A Profile of Students Enrolled at the University of Northern Iowa, Fall Semester 1982 continues the annual tradition established with the compilation of the Fall Semester 1979 Profile.

The contents include demographic data for all students, new students direct from high school, new undergraduate transfers from other colleges, new graduate students, and some comparative data for several years. Enrollment statistics are based upon enrollments at the end of the third week of instruction each semester.

The research section contains some comparative data from four persistence studies of UNI students who entered UNI in 1960-1961, 1965-1966, 1970-1971, and 1975-1976. This data includes information pertaining to enrollments, persistence, and academic performance of each of the four classes. In addition, a follow-up study of the 1975-1976 entering students who withdrew from UNI prior to graduation is also summarized.

PROFILE SUMMARY

ALL STUDENTS

The total enrollment of 10,988 students enrolled at UNI for the fall 1982 Semester was an increase of 34 (.4%) from the previous year. Undergraduate enrollment increased 215 (2.2%) and the graduate enrollment decreased 181 (14.9%). Two hundred twenty-two (222) students enrolled as undergraduates already had a bachelor's degree. In previous years, these students were required to enroll as graduate students even though they were not working towards an advanced degree. Of all students enrolled, 79% were full-time; 15% of the undergraduates had a part-time enrollment (less than 12 semester hours); and 75% of the graduates had a part-time enrollment (less than 9 semester hours). The total undergraduates who had declared majors in teaching curricula were 30%. Of all students registered, 56% were women.

The most popular undergraduate declared majors were: Elementary Education (479), Accounting (393), Special Education (292), Management (235), and Marketing (152).

The most popular graduate majors were: Business Administration-MBA (140), Special Education (61), Counseling (65), Physical Education (22), English (21), and Elementary Education (20). Nine (9) students were enrolled in the Doctor of Industrial Technology program. A total of 314 (30%) were not pursuing an advanced degree.

Of the 9,952 undergraduate students, 5,788 (58%) indicated an interest in Liberal and Vocational Arts curricula, 2,454 (25%) in Teaching curricula, and 1,710 (17%) were undecided.

A total of 10,581 (96% of all students) were Iowa residents, 2,950 (27%) were from Black Hawk County, and 1,318 (12%) were from counties contiguous to Black Hawk.

The 78 foreign student enrollment included 56 undergraduate students and 22 graduate students from 31 foreign countries.

Of the 9,952 undergraduate students 9,598 (96%) were white and 208 (2%) were black. Hispanics, Asians, and American Indians represented 1% of the undergraduate enrollment.

The average age of undergraduates was 21.6 years and graduates was 31.2 years.

A total of 75 permanently mobility-impaired students were enrolled Fall Semester 1982. This represented a loss of 70 (48%) from the previous fall.

Total enrollment of veterans receiving educational benefits from the Veterans Administration was 253 students, a decrease of 40 (14%) from the previous fall semester.

Total residence hall occupancy was 4,878 students, a decrease of 13 (4%) from the previous year. About 46% of the women students and 42% of the men students reside in residence halls.

FRESHMEN DIRECT FROM HIGH SCHOOL

A total of 1,968 students, approximately 20% of the total undergraduate enrollment for the Fall Semester 1982, were new students direct from high school.

More than 62% of the entering freshmen completed their applications for admission to UNI before January 31 of their senior year in high school.

Of all the new students 96.5% were Iowa residents with 93 counties represented. Approximately 24% were from Black Hawk County, while 65% came from a distance of not more than 100 miles from Cedar Falls. There was an increase in entering students from Black Hawk County and a decrease in students from distances of 100 miles or more from campus.

Approximately 57% of the entering students graduated from high school classes of 200 or less, while 19% graduated from classes of 400 or more students.

Of the entering freshmen, 76% ranked in the top one-half and 48% ranked in the top 30% of their high school graduating class.

Only 11% of the freshmen had ACT Composite Standard Scores of 27 or higher, while 52% earned scores of 21 or above, the same percentage as the previous year.

About 23% of the entering freshmen ranked in the top 30% of their high school graduating class and had ACT Composite Standard Scores of 24 or higher.

On their applications for admission to UNI, 61% of the entering freshmen indicated a preference for Liberal or Vocational Arts curricula, while 21% indicated preferences for Teaching curricula, and 18% did not indicate a preference.

A total of 1,750 (89%) of the entering freshmen were enrolled as full-time (12 semester hours or more) students compared to 92% in 1981.

Although 353 (18%) of the new classified freshmen did not indicate a prospective academic major, for those who did, the most frequently indicated were: Accounting (276), Management (106), Elementary Education (95), Speech (70), Industrial Technology (68), Business Education (65), Administrative Management (60), Music (51), Special Education (50), Physical Education, Health, and Recreation (48), Mathematics (46), Psychology (46), Art (46), and Computer Science (44). In addition, 144 new students indicated an interest in Pre-Professional curricula. Of the 144 enrolled in Pre-Professional curricula, 50 (35%) were interested in Nursing, 22 (15%) in Engineering, and 17 (12%) in Physical Therapy.

