Welcome Back to the 1993-94 School Year

We will be ready for school to open on August 24. We may look a little different, classes may be in different locations, and as always there will be some new faces, but Price Laboratory School and the PLS faculty, staff and administrators will be ready to greet each student as they come through the door on the first day of school. You are aware of the field house fire that has necessitated some changes in programs and class locations. You will also see other changes that were planned to improve and expand the PLS educational program. This issue of the PLS newsletter will describe some of the changes you will see in the 1993-1994 school year.

The field house and the status of our physical education and athletic programs have been a topmost priority this summer. The processes necessary to replace the field house are underway. As we wind our way through those processes, we will keep you up-to-date on our progress. The support shown by PLS parents and students, the UNI community, and the PLS community sustained us during those difficult weeks in June. We thank you for your thoughtfulness and wonderful genures since June 8, and we guarantee you that PLS parents and students will be involved as we move closer to replacing the field house. As we prepare this issue of the Newsletter, we do not yet know if the pool or locker rooms will be accessible. Decisions are pending regarding the safety of the fire wall, the static well, and the upstairs hall. As we receive information, we will quickly pass it on to you.

Elementary physical education will continue to be held daily. Activity classes will be held in classrooms and the calcieria. We do not have a final decision at this time as in whether or not we will be able to use the pool and locker rooms. If these facilities are not available, other activities will be substituted on what would have been swimming day. As soon as the pool and locker mons are available, we will resume the swimming program.

Middle school students will be transported to another UNI location for their physical education activity classes. Each middle school student will have two six-week sessions of physical education. Each physical education "period" will consist of two hours, which allows for transportation to the physical education site, time to change clothes for activity, an adequate period of time for physical education instruction, and time to change back into street clothes and transportation back to PLS by 3:00 p.m. This schedule will allow us to offer eight exploratory classes to middle school students. Each

exploratory will consist of one period (about 50 minutes) for a six-week session. Your middle school students will receive a complete schedule the first week of school.

All seniors will take Wellness this year. This arrangement will allow seniors to have outdoor activity during, at a minimum, the nice days of the fall and spring. If the pool is available, there may be an aquatics component. The bulk of the Wellness class is classroom instruction in a variety of topics related to health and personal wellness.

Decisions about the physical education and health program for freshmen, sophomores, and juniors will not be finalized until we receive the engineer's report regarding the pool and locker room. By registration time, we will have made arrangements for the physical education and health classes for grades nine, ten, and eleven.

Arrangements are being made to accommodate our athletic programs. We are hopeful that we will be able to find the space and appropriate times for practices for all of our athletic teams. There may be some need to practice at times different from those used with our field house. Prime practice time for UNI teams and our teams obviously overlaps, so accommodations and compromises will be necessary in order to meet the needs of all our sports teams.

It has been a challenging summer. We have, I am proud to say, risen to the occasion and met each challenge with a problem-solving, determined attitude. As a community, we can and will continue to meet each future challenge with flexibility and a positive outlook. Working together toward a common woal strengthens us.

Registration Days

We will be registering students and collecting fees on Wednesday, August 4 from 8:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. and Thursday, August 5 from 2:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. Please fill out the enclosed forms prior to bringing them to school during the designated hours on one of the two registration days. We cannot register students early. If you absolutely are unable to come on the 4th or 5th, please register as soon after that date as possible. All registrations must be completed prior to August 24,1993. School pictures will be taken for Grades 6-12 ONLY on Registration Days. Elementary pictures and secondary make-ups are scheduled for September 22.

Discussions this year among PLS faculty, administrators and parents resulted in clarification of expectations of advisors and parents and a new perspective on how to hotter meet those expectations during parents advisor student conferences.

Extending this through the middle and high school will provide for earlier communication among parents, advisors and students; give all participants an opportunity to clarify questions and conceans before we are not to turn the school year; and establish roles among parents, students and advisors. 1993-1994 School Fees

As you prepare for registration on August 4 and 5, we want you to be aware of changes in our fee structure necessitated by reductions in the PLS allocation. The chart below total "School Fees, 1993-1994" shows expected fees for each grade. There are additional costs for optional services.

The fees you pay are allocated 100% to support student services, materials, supplies, and activities transportation. We depend entirely on student fees to purchase teatbooks, positive field traps, purchase consumable student materials, and supplement classroom materials (e.g., software). If we do not receive expected fees, we cannot provide students the materials, supplies and opportunities the PLS community has come to expect. We understand that some families, particularly those with more than one student, may have difficulty needing the fee obligation on August 4 and 5. If this is the case, we ask that patents speak with Dr. Nielsen or Mrs. Robinson before registration to make arrangements for a payment schedule. Complete payment must be made at the time of registration tubless prior an augements have been made with Mrs. Robinson or Dr. Nielsen. If there are past due fees in a fee schedule has not been determined, students will not be registered. We regret that we must take such a firm line with fee payment policy, but we are madde to meet the financial obligations of our instructional program if student fees are not received.

