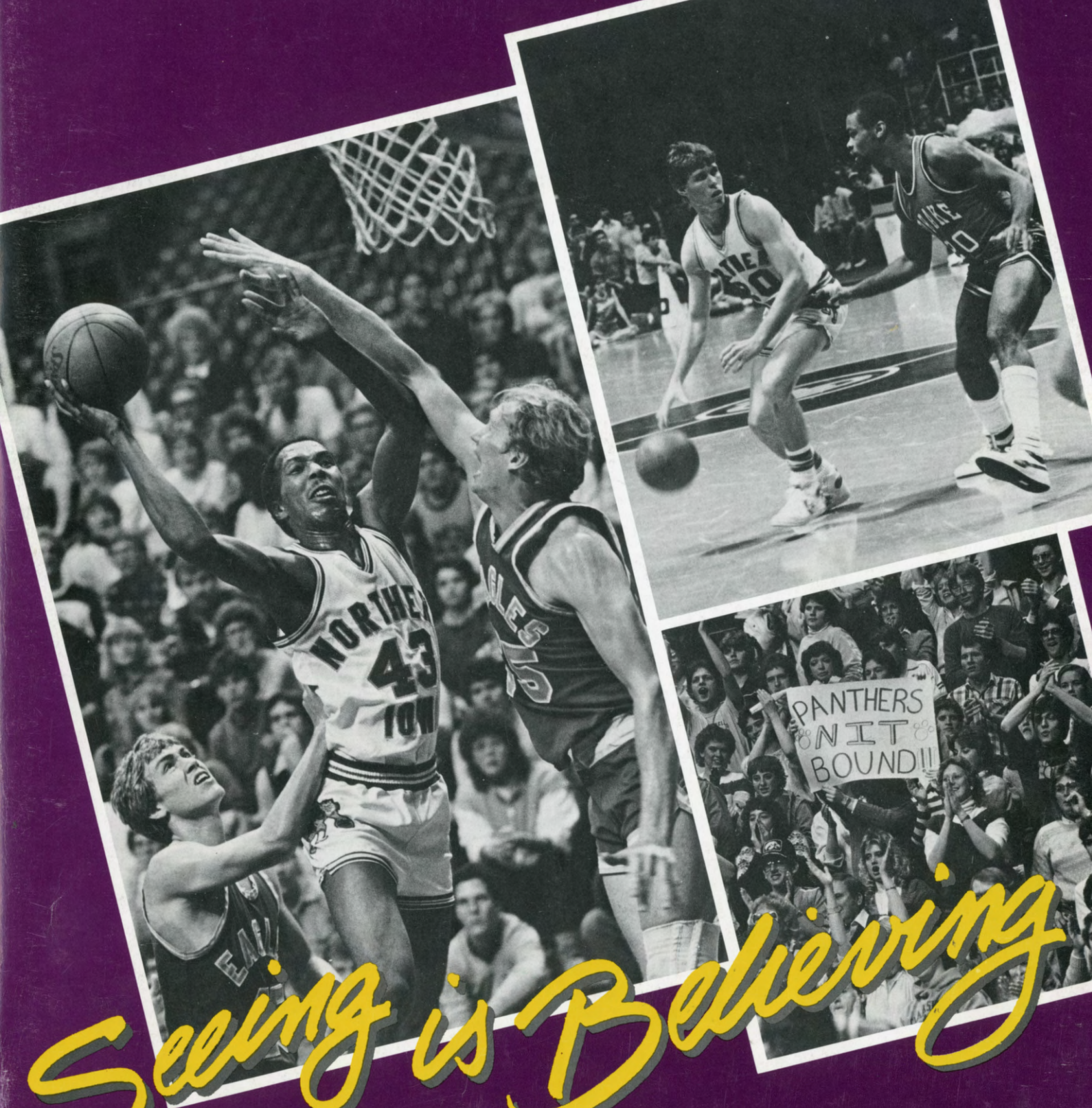

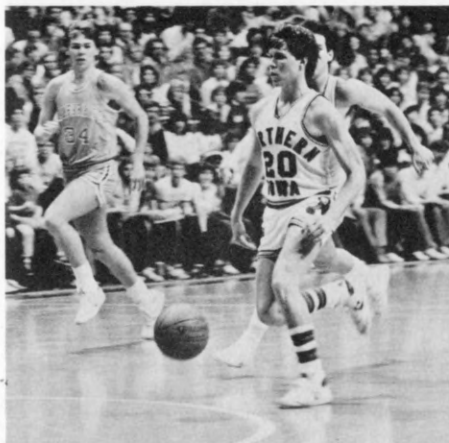

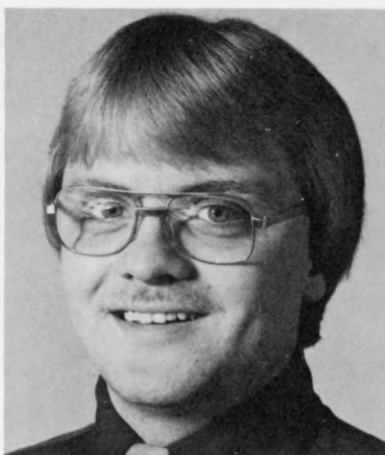

The Northern Iowa basketball media guide was prepared by the University of Northern Iowa Office of Sports Information to assist the news media in its coverage of the Panthers this winter. Requests for additional information, feature materials and photographs should be made to the sports information director.

Credentials: Requests for credentials for Panther home games should be made as early as possible so that the credentials may be provided without any confusion. Generally, all requests for credentials will be evaluated on a first-come, first-served basis, with the following priorities in mind: Local and metropolitan newspapers, wire services, opponent and area news outlets; daily newspapers who regularly cover Panther basketball; other requests from television stations, radio stations and periodic newspapers will be handled on a space-available basis, with preference given to those who regularly cover Panther basketball.

Photo Credentials: All courtside photographers are issued, and must visibly display at all times, photo passes. Due to severe space limitations, the sports information director must limit photographers at courtside. Television will be given top priority for courtside space. No other news agency will be issued more than one photo pass.

Press Parking: Parking for the working press will be in the west lot of the Physical Education Center (PEC), which is located directly north of the UNI-Dome and can be reached from Hudson Road (HWY 57) which runs north and south on the east side of the UNI-Dome. Your press pass will be sufficient to enter the lot to park.

Radio Rights: Each visiting school is allowed one free radio broadcast from the UNI-Dome. Stations should make their own arrangements for telephone hookup and private telephones. If stations wish to use the courtesy line, they must contact Kelly Neff at KCFI Radio in Cedar Falls (319) 277-1918.

Game Services: Pre-game fact sheets, full statistical summary and play-by-play sheets are distributed at halftime and after the game. The Sports Information Office has only one telecopier for use and will be made available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Dressing Room Locations: The Panther and visiting team dressing rooms are located in the Physical Education Center (PEC), the building directly north of the UNI-Dome, and may be reached by walking through the revolving doors at the northeast end of the playing surface.

Your hosts in the UNI-Dome pressbox are Nancy Justis and Michael Madsen.

Justis became SID in October of 1979 after serving three years as the first fulltime assistant SID at UNI. A native of Cedar Rapids, IA, she received her B.A. degree in journalism from the University of Iowa in 1973. After graduation, she worked for the Fort Collins (CO) Coloradoan before coming to UNI as an assistant editor in the Office of Public Information Services where she became involved in sports information on a parttime basis. She was a member of the Olympic Press Operations staff this past summer in Los Angeles. She is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America and Women in Communications, Inc. CoSIDA has honored her with publication awards for football programs and brochures and wrestling brochures.

Madsen was named assistant SID June 3. He had worked the past two years as graduate assistant SID at Western Illinois and the two previous years as SID at Morningside College. A native of Sioux City, IA, he received his bachelor's degree in mass communications from Morningside in 1981 and currently is completing a master's degree in sports management from Western Illinois. He served an internship with the Baltimore Orioles baseball club the summer of 1983 and also has been sports editor of Western Illinois' tri-weekly school newspaper, and has written parttime for the Macomb (IL) Daily Journal and South Sioux City (NE) Star.

Versatility Key to 1984-85 Campaign

The final month of the 1983-84 basketball season is one that will be on the minds of Coach Jim Berry and his Northern Iowa basketball team this year as they prepare for what they hope will be a fine season. The Panthers were hoping for a bid to the National Invitational Tournament (NIT) before injury and illness to key players resulted in three straight losses at the end of the year, including a first round defeat in the Association of Mid-Continent Universities (AMCU-8) post-season tournament. That year-ending disappointment which capped off an otherwise magnificent season should be a motivating force in the team's drive for the AMCU-8 crown this year.

This year, with three starters returning from last year's 18-10 team, the Panthers will be setting their sights on a fifth consecutive year of improvement in Division I and winning the conference crown rather than placing second. With a balance of veterans and talented newcomers, some of whom have been around the UNI practice court for a year already, the team can't help but set high goals for itself.

"The season may have ended on a down note considering how far we had progressed during the year," said Berry at the end of last season. **"But given a few days to put everything in perspective, we can't be anything but pleased overall. We have a good foundation now to build upon for next year."**

Yes, last season was a productive and exciting year but there is a lot more to be accomplished and Berry, his staff and the squad all realize they can't rest on the laurels of last year.

"We have three starters back who played well but it will be tough to replace the top four players who have graduated," said Berry. **"Our talent is just as good, if not better, but the chemistry has to be there. We also have a good nucleus of backup players returning and a super group of rookies.** But our big question mark is who will replace the big man, Herbert King. The season will depend upon how well our new players fit in."

Starters Randy Kraayenbrink, Scott Stafford and Rob Williams return from a year ago as do sophomores Todd Lumsden and Joe Morganfield and senior Stan Werner. There are other players who sat out last season but were able to practice with the team, as well as a crop of talented first year players.