Eighty percent (80%) of the new students indicated they planned to attend UNI four or more years.

About 75% of the students expected a 2.67 (B-) or higher grade-point average their first semester at UNI. Parents expectations were slightly lower than student expectations. Less than 1% expected grades below a 2.00 (C) average their first semester.

Only 16% of the parents of new freshmen and transfer undergraduate students had attended UNI; however, 30% of freshmen and 22% of the transfers had brothers or sisters who had attended UNI.

About 61% of the new freshmen students made their decision to attend UNI during their senior year of high school while 85% of the new transfer students made their decision to attend UNI after graduating from high school.

The entering freshmen came from homes in which 24% of the fathers were employed in professional or technical occupations, 20% in managerial or ownership positions, 17% in agriculture, 11% in sales or clerical positions, and 16% in skilled trades. Of the mothers, 35% were full-time homemakers, 28% were in clerical and sales positions, 27% in professional, technical, or managerial occupations, and 5% in service occupations. In contrast, 44% of the grandfathers of the new freshmen were farmers while 11% were managers or owners, while only 6% were in professional/technical occupations and 7% in sales and clerical positions. The majority of the grandmothers (66%) were full-time homemakers. Of those who were employed, 10% were in professional or technical occupations while 9% were in clerical or sales and 6% were in service type occupations.

Approximately 51% of the fathers and 51% of the mothers of the new students had received post-secondary education and about 28% of the fathers and 16% of the mothers were college graduates. Only 1% of the mothers and 3% of the fathers terminated their education before attending high school. In contrast only 16% of the grandfathers and 21% of the grandmothers of the new students had received post-secondary education and 6% of the grandfathers and 8% of the grandmothers were college graduates. About 41% of the grandfathers and 29% of the grandmothers terminated their education before attending high school.

STUDENTS TRANSFERRING FROM OTHER COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

A total of 828 new students, an increase of 5 from the previous year, transferred from other colleges and universities to UNI, Fall Semester 1982. (Included in this enrollment were 100 unclassified students who had previously attended another college and one transfer from a Nurses Training School.) Of the 727 classified transfers, over one-half (401) were from Iowa two-year colleges.

About 74% of the transfers from the two-year colleges came from the following colleges: North Iowa Area Community College, Ellsworth Community College, Marshalltown Community College, Iowa Central Community College-Fort Dodge, Des Moines Area Community College-Ankeny, Kirkwood Community College, and Hawkeye Institute of Technology.

Of those who transferred from Iowa four-year colleges 31% came from the University of Iowa and Iowa State University while 69% came from Iowa private four-year colleges.

On a comparative basis, about 4% more transfers came from Iowa two-year colleges than the previous year while the percentage from Iowa four-year colleges remained about the same and the percentage from out-of-state colleges declined about 4%.

NEW GRADUATE STUDENTS

The Graduate student enrollment of 255 new students represented a decrease of 9 (3%) from the Fall Semester 1981. A total of 109 (43%) received their bachelor's degree from UNI, 19 (7%) from Iowa State University, and 13 (5%) from the University of Iowa. The majority of students receiving their bachelor's degree from out-of-state colleges came from Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Kansas. Eight (8) new graduates came from foreign universities or colleges.

Of the 255 new graduate students, 218 (85%) were residents of Iowa including 117 from Black Hawk County and 13 from Bremer County.

The most popular major areas for new graduate students were Business Administration (14), Counseling (14), Physical Education (10), School Psychology (7), Special Education (7), and Communications Media (6). A total of 127 new graduates enrolled as non-degree students.

MISCELLANEOUS

The total number of new undergraduate students for the 1981-82 year (Summer 1981, Fall 1981, and Spring 1982) was 3,589, a decrease of 6% from the previous year. Of the 3,589 new students, 2,334 (65%) were entering freshmen while 1,255 (35%) were new transfers.

For Fall and Spring Semesters 1981-82, a total of 523 new undergraduates were enrolled on a part-time basis. This represented 16% of the total new students, the same as the previous year. The percentage of new part-time students has doubled since 1971-72.

Scholarship summary data for fall semesters in recent years (1976-1981) revealed a slight decrease in average semester hour loads for undergraduate students to 13.17 while the average grade index dropped .02. The average grade index for women students was higher than for men students. The average graduate student semester hour load was 5.03 while the grade-point average decreased to 3.43. Spring semester loads and grade-point averages tended to be slightly higher than those for the fall semesters.

A total of 205 new undergraduate students were enrolled in Educational Opportunity Programs (E.O.P.) for Fall Semesters 1979-1982. Of the 205 students, 122 (60%) were black and 78 (38%) were caucasian.

A total of 767 College Level Examination Program (CLEP) General Examination tests and subtests were administered to UNI students during the first nine months of 1982. The scores on 495 (65%) of the tests and subtests were high enough for the students to achieve college credit.

