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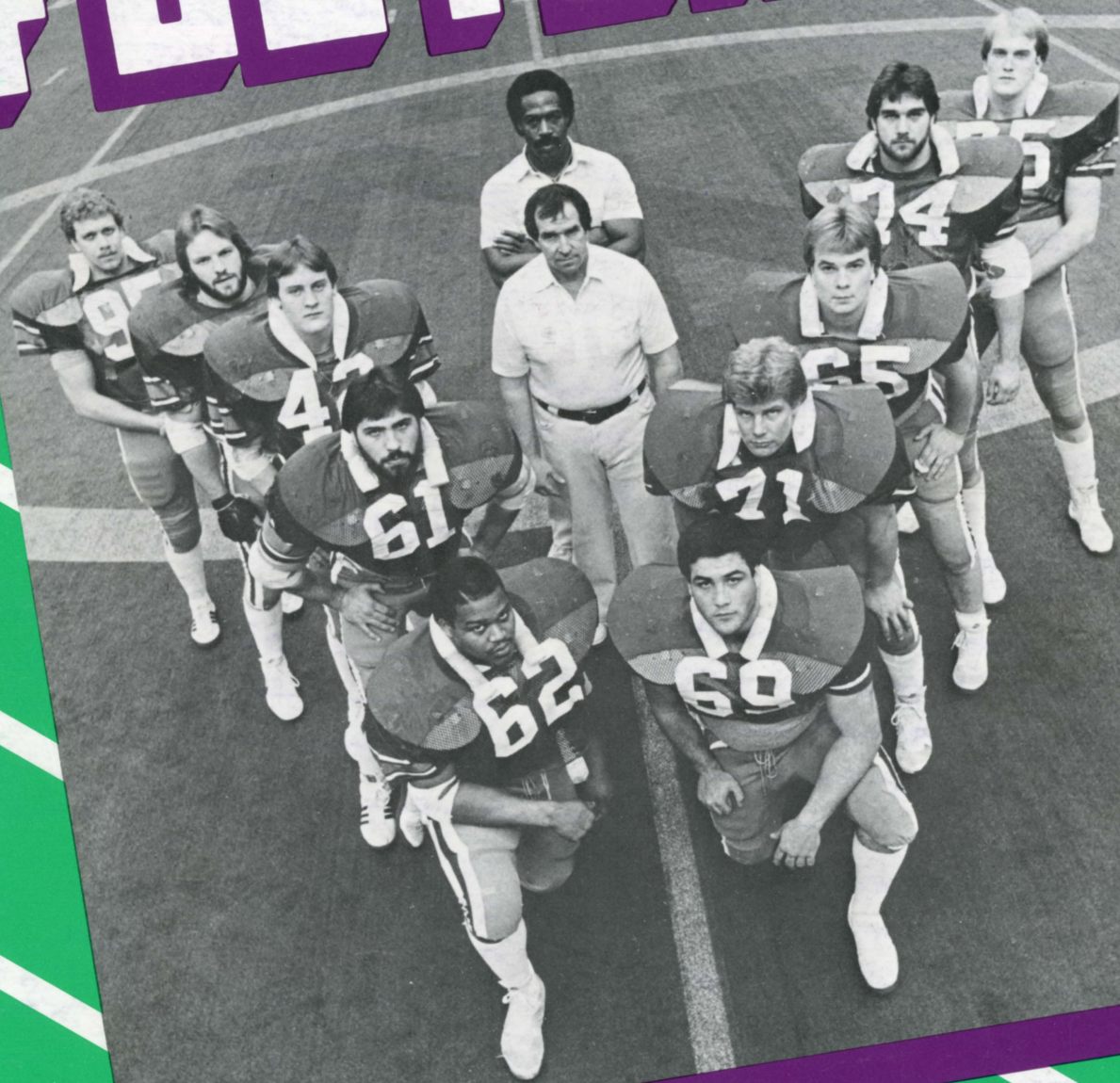

Chapter Two — The Plot Thickens

The University of Northern Iowa football storybook opened last season as any typical mystery — with a lot of unknowns because of a new head coach and several new assistants, accompanied by a new philosophy and changing teaching techniques. Chapter Two began at spring practice this year. Though the story line has just begun, the clues already have begun to come together and the mystery may be solved as early as by the end of the 1984 season.

Expectations last fall were high because of first-year Head Coach Darrell Mudra's reputation of healing not-so-healthy football programs in a very short period of time. Mudra feels those expectations turned out to be too high.

"I thought we'd be better last year," Mudra said, "but looking back, we probably didn't have any right to be better than we were. We had lost a lot of seniors and with a new staff and terminology, there was just too much to overcome. I think we were fortunate to finish on a winning note (6-5) and to improve the record slightly over the previous season."

Communication has improved over last year because of the stabilization of the staff and the fact that the players

and coaches know each other much better now. Mudra feels this has been the most important element in the amount of progress made this spring.

Other key elements in the success of UNI's spring camp was the return of 32 lettermen, including 13 starters, and the presence of six junior college transfers. Seventeen lettermen were missing, however, including center Scott Etzel who signed with the Kansas City Chiefs, wide receiver Darryl Goree, running backs Chris Miliner and James Vaughn, punter Mike Johnson and linebackers Mike Daniels, James McFadden and Mark Holmes. All have used up their eligibility except for Holmes who was injured this past winter in a fall on the ice.

The Schedule

The 1984 schedule certainly favors the Panthers. UNI will have seven home games, opening September 1 against Winona State. Nine games will be played on artificial turf, with the only games not to be played on an artificial surface being Drake September 8 and Eastern Illinois November 3.

"We'll probably start the fall outside as much as possible to prepare for Drake since that's our second game of

the year," Mudra said. "Southern Illinois and Youngstown State should be our toughest road games but since both will be played on artificial turf, the adjustment should not be great."

Mudra feels Southwest Missouri State probably should be the favored team in the Mid-Continent Conference, since it placed second last year and has almost its entire squad returning. "But they have to play us here," Mudra added. He doesn't feel Eastern Illinois will drop off too greatly in only one year but he doesn't feel his former team, which he coached five years before coming to UNI, will be as tough as last season.

The Quarterbacks

Three signal callers began spring drills and only two remained with the closing of practice in May. Two-year starter Larry Miller returns for his senior year and last year's backup QB, freshman Kevin Willard, also was in camp. Reserve Scott Rampy was moved to a defensive back position midway through the spring and freshman redshirt Mike Smith did not participate in spring drills because he played baseball.

"Offensive scheme-wise, we're 10 times better than we were a year ago," Mudra said, "and a lot of credit needs to go to our staff. The development of our quarterback is encouraging. I said all along that Miller may have been the most improved player this spring. He was a big factor in the difference between the Purple and Gold teams in the intrasquad game — he knows so much more about what's going on this year as compared to last year."

Mudra said Miller has to have a good year because of his experience. Willard possibly will be redshirted in the fall, leaving Smith as the only likely backup to Miller. No quarterbacks will be arriving in the fall.

The Running Backs

Though several running backs return from last year, including Steve Harris and Pat Williams, Mudra feels there still will be some battles in the fall for position.

Carl Boyd was the leading rusher with seven carries for 60 yards in the intrasquad game and Andre Sims and Williams had good springs. Even with that, there is not a lot of depth here so junior college transfer Scott Gardner is going to have to help out. Three other running backs report in the fall, the largest being 5-10, 215-pounder Errol Peebles out of Simeon High School in Chicago, IL.

Missing will be the top two rushers from last year — Chris Miliner, who carried the ball 134 times for 530 yards, and James Vaughn, who gained 290 yards on 81 carries. Miliner's best game last season was 174 yards against Northwest Missouri State.

Harris was the third leading rusher with 258 yards on 62 carries. He gained 113 yards against Central Missouri State a year ago.

Mudra was disappointed in the lack of a running game in the spring clash but said part of the problem might have been the fact the squads were split so evenly and timing was off. The Panthers in the last several years have used more of an aerial attack but Mudra hopes to even that out more this year.

The Wide Receivers

Decent depth fills the wide receiver positions, with the only player graduating being 1983 second leading receiver Darryl Goree who caught 34 passes for 530 yards, scoring once. However, leading receiver James Hutchings returns after capturing 43 passes for 580 yards.

Hutchings and returnees Mario Sanders and Scott Owens will play vital

roles, in addition to tight end Tom Roberts, who Mudra said "had an excellent spring." Marty Bruder also should strengthen the tight end position. Bryan Taylor, who scored the most touchdowns by pass last season with four to his credit, did not practice this spring and may not return in the fall.

The Offensive Line

At the beginning of the spring, Mudra felt the strength of the 1984 squad had to be in the offensive line in order to give the quarterback time and "that (offensive line) takes the longest time to develop. We have to learn to control the ball." At the end of the spring, he said the early progress made in the offensive line was one area which contributed to a good spring.

Missing here will be center Scott Etzel and guards Tracy Rokes and John Waskosky. Returning are starting tackles Troy Thomas and Ralph Clark. At the end of spring drills, Etzel's heir-apparent was Jeff Melchert and the guard positions were expected to be filled by backup Bill Bealles on one side and junior college transfer Mark Caballero on the other. Garden City Community College transfer Frank Ori is pressuring Caballero. However, seven offensive linemen make their first appearance in the fall, including one junior college transfer.