"As last year, the single most important factor which will help our squad is the internal competition," Berry said. **"The competition for positions within the team could be more intense than last year and that will only help each individual improve. There are few people on the team who have their positions sewn up."**



Before assessing the chances of the 1984-85 squad, the major personnel losses should be studied. Missing will be three- and four-year players, Jay Block, Dwayne Jackson, Herbert King and Mike Pijanowski who have graduated. Block, Jackson and King all were four-year letterwinners, while Pijanowski was a three-time letterwinner after transferring from Evansville. King was the second leading scorer last year with a 12.5 point average. He also tied for second place on the team with Block in rebounds with a 4.8 grab average. Block was the fourth leading scorer. Despite whatever statistics this crew compiled, the important fact is that many years of experience are lost with their graduation and plenty of basketball sense.

One other loss includes Eric Hawthorne who, as a sophomore this year, was expected to challenge for a starting role at small forward. A reserve last season who played primarily at guard, starting in five games, he was suspended this year for disciplinary reasons. Though his experience isn't as all-encompassing, he nevertheless could have been a great talent for this season.

The character of this year's Panther squad may be a bit different than last season's because of the new personnel but it will be expected to play the same style of game as in the past. It will fast break when the situation allows it but it also may play a more controlled type of game. Those areas that needed improvement last season should see some of that improvement this season.

"I think the things that were strengths a year ago will continue to be this year," said Berry. **"Those areas that needed improvement last year, like defense and maybe ball control at times, should be improved this year. But the struggle is just beginning. We have a pretty good shooting team but we can't rely on one person only, like Kraayenbrink, to bail us out of trouble. Hopefully, we can work more people into carrying the load."**

However, the key to the Northern Iowa attack once again probably will lie with Kraayenbrink, who played at the off guard spot last year, earning Sporting News Honorable Mention All-American honors despite an ankle injury that slowed him down the last month of the season. Scoring over 20 points

a game prior to being injured, his loss at a time when the Panthers were hoping for an NIT bid was a major blow.

"Randy improved tremendously this past season in all aspects of the game but he still needs to work on his defense and ball handling. He can score with the best in the country and we expect him to be an offensive threat again," Berry said.

Depth is a problem at the off guard spot, however. Hawthorne had played there as well as at point but he wasn't expected to play guard this season, anyway. The other candidates here are sophomores Joe Morganfield and Todd Lumsden and Illinois State transfer Kirk Francis, who won't be eligible until December 21, missing six games.

Morganfield played in only 14 games last year and Lumsden in 13. Lumsden, however, showed signs of brilliance last year with Kraayenbrink sidelined. Francis is listed as a forward but he could play either position.

While Berry is concerned with depth at the off guard spot, the same could almost be true for point guard, although last year's starter, Rob Williams, also returns here. "Rob did a super job for us last year but he wore out at the end. We need to get him some relief. He can play the game at both ends of the court," Berry said. With the loss of Hawthorne, other possibilities here include Morganfield and freshman Lamont Robinson. "It's hard to say anything about Lamont at this stage," said Berry. "He's very quick and penetrates well and is a good passer. With experience, I think he will be a great player."

One of the most important parts of the Panthers' front court play and one that will be stressed to the entire team will be increased rebounding at both ends of the court. Last season, the third returning starter, forward Scott Stafford, led UNI in the carom department with a 6.8 average. Block and King, however, were the second highest rebounders with only 4.8 averages and this area will need to be reinforced. Stafford also can be a great scorer but he will need to develop more consistency to hold down his starting role.

"Scott can be an excellent ball player but he needs to develop more consistency," Berry said. "He rises to the occasion the tougher the competition but he needs to play like that all the time. He has a responsibility of scoring and rebounding for us."

Along with Stafford, the other returnees at forward include Lumsden, who can play either forward or guard, and senior Stan Werner who played in only 15 games last year after transferring from Highland Community College. With the addition of Francis, who can play either forward or guard, and Jim McGrath, another Illinois State transfer, plus Northeastern Oklahoma A&M Junior College transfer Nate Harris and freshman Pat Quinn, depth is not a real problem in the front line, although experience needs to count for something. Both Francis and McGrath were able to practice with the Panthers last winter after transferring, so they are more accustomed to Berry's scheme of things than the players who just arrived on campus this fall.



"Jim (McGrath) is very capable offensively but he needs to work on his defense," Berry said. "He has to be a consistent rebounder for us. He has played very well in practice with us but that is different than game situations.

"Nathan (Harris) could be a big surprise," Berry added. "He's a hustler and works hard. He has good quickness, size and strength and he's a good ball handler for someone his size. And in time Pat (Quinn) will be an excellent ball player. He played center in high school but he also can play the perimeter. How soon he adjusts will determine his future."

That leaves the center position. With the graduation of King, the spot most likely will be filled by a completely new face — either Jay Henderkott or Greg McDermott. Berry said moving Stafford to this position would be a last resort solution.

Henderkott is a transfer from Ellsworth Junior College and McDermott was redshirted last year after coming down with mononucleosis during preseason of his freshman year. Thus, McDermott at least has had a year of practice with the Panthers, while Henderkott may have some catching up to do.

"Jay (Henderkott) is a strong, aggressive, hard-nosed player," Berry said. "He's not a big offensive threat but he is more than adequate. He's probably one of the better defensive post players I've seen. Greg (McDermott), on the other hand, showed signs in practice of the kind of player he can be and gave King a run for his money. It's unfortunate he didn't get any playing time."

With the many options that Coach Berry and his staff have prior to the season and hopefully throughout the year, it will be important to identify roles early. Berry has said that if he had to play a game tomorrow, "I would probably start Williams and Kraayenbrink at the guard spots, Henderkott at center, Stafford at one forward spot and Harris at the other forward. But all that could change in December when we get McGrath and Francis," he said.

The Panthers open their season in an exhibition game November 23 against Brandon University of Canada and jump right into things by hosting the Deery Bro's. Dome Classic November 30 to December 1 with Youngstown State, Alabama State and South Carolina State College. UNI must play at Kansas State early, December 8, before playing in a tournament December 21-22 at Evansville, along with Howard University and Central Michigan. Highlights of the home season include games against Missouri and Iowa State, January 9 and 10, respectively. The AMCU-8 season starts January 12 at Eastern Illinois.

Berry feels the AMCU-8 is becoming more competitive each year with no clear-cut favorite, although he gives the edge to Eastern Illinois, Cleveland State and Illinois-Chicago.

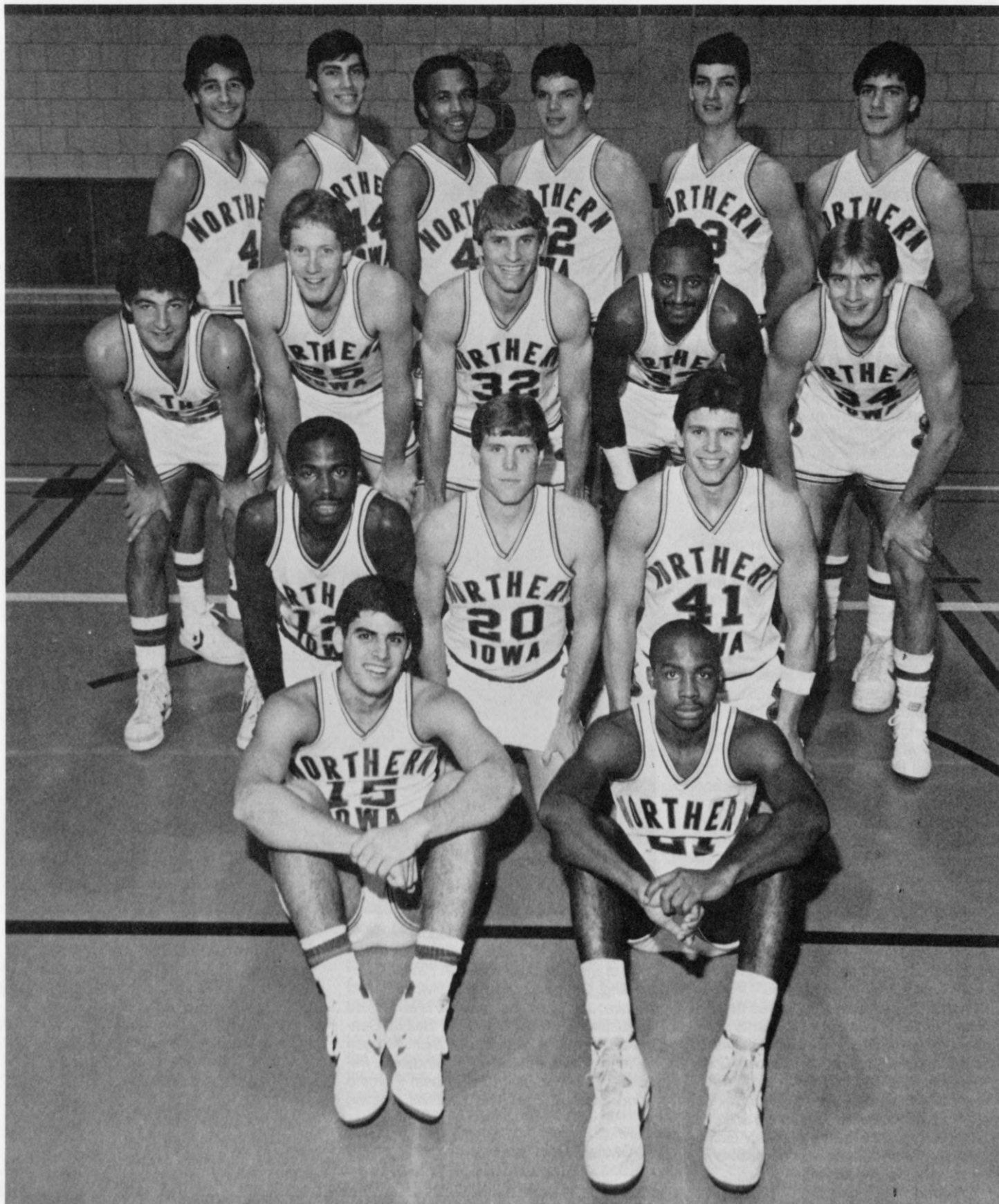

Guard, 6-3, 190, Junior, Paullina, IA (Paullina)

