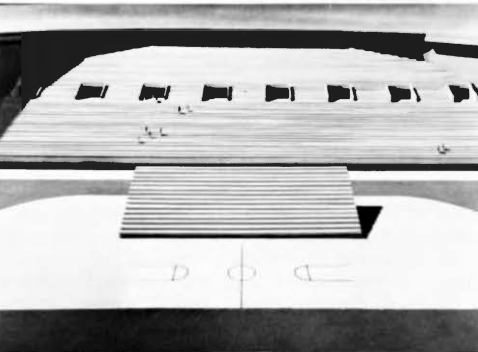
YOUR HOST AT NORTHERN IOWA

UNI-DOME NEARS REALITY

With the beginning of the 1975 football season, the University of Northern Iowa athletic department will be moving into a new facility ... **AND WHAT A FACILITY** ... the UNI-Dome. A covered arena that will allow indoor football, basketball, wrestling, track, gymnastics, and tennis, it will be a unique building — the first of its kind in the Midwest.

Groundwork began for the structure in July of 1974 and completion is set for the fall of 1975. The unusual structure consists of a translucent, teflon-coated fiberglass roof that will be inflated by air pressure from within the Dome. Seating is expected to be just over 8,000 initially while expansion to around 16,000 will come in a short time. Costing \$5.5 million, the structure will have a completely removable artificial gridiron turf that can be rolled up in 45 minutes revealing a base surface for basketball games, track, etc.

Due to limited press box space, only advance requests for credentials will be guaranteed front row seating. Scouts and non-working press will be moved down from the back row only if space permits. **Absolutely no one will be admitted without proper credentials.**

Stations will be assigned broadcast booths upon request for permission to broadcast. Stations must order their own telephone hookup.

Members of the press may park in the athletic club parking lot west of O. R. Latham Field by displaying the proper parking permit (available upon request). Photographers may receive credentials from the sports information office. The pass issued will be good for both sideline and press box areas. Photographers must have a pass to be admitted to stadium

Play-by-play, individual and team statistics at the quarter breaks, at halftime, and at the conclusion of the game, scoring summary, pre-game information, and programs will be furnished at your seat. Coffee and soft drinks along with a light lunch will be available during the contest.

..... CREATES EDUCATIONAL EXCITEMENT

The University of Northern Iowa is relatively new in name but the school itself is nearly 100 years old. Created by the Iowa General Assembly, the university opened in 1876 as Iowa State Normal. In 1909, the name was changed to Iowa State Teachers College and under this name the school attained a national reputation as a leader in the field of teacher education. In 1961, the name was again changed to State College of Iowa and six years later attained its present name.

Teacher education remains the chief function of the university, a wide-ranging program of non-teaching courses, including professional training in business and science-related areas, are now offered.

The school has grown from its original 40-acre site to more than 40 buildings and 600 acres. New structures include the Union, science building, music building, Towers residence and dining complex, the physical education instructional center, the modern education center and an addition to the library.

UNI's prowess in teacher education has left its mark on the physical education department, which turns out per capita the largest number of coaches in the state.

Maintenance of a well-rounded intercollegiate athletic program is of prime interest to the UNI staff. The success of this endeavor is indicated by the fact that Panther teams have won the conference's all-sports trophy the last three years.

The University retains membership in the National Collegiate Athletic Association and is one of eight schools in the rugged North Central Conference — America's premiere college division league. A full round of 11 intercollegiate sports are sponsored by the conference and all have championship events.

A Tradition

..... O. R. Latham Stadium



O. R. Latham Stadium has been the home of the Panthers for nearly 35 years. Dedicated in 1940, the stadium has seen additions in 1963 and 1965 and presently seats 7,300 fans. It is a steel and concrete facility with lights. Over the years, Panther teams have fared well. UNI has won 107 games against 41 losses and 5 ties inside the friendly confines of the venerable old stadium.