The Linebackers

One of the primary concerns heading into spring drills was at linebacker where the graduation of Doug Friess, Ron King, Mike Daniels and James McFadden are key losses. Spencer Cowan is one of the strongest players emerging on the outside from spring drills and Mark Steines has been moved to an outside spot to strengthen the outer edges. Also moved to the outside was running back Ken Morrison, and along with Bob Storbeck, these players have done a lot to shore up the linebacker position.

One player yet to come in this fall is Iowa Lakes Community College transfer Henry Saxon who probably will make his presence known. Another possibility in the fall is the shifting of some players from the secondary.

At inside linebacker, the loss of McFadden also was critical. The only veteran at this spot is Robert Williams but returnees Mark Farley and Randy Holcomb both had excellent springs. Hutchinson Community College transfer Danny Robinson also showed progress this spring and is expected to help out.

The Defensive Line

Besides the offensive line, Mudra feels early progress also was made in the defensive line. The loss of Mark Holmes left a very large hole to fill. Mudra, however, praised the likes of ends Art Stelken, Jeff Buss and Darren Wilson who all proved in the spring they are capable of handling the task at hand.

The veteran here is returning co-captain Joe O'Brien, who will be surrounded by returnees Cedric Hill and tackle Dwayne Price, who probably was the most improved player in the line. Hill currently is backing up O'Brien, Buss is at an end and Wilson is back after knee surgery last fall. Fred Freebolin and Terry Orth also are returnees. About nine additional ends and linemen will report this fall.

"I think we've overcome the loss of Holmes," Mudra said. "We have more confidence now in our defense."

The Secondary

Besides the linebacker spot, the other area of primary concern heading into spring drills was in the defensive secondary. But as was the case with the linebackers, Mudra feels definite progress has been made in this area.

Starter Joe Fuller, the flashy return specialist from a year ago, sat out spring drills because he competed in track. However, he will return in the fall, along with Doug Ware and Charlie Jenkins. Spencer Cowan has been moved to linebacker and quarterback Scott Rampy has been moved to weak safety.

"I think it was a stroke of genius moving Moses Aimable from wide receiver to the defensive backfield," Mudra said. "He has great speed back there and had earned a starting role at the end of the spring."

A transfer from Hutchinson Community College, he was a regional finalist in the 100 meters as a prep at Junction City (KS) High School.

The Kicking Game

The placekicking chores remain in the capable hands of returnee Mike Molstead who admirably took over for Steve Schonert last season but the punting job is wide open after the graduation of Mike Johnson. Several punters were in spring camp but Mudra expects those individuals to get rough competition from a couple of freshmen — Bob Duax from Davenport (IA) Assumption and Mike Angell from Mason City, IA.

Some say that football and hockey don't mix. Don't tell that to quarterback Larry Miller.

Miller's first athletic love was ice hockey and he didn't even attempt the game of football until his freshman year in high school.

He has since hung up his skates in exchange for a pigskin but he still enjoys a friendly version of the high-speed game of hockey.

As a youngster growing up in West Chicago, IL, Larry's father encouraged him to play in Chicago's highly competitive Inner-City Hockey League. Father Ed has always played an important role in Larry's life because of his father's play in the Old Chicago basketball league. That got the son interested in sports. Hockey was played by the son until he entered West Chicago High School.

When the hockey stick finally was exchanged for the football helmet, signal calling was not automatic. As a freshman, Miller played end on defense and tight end on offense.

It wasn't until his sophomore year that he started quarterbacking and that was because "nobody else wanted to play the position."

Miller's junior year at West Chicago High was an injury-riddled one. He went down during the first game of the year and was sidelined the rest of the season. "I wouldn't have played quarterback anyway because we had a high school all-American quarterback, Danny Stockton, who eventually went on to play at Purdue," Miller said.

Miller's senior prep season saw him thrust into the starting QB job. He responded by passing for 1,400 yards and seven touchdowns. He also excelled on defense where he played free safety, still his favorite position, by snaring seven interceptions and finishing 10th in the State of Illinois in total tackle points.

Miller came to UNI after considering such schools as Western Michigan, Indiana State, Oklahoma State, Montana State and Southern Illinois "because of the UNI-Dome." And the staff and Panther fans are glad he did.

"Larry has been a two-year starter and knows the system extremely well," said Assistant Coach Terry Allen. "The staff is counting on him heavily to do the things that a two-year starter should be able to do, not only his athletic responsibilities, but his duty as a team leader."

Miller's three football seasons at UNI have been very successful. Redshirted three years ago, he earned a starting role as a sophomore after apprenticing under Steve Sandon. Last season, under a new coaching regime, it took a while for the team to adjust to the new offense.

"We had put a lot of pressure on our quarterbacks to learn this new system and Larry began to reach the form of his sophomore year late in the spring. He has improved and in fact, probably was our most improved player in spring drills this year. He has developed even more confidence and is so much more aware of what's going on on the field," said Allen.

Having pressure put upon him has become a fact of life for Miller, as is usually the case with any quarterback. He handled the pressure of replacing Sandon by throwing 12 touchdown passes and averaging 160 yards with a 55 percent completion ratio his sophomore year. He also set a school and conference record with his 88-yard scoring toss to Darryl Goree against Youngstown State.

Along with those statistics, he led the Panthers to a share of the Mid-Continent Conference and a 4-6-1 record. Though the mark was not what everyone had been wishing for, the Panthers also defeated highly ranked Division II power, Northern Michigan, 33-14.

With improvement on his mind, despite learning a new system, Miller came out last fall and led UNI to a 6-5 mark, throwing 10 touchdown passes, averaging 169.3 yards, with his best game being 298 yards against Western Illinois.

Miller has high expectations for this fall's Panther football team. He feels this year's team "has an excellent chance for a Division I-AA playoff berth." To help that cause along, the summer has been spent informally tuning up the passing attack. Miller, along with receivers James Hutchings, Mario Sanders, Scott Owens and Tom Roberts, stayed in Cedar Falls together to throw the ball around a little bit.

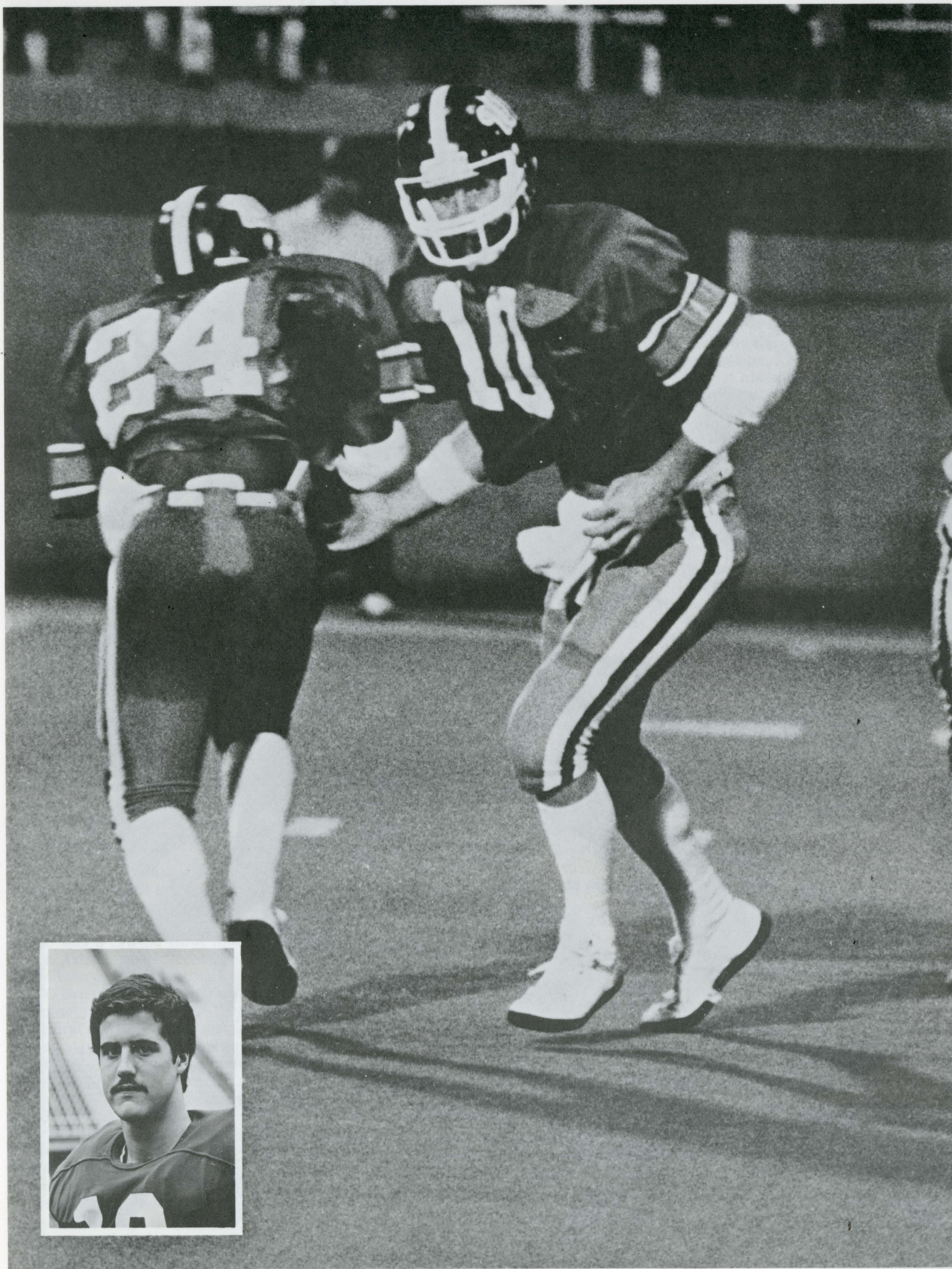
Despite the high expectations and past successes, football isn't everything in Miller's life. He describes himself as a "man of culture," tongue-in-cheek or not, because he enjoys theatre, old museums and American novels which he actively pursues through his American Studies major. His other interests include playing pickup basketball games at the Physical Education Center and he even tried his hand once at parachuting along with his brother.