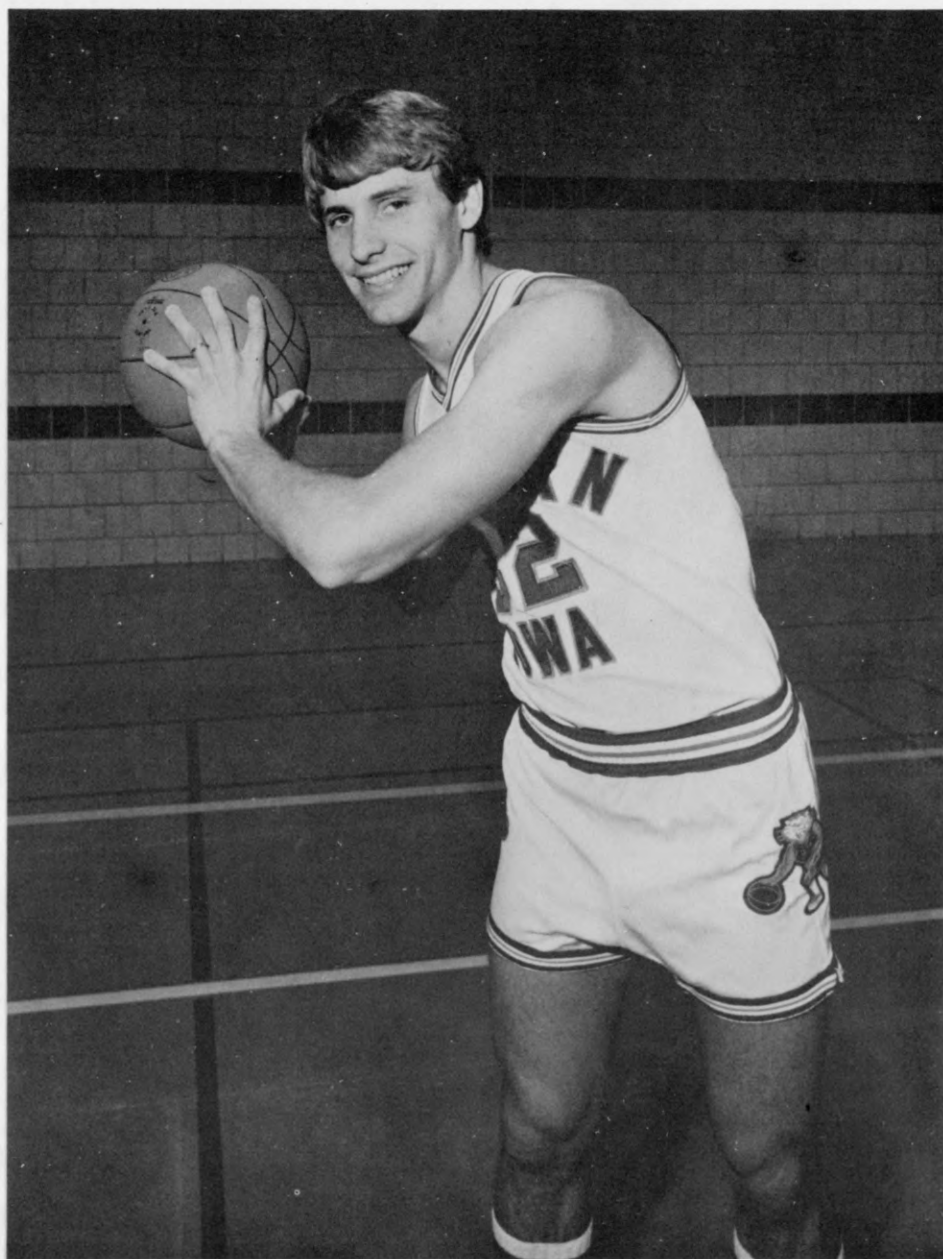
Last season: Appeared in 26 games, starting in 23. Injured an ankle in February, forcing him to sit out two entire games, and he never returned to form until the final game of the season when he scored 19 points in UNI's losing effort against Cleveland State in the AMCU-8 tourney. Averaged 18.5 points after averaging over 20 most of the season before his injury. Was the team's leading scorer in 16 of the 26 games he played. Had season highs for most field goals made (13 vs. Wayne State (NE) and Cleveland State), most free throws made (12 vs. Cleveland State), best free throw percentage (1.000 vs. Drake with 10 of 10) and most points (38 vs. Cleveland State). Named to Southwest Missouri's All-Opponent team, Sporting News Honorable Mention All-American team, Basketball Times 1983-84 Overlooked All-American Team, the AMCU-8 all-conference team, CoSIDA's (College Sports Information Directors of America) second team Academic All-American and moved into 21st on the UNI all-time scoring list after only two years of play.

College career: Appeared in 31 games, starting in 30 of them, as a freshman. The squad's top scorer (now two years in a row), averaging 12.4 points. Was the team's top scorer in 12 of the 31 games, including 29 points against Western Illinois and 25 against Wisconsin.

High school: A first team all-state pick in both football and basketball at Paullina High School. Averaged 26 points his senior prep year, shooting at a 60 percent clip. Shared the 1982 Iowa "Mr. Basketball" title. Also received the Hertz No. 1 award for the top athletic performance by an Iowa High School athlete. His school captured two Class 1-A basketball championships with his help. He also helped the school win the boys' Class C track championship and the Class 1-A football title his senior year. Set a single game scoring record of 47 points in the state basketball tournament and broke the all-time three-game point record by scoring 114 points. Was one of 18 Iowa high school players chosen to participate in an All-Star series against Minnesota players.

Coach Berry: "Randy improved tremendously this past season in all aspects of the game but he still needs work on his defense and ball handling. He just needs more confidence in his ball handling. He can score with the best in the country and we expect him to be an offensive threat again. However, the scoring load should be more evenly distributed this year and not so much pressure will be put upon his shoulders."

Personal: Parents are Mr. and Mrs. Al Kraayenbrink. Majoring in industrial education. Married to the



former Maria Johnson. The couple has one infant. **Hobbies:** Woodworking (he has made a lot of the couple's furniture). **Favorite Recording Group:** Alabama. **Individual Most Admire:** Jay Block, because he is always so consistent. **Favorite Pro Team:** Seattle Seahawks. **Favorite Film or TV Star:** Morgan Fairchild. **Favorite Movie:** Ghostbusters. **Favorite TV Show:** Hogan's Heroes. **Favorite Food:** Steak. **Biggest Athletic Thrill:** Beating

What's to tell about Randy Kraayenbrink that hasn't already been told? We already know that he is an outstanding basketball player with an uncanny ability to shoot from long range. We already know that he was married right out of high school to his charming wife, Marla. We already know that he was Iowa's "Mr. Basketball" his senior year at Paullina (IA) High School.

We already know he set the Iowa high school record for most points in a state tournament game (47) and most points in a tournament (114). We already know that he was blessed with a daughter (Leah) last March 31st. We already know that he has been the Panthers' leading scorer both seasons he's been here. What's to tell about Randy Kraayenbrink that hasn't already been told? . . . How about his fear of geckos.

What's a gecko? It is defined in Webster's Dictionary as "a harmless, chiefly tropical and nocturnal insectivorous lizard." A better definition of a gecko would be a baby alligator, two to three inches long, that skitters around dorm rooms on the campus of Cham-



inade University in Hawaii. It was there that Randy Kraayenbrink had met his match.

"Oh, Jay," Randy said in a worried voice. Before I had time to turn around, Randy was motionless, clutching a board, hugging the corner of the room opposite the harmless gecko. "What are we going to do?," Randy said to me in a nervous laugh. Lucky for both of us, a native Hawaiian came to our rescue and captured the little critter with his bare hands. A sigh of relief came over both of us.

A small gecko had accomplished in seconds what Steve Yoder of Wisconsin, Jack Hartman of Kansas State, Norm Stewart of Missouri, and countless other college coaches couldn't do — find a way to stop Randy Kraayenbrink. "We knew who was going to shoot it, but couldn't do anything about it," moaned Kansas State Coach Jack Hartman after Randy sank a shot with five seconds remaining in the game to seal the upset victory for the Panthers. "He's a great shooter," UNI Head Coach Jim Berry said. "Definitely, one of the best I've had. He always has the green light to shoot the ball."

The crowd senses the beauty of the ball falling gracefully through the net immediately as it leaves Randy Kraayenbrink's hands. The long range bombs that Randy is famous for float easily through the air in perfect trajectory and seem to excite hometown fans every bit as much as a Randy Kraayenbrink slam dunk. How did Randy become such a great shooter?

"I learned a lot from my older brothers, especially Dave," said Randy, referring to his eldest brother who also is a UNI graduate assistant. "When I was in fourth or fifth grade, I would play out on my driveway. We had an arc drawn eight to 10 feet out and Dave wouldn't let me shoot from outside that distance for about a year or two," he said. "I think it really helped me, because kids at an early age just aren't strong enough to shoot from way out and they develop bad habits," Randy added.

Randy is now shooting the ball twice the distance he was shooting from in fourth grade and, depending on the game, is credited for three points rather than two. "I love the three-point play," Randy said. "I think it's great for basketball."

