Youthful, But Experienced Squad Returns

It is a solid team that Head Coach Chuck Patten sends into his 16th season at Northern Iowa, but don't be surprised if this team is a carbon copy of the squad last season that went 11-5 in dual competition, took second in the Mid-Continent Conference and wound up third nationally in the Division II meet.

"I think we are going to be very similar to last year," said Patten. "We graduated Poolman (Keith) and Finn (Kevin) who were very steady for us. We lose Prehm (Dave), Woodall (Mike) and Sallis (Kirk), five starters out of our lineup which is more than any other team in the top place finishers in Division II."

It will be Patten's priority to find four or five wrestlers who can handle the type of competition the Panthers will be facing in the likes of Iowa, Iowa State and Minnesota on the schedule.

After capturing five straight North Central Conference titles, the Panthers entered a new era last season in their first year in the Mid-Continent Conference and had to settle for a second place finish to Eastern Illinois. Eastern went on to finish second nationally to Cal State-Bakersfield, losing the title by



one-fourth of a point, while UNI ended up third.

Despite the losses due to graduation, Patten has a solid nucleus returning with five All-Americans and a red-shirt with a better than average shot at winning a national title.

Back is two-time defending champion Kirk Myers at 190 pounds. Myers, a highly recruited prep star from Algona, IA, continued to add to his impressive freshman credentials, totaling 34 decisions in 1978-79 against five losses and defeating Eastern Illinois' Geno Savegnago for his second straight Division II crown. Myers went on to advance to the Division I meet where he finished third. He also captured the MCC title, defeating Savegnago for the crown.

Another standout is junior Joe Gormally at 177 pounds. Gormally posted a fine 32-9-0 overall record his sophomore season and was the conference champion. He finished second to Mark Hattendorf of SIU-Edwardsville in the Division II meet, then surprised everyone, including Patten, with a brilliant fourth place finish in the Division I meet.

Patten's '79-80 squad is a relatively young one with 37 of the 49 wrestlers listed on the roster as sophomores or freshmen. Out of the 10 tentative starters listed, only Brent Hagen (126) and Kevin Kurth (HWT) will be seniors.

The schedule has been finalized with the addition of Louisiana State to the dual meet list, but Patten feels it may not be as strong as it was last year.

"This year's schedule is not as competitive as we had last season. We ended up wrestling eight of the top ten teams in Division I last year. We tried to get more home duals this year because we've always taken whoever we could



get. This year we went out and actively wrote over 100 letters to get teams to come to UNI for more competition for our fans to see. Last year we had only six home dual matches and one was snowed out, so we will have a more numerous schedule, at least dual-meetwise, but we won't be wrestling the big powers in Division I, except for Iowa and Iowa State."

The Panthers' dual meet schedule is indeed numerous with 19 matches on the docket, 13 of them at home. Along with Iowa, Iowa State and Minnesota, UNI faces tough challenges against Cleveland State, Louisiana State, Kentucky, Auburn, Georgia and Minnesota. Along with many fine collegiate teams, the Panthers host powerful Athletes in Action.

The Mid-Continent Conference championships will be held Feb. 17 at Eastern Illinois with the Division II meet at Omaha, NE, Feb. 28-March 1. The Division I tournament will swing to the far west this year, March 13-15, at Oregon State University in Corvallis.

Patten Enters His 16th Season



It has been 15 years since Charles "Chuck" Patten took over the reins as the wrestling coach at the University of Northern Iowa and he's only the fifth person in the 56-year history of UNI wrestling to hold the position.

In those ensuing years, Patten has become the winningest wrestling coach in the school's long history and one of the premier coaches in the college division and now the Division II ranks.

His record speaks loudly with two NCAA Division II Championships (1975 and 1978), three second place finishes (1970, 1972, 1974) and finishing third on five other occasions (1967, 1969, 1976, 1977, 1979). That's win, place or show in 10 of the 15 years of coaching. Patten teams have won over 70 percent of dual meet competitions (.704) with an overall record of 174-73-7. A total of 47 All-Americans have wrestled under Patten, including 14 who have garnered NCAA national crowns. In the Division II championships in Brookings, SD, last February, Kirk Myers successfully defended his 190 pound crown, with Joe Gormally (177) placing second and Ken Gallagher (150) third.

Patten, who established an impressive 28-5-2 record as a Panther himself, is well-known throughout the nation for his knowledge and promotion of the sport he loves. He recently completed a one-year term as chairman of the powerful NCAA Rules Committee. He has twice been named the NCAA Division II Coach of the Year in 1969 and most recently in 1978.

