Covering the Panthers at home

The 1971 fall press book supplies basic information on the University of Northern Iowa football team. As you plan your coverage of the 1971 Panthers, please note the following items:

PRESS BOX—The press box at O. R. Latham Stadium is located atop the west stands. Seating capacity is 75 with 21 front-row working press seats, three radio broadcast booths and 2 end booths for coaches of competing teams. Use center door only for entrance.

PRIVILEGES—Only working press will be allowed in front row working area in assigned seating. Scouts will be moved down from back row only if space is available. Radio stations will be assigned broadcast booths upon request for permission to broadcast. Stations should make own arrangements for telephone hookup. If spotter is requested, please give a week's notice. Photographers will be issued press passes allowing them on the sidelines or atop the press box in covered photo area.

SERVICES—Pre-game information includes printed programs, starting lineups, depth charts and pre-game notes. Team and individual statistics will be available approximately five minutes after the end of the first half. Full team and individual statistics, along with play-by-play account can be expected 10-15 minutes following the conclusion of the game.



At the top — Stan Sheriff



The athletic year 1970-71 will probably not go down in Stan Sheriff's book as one of his favorites.

One of Northern Iowa's worst football seasons ever (2-8) got things off to a sufficiently miserable start, but for Sheriff the difficulties weren't over. The 11-year veteran of UNI football then spent the rest of the year learning the ropes of the demanding athletic director's job.

What is significant is that Sheriff's disappointment over the 1970 season hasn't dampened his enthusiasm for the upcoming season. As a matter of fact, Sheriff and his staff waged their most energetic recruiting campaign ever, and are confident of quickly restoring the caliber of UNI football to the "customary Stan Sheriff level."

Which is good news for Panther fans, since Sheriff, in his 11-year head coaching career at UNI, has been winning ball games at an outstanding 61.5 per cent clip.

After two years as head assistant under Bill Hammer in 1958 and 1959, Sheriff took over in 1960 and produced an unbeaten club in his first try. That club won the first of three consecutive conference titles by UNI clubs. In all, Sheriff has coached four North Central championship teams, the last coming in 1964, when the Panthers went on to win the Pecan Bowl game over Lamar Tech, 19-17.

Other Sheriff statistics are equally impressive. He's 42-17-1 in league play; he's produced six first team Little All-Americans; and he's coached 31 all-conference selections, including seven most valuable winners.

Sheriff played his college ball at Cal Poly (San Luis Obsipo) where he was a three-time all-conference center and a Little All-American as a senior. He played in the 1953 East-West Game and the Hula Bowl, later playing three years as a linebacker in the NFL.

He currently holds a seat on the prestigious NCAA Football Coaches' Rules Committee.

Sheriff, and his wife Jane, have three sons, Paul, Michael and Richard.

The assistants

Don Erusha



Sheriff's number one assistant, Erusha is beginning his ninth season with the Panthers. He is in charge of both the defensive and offensive lines. Erusha figures to be spending most of his time this fall working with the offensive line, which was one of the Panthers' major headaches a year ago. Erusha has consistently developed top-flight linemen, but none so accomplished as two-way guard Ray Pedersen, who was a first team Little All-American in 1967. Erusha graduated from Coe College and coached in the high school ranks at West Union, West Branch, Mt. Clemens, Mich., and Cedar Rapids, Washington. Prior to his arrival at UNI in 1963 he was on the Coe staff. Don and his wife Pat have one daughter, Kay, a junior at UNI this fall.

Dennis Remmert

Remmert is the senior member of former UNI players on the Panther coaching staff. Beginning his eighth season, Remmert has the responsibility of coaching the defensive secondary, including both the linebackers and deep backs. At one time or another, Remmert has held most of the assistant coaching spots at UNI. He started as freshman coach, and, before switching over to the defense, was offensive backfield and end coach. During his playing days Remmert was a two-time all-conference selection, and was a second team Little All-American pick in 1959. He graduated in that year and after a short pro career, joined the Panthers as a graduate assistant. He coached one year at Fort Dodge Junior College before returning to Cedar Falls. A native of Mason City, he and his wife Sandy have a son, Chad.