Randy averaged over 18 points per game last year and may have been able to surpass the 20 points per game clip, had it not been for an ankle injury suffered during the Wisconsin-Green Bay game last year.

"That's one of my goals this year, to average 20 points," Randy said. "I also would like to break the single season scoring record," he added. Last year, Randy almost accomplished that, too, but because of the injury he finished with 481 points, which is shy of the record held by Bill McCoy, who scored 550 points in 19 games. "The ankle is still a little

weak," Randy admitted, "but I've been in touch with Dave Burton (UNI head trainer) quite a bit, and he's helping me get the strength back."

Grab hold of your rabbit's foot, everybody, and maybe we can coax that ankle back to health. But, certainly, Randy wouldn't think this silly superstition would do any good. "Before every game, I always put the sock with the writing on it on my left foot," Randy said, "and I always tie my wedding ring onto my left shoe." Why the left shoe? "Ring goes on the left hand so I figured left shoe," Randy theorized. "Oh, yeah, I also always tie my right shoe first," Randy added.

Suppose, horrors of horrors, that Randy Kraayenbrink should receive socks with no writing on them. "Forget it, I might as well not play," Randy said. Whew! Got all that? Left sock — tie the right shoe first — ring on the right shoe — no, that's the left shoe — or is it the right? Oh well, as long as the equipment manager remembers to give him socks with writing on them.

This superstitious young man, who enjoys woodworking (Randy made all his furniture, including a waterbed), has high aspirations for this year's Panther team. "I really want to win 20 or more games this year," Randy said, "and get into a post-season tournament." Last year's outfit flirted with a possible NIT berth before slumping at the end of the season and Randy sees last year's experience as a building block for this year. "Last year was fantastic, one of the greatest thrills I've had as a basketball player. But we blew away a chance at the NIT and I think everyone wants that chance back," Randy added.

The Panthers upset Wisconsin of the Big Ten and Kansas State of the Big Eight last year, which drew some of the largest crowds in the history of UNI basketball. After each victory, joyous UNI fans stormed the court and removed the nets. Signs proclaiming "Ya Gotta Believe" (last year's team motto) and "Northern Iowa Tourney-bound" (NIT) sprung from the stands as basketball games at UNI generated more excitement than anyone could remember.

"The fans were great! It was so much fun playing in front of 7,000 fans," Randy recalled. Among this year's 7,000 fans may be a nine-month old fan, daughter Leah. "She's going to try and make it," Randy said. "She's been to the football games but she's just been kind of dazed by the Dome's lights and stuff."

With Leah in the stands or radio-side, thousands of Panther fans will be screaming their delight as Randy lights up the scoreboard with his outside shooting. That is, if opposing coaches don't find out the secret to stopping him. Don't worry, Randy, no more mentioning geckos.

Forward, 6-7, 190, Senior, Tulsa, OK (Central, Northeastern Oklahoma A&M JC)

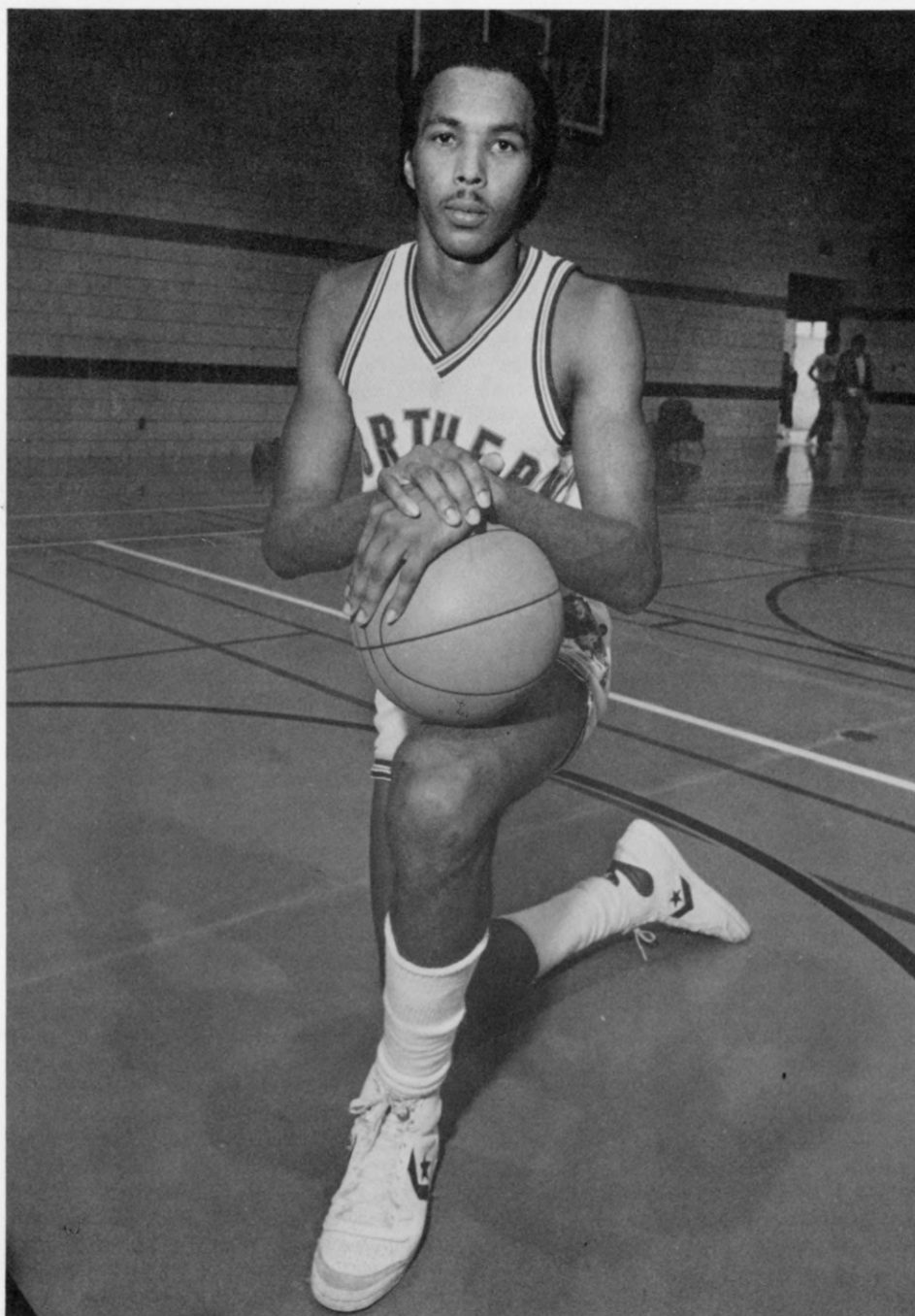

Scott Stafford didn't give fair warning to Northern Iowa basketball opponents for the 1984-85 season, but he did let on to insiders that he was getting the "fire" once again.

After watching his initial season in a Panther uniform, people might be hard pressed to figure out just what Stafford plays like when he's really fired up. During the 28 games played last year, Stafford averaged 10.1 points, 6.8 rebounds and blocked 51 of the team's 100 blocks. His figures for the AMCU-8 season were 9.6 points and 6.4 rebounds per game. To Stafford those figures aren't impressive. He feels he has yet to play up to his potential.

Stafford said the fire, what he calls his "wanna spirit", came back to him this summer. He played a lot of basketball games and helped out at some basketball camps around the area for scholboys.

Just like center Herbert King, Stafford could bring the UNI-Dome crowds to a fever pitch when he'd get a loose ball or a fed pass and sail in for a slam dunk. He blocked shots regularly and often blocked two offerings by the same player.

Although he fancies himself as a team player Stafford was singled out by his teammates as UNI's "Most Valuable Player" at the

end of an 18-10 season, the best Division I record ever by a Panther team.

Panther Coach Jim Berry liked what he recruited from Northeastern Oklahoma A&M but it is too bad that the staff couldn't offer scholarships to his uncles. Stafford has one uncle at 6-9, one at 6-7, two at 6-6, one at 6-5, another 6-4 and one at 6-2. They might be a tough unit to beat at family reunions.

Basketball has been Stafford's game since 10th grade, when he moved in with his aunt to attend Tulsa Central High. Stafford tried wrestling in elementary school and then football and basketball in junior high. He stayed with basketball because he thought "I could learn to play that game better than the others."

Maybe his biggest inspiration came from the basketball game of his native 36th Street area in Tulsa. He watched the older kids of that area play basketball in high school and "that got me wanting to play."

Basketball coaches may never know just how close Stafford came to giving up the game after his senior year in high school turned into a nightmare.

Central was a Cinderella team in Stafford's junior year. Off to a slow start, Central rallied to win area and regional championships and qualify for the state tournament. The flame was building in Stafford as he began to see the success he would continue to enjoy throughout his career.

Before his senior year, Stafford went to the famous Blue Chip Basketball Camp and came back ready for his final season. But fate intervened. A few days prior to Central's opening game, Stafford was informed that because of technicalities he was ineligible for the entire season. Recently, Stafford laughed while remembering how he, the head coach and the athletic director all had a good cry over the incident.

Despite the fact that he couldn't play for Central, Stafford was in the running for Oklahoma's "Player of the Year" award. He played in two all-star games, his North team won the city battle and he was named MVP of the Kansas-Oklahoma shootout.

College coaches who had seen Stafford play during his junior year were still convinced he could make the grade even after a year off. Arkansas was calling, Oklahoma was after him and Bob Cleeland wanted Stafford in Springfield, MO, at Southwest Missouri State. Stafford skipped over all of them and went to Northeastern Oklahoma for two years.

But after two years of JC play his flame had tuckered to a very low ember. Soon, it was recruiting time again. "I wasn't too pumped up about being recruited again," Stafford said.