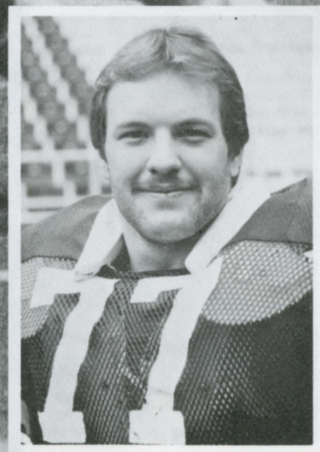
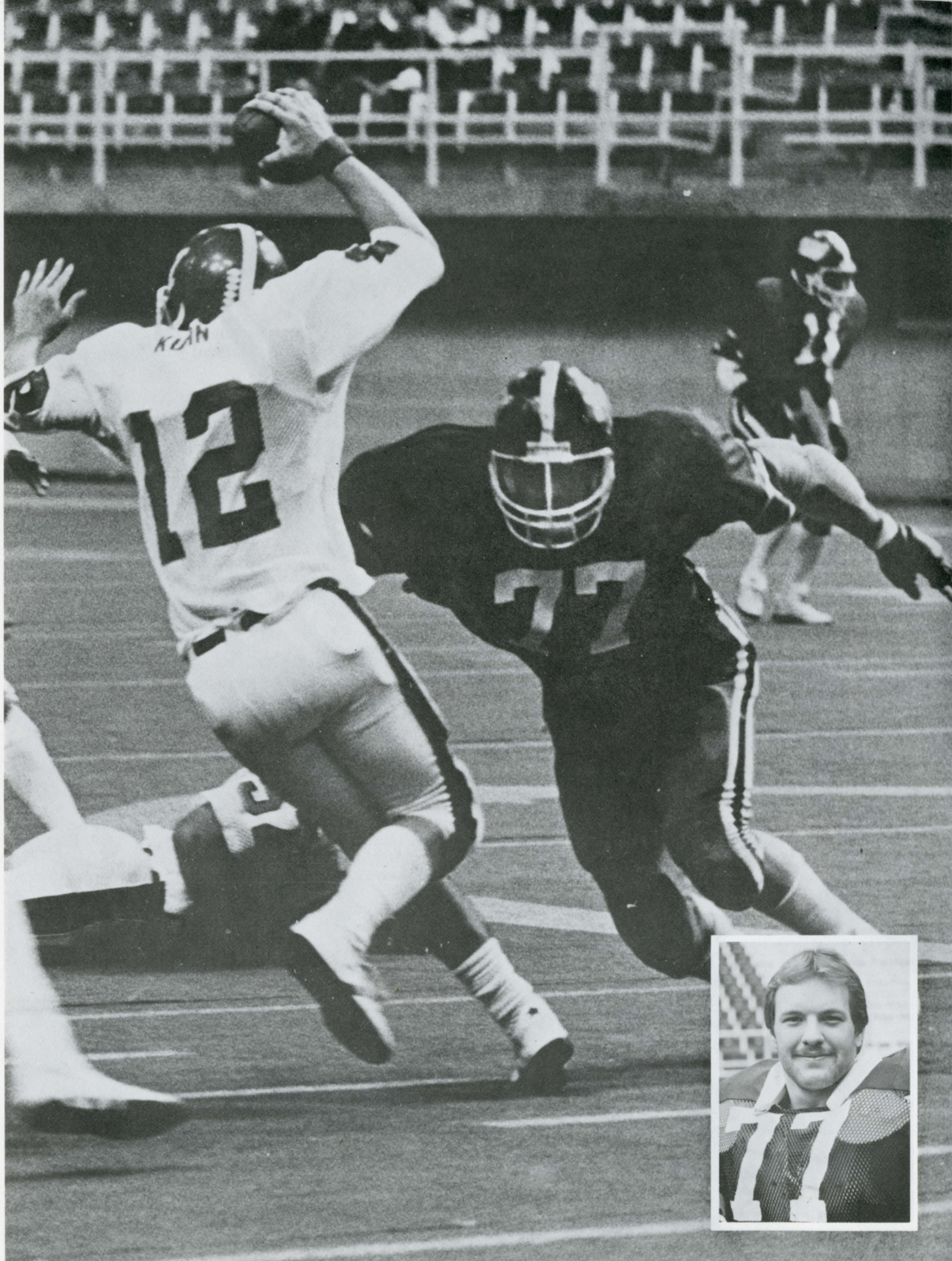
As for career ambitions, he would first like to work with his father in the insurance business and maybe in the future open his own brokerage firm.

But right now, the 1984 season looms near and Miller isn't thinking too much further ahead than that. He rooms with freshman redshirt quarterback Mike Smith and says "I would like nothing better than to hand down the reins to Mike (or Kevin Willard) after my final game."

Whoever takes over the chores in 1985, he will have learned from an excellent pair of arms and a heads-up player.

Joe O'Brien hardly fills the bill when it comes to picturing a defensive lineman. He doesn't snarl at people, doesn't eat raw meat, won't practice his blocking techniques on innocent people or any other acts of goony bravado that seem to be the stereotypes of his position.

Nope, O'Brien won't try to dismantle you unless you happen to be an opposing ball carrier who is trying to score a touchdown against Northern Iowa. What people do get when picturing O'Brien is a 6-foot 1-inch, 255-pound senior noseman who shows his strength either in the weightroom or on the gridiron. Off the field you get a 23-year-old who answers to the nickname "O.B." and takes life as an enjoyable situation. Rarely is O'Brien without a smile or a few funny words for friends or teammates.

The laughter stops when he hits the UNI-Dome turf on Saturday nights and stokes a white-hot flame that turns Joe O'Brien from a happy-go-lucky guy into a player with the intensity and tools that made Head Coach Darrell Mudra say of last year's defensive captain, "He's our best defensive player."

"I don't like getting beaten at anything. When I get beaten by a lineman, I think it was maybe because he prepared harder than I did or maybe he worked out harder. Maybe it's just a part of my ego," O'Brien said.

The intensity also made O'Brien an all-state football selection at LeMars, where the family moved from Hartley while Joe was in junior high. O'Brien also was a Shrine Bowl football selection, a three-year letterman in wrestling and won one letter in track.

O'Brien can be found on the bottom of most pileups since he's usually one of the first players on the scene and one of the last to get up. He's not hurt; he's just one of three or four teammates making sure the play gains minimal yardage. His quick reactions, strength and a radar-like ability to know where the ball carrier is bound have helped him to all-Mid-Continent Conference honors. Unless he's cut down early, O'Brien should be a shoo-in for more conference honors this season.

O'Brien plans to make this season a red-letter one for himself and is confident that the Panthers will have a banner year, also. He issued an early warning for opposing quarterbacks that he plans to visit them frequently this fall.

"I want more quarterback sacks this season," O'Brien said. "Last year, I had a lot of tackles but not many quarterback sacks."

"I see us (the UNI defense) being really exciting this year. We'll have a lot more blitzes," added O'Brien, who's played somewhere in every UNI game during his first three years. As the hub of UNI's defense, he shouldn't have too much of a worry in keeping that string alive.

Although he might have nailed a starting position during spring football practice, O'Brien says his game is far from being perfect. "All areas need work. When the time comes that you think you don't need work, you're on your way out," O'Brien said.

As was the case prior to last season, O'Brien spent the summer working in Colordao and taking advantage of the mile-high altitude to get himself in condition for the season. Both years have seen O'Brien working out with the Denver Broncos before joining the Panthers. Another reason O'Brien figures to come back to Cedar Falls in good shape is that he returns from a spring session where he wasn't bothered by injuries, as was the case when he left following his junior season.

"It's also my last year. I kinda want to hit it hard," O'Brien said.

O'Brien isn't the first member of his family to play collegiate football. His oldest brother Kelly played a year at Iowa Lakes Community College and another brother, John, played four years at Wartburg in Waverly. O'Brien has three brothers living in Colorado but they all make it back for at least one game each season. That's another inspiration for O'Brien.

"That's going to give you an extra push. They spend 15 hours in a car just to see me play so you say to yourself, 'come on, let's show them something,'" O'Brien said.

Football games started early for the O'Brien brothers as their farmyard outside of Melvin, IA, became a football field each Sunday for "kids of all sizes," according to his mother, Donalee.

Because of his heads-up play, O'Brien has experienced just about every dream a lineman could ask for: he's recovered fumbles, sacked quarterbacks and even returned an interception for a touchdown. Those must have happened because of his lucky charms, right Joe?

Before a home game, O'Brien can be found in a team church service and he'll try to get his mind relaxed so he can be at his best. But as far as the superstition act, O'Brien gave that up when he realized what a new pair of socks cost for each game.

O'Brien is anxious to get on with the season at hand. With seven home games he figures the Panthers have a perfect chance to produce a great season.