Lunch Tickets

Your advance purchase of hondors or breakfasts will be entered into the computer program: As your student uses meals, they will be charged against the family's balance in the computer system. Please send payments mouldy. You may purchase any amount you wish.

Free and reduced-price meal applications which were approved last year will be honored during the first two weeks of the school year, but now applications must be filled if the is to continue to receive free or reduced meals. Applications are included with your summer packet.

Breakfast Program

This year we are combining our localitiest program for PLS elementary and accountary audients which will be served to the categoria area between 7:30 and 6:20 a.m. The cost will be 75 cents per meat.

Athletic Season Tickets

Regular admission for all addetic events, except toothall, is \$1.50 for students and \$2.50 for adolts. Football admission is \$2.00 for students and \$3.00 for adolts. A season token provides admission as all regularly scheduled fostball, basketball, swamming, and voileyball events hold as home. The season tasket proce is approximately 50% of the total regular cost of these events.

Insurance Forms

The school has purchased catastrophic insurance on all sundents that provides coverage in all school related activities. This insurance has been arranged through the lown High School Athletic Association. It does not replace the need for school or family health insurance, it only supplements such coverage. This insurance goes into effect after the first \$25,000 to medical expenses (in one year) related to a school accident has been covered by the tuilividual or another insurance company. Information or medical insurance that may be purchased has been included with this mailing.

Nursery-Kindergarten

For nursery/kindergarten children, August 24-26 will be devoted to Parent-Teacher conferences. We ask that parents of children in the nursery/kindergarten program sign up for a conference during registration days August 4-5. Parents of students emering the PLS nursery or kindergarten classes for the first time should bring to the conference the completed physical and immunization forms, the questionnaire about the child, and a copy of the child's birth certificate if it was not available at the Round-Up or the time of preregistration. One-hour "mini-classes" will be held Priday, August 27. The time each child will attend mini classes will be acherialed at the conference on Tuesday. Wednesday, or Thousday. The first full day of classes for all nursery/kindergarten clubdren will be Monday, August 30, 1993.

. First Week's School Hours

For children in grades 1-5, the 1993-94 school year will begin on Tuesday, August 24, 1993. On the first two days of school, students will be dismissed at 11:30 a.m. There will be no afternoon classes for N-12 students because of parent conferences.

Normal school boars for the elementary school are 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. For children in grades 1-3, batch will be scheduled from 11:10 to 11:30 a.m. and recess from 11:30-11:50 a.m. For children in grades 4-5, recess will be from 11:30 to 11:50 a.m. and lunch from 11:50 a.m. an 12:10 p.m.

Students should arrive at school between 8:20 and 8:30 a.m. If they arrive prior to that time, they should go to the cafeteria area which will be supervised.

Change of Address

We need to be notified immediately of any change of address or telephone number

· Parent Conferences

We will start the school year with parent conferences. Classes will be held in the morning only (8:30-11:30 a.m.) during the first two days of school. In order to schedule times for parent conferences, we ask that parents sign up for a conference when registering their children on August 4-5.

· Safety Patrol

· Classes Begin

Northern University Middle and High School will begin classes on Tuesday, August 24 at 8:00 a.m. in the Butzier Auditorium. At that time, students will be given instructions and report to their homerooms where they will be given their individual class schodules. Following the homeroom meetings, an abbreviated morning schedule will be in effect. School will be dismissed at 11:32 August 24, and 25. Advisors will meet with parents and advisees thring these two afternoons.

· Middle School Orientation

All middle school students are invited to attend an orientation starting at 3:00 p.m. on Monday, August 23. We will meet in the auditorium where you will receive your schedule and information about classes and activities. Following the meeting, students will tour the building to find where their classes will be field. Please plan to attend?

- Lockers

Students are to use the locker assigned to from. Locks are not provided by the school and it is expected that the student will have a secure lock with them the first day of classes and keep that lock on their locker and locked at all times. Preferably, they should be high quality combination padlocks, but key locks are acceptable. Should keys be lost or forgotten, however, it may be necessary to cut keyed padlocks off student lockers.

· Absences

We ask that parents call the Attendance Office (273-2185) between 7:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. when your student is unable to attend classes. This procedure gives the school a check on students who may be absent from school without parental knowledge, and it alerts the nurse to attendous where the studenthas been seriously ill, thus allowing an opportunity to adjust the academic expectations for that student. We do need to be informed daily if the student is absent more than one day. Please note: We will attempt to contact a parent either at home or place of employment if a call is not received.

· Parking Permits

A permit is required of any student who parks a motor vehicle in the Laboratory School lots. Permits for additional vehicles may also be obtained by purchasing the "Car Pool" plan. The charge is \$16.00 plus \$2.75 for each car in the pool. This policy is a University policy and will be enforced by University Public Safety Officers. Permits are available at the Public Safety Office in Gilebrist Hall.

School Pictures

Pictures will be taken on Registration Days, August 4 and 5 for all students in Grades 6 florough 12.