Panther assistant coach Dan Traeger spelled out his wares to Stafford and arranged

for a trip to Cedar Falls and a meeting with Coach Berry. The Panthers had lost 6-11 center Ray Stork to graduation and Berry's plan listed King as the new center. Stafford would be a good replacement for King at the forward spot. A deal was struck — Stafford would come to UNI as a forward. The coaches chuckled to themselves. Those who asked Berry or his assistants about recruiting were told how good the new forward would be.

Their prediction was right on target. Stafford proved his ability the very first time he touched the basketball during an intrasquad game in Cascade. Rob Williams brought the ball upcourt and spotted Stafford crossing the base of the lane. With an alley-oop pass, Stafford caught the ball and rammed home a reverse dunk that awed the crowd.

That was just the beginning. Stafford was part of the Panther team that finished 14-0 in home games and second to Illinois-Chicago in conference standings. He became known as the player who showed little emotion on the court and who could shoot at close range or 15 feet with similar accuracy.

Stafford prefers game situations over practices. "When I'm running out on the court, I get a trickle of sweat running and I get excited on the inside," Stafford said. "But I like to keep a calm look here (pointing to his face)."

Playing the frontline takes skill, muscle and agility. Stafford is able to exchange elbows with anyone and plays the middle on his toes so he can spring to block shots. And he likes to mix all of those ingredients with a dose of smarts.

"More than just the ability, I try to use my head," Stafford said. "After so long, there are only so many ways of doing things."

Stafford was given the green light in high school to shoot wherever he felt comfortable. If that meant a 15-foot jumper, so be it. But he doesn't like to put up any shot just to see it fall. "I won't shoot unless I feel we need it," Stafford added.

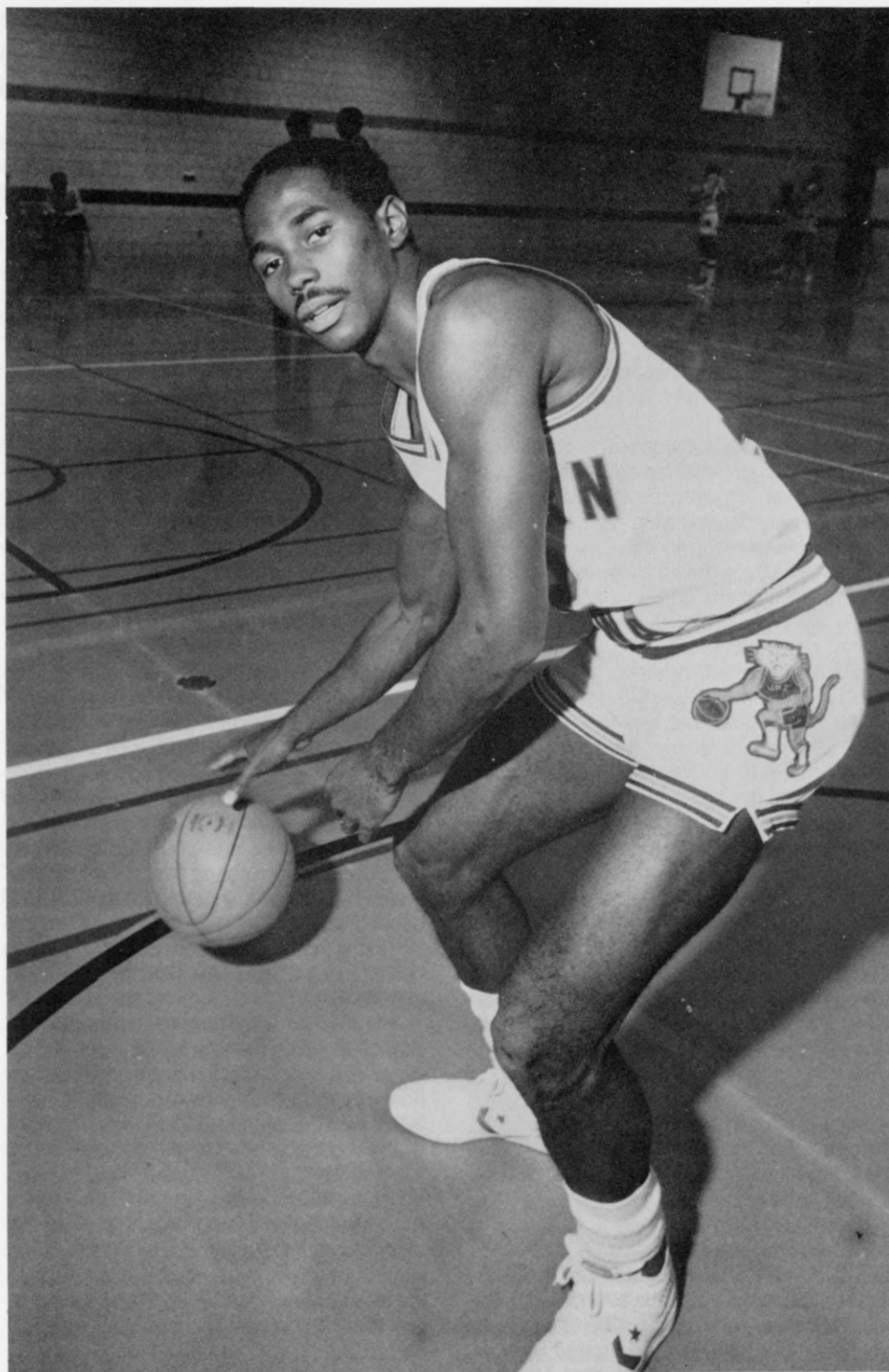
At times last year, Stafford said he was hesitant to shoot in some games. Pretty soon a fan would send down instructions from the rafters to shoot. He would and the Panthers would have two more points. Stafford said the fans act like a sixth man. "They get you to give that 100 percent and take a step more," he said.

The Panthers are again hoping to qualify for post-season play in the NIT as they had hoped last season. Stafford believes team unity, "Playing as we and not I," is the key to success this winter.

His goals are to average 15 points and nine rebounds per game while leading the AMCU-8 in both rebounding and blocked shots. Meanwhile, he wants to keep the flame burning at a white-hot pace.

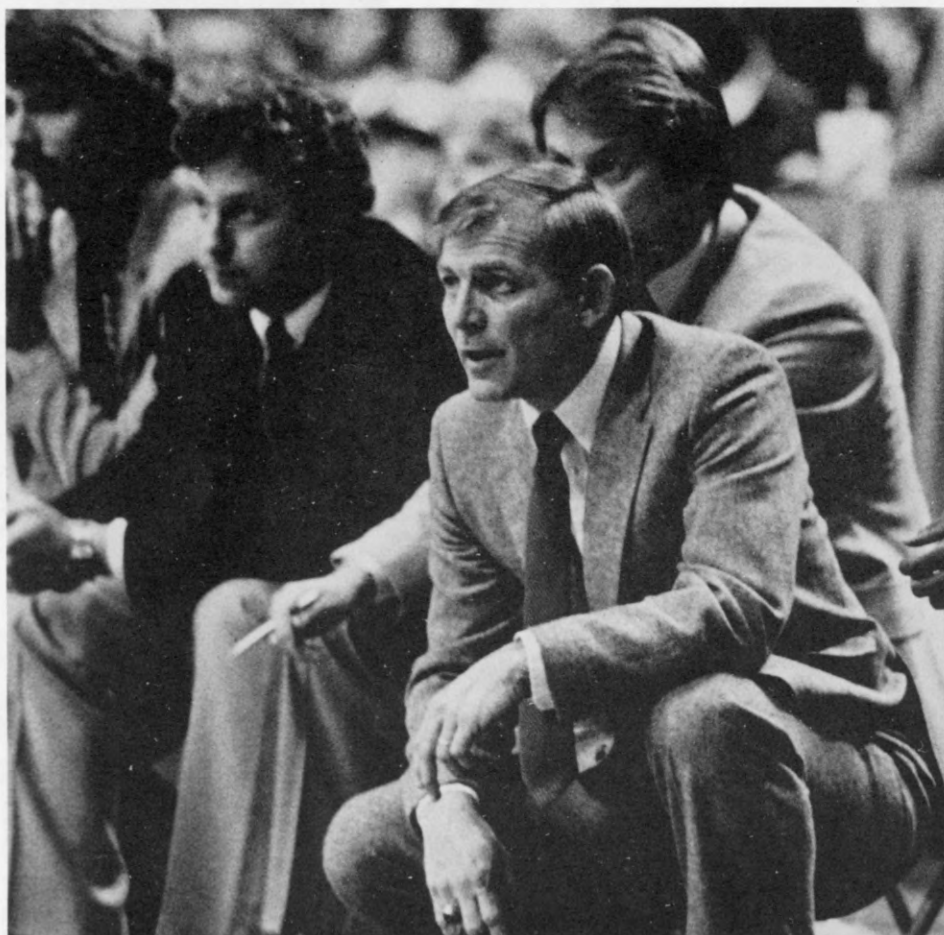
be a positive addition if he returns healthy. It's unfortunate he didn't get any playing time."

Head Coach Jim Berry



Coach Jim Berry is starting his 12th year at the helm of the University of Northern Iowa Panther basketball program. The 20-year coaching veteran has compiled a 124-175 mark at UNI in his 11 years. Two seasons stand out the most. The 1978-79 team posted an 18-11 mark, the best record since 1963. The Panthers advanced to the Division II playoffs, knocking off host Nebraska-Omaha in the first round, 84-72, before losing to eventual national runner-up Wisconsin-Green Bay in a hard-fought 56-50 battle. Last year, UNI finished with its best record since playing Division I ball, 18-10, went undefeated at home with a 14-0 mark and placed second in the Association of Mid-Continent Universities (AMCU-8) conference.