As a member of the North Central Conference, Patten won 10 titles and finished second four times. From 1974 until 1978, when UNI left the NCC to join the Mid-Continent Conference, his teams won five straight titles. Last year, in his first season in the new conference, UNI finished second to Eastern Illinois. Eastern went on to place second in the Division II championships, losing to Cal State-Bakersfield by one-fourth of a point.

For the past four years, he has done the color commentary for the live televised State High School Wrestling Championships on IPBN.

Patten began his mat career at Waterloo East High and graduated with a B.A. degree in Physical Education from Northern Iowa in 1961. Not only was he a fine wrestler, but he was the number two man on UNI's golf team and participated in the national tournament.

Along with his outstanding golfing ability, Patten finds a great amount of time to pursue his favorite hobby, fishing. He will not reveal where his secret fishing hole is located. He and his wife, Zig, have two daughters, Jamie, 11, and Cindy, 9.

as a graduate assistant to Patten during the 1974-75 season before becoming fulltime after earning his master's degree in Physical Education.

Another highly talented wrestling mentor, Briggs began his coaching career at Cedar Rapids Prairie High in 1973 after graduating from the University of Iowa in 1971.

Wrestling has been a big part of Briggs' life. As a member of the lowa mat squad four years at 134 pounds, he placed fourth in the Big Ten Conference his sophomore year and qualified for national competition. In his junior and senior seasons, he finished third. He served as the Hawkeye's team captain his senior year.

Born May 29, 1949, Briggs is a Cedar Rapids native and attended Cedar Rapids Jefferson before going on to Iowa.

Last year at 118, two-time All-American Dave Prehm was expected to carry the load, but after wrestling at 126 the first part of the season, he sustained an injury and decided to forego the rest of the season. In stepped freshman Tony Wessely (Waterloo Columbus) who finished the year with a 20-7-0 record, won his weight class at the Midlands Tournament, finished second in the conference meet and just missed making the top eight in Division II. According to Patten, Wessely is a "gifted wrestler" when it comes to reaction to the other man's moves and keeping his balance, but he will have to work on developing an offense to be more competitive and successful.

Following Wessely in the lineup are three promising freshmen. **Bob Hallman** (Des Moines Dowling) brings some outstanding credentials to UNI. Hallman was the state

champion at 112 pounds last spring and was the first three-time state finisher Dowling has produced.


Duane Grant (Britt) finished third in 1979 and second in 1978 for the powerful Britt team. **Steve Thomas** (Charles City), who wrestled for former Panther standout Jim Miller, is another state finisher looking for a chance to show his talent.

Another freshman from the plains of eastern Colorado who may make his mark in the program this year is **Rick LeForce** (LaJunta, CO-Swink High). LeForce was a four-year letterman with 56 pins in four seasons and an 80-19 record overall. Lists his greatest thrill as meeting Pope John Paul II while on a trip to Poland.

Gregor MacDonald (Stillwater, MN) is a junior who saw brief action in a couple of tournaments last season.

Reginald Koop (Ackley, IA – freshman) and **Rick Samuelson** (Decorah, IA – senior) most likely will see action in junior varsity meets and backing up the top three.

The Panthers look solid at 126 with red-shirt transfer **Brent Hagen** ready to go this season. As a freshman at Mankato State he placed second in the Division II meet and as a sophomore he won it all. He has one year of eligibility left and should provide a stable force in the early going of each dual meet. A tough competitor both physically and mentally ... will more than likely start the year off at 134, but has indicated he will drop down towards the middle of the season.

With last year's starter, Kirk Sallis, leaving school, **Doug Tredway** (Gunnison, CO-sophomore) looks to be the number one back up. Tredway appeared in three matches last year in tournaments, winning two and losing one. A freshman who may see some action is **Josh Youel** (Fort Madison, IA). Youel was selected to wrestle in the North-South All-Star Meet but was unable to compete because of illness ... had a three-year total of 76 victories for Coach Mick Pickford.

Others expected to help out at 126 are **Dave Lott** (Denver, IA – sophomore), freshmen **Brian Schu-Ier** (Waterloo, IA) and **Tim Vaughn** (Iowa City, IA).

"Until Hagen decides to come down to 126, it looks as though Tredway will be our starter," Patten said. "There will be a lot of shifting between these two weights because we have so many individuals in them."


With the departure of All-American Kevin Finn and Hagen moving down to 126 early in the year, the race for the number one spot is wide open. Unfortunately, those persons in the running either have little or no experience in collegiate wrestling.