The names and the faces change and the uniforms have evolved to the present day standard, but the action remains. Above, UNI gridgers compete in the early days of the stadium, helping the Panthers to roll up seven championships in the first seven years of the stadium's history. Panther teams have rolled up five more league titles since those days, the last in 1964. Below, recent action at O. R. Latham Stadium, continuing the well-established UNI winning tradition.



Stan Sheriff — Energy, Dedication, Success

Head Football Coach and Athletic Director

It's been 15 years since Stan Sheriff became the head man at the University of Northern Iowa. Since that time, the law enforced by UNI's Sheriff has been stern for opponents and justice has prevailed on the side of the UNI Panthers.

An impressive 77-56-2 mark over the first 14 years is the first indication of the success enjoyed by Panther teams under the tutelage of the former All-American and professional football player. That mark becomes even more significant when one realizes that Sheriff coached teams have captured four North Central Conference titles and participated in two post-season bowl games.

Northern Iowa won league crowns in 1960 (Sheriff's first year as head coach), 1961, 1962, and 1964 under the highly respected Sheriff. As a matter of fact, the Panthers have placed in the first division of the NCC — widely acknowledged as the toughest NCAA Division II league in America — 12 times in 14 years including eight 1st or 2nd place finishes.

In Sheriff's first year at the reigns of the Panthers, UNI lost a 17-6 contest to Hillsdale College in the Mineral Water Bowl. The Panthers 1964 title team participated in the NCAA Mid-West regional championship, the Pecan Bowl, and earned a 19-17 decision over Lamar Tech.

The caper to all these facts and figures is, UNI teams have been blessed with seven first team All-American selections, two second team picks (including defensive free safety Mike Woodley last year), and two third team All-Americans. In addition, 38 Sheriff-coached athletes have been named to the All-North Central Conference team over the years.

The 42-year-old Sheriff is a native of San Francisco where his mother still resides and was an All-American center at Cal Poly in 1953. He became one of the first college division players ever invited to the annual East-West Shrine All-Star game and the Hula Bowl game. From there, the rugged Sheriff advanced to the National Football League where he played linebacker for three years with the Rams, Browns, Steelers, and Redskins.

A United States Army veteran of two years, he earned a bachelors degree in 1954 and masters in 1958 from Cal Poly. Sheriff holds positions on the NCAA Football Rules Committee, the American Football Coaches Public Relations committee, and is a regional member of both the NCAA football and baseball post-season selection committees.

In recent years, Sheriff has assumed the duties of Athletic Director and has guided UNI's balanced program to three straight NCC All-Sports titles. In addition, he has been one of the moving forces in forming the UNI-Dome into a reality.

Stan and his wife Jane have three sons — Paul, Michael, and Richard.

Erusha

DON ERUSHA—Offensive Line Coach ... A 1953 graduate of Coe College, Erusha has been with Sheriff's staff since 1963. Erusha has coached in both the defensive and offensive line during his 11-year stay at UNI and has consistently molded top-flight linemen, highlighted by first team Little All-American Ray Pedersen in 1967. Prior to his arrival on the UNI scene, Erusha coached in the high school ranks at West Union, West Branch, Mt. Clemons, Mich., and Cedar Rapids Washington. He also was a member of the Coe College coaching staff in the early 1960s. Don and his wife Pat have one daughter, Kay.



Remmert

DENNIS REMMERT—Defensive Line, Linebacker Coach ... Second on the staff in terms of years, Remmert begins his 11th year at UNI. He is no stranger to the Panther scene. In the late 1950s, Remmert starred for the Panthers as a hard-nosed tackle. He earned All-Conference honors in 1958 and 1959 and then won All-American awards in '59 on both the Williamson and the Associated Press Little All-American teams. He played briefly with Buffalo in the pro ranks. He served as a graduate assistant under Sheriff in 1961 and 1962 before coaching at Iowa Central Community College (Ft. Dodge) for one year. He returned to UNI to help coach the Panthers to the Pecan Bowl in 1964. He and his wife Sandy have two young sons, Chad and Brad.