"There's not a better atmosphere (than in the UNI-Dome)," O'Brien said. "I don't care who walks in the door, we play them."

He also is anxious for a road game in Charleston, IL, against Eastern Illinois. The Purple Panthers and Eastern's Blue Panthers are big rivals and a victory by either team usually goes a long way towards determining just where the teams finish in the conference race.

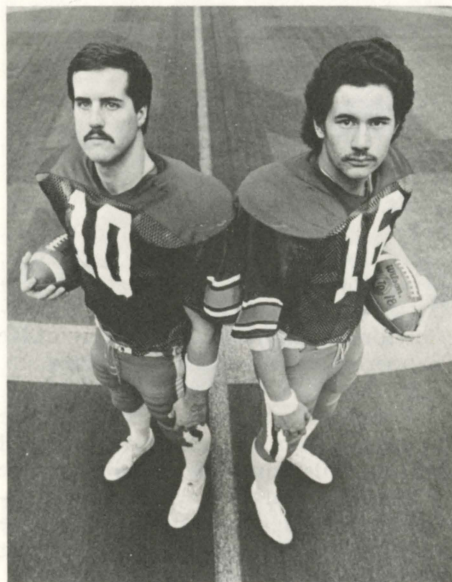
Because of his performances in past years, O'Brien has drawn the attention of some pro scouts. The LeMars High graduate who's been playing with the varsity squads since he was a high school freshman knows this year's effort is his ticket to a tryout.

The noseman who's never had trouble making friends is anxious to make a few opposing linemen unhappy this fall while he shares in what could be one of UNI's best seasons in recent years on the gridiron.

Joe O'Brien will probably be smiling much of the time.

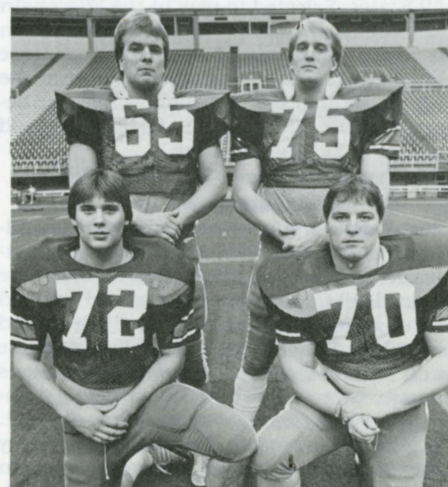

Q. You have paid Larry Miller some fine compliments this past spring. Compare him with some of your other outstanding quarterbacks. Just how much does he have the potential to be a first-rate signal caller in his final season?

A. I think Larry has a chance to be the best quarterback I've ever had — even better than Jeff Christensen who I had at Eastern Illinois and who is now with Cleveland. Larry is more active and tougher. His arm is not as strong, which is somewhat related to the injury he had last year, but he'll work hard and improve that facet this coming season.

Q. Where do you see the strength of this year's defense? Against the run or pass?

A. Right now, with the fact we've lost (Mark) Holmes, we'll probably be a little stronger against the pass, at least until we develop a replacement for Mark. Eventually, we'll be just as good against the run. We'll be awfully good in the secondary with Joe Fuller and Moses Aima-ble.

Q. Your punting game was never resolved in spring practice. How will you approach this in August?

A. I think we have to find a punter amongst our new players coming in in the fall. We worked an awfully lot on our punting game in the spring — the punt returns and protection — but I think the kicker will be a new player. Clay Netusil improved a lot in the spring and he'll compete for the job, however.

Q. How do you see the Mid-Continent race in 1984?

A. Without a question, Southwest Missouri, with their experience, will be the strongest team. The advantage we have is that we play them at home.

Q. Has the progress you've seen in only the last year surprised you or disappointed you, considering your reputation for turning programs around so fast?

A. Everyone thinks that they're a superman. I won't take the blame for what might not have happened last year. We had immense difficulties last year with a hard schedule and the changeover in staff. The transition was not very smooth. We weren't able to recruit as much as we wanted to imme-



diately and we had to overcome deficiencies in equipment and the program. The improvements were slow to come because of a new president. But with new athletic director Bob Bowlsby and the president on board now, we should see more rapid progress. We also lost heavily in the personnel department last year. We were short talent-wise.

Q. What are the advantages of coaching at Northern Iowa?

A. The big things start out with having as good a facility as anyone at the level we want to compete at — 1-AA. We also have the potential to become financially able to compete because of the population area. The reorganization of staff and the department also has made

UNI a more pleasant place to work. The long range advantages are that we have had an excellent recruiting year and it is easy to recruit because of the facility and staff. We'll see gradual improvement every year.

Q. What are the disadvantages of coaching at Northern Iowa?

A. Well, the fishing isn't as good here. The differences between here and Eastern and Western Illinois is that there's more red tape involved here. At the other places, I was able to make more crucial decisions quicker. It's going to take more time to develop that same kind of communication here.

Q. What were or are your objectives of spring practice?

A. Simply, to work individually with each player to improve fundamental skills for each position and to experiment with our schemes — the offensive and basic defensive plays and to develop insights into what make them work.

Q. Did you have any major spring experiments?

A. We experimented with the wide tackle 6 defense which is a change from our odd front. The evaluation is that we're still learning it.

Q. Do you have a particular philosophy in football?

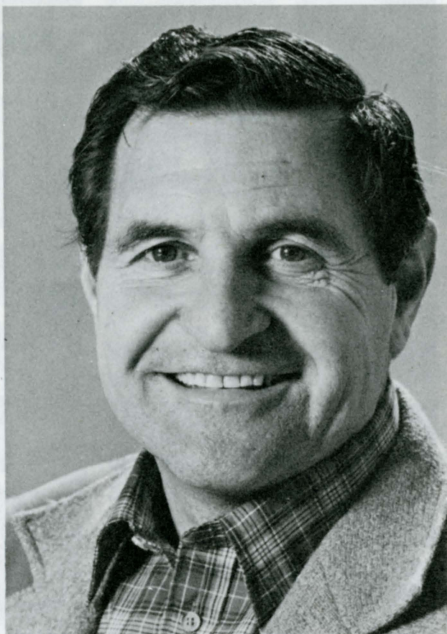
A. The key thing is to believe in the players. The differences are so slight between them. The greatest possibilities for the players lie in their potential. Most of them work at a fraction of their ability. Most teams have the potential to develop into great teams. You have to be optimistic about the potentialities of your players.

Q. What are your selling points on the UNI football program?

A. We're trying to sell the fact we have a talented coach to work with each position; the fact that the facilities are excellent — we never have bad weather to teach in. We also try to sell the idea that UNI is an excellent institution for physical education and most players are interested in becoming coaches. A school like this, with its tradition of teacher education, means the environment is sensitive to the learning process. The responsibility for student learning is partially up to the teacher, not just the student.

Q. What are your recruiting priorities?

A. No. 1, speed, always. And we try to find players who are committed and interested intrinsically, in athletics. I also really believe the more local players will be more highly motivated than those who come from far off.



Q. You seem to enjoy everything about coaching. What is it about football you so dearly love?

A. For a coach, the organizing of the talent you have into a productive unit to perform at a high level — the greatest satisfaction is the result. I also love to watch the development of the players. I believe the football experience enables them to become better people. Activity is fun — there is nothing special about football — except every activity competes with every other activity. Football helps develop the natural kinds of human movement — throwing, catching, jumping, running, pushing, shoving. Football also requires a tremendous amount of cooperation. The practice and learning will carry over to getting along in the community.

'Dr. Victory' UNI's 21st Head Football Coach

It had been a long time since the Northern Iowa Panther football squad had marched to a new drummer but 1983 was the beginning of a new look. Darrell Mudra, head football coach at Eastern Illinois for five years, was named head coach at UNI December 21st, 1982. He replaced Stan Sheriff who resigned the post prior to UNI's last game of the 1982 season after directing the Panther fortunes for 23 years.

Known as "Dr. Victory" in coaching circles, Mudra has had outstanding success at almost every coaching job he has taken on. His 22-year collegiate record is 163-70-3 and he has directed several squads to no less than nine post-season playoff bids.

"I'm very delighted about coming to Northern Iowa," Mudra said at the press conference announcing his appointment. "I've known Stan a very long time and I have great respect for him and the University."

Mudra would be the first one to shy away from the laurels piled upon him and the nickname of "Dr. Victory." He prefers to let his coaching staff and athletes take whatever credit is due. A great believer in the democratic approach to coaching rather than an authoritarian approach, his players and staff contribute greatly to the operation of the football programs that he oversees.

A native of Omaha, NE, Mudra began his collegiate coaching career at Adams (CO) State where he posted a 32-4-1 record in four years, including a 23-20 win over Northern Illinois in the 1962 Mineral Bowl. From there, he went to North Dakota State where he compiled a 24-6 mark over three years, including a 14-7 victory over Western Colorado in the 1964 Mineral Bowl and a 20-7 win over Grambling for the national championship in the Pecan Bowl.

In 1966, he directed the Montreal Alouettes to a 7-7 record but left immediately for a two-year stint at Arizona, compiling an 11-9-1 mark, including a loss to Auburn in the 1968 Sun Bowl.

He spent the next five years at Western Illinois, posting a 39-13 record and a Division II NCAA playoff berth in 1973. He spent the 1974 and '75 seasons at Florida State, going 4-18. He took the Eastern Illinois job beginning in 1978 and recorded a 47-15-1 record there in his five years.