Dan Boals



UNI's newest assistant coach gets his first college coaching experience this fall, but actually Dan Boals is familiar with the UNI system. In charge of the offensive backfield, Boals was twice named the North Central Conference's most valuable back during his playing career at UNI. And in his final season (1962) he was named to the first Little All-American team at fullback. Despite having many of his school rushing records wiped out by Randy Schultz, Boals still holds the single season scoring record and is second in career rushing and average gain. Prior to his arrival at UNI, Boals had a successful three-year coaching stint at Waterloo West, where he compiled a 21-5-1 record. Boals and his wife Carol have two sons, Shannon and Aaron, and a daughter, Alinda.



Elmer Kortemeyer

It's year No. 6 for Kortemeyer as Northern Iowa's head trainer. A former UNI student, Elmer completed his undergraduate studies at the University of Wyoming in 1957 and received his M.A. from the same school in 1962. In the interim he coached high school football and basketball in Wyoming. He and his wife Joy have two sons, Karl and Paul, and two daughters, Clare and Katherine.

Jim Rudd

Rudd has retained the enthusiasm he showed two years ago when he was named UNI's most valuable lineman with a great senior year at defensive guard. Rudd's specific duties will include directing the junior varsity program, which begins Sept. 27 with a home game against Wartburg. Last year Rudd was the hardest-working student assistant on the staff, and helped out with recruiting in the fall. He and his wife Connie have no children.



Graduate assistants —

Earl McQuiston

A starting guard-linebacker at the University of Iowa in 1961 and 1962, McQuiston will assist Erusha in handling the offensive line. Was given first team all-state accord as a Keokuk prep. McQuiston also has experience in pro ball, playing linebacker for Montreal of the Continental League in 1967 and 1968.

Brian Naber

A recent graduate of Concordia Teachers College in Nebraska, Naber will be assisting with the wide receivers this fall. A versatile athlete at Concordia, Naber was a two-year letterman in basketball and baseball and a three-year letterman in football. Will assist in the UNI intramural program after football.

Bill Montignani

Montignani comes to UNI with the most coaching experience of the graduate assistants. He coached and taught at Emmetsburg and LeMars one year each, and for the last two years has coached basketball and football at Plainfield. His two-year football record was 13-1-2, including an 8-0 mark last year. Like Naber, will also assist in the intramural program.

1971 — On the way back

Inevitably, the 1971 pre-season look at University of Northern Iowa football begins with the Panthers' disappointing 1970 campaign.

It begins with how the UNI coaching staff was forced to re-evaluate a program which, to many observers, was in good enough shape to produce a title-contending team—but which rather fell mysteriously to last place in the North Central Conference with a 2-8 overall record.

The end result of that re-evaluation was a decision by the staff to strengthen the program at its roots—to turn the main thrust of its recruiting drive away from the junior college and back to the high school.

And the result of that decision?

Simply the largest freshman class ever recruited by the university. Some 35 first-year athletes will be on hand Aug. 22 when the '71 Panthers arrive in Cedar Falls for three weeks of pre-season drills.

'On the way back'

Therefore the "on the way back" philosophy, and, as Sheriff says, "We're not anticipating immediate recovery, and we're not ruling it out, either."

The reason for the latter qualification is that Sheriff has 21 lettermen on the scene, and despite their performance a year ago, the staff is firmly convinced that a good majority of them are "players."

Nowhere are the Panthers stronger than at the running back positions, where three proven veterans return—juniors Dave Hodam and Jerry Roling along with senior Jim Gorsh, one of four 1971 captains.

After two years of flirting with a variety of positions, the fleet 6-1 195-pound Hodam is at last set at half-back, where he showed glimpses of greatness a year ago. The shifty Roling, after spending the 1970 season at slot-back, spent spring practice at the fullback spot alongside Gorsh, who will attempt to escape the injury bug this fall.