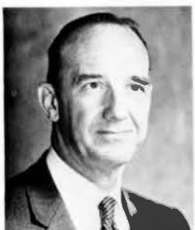
Boals

DAN BOALS—Defensive Backfield Coach ... An outstanding running back for Northern Iowa in the early 1960s, Boals joined the Panther staff in 1971 and will be returning for his fourth season at UNI. Twice named the NCC's outstanding back while running from the fullback slot, he was picked to the first team Little All-American backfield in 1962. His 90 points scored during that campaign still stands as a UNI record. Boals coached at Charles City and West Waterloo High Schools prior to returning to UNI. He and his wife Carol have two sons, Shannon and Aaron, and a daughter, Alinda.

REGINALD GREEN—Receiver Coach ... Green will be starting his first year at Northern Iowa as a fulltime assistant. He coached for the Panthers last season in a graduate assistant capacity so he is quite familiar with the strengths and weaknesses he must deal with. A native of Columbus, Ohio, he had a college career at Waldorf Junior College and Luther College. Green is a bachelor.

There may be more reason for optimism in the 1974 Northern Iowa football camp than in any UNI camp in a number of years. And the reasons are quite evident. The Panthers will have 35 lettermen on hand from last year's 5-5 team that showed signs of being ready for stardom. Included is a veteran offensive crew and a defensive unit that may just be sprinkled with enough veterans to make it more than adequate.

It's a long way from September 7 when UNI opens on the road at Kansas State-Pittsburg to November 9 when UNI closes on the road at the University of South Dakota, but let's make one thing perfectly clear. UNI has the potential for one of the best teams in many years. The Panthers have to be rated as definite contenders in the North Central Conference in 1974. Let's take a look:

EXPLOSIVE FIREWORKS ON OFFENSIVE ... That's the case for the University of Northern Iowa in 1974. Of course, the Panthers will have to wait until November before the final verdict is in but all signs point to a successful trial under fire.

OK, the reasons ... The Panthers return as many as nine offensive starters for the coming campaign although it is probable that just eight will be in the starting lineup when the opening whistle blows ... The Panthers will be blessed with a veteran offensive line that could be one of the best blocking outfits in recent school history. Heading that cast are veterans Mike Timmermans (6-2, 222) and Charles Frisk (6-4, 232) at guards and Dave Skibsted (6-3, 219) and Dennis Harms (6-1, 215) at tackles in the Panthers Houston Veer offense. The switch of Randy Scott from defense to offensive center could help to fill the gap left by All-NCC center Steve Lounsberry (graduated). Tight end Scott Donovan (6-2, 211) returns and is a good target for the pass, grabbing 5 aerials for one TD last season.

The receiving corps appears to be in good shape headed by leading 1973 receiver Dave Schooley. The slick Schooley captured 22 passes for 483 yards and four scores last season. Schooley will be at the split end slot. The wide receiver position will likely go to converted quarterback Jim O'Donnell (6-2, 192). O'Donnell worked at the position on spot occasions late last year and made the full switch this spring. He apparently will move ahead of 1973 starter Mike Hillman who caught seven passes for 115 yards in 1973.

The offensive backfield could be as good as any in the upper midwest. The Panthers will have experience at all positions. Quarterback Bill Salmon ran the club to strong offensive showings of 444 yards, 431 yards and 378 yards against Drake, Morningside, and the University of North Dakota indicating the potential that he will lead. And he has the credentials to lead them. Salmon ran for 224 yards and scored 5 TDs on the ground and passed for 963 yards and five touchdowns. The classy junior-to-be is not a one-man show. He has the leading rusher from last season—Pat Batten (6-1, 198)—to depend upon. Batten netted 645 yards last season and averaged 4.8 yards per carry. He was the only UNI rusher to gain over 100 yards in a single game—peaking at 129 yards against the Sioux of North Dakota. Also available is

senior letterman, Larry Martin. Two lettermen are listed behind them in Tom Scalissi and Pat Eisenmenger. Both were freshmen last year and should provide outstanding depth. Several top freshmen could be considered as potential help as well—Bill Vining and Gary Eagle—due to their blazing :04.5 speed in the 40-yard dash.