The most popular General Examination during the 1981-82 Fiscal Year was Mathematics, which accounted for thirty-nine percent (39%) of all examinations given. The other four General Examinations made up 47% of the rest of the examinations given while the Subject Examinations made up only 14% of all examinations given throughout the fiscal year.

RESEARCH PERTAINING TO UNI STUDENTS

PERSISTENCE AT THE STATE UNIVERSITIES

Information pertaining to enrollments, persistence and academic performance of undergraduate freshmen and transfer students who entered the University of Northern Iowa in Summer, Fall, or Spring Semester of 1960-1961, 1965-1966, 1970-1971, or 1975-1976 has been included in a series of persistence studies conducted by the Regents' Universities for the Iowa State Board of Regents. As a general rule the studies have covered a six year period from the year of entry of each class.

Freshmen Direct From High School:

Of the freshmen who entered in 1975-1976, 41% earned degrees from UNI compared to 42% in 1960-1961, 46% in 1965-1966, and 48% in 1970-1971.

Twenty-seven percent (27%) of the 1975-1976 year freshmen remained at UNI for one year or less compared to 24% in 1970-1971, 23% in 1965-1966 and only 11% in 1960-1961.

Only 28% of the 1975-1976 freshmen received a bachelor's degree from UNI at the end of four years compared to 43% in 1970-1971, and 35% in 1965-1966; however, of those who received a bachelor's degree from UNI, 68% of the 1975-1976 group received their degree within four calendar years compared to 75% of the 1965-1966 class, and 90% of the 1970-1971 class.

The mean cumulative grade-point average of the 1975-1976 entrants who received degrees from UNI was 2.98 (B=3.00) compared to a 2.93 for 1970-1971, 2.66 for 1965-1966, and 2.58 for 1960-1961.

The percent receiving academic suspensions for low scholarship was 9% in 1975-1976, compared to 23% in 1960-1961, 20% in 1965-1966, and only 6% in 1970-1971.

Of the freshmen who entered in 1975-1976, about 35% ranked in the top 20% of their high school graduating class compared to 42% in 1970-1971, 41% in 1965-1966, and 41% in 1960-1961. Also, 25% of the 1975-1976 entrants ranked in the lower one-half of their high school class compared to about 9% in 1965-1966, 14% in 1970-1971, and 17% in 1960-1961. The study reveals that the higher the rank in the high school graduating class the larger the percentage of graduates from UNI.

American College Test (ACT) Composite Standard scores were available for 1965-1966, 1970-1971, and 1975-1976 entrants. A total of 37.5% of the 1975-1976 group had Composite Standard scores of 24 or above compared to 50% in 1965-1966 and 52% in 1970-1971 while 26.6% of the 1975-1976 entrants had ACT scores of 18 or below compared to only 9.0% in 1965-1966 and 10.7% in 1970-1971. The study revealed that the higher the ACT Composite Standard scores in each class the higher the percentage of entrants who graduated from UNI. A total of 69% of the 1975-1976 group who had scores of 27 or above graduated from UNI compared to only 33% who had scores of 18 or below.

Transfers From Other Colleges and Universities:

Of the undergraduate transfer students who entered in 1975-1976, a total of 57% graduated from UNI compared to 58% in 1960-1961, 52% in 1965-1966, and 62% in 1970-1971.

A total of 49% of the 1975-1976 transfers who received degrees from UNI transferred from Iowa Public Two-Year Colleges compared to 29% in 1960-1961, 42% in 1965-1966, and 50% in 1970-1971.

Of those who transferred from Iowa Public Two-Year Colleges, 65% of the 1975-1976 transfers received a degree from UNI compared to 69% in 1960-1961, 60% in 1965-1966, and 68% in 1970-1971.

The mean cumulative grade-point average of the 1975-1976 transfers who graduated from UNI was 2.98 compared to a mean of 2.81 for 1970-1971, 2.63 for 1965-1966, and 2.56 for 1960-1961.

The percent of transfers receiving academic suspensions for low scholarship was 4% in the 1975-1976 group, 5% in 1970-1971, 20% in 1965-1966, and 18% in 1960-1961.

Follow-Up of Non-Persisters Who Entered in 1975-1976:

A follow-up study of new undergraduate students who entered in 1975-1976 and had not received a degree by Summer 1981 revealed the following information:

The major reasons freshmen left were lack of finances, desired programs not available, and because they wanted to transfer to another school.

Transfers left because desired programs were not available, conflict between job and studies, home responsibilities, and moved from the area.

Freshmen were most satisfied with library services, location of UNI, social opportunities, recreational opportunities, and residence hall accommodations.

Transfers expressed most satisfaction with library services, size and location of UNI, cost of attending UNI, and employment opportunities.

Of the responding non-persisters, a total of 83% of the freshmen and 78% of the transfers had either earned a degree since leaving UNI or planned to earn a degree.