Mudra led the EIU Panthers to three post-season championship playoffs. In 1978, his first year there, they won the NCAA Division II title by defeating Delaware 10-9. In 1980, they were runners-up, losing to Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo 21-13. In 1982, EIU advanced to the Division 1-AA quarterfinals and finished the season with an 11-1-1 record. The tie was a 10-10 stalemate against Northern Iowa in the UNI-Dome.

Mudra understands the competition Northern Iowa faces with the Big 8 and Big Ten schools vying for the spotlight within the State of Iowa but he says,

"hopefully, we (UNI) serve a little different constituency here in Waterloo-Cedar Falls. We also have a unique situation with the UNI-Dome and I think we have definite possibilities of getting into the 1-AA playoffs in the very near future."

A graduate of Peru State (NE) in 1951, he received his master's from Omaha University (now Nebraska-Omaha) and his Ed.D. from Colorado State in 1965.

Mudra and his wife, Jean, are the parents of four children, Darrell, Jr., Steve, Sherry and Michelle.

DENNIS REMMERT

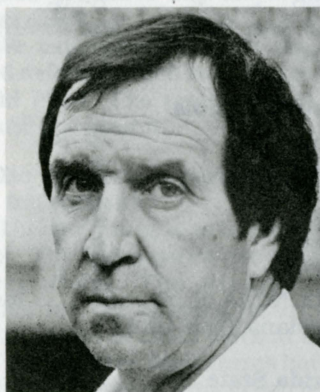


Assistant Head Coach, Defensive Coordinator

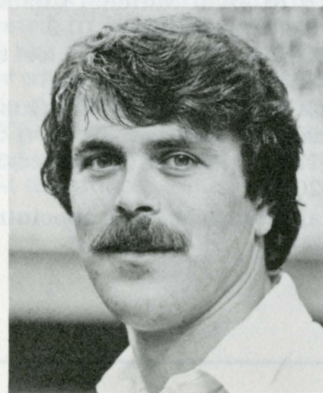
Klinker played at Colorado from 1959-61 and was an All-American pick. He recently was voted the best two-way center in the history of Colorado football.

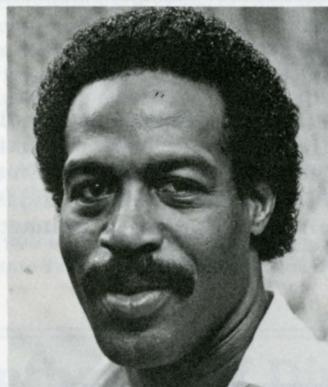


Quarterbacks, Wide Receivers

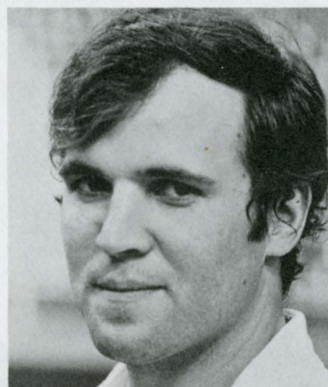
Defensive Line

Chambers played with Tampa from 1978 to 1979 and the Bears from 1973 to 1977. He was named the Bears' Most Valuable Player twice, the NFC's Most Valuable Player as defensive lineman twice and the City of Chicago's Athlete of the Year twice. He also was an all-American pick at Eastern Kentucky University, where he got his bachelor's degree in 1973.

Most recently, he was an assistant promotional director for the Chicago Career Development Faire. Between the time he played pro football and the present, he also went back to school and got a second degree in broadcasting.

Chambers has learned the game of football from some of the best coaches in the field, including Roy Kidd from Eastern Kentucky, Abe Gibron and Jack Pardee with the Bears and John McKay at Tampa.

BILL SALMON



Running Backs

Without a doubt one of the all-time greatest quarterbacks in Northern Iowa history, Bill Salmon joined the Panther coaching staff last season on a part-time basis and is in charge of the running backs.

Salmon led the Panthers to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 1975. Known for his excellent throwing arm, quick release, great quickness, speed and football knowledge (he called about 75 percent of his own plays), he was superb at running the Panther veer attack and ran the ball as good as any running

back. A three-year starter, he was voted All-North Central Conference and named the league's Most Valuable Offensive Back his senior year, in addition to being named to the AP third team All-American list. The Minnesota Vikings picked him up following his last collegiate season, but a winter knee injury eventually spelled the end of his playing career.

He is a native of Cedar Falls, IA, and was a former All-State quarterback at Cedar Falls High School.



Graduate Assistant John Piro

Former Northern Iowa football player John Piro joined the Panther staff in the spring as graduate assistant. Currently a candidate for a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University, he graduated from UNI in 1975 with a bachelor's in political science and journalism. He played varsity football at UNI four years as a quarterback. A native of

Iowa City, IA, he attended City High School where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball, quarterbacking the 1970 team to the Mississippi Valley Conference title and fifth place state ranking. Prior to returning to school, Piro worked in the insurance business.



Head Athletic Trainer Dave Burton

Starting his eighth year as Head Trainer, Burton heads up the Athletic Training Staff that keeps UNI's athletes on the field and court. After receiving his B.S. degree from Fort Hays State in 1976, Burton came to UNI and obtained his master's in 1977 while serving as an Assistant Trainer under Elmer Kortemeyer. When Kortemeyer took a special two-year leave of absence, Burton was promoted to the head position.

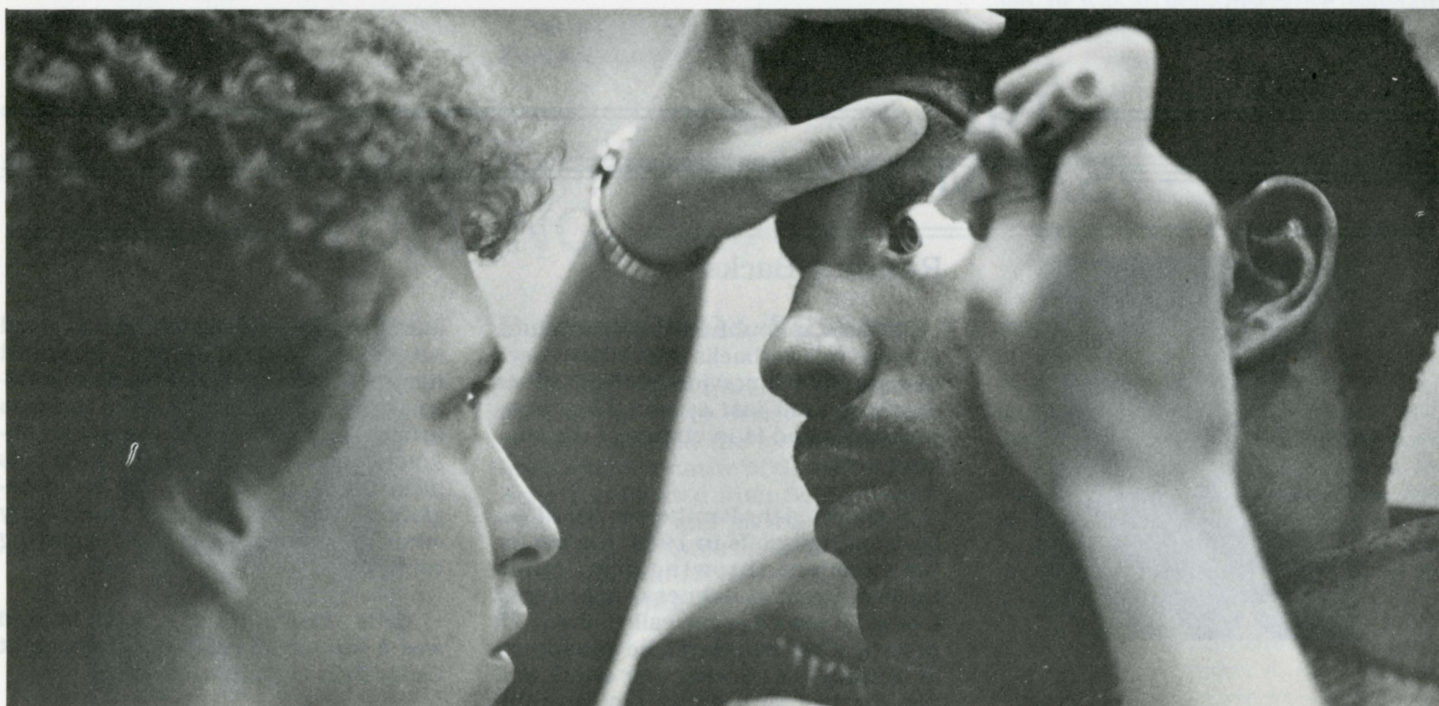
He is a member of the American College of Sports Medicine, the State Licensing Committee on Athletic Training and the National Athletic Trainers Association. In the spring of 1978, Burton accompanied the NCAA Division II All-Star wrestling team to Mexico City as the team's head trainer. He is a certified athletic trainer and an Emergency Medical Technician. A Boulder, CO, native, Burton and his wife, Marti, reside in Cedar Falls, along with two infant sons.



Equipment Manager Dick Timmerman

Dick joined the Panther staff in September of 1982 as equipment manager after spending 22 years as equipment manager and athletic trainer at Upper Iowa University in Fayette. He is responsible for overseeing equipment for all 19 intercollegiate sports with primary responsibilities for football and basketball.

Besides his duties at Upper Iowa, he also worked with the Fayette ambulance service for 10 years. He is a certified EMTA (Emergency Medical Technician Assistant) and is a member of the Athletic Equipment Managers Association, a national organization.



==THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN IOWA==



The University of Northern Iowa, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, is the outgrowth of the Iowa State Normal School established by the General Assembly in 1876.

From a single building on a 40-acre campus, the University has grown to include over 40 major buildings, a 723-acre campus, over 500 faculty members and over 11,000 on-campus students.

During the first 27 years, the school issued teaching certificates requiring 12 weeks to two years of training. In 1903 a four-year curriculum based on high school graduation and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Education was authorized.

In 1909 the institution was renamed the Iowa State Teachers College and the govern-

ment of the College, along with that of the University of Iowa and Iowa State University, was vested in the State Board of Regents, a nine-member body appointed by the Governor. Under the new name, the College attained a reputation as one of the nation's outstanding institutions for preparation of teachers.

On July 5, 1961, the Iowa General Assembly on recommendation of the Regents changed the name of the school to the State College of Iowa and redefined its function to include the offering of liberal arts degrees.

On July 1, 1967, the General Assembly on recommendation of the Regents approved university status. The name was changed to University of Northern Iowa and its function was again redefined.

Although teacher education remains an important program, the University offers degrees to students majoring in a wide variety of subjects. Thus UNI has two bachelor of arts degrees, one with certification to teach and one without certification. Also, a bachelor of technology degree can be earned with or without certification to teach, and since 1969, the bachelor of music degree has been offered. A bachelor of fine arts degree was approved by the Regents in 1976. An individual studies major enables a student to pursue, with faculty approval, a wide assortment of study areas. The bachelor of liberal studies, the fifth baccalaureate degree, is an external degree made available through the cooperative efforts of the three Iowa Regents universities. This degree was approved by the Regents in 1977.

On the graduate level, courses leading to the degree of master of arts in education were offered for the first time in the summer of 1952 and a sixth-year program leading to the specialist degree with a program in science education was inaugurated in 1970.

In 1964, the master of arts degree was approved by the Regents. The first master of arts degrees were granted in 1966. The master of business administration degree was approved by the Regents in 1975, and the master of music in 1976. The graduate program was further extended in 1978 with the addition of UNI's first doctoral degree, the doctor of industrial technology.

Ground was broken in October, 1975, for the 1st phase of the Speech/Art complex, located southwest of Russell Hall. This phase, which includes the Strayer-Wood Theatre and the Communication Arts Center, opened in January 1978.

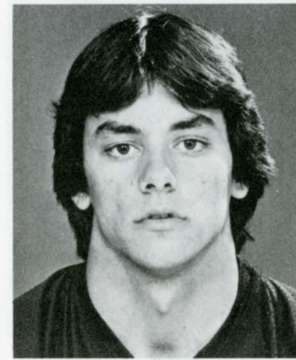
If the Bulldogs are to improve on last year's 1-10 record and sixth-place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference, one thing they obviously will have to do better is generate more offense. After leading the nation in total offense in 1982, averaging 444 yards a game, Drake dropped to 217.3 yards a game in 1983, including only 95.2 yards a game passing. Despite returning starting quarterback Ray Gronowski, Drake will enter fall drills with a four-man battle between Gronowski, Ed Cheatham, John Lawrence and Darryle Henry. The receiving corps looks stronger with senior Stan Gardner having one year as a starter under his belt, however, the running game remains a question mark with the loss of Tom Holt. The key to Drake's defense will be the play of the inside linebackers. Returning starters Tim Leimer and Clifford Dunigan will have to hold off Jeff Long and Wade Harman to retain their starting slots, while the emergence of Tom Ackerson at defensive tackle could be the key to an improved defensive line.

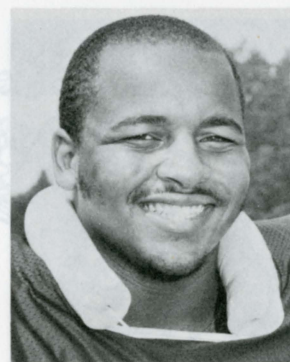
The return of 27 lettermen, including two All-Americans, coupled with the addition of 26 junior college transfers has raised immediate high hopes for the WIU coaching staff. 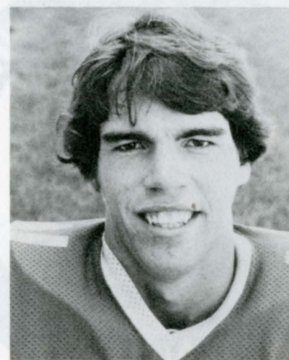
Coming off its best season ever, the Southern Illinois football team will look to defend its NCAA 1-AA crown in 1984 under new head coach Ray Dorr. Along the way to the title contest, the Salukis rolled to a 7-0 record at home and broke or tied 11 1-AA records. Dorr will start the 1984 campaign with 12 returning starters plus both kicking specialists. Filling the gap at quarterback, however, created by Rick Johnson's graduation will be Dorr's first major task. Last season's number two signal caller, Darren Dixon, will be called upon to replace Johnson. Leading rusher Derrick Taylor returns, along with also leading in the receiving department. Perhaps the most solid element of the Saluki offense will be its powerful line where four starters return. Split end James Stevenson and tight end Carey Shephard return to bolster the receiver corps. Although the Salukis graduated four all-Missouri Valley Conference players, two others return from last year's unit which yielded only 225 yards per contest. Leading tackler Fabray Collins heads the list. Middle guard Sterling Haywood will anchor the line after starting his first two years. Although the secondary has always been one of the Salukis' strongest areas of defense, the loss of pro prospects leaves the aerial defense considerably suspect. Only strong safety William Thomas returns.

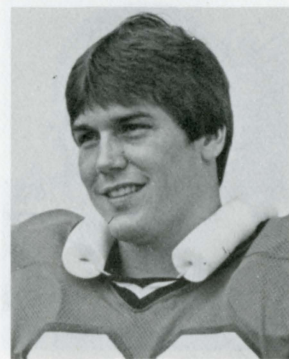

The Wisconsin-Whitewater coaching staff lists experience as one of the most important team strengths for the 1984 season — experience gained because injuries in 1983 forced a lot of players into action. Both quarterbacks — Jim Stoppenbach, a second team All-Conference selection, and Lance Leipold return. 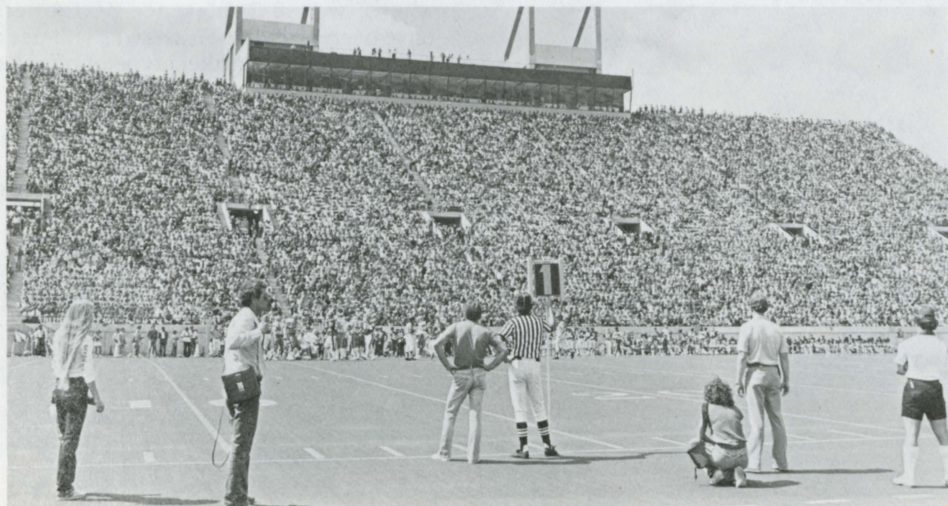

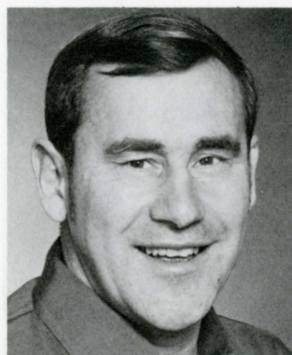

Youngstown State Outlook

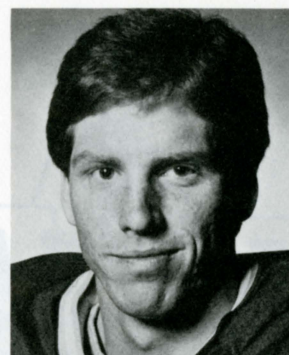
Coming off a disappointing 4-7 season, the loss of several outstanding performers and a rugged 1984 schedule that includes six road games put a lot of pressure on spring drills at Youngstown State. Gone are All-American tight end John Goode and offensive tackle and co-captain Rick Brunot, along with kicker Paul McFadden. The quarterback position has had the most heated battle between five players, led by last year's two veterans, Mike Sloe and Ken Kuhn, both seniors. Another bright spot is the return of senior defensive back John Tomassilli, who missed most of last season with an injury. 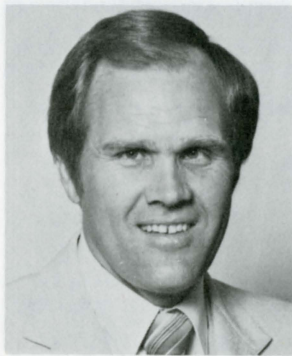