DEFENSE IS REBUILT BUT STRONG ... If opponents are looking for a weak link in the UNI armor, then defense will be the point they pick. Fortunately, the Panthers have had a long history of solid defensive teams under Sheriff and 1974 does not appear to be year that the Panthers will deviate from that pattern.

The front line defense of the Panthers suffered greatly due to graduation but Sheriff appears to have that problem solved. Big Ed Brown returns at one tackle and the 6-2, 235 lb. athlete should be one of the best in the NCC. Jim Campbell started at defensive end for a while last season before being injured (broken hand) and he has now made the shift to fill the vacant middle guard position. The move has turned out well and the 6-1, 225 griddler will help make the team solid. Letterman Clarence Daniels could help at tackle. One end slot could go to JC transfer Walt Krebs (6-2, 235), an All-Iowa JC pick in 1973. He was impressive in spring drills but will have to overcome an off-season summer injury. Other lettermen available are end Tom Smith and tackle Tim Carson. Several newcomers could also help with depth.

UNI linebacking in 1974 is ? ... With Steve Blankenberg back for the 1974 season, the Panthers have a starter with proven ability. If Paul James is able to recover from a serious knee injury last season he could be a major help at either linebacker or in the defensive line at end. Letterwinner John Aldrich had a good spring and could challenge for considerable action. High school All-American Derrick Dickerson could be good enough to be a valuable addition as a freshman. And defensive end Marty Stratton is versatile enough so that he could be used in the linebacking spot.

The deep back situation is good despite the Panthers losing the services of graduated All-American Free Safety Mike Woodley and starting strong safety Nelson Converse. Three players that started for UNI all of the campaign at the cornerback positions in 1973 return. Jim Thomas was a fixture while Ron Dodd started the first part of the season and Phil Ross handled the chores during the last half. Thomas and Ross appear to be the starters in 1974 but the Panthers lose nothing when Dodd is inserted.

Larry Norman, a two-year letterman and understudy at the strong safety position, should fill that gap with no noticeable difference. Doug Jones is the man who must fill the shoes of Woodley at free safety. He is a letterman and should prove to be adequate.

Specialists Jim Fransen and Kriss Smith are two of the best in the North Central Conference. Fransen finished second in the NCC in punting last season and averaged better than 39 yards a kick last season. Smith kicked 15 of 16 PATs and hit on 5 of 11 field goal attempts.

Undoubtably, one of the major strong points for the 1974 team ... Donovan, Skibsted, Harms, Timmermans, and Frisk worked together as a solid unit last season ... All-NCC center Steve Lounsberry will be missed but the move of Randy Scott to center should be more than adequate ... Look for Timmermans and Frisk to be two of the best in the NCC ... Could be one of the best lines in recent UNI history.

THE PASSING GAME

Should be even better than last year ... The Panthers will have a good passing attack to worry opponents with next season as Salmon looks to improve on 1973's good statistics (5 TDs, 50 completions, 963 yds.) ... All the 1973 receivers are back ... Schooley was the top target with 22 catches and 4 TDs and is a threat all the time ... O'Donnell goes wide after two years at QB and the change looks good ... Hillman is a threat long and short as is Alston while Donovan and Schwartz are good receivers from the tight end slot.