Schooley ineligible

The quarterback situation, which brightened a bit with the performance of junior college transfer Ron Schooley, faded again when it was discovered that Schooley, along with fellow JC transfers Chuck Follett and Larry Ford, were ineligible.

An obscure rule regarding academic achievement of the junior college athlete, which went into effect this spring, was the cause for the ineligibility ruling for the three.

The loss of Schooley puts the quarterbacking responsibilities squarely on the shoulders of sophomore Al Wichtendahl, who was forced into action as a freshman a year ago. Sheriff tried everything to avoid putting the Cherokee youngster in a starting role. But when it became necessary, the UNI staff was impressed with the way Wichtendahl performed "under the gun."

Strong receivers

If Wichtendahl is able to deliver the ball, the Panthers are in business because their pass receiving corps is more than adequate. The leader, of course, is senior flanker Larry Skartvedt, who led the club in catches a year ago with 30. He, along with split end Bruce Dinnebier, a junior from Waterloo, supply ample speed for the long ball threat.

Junior Dave Bright, a transfer student, gives UNI the size at tight end which the Panthers have lacked the last few years.

Top assistant coach Don Erusha has mixed emotions about his chief concerns—the offensive and defensive lines. He is enthusiastic about his defensive personnel, almost all of which is from the Waterloo-Cedar Falls area, but he is concerned with developing a top-flight offensive line, something the Panthers lacked during the 1970 season.

Co-captain Mike Allen of Waterloo heads up the defensive front four which includes five local athletes. In fact, the starting lineup could read like this: Allen and Doug Schuler or

Dick Blau, both of Cedar Falls, at tackle; and Lynn Stickfort of Cedar Falls and Nelson White of Waterloo at guard.

Allen, Schuler and White are lettermen, Blau is a sophomore who was ineligible last year and Stockfort is a junior college transfer from Ellsworth.

The outlook on the other side of the line is much cloudier. Erusha has veterans like Ken Rosenkrans and Tom Jordan at guard and Sim Ginn and Gene Dietrich at the tackles, but the experience ends right there.

Need back-ups

As Erusha explains, "We'll have to find back-up men for almost all of our offensive line positions." The conjecture here is that the offensive line may be one area where freshman talent, the likes of Charles Frisk of Ackley-Geneva and Gary Meyers of Waterloo, may be utilized immediately.

Dennis Remmert shares a similar problem, especially in the vital line-backing corps, where he will be forced to replace two-thirds of last year's team of Mike Filer, Bob Lee and Dennis Meyer. Of the three, only Lee returns, but lettermen are available in Mike Brooks and Scott Evans.

All-American junior college pick Walt Fieseler of Fort Dodge should make Remmert's rebuilding of the deep secondary a relatively easy task. Fieseler will soften the loss of all-conference cornerback Jim Luhring, leaving only the strong safety position up for grabs.

Freshman starter Mike Woodley returns at free safety, and senior Randy Junkman is back at the other cornerback spot.

The talented duo of punter Mike Butler and place-kicker Gene Dietrich is back intact, making the kicking game one of the Panthers' strongholds.

Sheriff says . . .

"I believe we will see obvious improvement in our team this fall—especially in the area of attitude. Squad morale was at a four or five-year peak during drills last spring, and I look for that to carry over into the season. . . .

"There's no doubt that the loss of Ron Schooley will hurt us. We were quite amazed with the improvement he made during the spring. But you'll remember we never did overlook the play of Al Wichtendahl. Al earned the respect of our entire staff last fall, and he's never lost it. I actually believe he can do the job for us

"I think our large—and talented, I might add—freshman crew will begin paying dividends for us immediately. Maybe not directly, but certainly they will give us competition and depth at almost every position. That's something we had to go without last year. . . ."

Where are they now?

Stan Sheriff's 64-40-2 career record at the University of Northern Iowa is far from a complete documentary of his 11-year tenure at UNI. One of Sheriff's proudest accomplishments is his continuing contribution to the high school and college coaching ranks. The list below includes those men who participated in the UNI football program since Sheriff's arrival, who earned their undergraduate degrees at UNI, and who then went into the coaching profession.