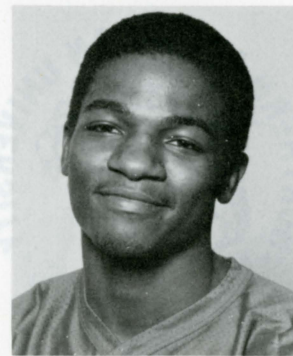
Northern Michigan's offense returns seven starters but of the four gone, three are in the line and the other is in the quarterback position. Presently holding down the number one signal calling spot is junior Keith Nelson, who appeared in five games each of the last two seasons. While quarterback may be the most visible change, the biggest overhaul is coming in the offensive line, where a guard, center and tackle are gone. 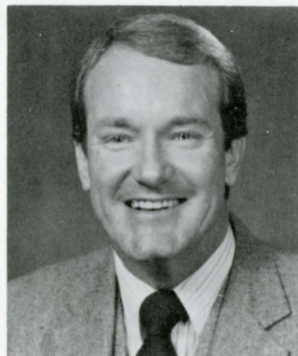
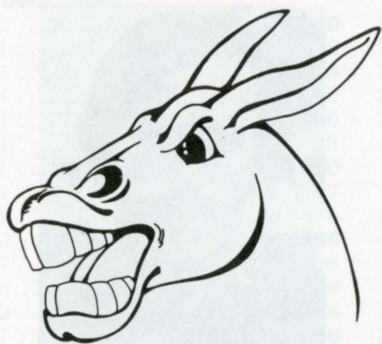

Eastern Illinois Outlook

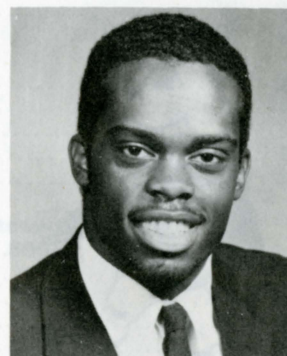
After six years of unparalleled success, Eastern Illinois can legitimately claim that 1984 will be a rebuilding year. Last year's group, a senior dominated team, had no depth, consequently, graduation has depleted most of the starters with few experienced backups ready to move forward. Only two players on offense and four on defense return from the units that started the playoff game against Indiana State. Wide receiver Jerry Wright and linebacker Tyrone Covington, both seniors and AP Honorable Mention All-Americans, will lead their respective units. Quarterback will again get more than its share of attention as two sophomores went head-to-head in the spring. 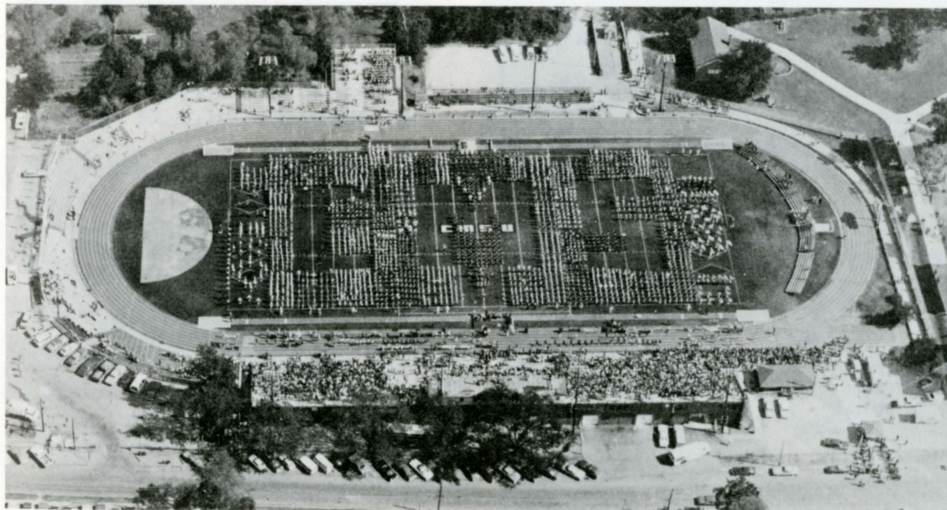

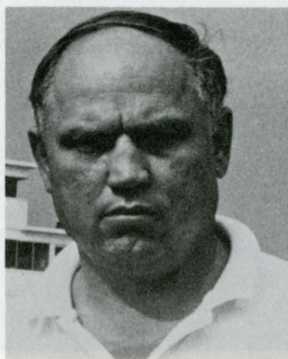

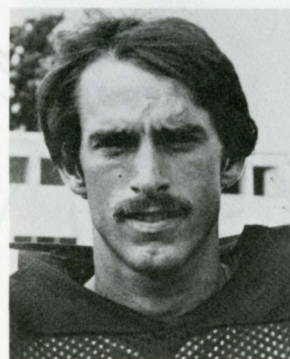
Central Missouri Outlook

Northern Iowa's 34-10 win over Drake in the UNI-Dome represented three firsts for the Panthers. First, it was the first win for first-year head coach Darrell Mudra in the UNI-Dome. Secondly, the Panthers snapped an opening game losing streak which had dated back to the 1978 season, and last but not least, it was the first win for UNI during a televised game, whether network or Iowa Public Television.

UNI jumped out to a 3-0 first quarter lead on its first possession of the game on a 51-yard field goal by Mike Molstead, his first UNI field goal attempt. Drake's Tae Kim tied the game in the second quarter on a 24-yard field goal and the Bulldogs went ahead 10-3 on a six-yard run by Tom Holt. Both Drake scores were set up by UNI miscues, the first when signal caller Larry Miller was intercepted on UNI's 27 and the second when Scott Owens fumbled a kickoff.

The Panthers tied the game 10-10 with 19 seconds remaining in the half when Miller hit running back Chris Milner from three yards out. The second half was all Northern Iowa. The Panthers scored on their first possession of the third period when Miller hit Milner again, this time from 15 yards. Molstead missed a 35-yard field goal on the next possession and the quarter ended with UNI leading 17-10.

UNI scored 17 more points in the last quarter. The Panthers scored again on its first possession on the first play from scrimmage, a 50-yard scoring strike from Miller to Bryan Taylor. Molstead redeemed himself for the earlier missed field goal when he hit from 48 yards out. The very next play, Drake fumbled UNI's kickoff and UNI's Spencer Cowan recovered the ball in the endzone for the last score of the game.

Terre Haute, IN . . . Attendance 8,914

Northern Iowa head coach Darrell Mudra was more right than he wanted to be when he said Indiana State probably would be the best team the Panthers would face all season. The Sycamores dominated the first half in defeating UNI 26-0 on a hot and muggy night, with the temperature 90 degrees at kickoff.

ISU built up a 24-0 lead at the half and held the Panthers to only 12 yards rushing in the first two periods. UNI's Larry Miller was 13 of 19 passing for 95 yards in the same time period but his one interception set up the Sycamores first score 12 plays later — a one-yard run by ISU signal caller Jeff Miller. Scott Bridges kicked the extra point and the first quarter ended with UNI trailing 7-0.

With 14:52 remaining in the half, UNI's Miller threw a six yard pass to Darryl Goree on a fourth-and-four down to keep the drive going. At 12:54, with a fourth-and-one situation on the ISU 12 yardline, Chris Milner was decked for a three yard loss and that was the closest the Panthers came to a score.

ISU went ahead 14-0 three minutes later on a three yard run and six minutes later scored again from three yards out to lead 21-0. With only 27 seconds remaining in the half, ISU kicked a 38-yard field goal to lead 24-0 at intermission.

The Panthers were held to only seven first downs in the entire game, all in the first half. The Panthers accumulated only 12 yards rushing in the first two periods as compared to 114 for Indiana State. UNI's defense did a much better job in the second half, holding the Sycamores scoreless except for a fumbled punt which UNI's Joe Fuller fell on in the endzone for a safety.

Southwest Missouri State took a firm lead in the Mid-Continent Conference race with its 35-13 defeat of UNI. It was the first SMS win over Northern Iowa in four tries. The Panthers got on the scoreboard first with 5:28 left in the first period when quarterback Larry Miller swept around the right end from seven yards out. SMS came right back with five quick first downs, only to be stopped at UNI's 27 on a fourth down and three.

UNI took a 10-0 lead with 13:51 left in the half when Mike Molstead kicked a 38 yard field goal. However, the Bears answered on their next series when QB Greg Arterburn rushed for 16 yards and the score. The drive was aided by a UNI pass interference call which moved the ball from SMS' 43 to its 27. The Panthers held the lead at 13-7 when Molstead kicked a 50 yard field goal with 9:07 left in the half. Five plays later, Miller fumbled the snap on UNI's 21 but SMS failed on a 43-yard field goal attempt. Miscues continued to plague the Panthers in the third quarter. UNI's Ron King intercepted UNI's first pass of the season, returning it to the Panthers' 40. But the Bears recovered another UNI fumble from snap at the 11:43 mark and only 1:23 later, Johnny Longstreet took the ball in from the one for an SMS 21-13 lead.

Twenty-two seconds later, Arterburn threw a 24-yard TD pass to Jim McLaughlin following another UNI interception by Terry Gourley who returned it 21 yards to UNI's 26. SMS put one more score on the board before the end of the third period on an 11 yard pass from Arterburn to Cummings.

Six lost fumbles, four interceptions, one returned for a TD, and a blocked punt recovered in the endzone for another TD directly led to Northern Iowa's 52-9 thrashing by eighth-ranked Southern Illinois. The Panthers recorded five more first downs and had the ball about five minutes longer than the Salukis but miscues led to UNI's third straight defeat of the year.