The top candidate is sophomore **Dave McGuire** (Urbandale, IA) who wrestled in 12 matches last year, going 0-1 in dual competition and 5-6 in tournament action.

Drew Waddell (Urbandale, IA – freshman) was a runner-up in the state tournament last year at 138 and could challenge for the top spot if he can overcome the knee problems that have plagued him during the early part of fall work outs. But he is expected to return to full strength by the first of the year. **Dave Dunning** (Waterloo, IA – freshman) out of Waterloo West High's powerful wrestling program has the talent but needs to develop a "mental toughness" to be successful at the collegiate level.

The only other person with any experience at all is **Brian Moore** (Osage, IA — sophomore) who had two matches last season and lost both of them.

Other faces to look for are **Shawn** Kelly (Dubuque, IA – freshman) from Wahlert High who compiled a 16-6 record as a senior. Kelly Weiss (Charles City, IA – freshman) and Dan Drexler (Dyersville, IA – freshman) are two newcomers who will have to wait their turn for the number one position, along with Randy Fitch (Cedar Falls, IA – freshman). Bret Adams, a junior from lowa Falls, also has his hat in the ring as a candidate for the job.

All-American Larry Luttrell returns for his sophomore season after an outstanding year as a freshman. Luttrell, who prepped under his father Gene at Waterloo Central High, posted an 18-16 mark overall, finished third in the Mid-Continent Conference championships and at the Division II meet in Brookings, SD, he ended up sixth.

"Larry has outstanding talent and showed that last year as a freshman facing some of the strongest talent in the nation," says Patten. "If he can put his mind to do what he needs to do in order to prepare for the upcoming season, he should be even better."

Backing up Luttrell is Mike Van-Oosbree out of Bob Roethler's powerful program at Emmetsburg High. VanOosbree was an all-stater both in football and wrestling and competed on the North All-Star team in both sports ... had a

sparkling 47-1 dual record as a fouryear letterman . . . is the ninth child out of a family of 12, eight boys and four girls.

Another freshman putting in a bid is **Bruce Weisinger** (Fort Madison, IA — freshman). Weisinger had a three year record of 66-14-2 and was a part of Fort Madison High's undefeated team in 1977.

Brad Nordyke (Winfield, IA – sophomore) appeared in one dual match and three tournament matches as a freshman last season, but will be pressed to beat out VanOosbree and Weisinger for the back up position... is also a cheerleader for the football and basketball teams when he is not involved with wrestling.

Probably the biggest surprise last season was the performance of Ken Gallaaher at 150. Gallaaher didn't start off as the number one man, but broke into the lineup during the team's trip to Florida where he won one dual match and had a 4-1 record in the Orange Bowl Classic ... split his time between 150 and 158 but settled in at 150 during the latter part of the year ... pulled off the biggest upset in the Mid-Continent tournament knocking off undefeated Steve Spangenberg of Northern Michigan, 10-7, to win the conference crown ... went on to finish third in the Division II meet, defeating Marty Maciel of Cal State-Bakersfield.

"Ken is probably one of the hardest off-season workers we have on the team," says Patten. "He worked out every day with Brad Smith (national champion at Iowa) and improved 135 pounds on his

leg lifts and 60 pounds bench pressing. He is a tough competitor who is willing to pay the price to achieve greatness and I'm sure before he is done he will be a great one for us."

Listed behind Gallagher at 150 is junior **Rick Hartnett** (Clear Lake, IA) who appeared in four matches, all in tournament action, and was 2-2.

Brian Mead (Marshalltown, IA) is a freshman who may see action at both 150 and 158 but will certainly not dethrone Gallagher from the top spot at 150.

Jack Krumlinde (Charles City, IA – senior) wrestled at both 150 and 158 last year having 10 matches (3-7-0) and has the experience over Hartnett and Mead. With so many people at 158, he most likely will drop to 150 as the chief reserve to Gallagher, but should also see action at 158 if none of those people come through.

The only weight not represented by a UNI wrestler at last year's Division II meet ... since the departure of three-time Division II champion Gary Bentrim, this spot has been the weakest point in the lineup.

Although he doesn't have much on the mat experience behind him, John Windolf (Nashua, IA – sophomore) appears to be the strongest candidate. Windolf's only collegiate experience was in last year's UNI Open, where he went 3-2 with one fall, winning his last three matches in a row... is a very strong, physical-type wrestler.

Patten looks for freshman **Kevin Wedeking** (Charles City, IA) to put up the strongest challenge and possibly even be the number one man by the end of the season. Wedeking was the state champion this past year at Charles City ... had a 53-17-2 record and was a

three-year letterman ... competed for the North squad in the North-South All-Star Meet.