Both the freshmen and transfers gave UNI an overall satisfaction rating between "moderate" and "much" satisfaction.

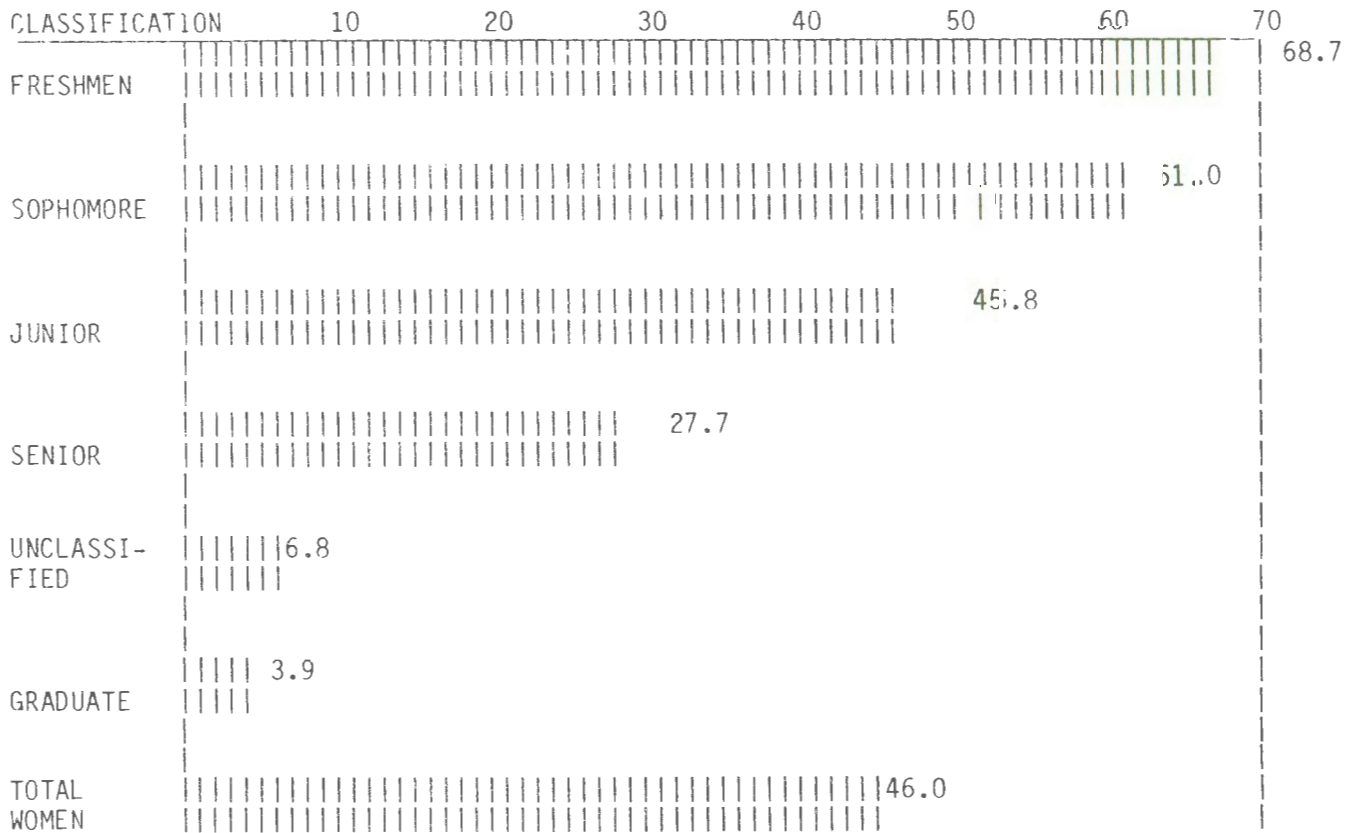

NEW FROM IOWA HIGH SCHOOLS BY COUNTY OF ORIGIN

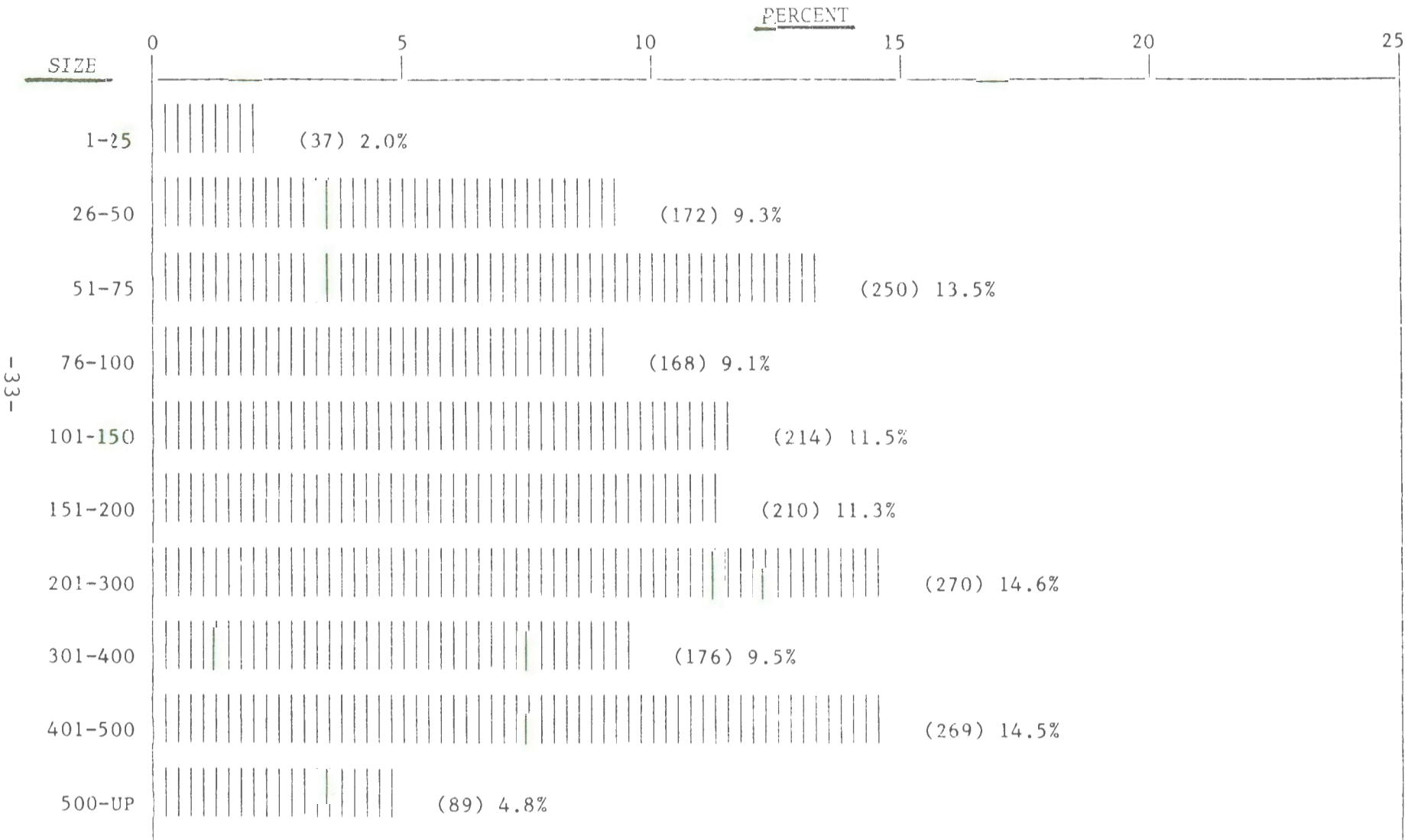