Prior to his arrival in Cedar Falls, Berry coached Loras to a 58-39 record over four seasons, including two 18-win seasons. Three of his squads at Loras participated in the NAIA district playoffs.

Berry went to Loras from Waterloo Columbus High School where in five years he made that program one of the finest in the State of Iowa. His record at Columbus was 64-36 and he had several teams rank high among the state's top 10 squads. His teams won or tied for the Waterloo city championship four times.

He graduated from Waterloo West High School in 1955 where he earned all-state honors. Just last March 17, he was inducted into the Iowa High School Basketball Hall of Fame because of his outstanding prep and collegiate careers. He received a bachelor of arts degree from Creighton in 1960 and earned his master's in physical education from UNI in 1970.

During his playing career, he was a four-year member of Creighton's varsity basketball and baseball teams and won All-American honors in basketball as a junior and senior.

After graduation, he remained at Creighton as an assistant basketball and head baseball coach. He left that post in 1962 to enter the United States Army. He coached the Fort Polk, LA, basketball and baseball teams, with his cagers compiling a 41-11 record in two years. He remains active in the Army as a lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve.

He and his wife, Mary Gene, have three sons and a daughter: David, 24; Michael, 20; Jeffrey, 19; and Kelly, 23.

An Exclusive Interview With Northern Iowa's Head Coach



Q. How do you characterize yourself as a coach?

A. I think I'm somewhat laid back. For the most part, I think I'm patient, although when I become impatient I get **very** impatient. I think I almost expect perfection more than I should and that's where my patience needs to take hold. I don't think I'm a wild, shouting type of coach. My emotions don't show what I'm feeling at times. I try to present a steady, uniform type of emotion to keep the players on an even keel, although we all have peaks and valleys. I think I do a better job of hiding my exuberance than my lows. I also think I try to keep things simple and that just by executing our offense and defense we shouldn't have to make things too difficult.

Q. Do you label yourself an educator or a coach?

A. I don't think you can separate the two. A coach, basically, is an educator. A coach has to teach. A good coach is a good teacher.

Q. How good is the program you now head?

A. It's a lot better than it was four or 12 years ago. We still have a long way to go—to where it could be or to where I might want it to be. It's a slow progress. Laying a solid foundation takes time. There may be other ways to get healthy quicker but they may not be lasting ways. We made strides last year. I didn't know we were capable of such things last year. I'm not sure we can maintain it, we made a big jump last year. That kind of a jump is difficult to sustain. A lot of things fell into place for us, the chemistry and ingredients. Everything snowballed in our favor.

There have been a lot of people who contributed to this program, No. 1 being the players. They have worked hard. Also, my assistants through the years — from Dan Breitbach, to Randy Eccker, to now Dan (Traeger) and Paul (Swanson). Those are the only assistants I have had in my years here. I also think the administration has been very positive and cooperative and patient and understanding. It knows things don't happen overnight.

Q. How good can the UNI program be?

A. That depends upon how much is put into it — financially, emphasis-wise, etc. Last year was an indication that basketball can be profitable here at UNI and under the present philosophy we could be a very good mid-major basketball program. I don't know if the administration has any desire to go higher than that and if so, we would need a larger commitment. All coaches have a dream of being recognized nationally. We will do the best we can with the equipment we have on hand.

Q. Can UNI win a national championship?

A. Under the present circumstances, no. But that may not be our philosophy or goal at this time. At this time, we can be very competitive at our level or even a little higher; for instance, in the Missouri Valley. But we're not even close on the national level — we're not even close to spending the amount of money necessary. Again, at this time that may not be the administration's goal or philosophy. But I'm not complaining.

Q. How good is the talent on the current UNI team?

A. This year's talent is the best we've ever had, but we lack experience. We don't have as much experience as we had last year. Rarely have I seen talent overcome lack of experience. But the potential is here. We lost four players who had played off-and-on as starters for four years and they are being replaced by people who haven't played that much.

Q. How have you and your coaches been received in the homes of recruits?

A. Very good. We received a little more recognition last year and became better known. We've been talking to some very fine players and we've gotten some very favorable reactions. Hopefully, UNI is a place where they would like to continue their education. I don't expect to sign anyone on the early signing date, however, but that doesn't concern me.

Q. When you're not involved with coaching or recruiting, what do you like to do?

A. I spend a lot of time with the Army reserves, which I have been with for 20 years — 24, counting my active service with the

Army. It's kind of a hobby for me, although it's more than that. I think it's necessary for the defense and freedom of our country. I guess the patriotism comes first. But that time provides me with something completely different from what I do the rest of the year. It's an avocation rather than a vocation.

I also play tennis as often as I can. I used to spend a lot of time following my children's athletic careers, but they are basically over. I still enjoy being a spectator.

I don't feel like my job is a job. I have fun working with young kids and basketball, after all, it is a game. All coaches put in a lot of hours, including weekends, and I couldn't do that if I was, say, working in a factory. This job is a little like trying to raise 15 of my own children. They all have different problems. I don't have all the answers but I'm a good listener and can be sympathetic or be a disciplinarian, whichever is called for.

Q. What is your philosophy for student-athletes?

A. Basically, for a basketball player or any other athlete, athletics is an opportunity to steal an education and have fun doing so. They won't play basketball all their lives — that career will end, some sooner than others. They'd better have something else to do. Some players will have an opportunity to play in foreign countries which may extend their playing days. But academics should come first and basketball after that. For some, like Randy Kraayenbrink, basketball may not even be second on their list because of the family. Basketball should be a game and it should be kept as such.

Q. What do you feel your personal strengths and weaknesses are?

A. Over the years I think I've become more patient with my teams, and that is a strength not a weakness. Sometimes I assume too many things. I need to be more direct. Basically, I think I'm an easy enough coach to play for but I do make it tough enough so players do things correctly. I try to keep basketball fun. I'm also trying to develop other outside interests — I even went to a play the other night! However, sports are a form of relaxation for me, both mentally and physically.

I think I have a tendency to worry about things I shouldn't, perhaps because I'm too much of a perfectionist. I have a hard time accepting defeat and mediocrity.

I think I'm honest, sincere and that I care for other people. I understand that people can't be perfect, although I expect perfection from myself.

The Assistants



Daniel Traeger

This will be Dan Traeger's fourth year as first assistant under Head Coach Jim Berry. He became UNI's third fulltime cage assistant in history when he replaced Randy Eccker, who left the Panthers after only a single season to take a position at Colorado.

Traeger has established himself as one of the premier recruiters in the Midwest and has consistently increased the number of recruits and improved upon the talent of recruits that play basketball at Northern Iowa. He also has directed the UNI Basketball Camp, one of the few camps in the nation that specializes in the "team" concept of instruction rather than solely on individual skills.

An assistant basketball and football coach at Luther College in Decorah, IA, for one year, Traeger received his master's degree in administration and supervision from Roosevelt University in 1979. He received his bachelor's degree in political science and physical education from Illinois State in 1970 and also attended Illinois Valley Community College two years.

Prior to his position at Luther, he was head basketball coach from 1973-80 at Glenbard East High School in Lombard, IL, where he turned a losing program into a winning program, posting 72 wins against 50 losses. He directed the team to the finals of the regional state tournament for the first time in the previous eight years and continued to make the finals for the next five years, winning three titles. One of his players received All-American honors.

From 1970-73, he was an assistant coach at Toluca High School in Toluca, IL, where he coached baseball, cross country and three levels of basketball. He coached sophomore basketball teams to three straight conference titles, baseball to three district championships and cross country to one league title.

Traeger's basketball background includes invitations to work in some of the best basketball camps in the nation, including the Medalist Basketball Camp, Garfinkel's Five Star Camp, DePaul University, Kentucky and Bill Creneur's All-American Camp.



Paul Swanson

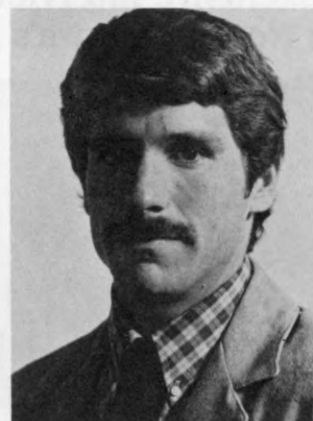
Paul Swanson is in his third year as assistant to Head Coach Jim Berry after spending nearly a decade as a prep coach in Chicago and its Catholic league.

A graduate of LuVerne (IA) High School, he received his bachelor's degree in industrial education with a minor in physical education from Iowa State University in 1974 and his master's in physical education and health from Northwestern University in 1980.

Swanson took over the reins of the Marist High School boys' program eight years ago, charged with a major rebuilding job which paid off four years ago when the squad finished 25-5 and advanced to the prestigious Sweet 16 Super Sectionals for the first time in the East Suburban Catholic League in Chicago.

Swanson has developed an excellent reputation both as a coach and recruiter. He has worked at the top All-Star high school camps in the country and was a member of the Southern California Summer Pro Basketball League staff two summers ago. He also is a recognized clinic and banquet speaker and has a strong background in marketing and promotions.

Among his hobbies, Swanson also has a private pilot's license.

Dave Kraayenbrink took over the graduate assistant chores last year after spending two years as recreation director for the city of LeMars, IA. A 1979 graduate of Northern Iowa with a bachelor's degree in recreation, he currently is working on his master's in health promotion and fitness management.

Prior to his post at LeMars, Kraayenbrink was recreation director for the city of Sheldon, IA, and received his recreation training on an internship program for the Family YMCA of Black Hawk County in Waterloo, IA.

A native of Paullina, IA, he is an older brother of Panther starting guard, Randy. David competed in football, track, baseball and was captain of his basketball squad his senior year. He also competed in basketball at Southwest State (MN) and Northwestern College (IA).