Jim Swieter (Maquoketa, IA – junior) had seven matches last year, all coming in tournament action and will be contending for a chance to be number one.

Ross Yoder (Sigourney, IA – sophomore) saw action in four matches last year as a freshman, including one dual match during the Florida trip.

Four newcomers to the UNI program are making their bid at 158. Loren Keppy (Durant, IA) and Steve Marshall (West Union, IA) are both freshmen. Keppy was a four-year letterman at Durant High under Chuck Rogers with an overall record of 72-24-4. Marshall, out of Jim Guyer's program at West Union, also was a four-year letterman, with two letters each in football, track and baseball ... once scored 33 points in a dual match.

Two upper classmen new to UNI are **Mark Geary** (North Liberty, IA – sophomore) and **Brad Blanchard** (Belle Plaine, IA – junior).

Look for a lot of shuffling between 150 and 158 due to the high number of wrestlers at 158.

The graduation of three-time All-American Keith Poolman really puts a hole in the middle of the lineup, especially with 158 being weak, but Patten thinks he may have found two young freshmen who, though they won't accomplish anything near what Poolman did, may surprise some people.

The most likely candidate is home grown **Jay Llewellyn**, a freshman from Keith Young's program at Cedar Falls High. Llewellyn was the state champion at his weight last year and is a very hardnosed, physical-type wrestler out of the Kirk Myers mold, which is quite a compliment. He was a two-year letterman in both football and wrestling and was the number four man on the Cedar Falls High golf team. Llewellyn was the North squad's entry in the North-South All-Star at 180 pounds ... lists his biggest thrill as winning the national title at the Federation Greco-Roman Nationals.

Waiting in the wings is **Dion Cobb** (Des Moines, IA), another freshman with excellent strength and a great desire to improve. Cobb was a teammate of Bob Hallman at Des Moines Dowling.

Another freshman who decided to attend UNI is **James Joy** (Wauconda, IA). Hoy was the first junior from Wauconda High to go to the state championships as a junior... Division II champion Bob McGuinn (Eastern Illinois) attended his high school.

177 Pounds

Joe Gormally is back at 177. along with Myers at 190. That makes a tough twosome to overcome in a dual meet if you happen to be behind at the end. After a fine freshman season that saw him finish fourth at the Division II meet. Gormally just got stronger, finishing his second year with a 32-9-0 mark overall (11-4 in duals, 21-5 in tournament action), winning the conference championship, finishing second to Mark Hattendorf in the Division II finals and then going on to Ames, IA, to the Division I meet and winding up in fourth place, all as a sophomore.

In the Division I meet, after pinning Joe Palivoda of Cleveland State and surprising Jim Darlington of Oklahoma, he was defeated by Bud Palmer in a very close 4-5 match. He decisioned Butch Revils of Eastern Carolina (5-4), then upset Dan Severn of Arizona State, 3-3, 1-0, after Severn had defeated him only two weeks before in a dual match, 5-7. Gormally put up a good fight against Iowa State's Dave Allen before Iosing, 6-1 ... has a two-year overall record of 61-15-0 ... Patten describes him as a battler and punisher, who won't pin his opponent very often, but gives them a working over for three periods ... is at his best in close matches at the end of the third period.


The only two men listed as backups to Gormally are **Brad Phipps** (Cherokee, IA – sophomore) and **Efonda Sprole** (Waterloo, IA – sophomore).

Phipps is a stocky, well-built wrestler who may end up down at 167 sometime during the year. He had two dual matches last year as a freshman and eight appearances in tournaments.

Sproles, out of Waterloo West High, was voted the most improved wrestler his senior year and was named to the Charles City Tournament All-Star team.

If either Phipps or Sproles is going to see much action, it will more than likely be at 167, unless an injury slows Gormally down.

Two-time Division II champion **Kirk Myers** returns for his third year at UNI and looks to repeat as the number one 190-pounder in Division II, with a better than average chance at winning the Division I crown.

Last year Myers racked up an impressive 34-5-0 overall record (13-3-0 in duals, 21-2 in tournaments), recording 20 pins along the way... was the conference champion, Division II champion and third place finisher in Division I... Patten calls him one of the most dedicated wrestlers he has ever coached and that's quite a statement, considering he has had 14 national champions in his 15 years.