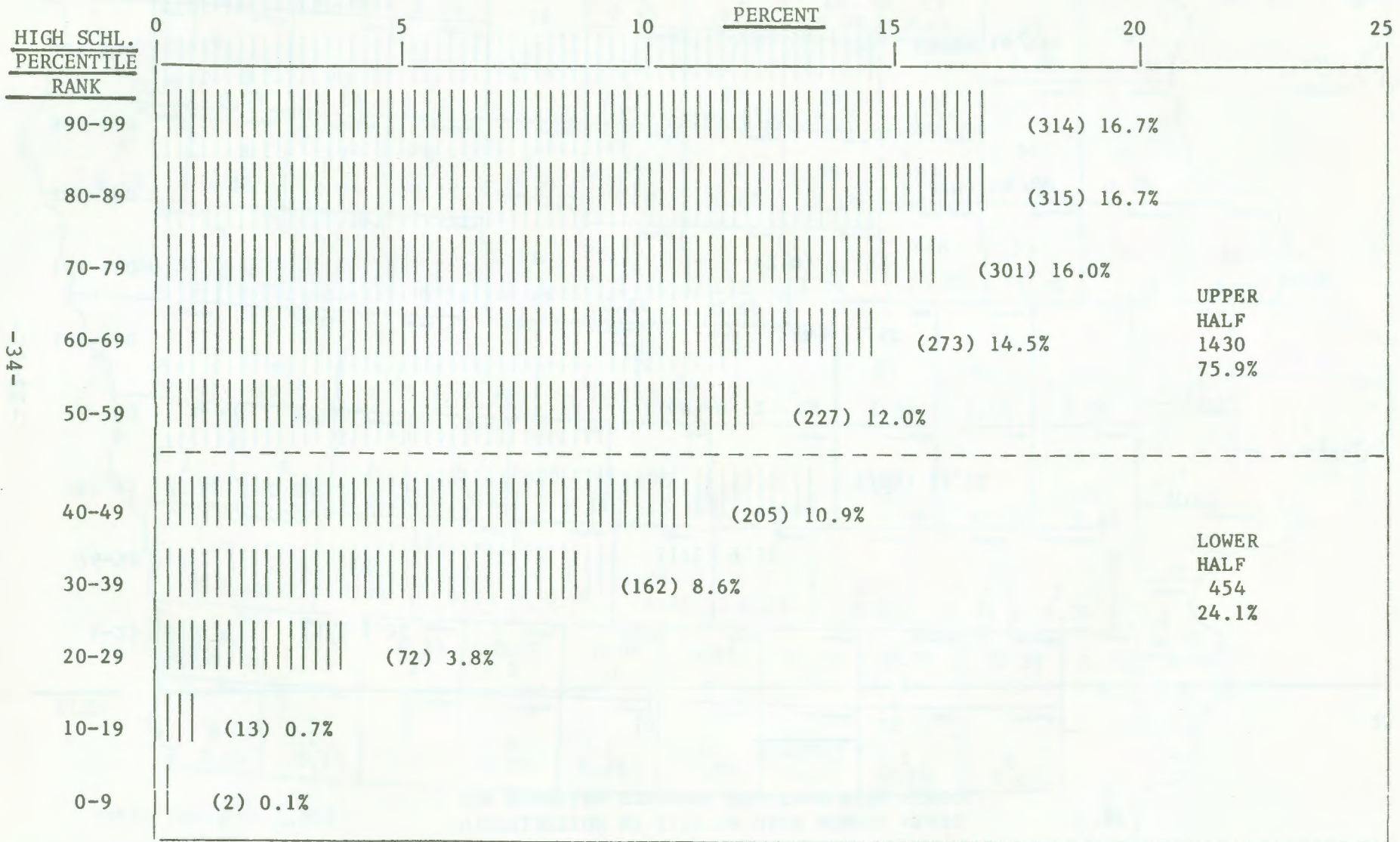

FOR ENROLLED STUDENTS NEW FROM HIGH SCHOOL



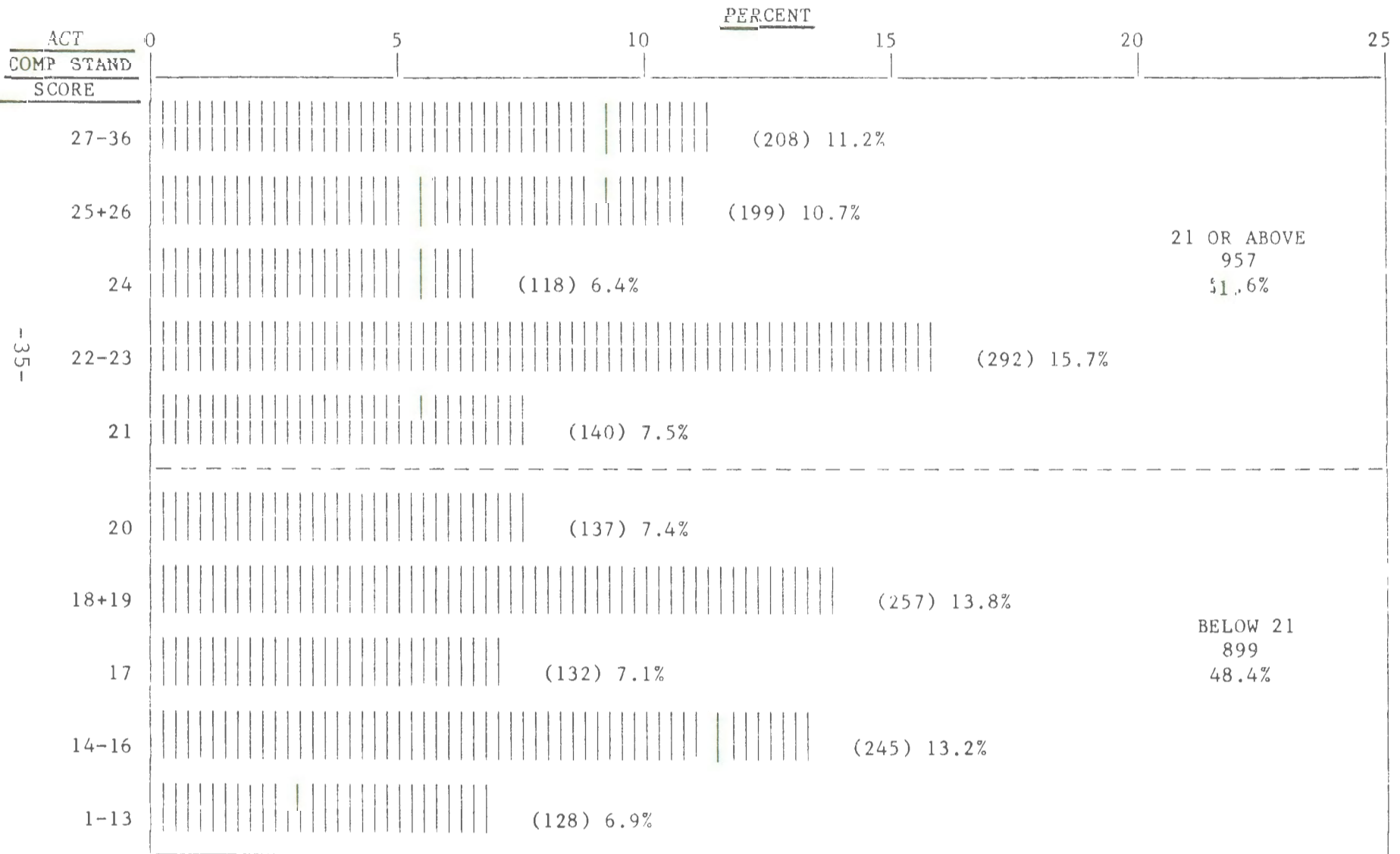