SIU scored three times as a result of mis-handled punts by UNI defensive back Joe Fuller, who had been ranked second in 1-AA in punt returns. The Salukis had blocked a punt in every game so far this season and kept the streak alive with another against UNI which gave them their fifth score of the game and a 35-0 halftime lead.

The Panthers scored their only nine points in the third period when an SIU substitute punter was sacked for a loss of 16 yards. Chris Miliner scored on a one yard run four plays later. 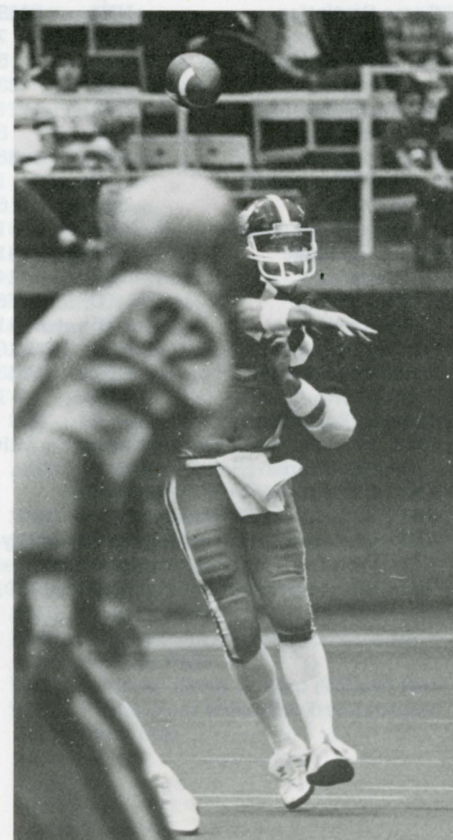

Northern Iowa Post-Season Appearances

1975 NCAA II Playoffs

Cedar Falls, IA — In what has since been dubbed the "Mud Bowl," Northern Iowa struggled with Western Kentucky in heavy rain and 42-degree temperatures and a 16 mph wind in the last game to be played in O.R. Latham Stadium. The Hilltoppers won the first round of the NCAA II playoffs 14-12.

The Panthers closed to within two points when they rallied with 12:25 left in the game. The touchdown was set up when Jim Fransen put Western in a hole by booting a 64-yard punt to its one yardline.

UNI had two chances to cash-in in the final period but two errant field goals by Fransen buried the Panthers' chances deep into the muddy field. Fransen missed from 38 and 27 yards as UNI finished the season with a 9-3 record — its best effort since Head Coach Stan Sheriff took over the reins in 1960.

1964 Pecan Bowl

Abilene, TX — In the first NCAA-sanctioned Pecan Bowl, UNI scored an impressive 19-17 win over Lamar Tech behind a sensational performance by two-time All-American fullback Randy Schultz.

Schultz ran for 160 yds. on 38 carries and scored two touchdowns. He was named the outstanding back of the game and teammate Loren Buser received the outstanding lineman.

The Panthers were 9-2 for the season and tied for the North Central title.

1960 Mineral Water Bowl

Excelsior Springs, MO — Northern Iowa ran into a bulldozer from Hillsdale College (Ohio) which won the contest 17-6.

The Panthers never really got going after finishing the 1960 season with a fine 9-0 record and winning the North Central Conference.

This game marked the first time in history UNI (then Iowa State Teachers College) played in a bowl contest.

Origin of a Nickname

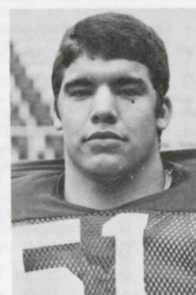
It was 1931. The Northern Iowan was the College Eye. Cheerleaders were men and the UNI Panthers were known as the Iowa State Teachers College Tutors. But in the fall of that year, a contest was sponsored by the College Eye and the Men's Physical Education Department to change the name of the school's athletic teams. It was the "Purple Panthers," submitted by Burl Berry of Wellman, IA, that caught the College's eye and that's the name that has guided UNI teams for the last half-century. Berry, who also happened to be that season's football MVP selectee, won a briefcase from Berg Drug Co. The second place winner received an alarm clock. It also is known that the name which took third place was the "Purple Grackles," a name submitted by students living in the same rooming house.

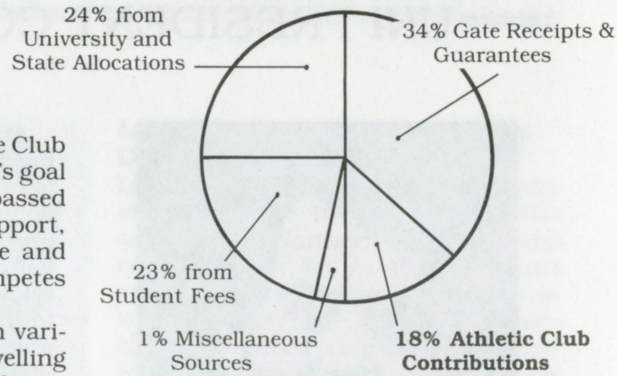

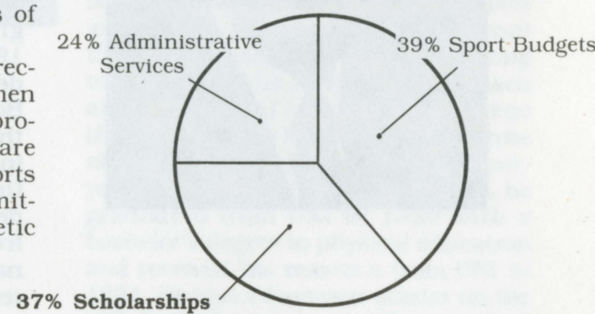

UNI PRESIDENT CONSTANTINE CURRIS

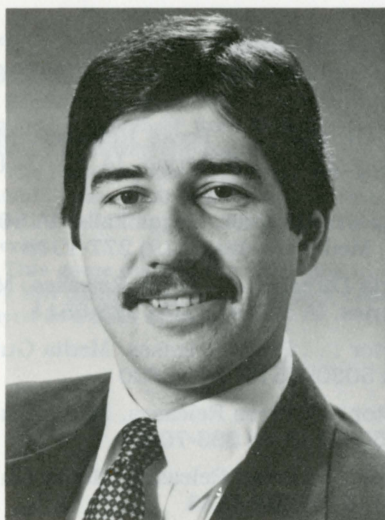


Dr. Curris was named the seventh president of the University of Northern Iowa June 17th, 1983, replacing Dr. John J. Kamerick who retired from the presidency after 13 years. Curris, 43, had been president of Murray State University in Murray, KY, since 1973. Prior to his presidency at Murray State, he was vice president and dean of the faculty at West Virginia Institute of Technology from 1971-73. From 1969-71, he was dean of student personnel programs at Marshall University. In 1968-69, Curris was director of academic programs of the West Virginia Board of Education, which served as the governance body for nine collegiate institutions, excluding West Virginia University. He was vice president and dean of the faculty at Midway College from 1965-68 and assistant coordinator of the University of Kentucky Centennial Celebration in 1964-65.

Curris received a B.A. degree magna cum laude, in political science, with a minor in speech communication in 1962 from Kentucky. He received an M.A. degree in political science with a public administration emphasis from Illinois in 1965 and the Ed.D. in higher education with minors in student personnel services and public policy from Kentucky in 1967.

He has received many professional honors and just last year the Murray State University Board of Regents designated the school's new student center as the Constantine W. Curris University Center. In 1982 he was named Boss of the Year by the Murray Chapter of Professional Secretaries International. He was a delegate to the White House Conference on Small Business in 1980 and was named "Outstanding Young Kentuckian" in 1974 and was Youth Governor of Kentucky in 1958. He received the Sullivan Medal at Kentucky in 1962 as the "Outstanding Male Undergraduate."

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR ROBERT BOWLSBY



Robert A. Bowlsby was selected athletic director in mid-February of 1984 after serving as assistant athletic director for facilities and interim A.D. when Stan Sheriff resigned the post in September of 1983.

A native of Waterloo (IA), Bowlsby is a 1970 graduate of West High School. He earned a bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Moorhead State in 1975 and a master's in recreational administration from the University of Iowa in 1978.

He served as assistant director of recreational services at Iowa from 1978 to 1981, working in facility management and being responsible for the indoor and outdoor tennis programs, as well as the school's Recreation Building.

He joined the UNI staff in April of 1981. His experience at UNI has been

broadbased, including involvement in all areas of the intercollegiate athletic program and promotion of the UNI-Dome. He has worked with a variety of athletic events, special programs and entertainment attractions.

At the time of his appointment, he was a member of the Athletic Club Board of Directors and was one of three University representatives on the Athletic Club Executive Committee. He is a member of the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Convention and Visitors Bureau and is a past board member of the Iowa Parks and Recreation Association.

As an undergraduate, he was a four-year letterwinner and captain of the Moorhead State wrestling team.

Bowlsby and his wife, Candice, have two children — Lisa and Matt.

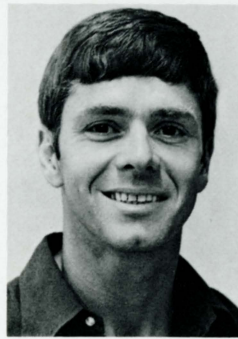
Sandra Williamson — Associate Athletic Director