. . . Allen to Yelland

1971 Co-captains

22—LARRY SKARTVEDT, FL, 5-10, 185, Sr., Radcliffe, Ia. "Skarty" appears ready for an outstanding senior year as UNI's top pass-catching threat. Caught 30 passes last year despite missing part of the season. Has two-year total of 69 receptions. Has all the tools—speed, agility, confidence—to excel at flanker position. Top pro prospect on the team.



35—JIM GORSH, FB, 6-1, 220, Sr., Cedar Rapids, Ia. Oldest member of the team, Gorsh must escape injury tendencies to become regular performer. Reported to camp last year in top shape, but couldn't stay there when he suffered leg injuries. Had a fine 3.5 gain per carry in 35 attempts last year, and had the longest run of the year, a 40-yarder against South Dakota State.



51—GENE DIETRICH, OT, 6-1, 225, Sr., Marengo, Ia. Dietrich sees double duty for the Panthers as place-kicker and a two-year veteran in the offensive line. Has a hand in almost every school field goal and PAT record, and last year booted a 39-yarder to beat Drake, 13-10. Should be a strong leader among youthful offensive linemen. Coaches expect strong year from Marengo senior.



60—MIKE ALLEN, DT, 6-1, 200, Sr., Waterloo, Ia. Quickness makes this outstanding athlete from East Waterloo a tough target for opposing offensive linemen. Was one of UNI's most consistent performers during the 1970 season. Has great upper body strength which helped him win a North Central Conference wrestling title in his sophomore year. Should challenge for league honors.



Returning lettermen

13—DAVE HODAM, TB, 6-1, 195, Jr., Des Moines, Ia. After nearly two years of searching, Hodam found himself a home at tailback at the end of the 1970 season. Rushed for 100 yards in season finale against Western Illinois. The versatile performer is also adept at catching passes, is a threat to throw the halfback option and is a fine kickoff return man.

14—AL WICHTENDAL, QB, 6-1, 190, So., Cherokee, Ia. The pressure once again is on the Cherokee youngster to come through at the quarterback spot. Forced to enter the starting position as a freshman, Wichtendahl impressed UNI coaches with his gutsy play. The physical tools, including a strong arm, are there. If the confidence is there, he could make the Panthers a winner.

17—MIKE BUTLER, P, 5-8, 155, Jr., Des Moines, Ia. Butler begins the third leg of his attempt to win the NCC punting crown four straight years. Again last year he flirted with the 40-yard average, but ended up half a yard short. Still booms the ball a mile high—he had a best of 68 yards last year—and needs now to develop only consistency.

20—MIKE WOODLEY, FS, 5-8, 160, So., Waterloo, Ia. Some said a freshman couldn't play free safety in collegiate ball; many said he was too small to play anywhere. But little Mike Woodley had few skeptics left after he played the last seven games of the season at free safety. A fiery competitor, Woodley tied for the club interception title with four.

28—JERRY ROLING, FB, 5-11, 195, Jr., Eldora, Ia. Like Hodam, Rolling has apparently found a home after being moved around during his first two years. Last year played slot-back, and was the No. 2 pass-catcher on the team with 12 catches and 92 yards. UNI coaches hope to take advantage of his shifty running style by playing him at fullback, where he has also shown an adequate supply of power. He and Hodam make solid 1-2 running punch.

34—KARL KRUMM, SS, 5-10, 190, Sr., Tripoli, Ia. Started first game of 1970 season at strong safety, but later was forced to relinquish his job to senior Wayne Smith. Strong at coming up fast on the running sweeps. His development in 1971 is crucial, because the UNI depth is not over-abundant in the deep secondary. Could make strong quartet along with Woodley, Junkman and Fieseler.



43—RANDY JUNKMAN, DHB, 6-1, 190, Sr., Manson, Ia. Tied Woodley for team leadership in interceptions with 4. In his first year at UNI failed to realize full potential. Made several superb deflections during the year—especially in the Drake game, where he batted down a certain touchdown pass on first play of the game. Big year for Junkman could give UNI strong corner-backing duo with All-American college star Walt Fieseler.