ENROLLED STUDENTS NEW FROM HIGH SCHOOL

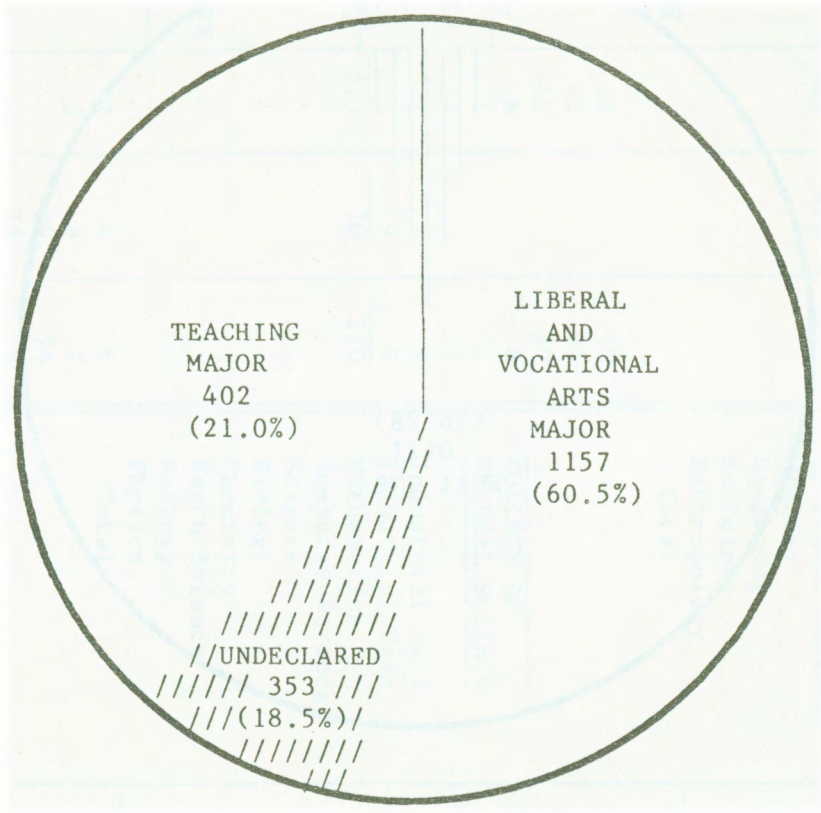

AS A PERCENT OF TOTAL