The University of Northern Iowa

The University of Northern Iowa, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, is the outgrowth of the Iowa State Normal School established by the General Assembly in 1876.

From a single building on a 40-acre campus, the University has grown to include over 40 major buildings, a 723-acre campus, over 500 faculty members and over 11,000 on-campus students.

During the first 27 years, the school issued teaching certificates requiring 12 weeks to two years of training. In 1903 a four-year curriculum based on high school graduation and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Education was authorized.

In 1909 the institution was renamed the Iowa State Teachers College and the government of the College, along with that of the University of Iowa and Iowa State University, was vested in the State Board of Regents, a nine-member body appointed by the Governor. Under the new name, the College attained a reputation as one of the nation's outstanding institutions for preparation of teachers.

On July 5, 1961, the Iowa General Assembly on recommendation of the Regents changed the name of the school to the State College of Iowa and redefined its functions to include the offering of liberal arts degrees.

On July 1, 1967, the General Assembly on recommendation of the Regents approved university status. The name was changed to University of Northern Iowa and its function was again redefined.

Although teacher education remains an important program, the University offers degrees to students majoring in a wide variety of subjects. Thus UNI has two bachelor of



arts degrees, one with certification to teach and one without certification. Also, a bachelor of technology degree can be earned with or without certification to teach, and since 1969, the bachelor of music degree has been offered. A bachelor of fine arts degree was approved by the Regents in 1976. An individual studies major enables a student to pursue, with faculty approval, a wide assortment of study areas. The bachelor of liberal studies, the fifth baccalaureate degree, is an external degree made available through the cooperative efforts of the three Iowa Regents universities. This degree was approved by the Regents in 1977.

On the graduate level, courses leading to

the degree of master of arts in education were offered for the first time in the summer of 1952 and a sixth-year program leading to the specialist degree with a program in science education was inaugurated in 1970.

In 1964, the master of arts degree was approved by the Regents. The first master of arts degrees were granted in 1966. The master of business administration degree was approved by the Regents in 1975, and the master of music in 1976. The graduate program was further extended in 1978 with the addition of UNI's first doctoral degree, the doctor of industrial technology. Approval for a second doctoral degree, the doctor of education, was granted in 1983.

The Court — Home in the Dome

UNI supporters and the entire State of Iowa realized a dream come true with the completion of the UNI-Dome — a completely covered, multi-purpose facility with an air-supported roof — in February of 1976.

UNI-Dome (the prefix stands for University of Northern Iowa as well as meaning one and unique) combines the features of three buildings — a football stadium, field house and large auditorium. It hosts such events as concerts, exhibitions, trade shows, pageants, rallies and convocations, as well as football, basketball, and softball games and wrestling and track meets.

The Dome has hosted such events as the NCAA gymnastic and wrestling championships, the Iowa High School All-Star Basketball games, the Iowa High School football playoffs, concerts by Dolly Parton, the Eagles, REO Speedwagon, Fleetwood Mac and the Rolling Stones, to mention a few, antique car shows, tractor pulls and many other non-athletic events.

The Dome's air-supported, Fiberglass fabric roof, constructed by Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corp., was erected at a cost equal to half that of conventional roof construction. And because of the dome's translucence, ample natural light is available during daylight hours resulting in a sizeable savings on utility costs.

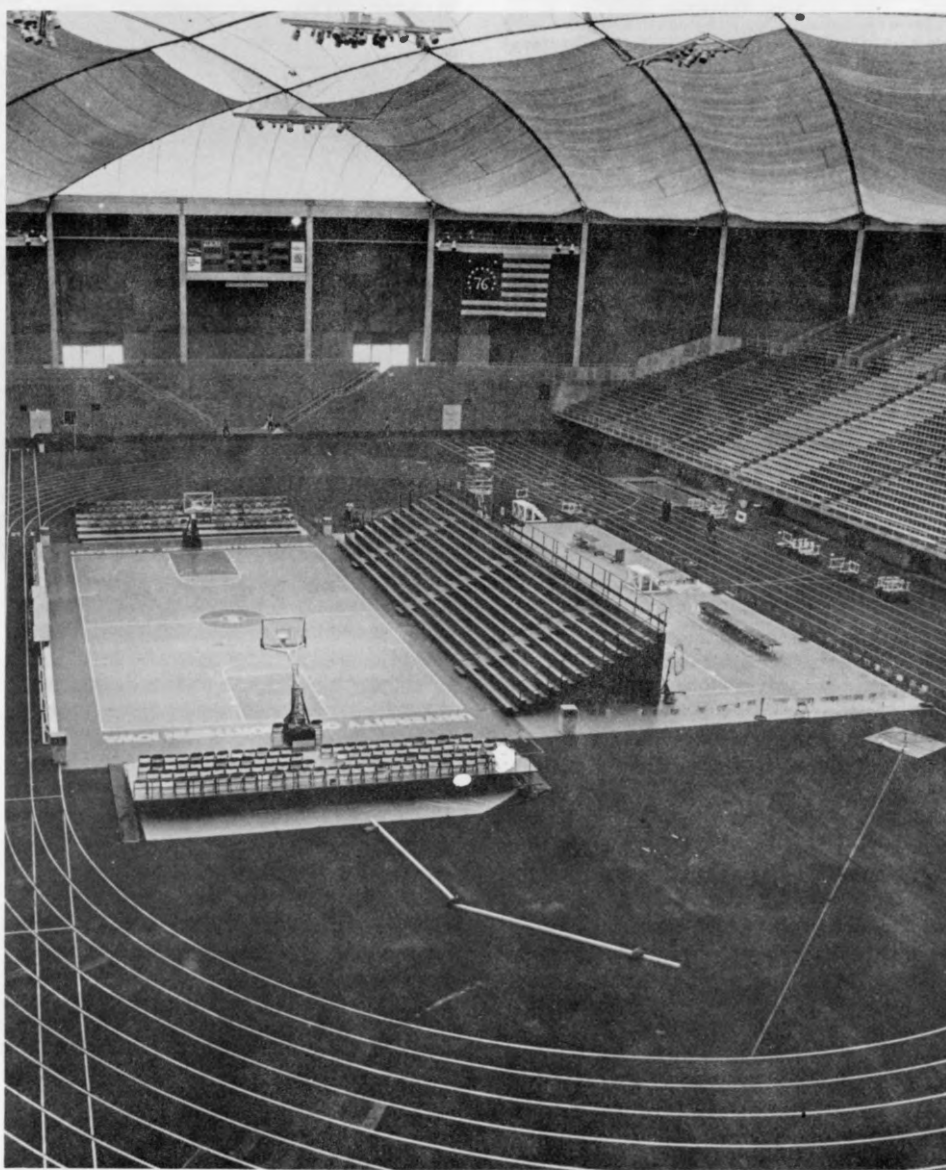
The UNI-Dome was designed with "something for everyone." Its artificial turf for football games can be rolled up in a minimum of 36 hours. Underneath, on a synthetic floor area, are basketball and tennis courts and an eight-lane, 220-yard oval running track. As many as 12 tennis matches and two basketball games could be played simultaneously.

Approximately 16,400 spectators can be seated for football and 7,254 for court-side activities. For stage activities, such as commencement, concerts and speaker series, total capacity — using movable bleachers and chairs — can reach 25,000.

The 168,000-square foot dome, which rises 124 feet above the arena floor, is supported entirely by a network of 12 stranded steel cables and four air blowers. A concrete and steel ring around the top of the 70-foot high stadium wall holds the cables. The cables weigh 47 tons.

The roof of the dome is made of 49 tons of woven Fiberglass coated with Teflon. Approximately 60 percent of the dome has an inner liner of fabric that provides acoustical as well as thermal benefits.

A spacious press box atop the east stands has facilities for 20 radio stations, television capabilities and seating for up to 125 people. A photography darkroom, photo bay, concession area and scouting booths are a few other features. Two huge scoreboards can flash messages and information to spectators throughout the events.



The west press box recently has been completed to provide a meeting room for the UNI Athletic Club.

Plans call for the addition of administrative offices, locker and training rooms and VIP boxes. Currently, an enclosed passageway connects the Dome with the Physical Education Center for locker facilities.

The Panthers possess a winning magic when they play at home in the UNI-Dome. The record speaks for itself. Since the Dome opened in mid-February of 1976, UNI's home record is 79-26. So the "home court advantage" should not be taken lightly in the Panthers' case.

1983-84 In Review

The University of Northern Iowa men's basketball team began the 1983-84 season with cautious optimism, had high hopes for a possible NIT bid two-thirds through the season and ended the year with three straight losses, cancelling out any possibility of a post-season bid. Although the season ended perhaps on a disappointing note, the Panthers nonetheless completed the year with their best record ever, 18-10, since moving to Division I.

UNI was picked to place fifth in a preseason poll the second year after joining the AMCU-8 and instead finished second in the regular season standings with a 10-4 mark behind Illinois-Chicago. Seeded second in the first AMCU-8 post-season tournament, the Panthers were eliminated in the first game by seventh-seeded Cleveland State, 93-79, in overtime. Cleveland State went on to place second in the tourney when it lost to fifth-seeded Western Illinois in the championship game.

UNI's 18-10 record tied the most wins in a season for a UNI team coached by Jim Berry.

The 1978-79 squad finished 18-11. It also marked the fourth consecutive year of improvement in Division I. The Panthers finished 8-19 in their first year in Division I, 12-15 the following year and 13-18 in 1982-83.

The season was highlighted by a perfect 14-0 home record, including wins over Wisconsin, Kansas State and Drake. The Panthers also won three games on opponents' courts after accomplishing only one road win during the last couple of years. Heading into the last two regular season games, UNI had won seven straight contests.

