

Weeks Talks on Intolerance

MUCH OF TODAY'S INTOLERANCE RESULTS from youngsters overhearing their elders chat at the dinner table, Dr. I. D. Weeks, president of the University of South Dakota, told delegates at the annual Parent-Teacher conference on the Teachers College campus July 10.

The university executive said that too often children hear such things as, "Oh, well, his folks live on the wrong side of the track," or "What you you expect, he's a Russian," or similar remarks deprecating a minority group.

The children unconsciously absorb these sentiments and soon act accordingly. Such a situation, Dr. Weeks said, reveals the need for a more functional curriculum in America's schools.

"The focal point should be on man in tomorrow's education," he said. "It is not enough to know that we are now living in a 60-hour world or an atomic age. We must know more and more about all the people of the world."

HERBERT V. HAKE, JOVIAL TEACHERS College radio director, is also a popular "chalk talk" artist.

Speaking at the three branch summer schools last July, he sought to show his audiences that things, and people, aren't always what they seem.

His topic: "Second Thoughts on First Impressions." Making tricky, rapid-fire drawings as he spoke, he mixed a philosophical humor with his remarks.