ENROLLED STUDENTS NEW FROM HIGH SCHOOL

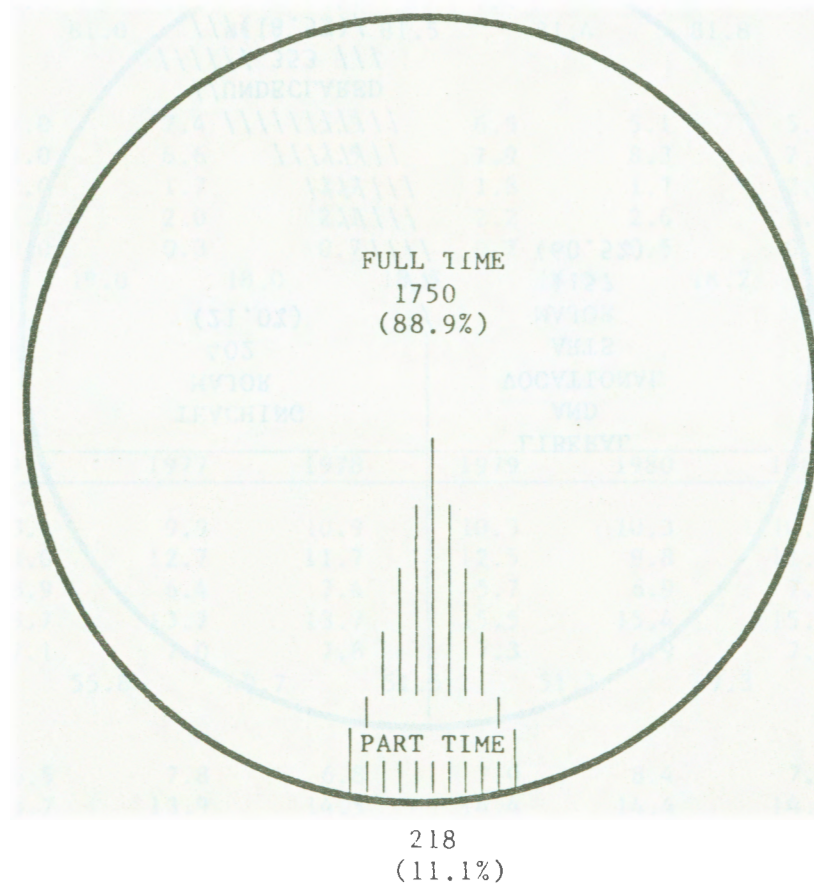

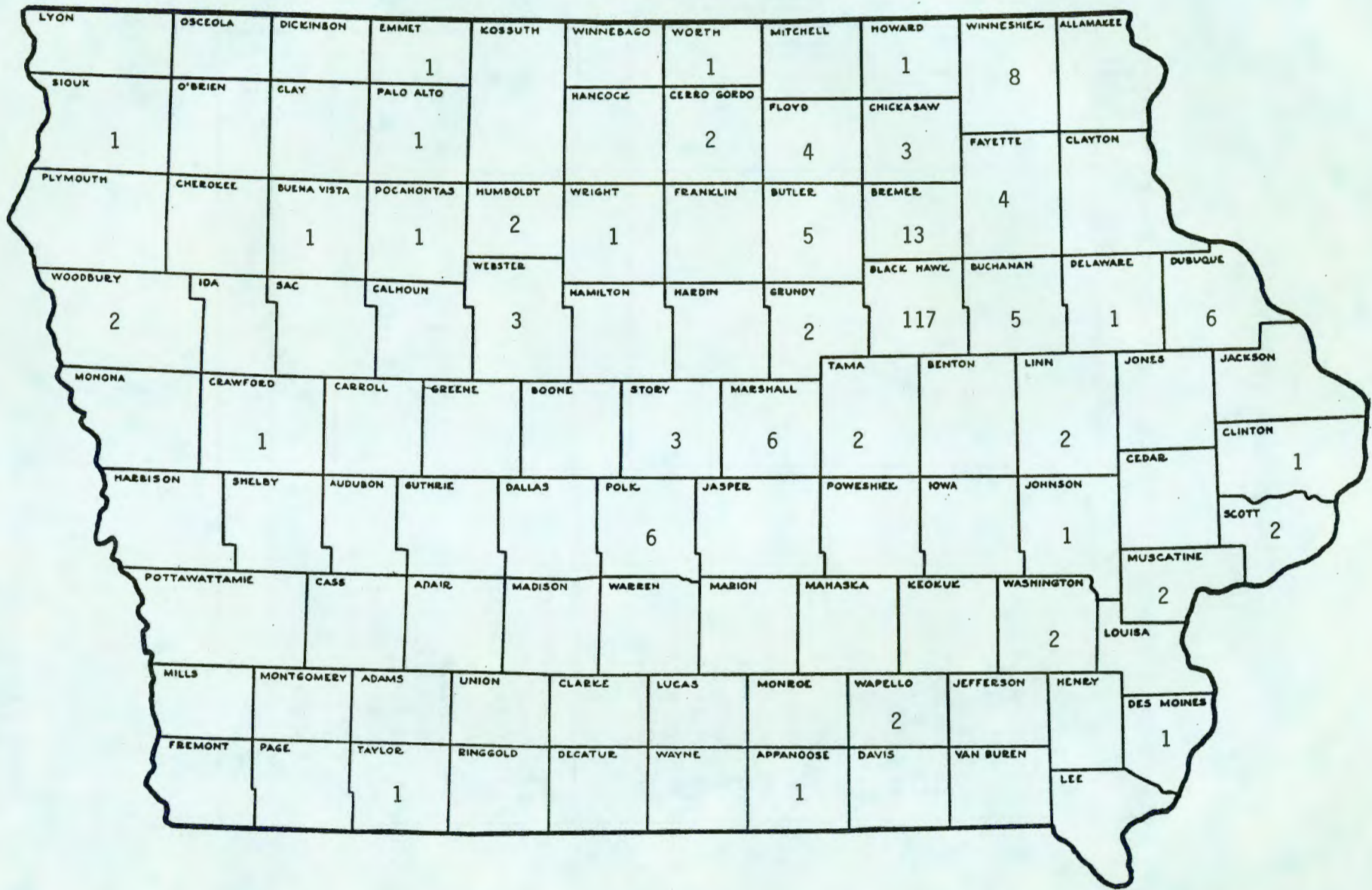