The reasons for the Panthers' slide at the end of the year are difficult to assess. UNI's leading scorer, Randy Kraayenbrink, injured an ankle February 13 and never returned to his previous form. After averaging over 20 points most of the season and leading the conference in scoring, he missed two entire games and played sparingly the rest of the season until scoring 19 points in UNI's losing effort against Cleveland State in the post-season tourney. Also, illness struck several players at the end of the year and though all

played most of the time, they weren't playing at 100 percent.

There were things to cheer about. Fans came out in record numbers to watch the Panthers at home. UNI set three attendance records, with the largest crowd of 7,220 watching UNI defeat Southwest Missouri State in the last home game of the season. Three Panthers were named to the AMCU-8 All-Conference squad. Kraayenbrink was named to the first team, Herbert King to the second team and junior college transfer Scott Stafford was named to the All-Newcomer team. Kraayenbrink also was named to Basketball Times 1983-84 Overlooked All-American Team and was selected to CoSIDA's (College Sports Information Directors of America) national All-Academic team.

Sophomore Robbie Williams set a school record for number of assists in a season, breaking the old mark set by Jay Imhoff in 1979-80. He also was the major contributor to UNI's new record for team assists in a season, breaking the old mark set in 1979-80.

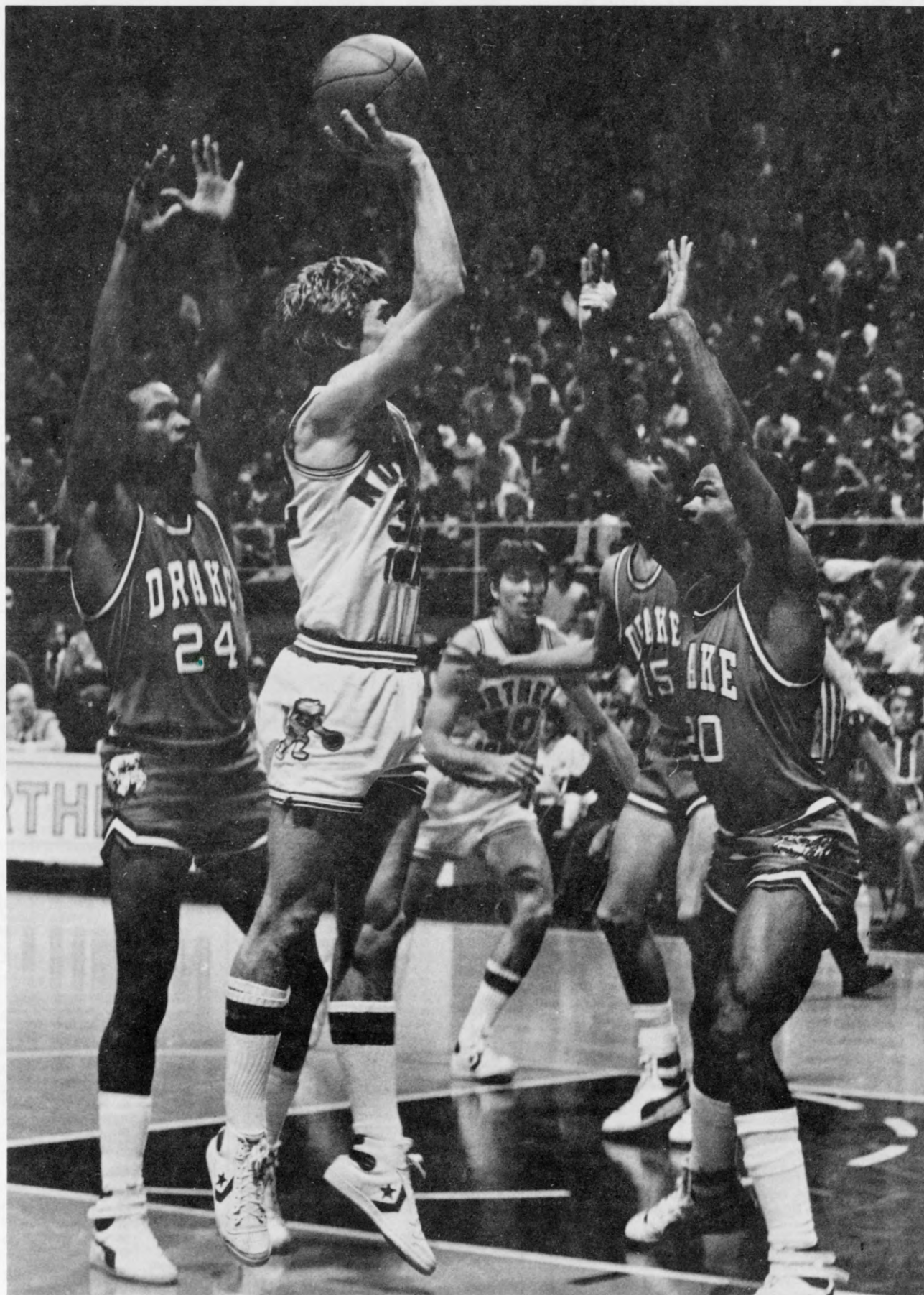

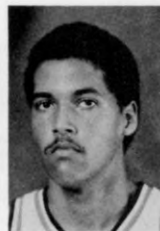

UNI President Constantine Curris

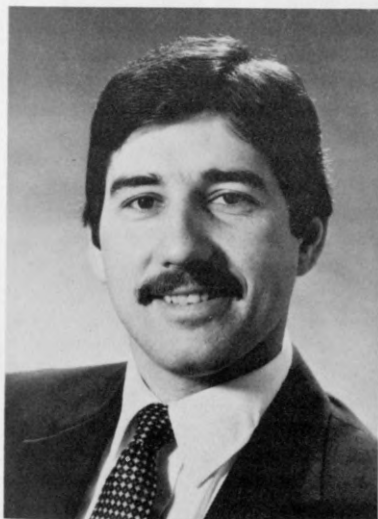


Dr. Curris was named the seventh president of the University of Northern Iowa June 17th, 1983, replacing Dr. John J. Kamerick who retired from the presidency after 13 years. Curris, 43, had been president of Murray State University in Murray, KY, since 1973. Prior to his presidency at Murray State, he was vice president and dean of the faculty at West Virginia Institute of Technology from 1971-73. From 1969-71, he was dean of student personnel programs at Marshall University. In 1968-69, Curris was director of academic programs of the West Virginia Board of Education, which served as the governance body for nine collegiate institutions, excluding West Virginia University. He was vice president and dean of the faculty at Midway College from 1965-68 and assistant coordinator of the University of Kentucky Centennial Celebration in 1964-65.

Curris received a B.A. degree magna cum laude, in political science, with a minor in speech communication in 1962 from Kentucky. He received an M.A. degree in political science with a public administration emphasis from Illinois in 1965 and the Ed.D. in higher education with minors in student personnel services and public policy from Kentucky in 1967.

He has received many professional honors and just last year the Murray State University Board of Regents designated the school's new student center as the Constantine W. Curris University Center. In 1982 he was named Boss of the Year by the Murray Chapter of Professional Secretaries International. He was a delegate to the White House Conference on Small Business in 1980 and was named "Outstanding Young Kentuckian" in 1974 and was Youth Governor of Kentucky in 1958. He received the Sullivan Medal at Kentucky in 1962 as the "Outstanding Male Undergraduate."

Athletic Director Robert Bowlsby



Robert A. Bowlsby was selected athletic director in mid-February of 1984 after serving as assistant athletic director for facilities and interim A.D. when Stan Sheriff resigned the post in September of 1983.

A native of Waterloo (IA), Bowlsby is a 1970 graduate of West High School. He earned a bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Moorhead State in 1975 and a master's in recreational administration from the University of Iowa in 1978.

He served as assistant director of recreational services at Iowa from 1978 to 1981, working in facility management and being responsible for the indoor and outdoor tennis programs, as well as the school's Recreation Building.

He joined the UNI staff in April of 1981. His experience at UNI has been broadbased, including involvement in all areas of the intercollegiate athletic program and promotion of the UNI-Dome. He has worked with a variety of athletic events, special programs and entertainment attractions.

At the time of his appointment, he was a member of the Athletic Club Board of Directors and was one of three University representatives on the Athletic Club Executive Committee. He is a member of the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Convention and Visitors Bureau and is a past board member of the Iowa Parks and Recreation Association.

As an undergraduate, he was a four-year letterwinner and captain of the Moorhead State wrestling team.

Bowlsby and his wife, Candice, have two children — Lisa and Matt.

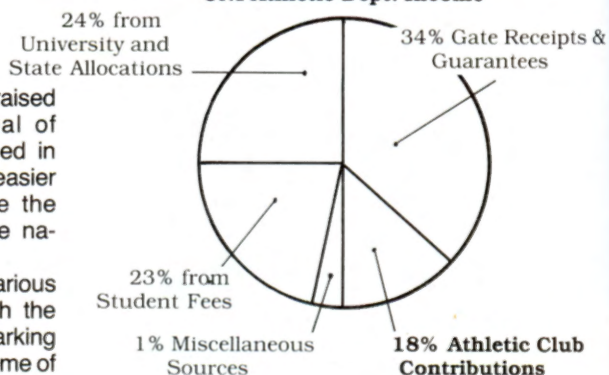

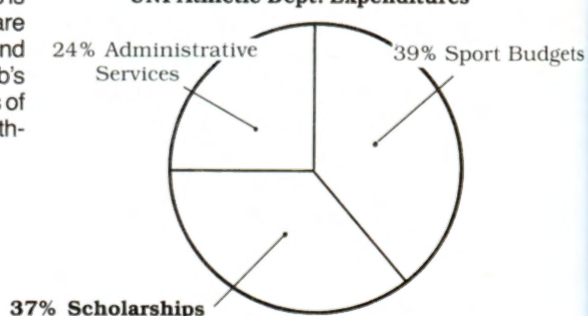