In Ames last March, Myers won his first two matches by falls before bowing to Mitch Hull of Wisconsin, 5-5, 2-3 in overtime. After defeating Geno Savegnago of Eastern Illinois for the third time during the year, he upset Howard Harris of Oregon State, 10-8. Harris dealt Myers one of his three dual meet losses with a 15-12 decision only three weeks before. Myers then got a second chance at Hull and defeated him, 6-3. "Myers is the type of wrestler that will rarely get beat twice by the same person," says Patten. "He always remembers how the man beat him before and learns from his mistakes and he showed it at the Division I meet."

Myers' two-year record is an impressive 67-11-1 ... his lanky 6-2 frame is a great asset to him ... was named to the Amateur Wrestling News First Team Freshman Squad as the top 190 pound freshman in the country in 1978.

Patten, like many other wrestling coaches, finds it hard to get people to back up a person such as Myers. The only backup listed on the roster is **Mark Johnson** (Des Moines, IA – freshman) who returns to school after a hitch in the Armed Services and was a state champion his senior year in high school.

The only two heavyweights listed in the roster are a veteran senior and a promising freshman.

Kevin Kurth (Tama, IA) is the returning senior who ended up having a great season, considering he wasn't eligible until the second semester in January.

Kurth ended the dual meet season undefeated with a 7-0-0 mark and wound up third in the Mid-Continent Conference race. At the Division II meet, he won his first two matches against Mike Brown of Central Florida (a fall at 6:22) and Joe Williams of Nebraska-Omaha (5-3), then was defeated by defending champion Jeff Blatnick in a tough 2-4 match and lost to Bob Howe of Northern Michigan 6-10 to finish fifth. According to Patten, he really made great strides in his performances from match to match. His only draw back is his tendency toward injuries and if he can stay healthy, it could be a big plus for the team.

Expecting to give Kurth all he can handle is freshman **John Kriebs** from Dubuque's Wahlert High. At 6-2 and 265 pounds, he poses a big threat out on the mat... was a three-year letterman in wrestling and received two in football and was the state heavyweight champion in 1979... recorded 27 pins his senior season on his way to a 30-1 mark ... his most harrowing experience was falling off a cliff and living!

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN IOWA

The University of Northern Iowa, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, is the outgrowth of the Iowa State Normal School established by the General Assembly in 1876.

From a single building on a 40-acre campus, the University has grown to include over 40 major buildings, a 723acre campus, over 500 faculty members and over 10,000 on-campus students. Of the 11,340 enrolled for university credit in the fall of 1978, 10,455 were on-campus and 885 were through extension and correspondence. The University also maintains a laboratory school for some 700 students in preschool through 12th grade.

In 1909 the institution was renamed the Iowa State Teachers College and the government of the College, along with that of the University of Iowa and Iowa State University, was vested in the State Board of Regents, a nine-member body appointed by the Governor. Under the new name, the College attained a reputation as one of the nation's outstanding institutions for preparation of teachers.

On July 5, 1961, the Iowa General Assembly on recommendation of the Regents changed the name of the school to the State College of Iowa and redefined its function to include the offering of liberal arts degrees.

On July 1, 1967, the General Assembly on recommendation of the Regents approved university status. The name was changed to University of Northern Iowa and its function was again redefined.

Although teacher education remains an important program, the University offers degrees to students majoring in a wide variety of subjects. Thus UNI has two Bachelor of Arts degrees, one with certification to teach and one without certification. Also, a Bachelor of Technology degree can be earned with or without certification to teach, and since 1969, the Bachelor of Music degree has been offered. A Bachelor of Fine Arts degree was approved by the Regents in 1976. An Individual Studies major enables a student to pursue, with faculty approval, a wide assortment of study areas. The Bachelor of Liberal Studies, the fifth baccalaureate degree, is an external degree made available through the cooperative efforts of the three Iowa Regents universities. This degree was approved by the Regents in 1977.

On the graduate level, courses leading to the degree of Master of Arts in Education were offered for the first time in the summer of 1952 and a sixth-year program leading to the Specialist in Education degree began in 1960. A sixth-year Specialist degree with a program in science education was inaugurated in 1970.

In 1964, the Master of Arts degree was approved by the Regents. The first Master of Arts degrees were granted in 1966. The Master of Business Administration degree was approved by the Regents in 1975, and the Master of Music in 1976. The graduate program was further extended in 1978 with the



addition of UNI's first doctoral degree, the Doctor of Industrial Technology.

Ground was broken in October, 1975, for the 1st phase of the Speech/Art complex, located southwest of Russell Hall. This phase, which includes the Strayer-Wood Theatre and the Communication Arts Center, opened in January 1978.