54—ROBERT LEE, LB, 6-3, 215, Sr., Chicago, Ill. Sheriff calls Lee one of the "finest physical specimens" to play football under him at UNI. Still, the lanky linebacker must step up his development in order to fulfill the forecasts made for the Chicago native. Delivered some of the stiffest blows of the 1970 season. But needs to develop consistency in his game effort. Could be put at either middle or outside linebacker.

47—J. SCOTT EVANS, LB, 6-1, 195, Sr., Knoxville, Ia. Started at right linebacker a good portion of 1970 season when regular Dennis Meyer sat out with injuries. Tough on the running game, as he showed against Drake, but mobile enough to help out on pass coverage. Another senior who must reach full potential immediately in order for the Panthers to have a successful 1971 season. He and wife Leslie have twin daughters.

55—KEN ROSENKRANS, OG, 6-1, 220, Jr., Waterloo, Ia. Played three different positions in 1970, and that had to hurt the effort of this former all-stater from East Waterloo. Began at center, his old high school position, but then had to be shifted to defensive tackle until lack of numbers brought him back to the offense, this time at guard. Looked strong in spring drills, and after a stint with the National Guard this summer, could become UNI's top lineman.

Started the year at defensive end, and ended up at left guard on offensive. How well UNI's newcomers fare in the offensive line will determine which side of the pit Jordan will play.



guard Doug Walter and White should be a capable replacement for the graduated Walter. Has all the physical tools, plus an outstanding attitude and temperament for his position.







His brother Dan is a freshman on the team. Hard-nosed Metzger is playing a tough position for a sophomore, but great attitude and determination may get him the job.

48—**NELSON CONVERSE**, DHB, 5-10, 180, So., Sumner, Ia. The UNI staff is planning on big things from this Sumner sophomore. Converse had trouble adjusting to the defensive halfback position last fall, but that is understandable, considering he played guard in high school. Should

be a top-flight substitute this year.

50—**STEVE LOUNSBERRY**, C, 6-4, 210, So., McCallsburg, Ia. Lounsberry's development at the center position should be obvious as the year progresses. Was told at the end of the season last fall to practice snapping the ball during the winter. Polish is not there yet, but by mid-season should begin giving the Panthers a top performance.

56—**JIM BOHNSACK**, C, 6-1, 210, So., Estherville, Ia. Son of former UNI All-American Lou Bohnsack, Jim started at center for the junior varsity last year, and that experience should enable him to challenge Lounsberry for the No. 1 job.

95—**MIKE KOCK**, DG, 6-6, 245, Jr., Lohrville, Ia. Panther coaches are still waiting for Kock, the biggest man on the team, to come into his own. Can be tough when he wants to be, but needs to develop tough mental attitude which will result in consistency.

96—**ED BROWN, DG, 6-3, 215, Fr., Washington, Ia.** Starred alongside Scott Swartzendruber at Washington in both football and track. A burly tackle, Brown was a first team all-conference pick in football and a place-winner in the state discus.







Sloan seeks third 'Cinderella' season

In his first two seasons as head football coach at Northeast Missouri, Russell Sloan has given the pre-season pollsters fits.

In both 1969 and 1970 the Bulldogs were given no better than a shot at a third or fourth place in the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA). But both years Sloan guided NEM to a co-championship finish.

However, 1971 may well be Sloan's toughest challenge yet.

Graduation eliminated 12 lettermen and four first team all-conference selections. Included in the latter category was quarterback Don Cummings, who in his senior year passed for 2,221 yards and 15 touchdowns.



So, the questions which face head coach Dean Pryor, who is heading into his second year, are:

1. Can the Jackrabbit offense pick up where it left off last year against Morningside, and

2. Can the SDSU defense mend its fences and lower its per game allowance of 26.5 points a year ago.

If the Jacks can answer "yes" to both those questions, they may be able to move back into the position of conference leadership which they enjoyed in the early 1960's.