THE RUNNING GAME

The Passing game will be well complemented by a Houston Veer running attack that features at least six good running backs ... QB Salmon gained 224 yards and 5 TDs via the ground attack last year ... Batten paced the UNI attack with 645 yards and should be one of the top backs in the NCC this season ... Martin could be ready to fill the only gap left by Hodam's departure ... Scallissi and Eisenmenger are experienced and ready to step in ... And soph Tom Haning could be ready after an impressive spring performance.

THE FIELD GOAL

All that need be said here is Kriss Smith who kicked 5 of 11 field goals and booted 15 of 16 extra point attempts ... Provided the margin of victory in a 20-14 verdict over Western Illinois with two medium range boots ... Beat North Dakota with a 21-yard kick in a 17-14 UNI win ... Longest kick of the season was from 40 yards.

DEFENSE

THE DOWN FOUR (FIVE)

Homecoming Record: Wins 31 Losses 15 Ties 6

ABOUT THE NORTH CENTRAL CONFERENCE

Representatives of colleges and universities in North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, and Minnesota met in the late fall of 1921 in Chicago to consider the formation of what was to become the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

There were representatives from nine institutions at the meeting; University of North Dakota Agricultural College (now North Dakota State University), North Dakota University, State University of South Dakota, South Dakota State College, Morningside College, Des Moines Municipal University, Nebraska Wesleyan, College of St. Thomas at St. Paul, Creighton University. They all became charter members and competition officially began in the spring of 1922.

Shortly after the conference began it met with some rough going as four charter members withdrew. Des Moines Municipal University was first, dropping out after the 1926 season. Nebraska Wesleyan severed relationships after the season of '27. In 1928, College of St. Thomas and Creighton University also withdrew. It was not until 1935 when Omaha University was allowed to join the conference. In 1936, Iowa State Teachers College (now University of Northern Iowa) was admitted and in 1941 Augustana College of Sioux Falls was allowed to become a member of the conference. Omaha University withdrew from the conference in February of 1943 leaving conference membership as it stood in '68; Morningside College, University of Northern Iowa, North Dakota State University, University of North Dakota, Augustana College, South Dakota State University, and South Dakota University.

At the fall meeting in 1968, Mankato State College was admitted to the NCC.

Year in and year out, the North Central Conference is one of the toughest college division leagues in the nation. The league has been represented in a post season bowl game every year since the NCAA opened college bowl contests except '71. North Dakota State has captured the national crown in football three out of the last nine seasons. Annually, NCC teams are ranked in the top 10. South Dakota, South Dakota State, and North Dakota have won national championships in basketball or placed among the top three, and are perennial powers. Four of the league's wrestling teams were ranked in the top 10 in the nation last year. The NCC has produced many All-Americans in track, crosscountry, baseball and swimming.

The Most Recent UNI All-American — Mike Woodley, 1973

The University of Northern Iowa's free safety Mike Woodley was named to the Associated Press' 1973 Little All-American defensive football team. Woodley was named to the second team.

Woodley, a 5-9 senior from Waterloo, Iowa, was a four-year starter for the Panthers and a three-year selection on the All-North Central Conference football team. At UNI, he was the co-captain of the 1973 squad that finished the season 5-5 and called the defensive signals.

He set a career pass interception record at Northern Iowa of 20 including seven thefts during his final campaign. Woodley was named as the North Central Conference's player of the week in early October for his play against Drake University in the Panthers' 31-3 victory over the Bulldogs. In that contest, Woodley intercepted two Drake aeriels, made 10 tackles and broke up three pass plays — a typical Woodley effort.

"He did an outstanding job for us for four years," noted UNI head football coach Stan Sheriff. "He was forced to start for us as a freshman when a regular suffered an injury and it was our gain."

Sheriff continued by saying, "He was All-North Central Conference for three years which is an almost unheard of feat and that speaks for itself. Mike Woodley has been a great man to work with."

"He exemplifies what we are attempting to do with our program at Northern Iowa," said Sheriff. "He is a tremendous leader and a man with exceptional integrity."

Woodley is the first UNI All-American since Ray Petersen earned a first team berth as a guard in 1967.

