ia.** Another two-year letterman, Roberts has operated for two seasons at offensive tackle and defensive guard. He must provide the leadership for the rest of the tackle corps that is sophomore dominated. Roberts missed spring drills due to farming obligations. Married, he prepped for Arden Johnson and is a physical education major. Transferred from Iowa State.



79—**JIM BASYE, 6-2, 228, Sr., West Union, Ia.** Basye made his mark last fall as one of the finest pass rushers in the league, teaming with Ray Pedersen at the wings on SCI's four-man front line. Bigger this fall, Basye gives the Panthers experience, speed and size up front where it is needed. A transfer from North Dakota U., Jim prepped for Greg Bice at Grundy Center where he earned all-state honors. He's a P.E. major.



31—**RALPH THOMSEN, 6-0, 202, Jr., Gladbrook, Ia.** Thomsen, a starting linebacker in 1965, will battle Jerry Malloy for the running spot vacated by two-time Little All-America Randy Schultz. He was top ground gainer in varsity's 7-6 win over the Alumni in the spring game, going 64 yards in 22 carries. A transfer from Iowa, Thomsen prepped for Paul Kellerhals and gained all-state honors. In the same prep league with Schultz, he outgained the Alden flash one season. Ralph's a business major.

17—**DICK OLIN**, 5-10, 170, Sr., Cedar Rapids, Ia. Olin started all but one game in 1965, passing for 705 yards on 45 completions on 108 attempts. He fired six TD passes, the longest a 78-yarder for a score to Terry Fox. Olin must battle for his spot if he's to keep junior Ed Mulholland from taking over. Married, he prepped for Bud Rainbow at Washington High.

16—**ED MULHOLLAND**, 5-10, 180, Jr., Webster City, Ia. Mulholland didn't play enough in 1965 to letter. Starting as the number 4 quarterback he stuck with it and finished number two. He gained 40 yards rushing, 40 yards passing in his limited action and then sparkled in spring game, moving varsity 64 yards in final 25 seconds to win game. Was an all-stater for Harley Rollinger as a prep.

15—**DON RAJTORA**, 5-11, 188, Jr., Cedar Rapids, Ia. Not far behind the front runners is Rajtora, who passed for 44 yards last fall and started one game. Was an all-stater for Ted Lawrence at Jefferson High.

14—**BO BLAKE**, 5-11, 170, Soph., Cedar Falls, Ia. Blake did all the quarterbacking for the freshman team last fall, hitting 31 of 57 passes for 305 yards in three games. Prepped for Ed Lyons.

Running Backs

24—**TERRY FOX**, 5-7, 170, Jr., Perry, Ia. Fox, one of the team's most exciting performers, played last year as a flanker, scoring five touchdowns while picking off nine passes for 246 yards, tops on the club. He added 60 yards in 11 rushes and broke up the Morningside game with 78-yard TD pass from Olin. An outfielder in baseball, Terry missed spring drills and is being shifted to a running back this fall. An all-stater, he prepped for Graydon Lappe and is a PE major.

25—**DAVE MATTHEWS**, 5-10, 190, Sr., Corning, Ia. Matthews was SCI's number two ground gainer in 1965, posting 236 yards and a 3.7 per carry average. He'll battle Fox and Stater for halfback running post after good spring game. He made diving catch of Mulholland pass to score against the Alumni. An all-stater as prep, he played for Larry Fett and also competes in track.

44—**DICK MILLER**, 6-3, 186, Jr., Waterloo, Ia. Miller an All-American prep, played the safety position on defense last year. He's been shifted to flanker back this year. He nabbed three passes in spring game for 34 yards. A PE major, he prepped for George Dutcher at West.

34—**JERRY MALLOY**, 5-11, 195, Sr., State Center, Ia. Malloy started spring game at fullback after gaining 49 yards last fall in limited action. He'll battle Thomsen for starting role this fall. An all-stater, he prepped for Ralph Losee and is a PE major.

23—**JOHN STATER**, 5-8, 171, Jr., Ottumwa, Ia. An all-stater as a prep under Gary Grouwinkel, Stater was one of the most impressive runners during spring workouts. He overcomes lack of size with speed. SCI will depend on John and Fox for outside threat.

22—**MIKE TOOM**, 5-10, 188, Soph., Bettendorf, Ia. The top ground gainer for the Frosh in 1965, Toom needs only experience to crack starting lineup. He gained 186 yards in three games as frosh and hauled in five passes. He prepped for Merritt Parsons.

36—**RON MILLER**, 5-10, 180, Soph., North English, Ia. A prep star in track, Miller's first crack at football came this past spring. He's got exceptional speed but needs loads of experience.

26—**BILL STROTTMAN**, 5-11, 180, Sr., Waverly, Ia. Strottman, who missed spring drills while playing outfield on the Panther baseball team, is a veteran defensive back. Played the corner back spot last fall and may be switched to safety this fall. An all-stater as a prep he played high school ball for Martin Brandes and then moved to Mason City JC.

21—**LYNN KING**, 5-10, 161, Jr., Cedar Falls, Ia. A great battler, King fought his way to starting defensive halfback spot last fall and will be hard to budge this year. He tied Strottman and Price for interception leadership in 1965 with two each. He prepped for Ed Lyons.

41—**RON RODD**, 6-1, 179, Soph., West Des Moines, Ia. Rodd is one of three yearlings vying for duty on defense. He lacks experience but not a willingness to hit. He prepped for Jack Elgin at Valley High and is a PE major.

46—**TOM BERGSTROM**, 5-11, 180, Jr., Cedar Falls, Ia. Another John Aldrich product from SC High, Tom should see considerable duty this fall on defense. He's a physical education major.

Cross Country Team Is Better Balanced

Optimistic Jack Jennett has the youngest cross country team of his coaching career. The team should be a year away by all odds, but Jennett thinks the squad has enough talent right now to hold its own during the 1966 dual season.

"We'll be better than we were in 1965 despite the youth on this team," he said. "We have only one letterman, Ron Bousman, back and he is a question mark. He missed the entire winter and spring track season. If he gets medical clearance he'll be a plus to our plans."

Bousman lettered last fall after setting the freshman course record in 1964. That record lasted just long enough for Tom Denney to show up. He cracked the mark in 1965 and now heads up the list of five incoming sophomores.

Transfer student Duane Bachman, Waterloo East graduate, is the real key, though. "Bachman could be the best of the bunch and make us a real strong team in the dual season," Jennett added.

"South Dakota State won the NCC crown last year and has their entire team back," he said. "They are the class of the league, but our freshman team won their division and the five runners all finished in the top nine."