The following is from an article on Woodley in the 1973 final game program:

When Mike Woodley signed his letter of intent to play football at the University of

Northern Iowa in the spring of 1970, many said that he would be too small to play football in the rugged North Central Conference.

After all, wasn't it the league that boasted North Dakota State University-champions of small college football in America for the past two years (1968, 1969)—and the six also-rans who fielded teams as big as most Big 10 teams—weight-wise. And didn't Woodley weigh and measure 160, 5-8. Besides, who ever heard of Woodley when he played at



Waterloo East High School, the same school that featured America's premier high school runner that year—Jerry Moses.

Well, Stan Sheriff and the football staff at the University of Northern Iowa had no problem in tagging Woodley as a top recruiting prize. And he earned the praise during the 1970 football season when he worked his way into the starting lineup for the final 7 games of the season.

Despite his size and despite his lack of experience—being a freshman—Woodley was the leading player in interceptions that

season, picking off 4 passes from his free safety position.

Mike's size via the press books has not increased much during his four year stay at UNI, that is, physical size. His sophomore year, he was listed the same, 5-8, 160. His junior year he was 5-9, 165 and this campaign, he comes in at 5-9, 169. Maybe we're making a big deal out of Mike's size, but that's because it is a big deal.

In a tough, physical game where size and strength appears to be so vital, it is not too common to find a man who accepts the challenge that Mike Woodley has accepted. Now, maybe it's time to tell you about what his opponents think.

North Central Conference opponents have expressed it best. In the past two years—his sophomore and junior campaigns—Mike has been named to the All-North Central Conference defensive backfield and will be named for an extremely rare third time this season.

The crux of the whole matter is—Mike Woodley is a very good football player. He is the best defensive back in the North Central Conference and very possibly one of the best in the United States.

For Northern Iowa, Woodley is the defensive team leader. He calls the defensive signals, runs back punts, and moves the ball up the field on kickoffs. But mostly what he does is STICK people. Sometimes his hits are the type that can be heard throughout the stadium—bone-jarring. And sometimes he just takes the ball away from people.

In fact Woodley has intercepted the ball 20 times during his career at UNI. He snapped the old record of 15 early this season. He has 7 thefts this year after the SDSU game last weekend.

The record is incidental. Woodley's play is monumental.

Hillsdale scored its points on a 60-yd. punt return, a short run, and a 25-yd. field goal. UNI's season-leading rusher, Warren Hansen scored the Panther's lone TD on a one-yard run.

The game marked the first time in UNI history that a Panther team had appeared in a post-season bowl game.

Schultz carried the ball 38 times for 160 yards and two TDs to sting the vaunted Lamar Tech defense. Named the outstanding back of the game, Schultz' first TD aided the Panthers to a 13-3 halftime lead. It came from 3 yards out.

Earlier, the Panthers had scored on a 30-yard pass from Rich Oliphant to end Del Hammond. Tech came back with an 80-yard bomb but Schultz iced the contest with a one yard plunge.

UNI finished the season with a 9-2 mark and the North Central Conference Championship. Loren Buser, playing defensive tackle for UNI, was the outstanding lineman of the game.

The 1973 season was one of surprise, disappointment, and yet hope for the future. The Panthers finished 5-5-0 on the year. Before the year began, UNI did not know just what to expect from its young men on the gridiron but before the season was over all the emotions were reached. The Panthers started out by winning two straight games including a win over Western Illinois in one of the better Panther games in a decade. Western Illinois went on to play in the NCAA Division II national post-season championship playoffs.

National Powers South Dakota U. and North Dakota State plus NCC foe Mankato State put the skids to any UNI title dreams. But the Panthers bounced back with three impressive victories over Drake, Morningside and national power North Dakota U. What looked to be the first winning season in six years fizzled as the Panthers dropped their final two games to South Dakota State and Augustana College.
