## Educators and Lay Leaders Attend Third Annual School P/R Workshop

Nearly one hundred Iowa leaders of business, labor, industry, education and civic affairs attended the Third Annual workshop on School Public Relations held on campus, July 13-16.

Theme of the workshop was, "The Citizen's Responsibility for the Public Schools." Stewart Harral, director of public relations studies at the University of Oklahoma, was the featured speaker.

If America is to have good public schools, Harral told workshop participants, it is up to every town and hamlet to enter the battle on the local level.

"It will take work—talking, ringing doorbells, telephoning, meeting, thumping heads together—to drum up action for needed improvements," he said, "Let's move beyond the hand-wringing stage."

Wesley Erbe (B.A. '30), principal at the Fort Dodge high school and president of the Iowa State Education association, presented the final summary of workship findings.

The citizen, said Erbe, has a responsibility to know the schools. In turn, teachers and administrators have the responsibility to inform the citizens of what's going on in the schools.

"It's a two-way channel of communication," he said, "By planning together we can provide better education."

He touched on curriculum planning, parent visits, P-TA, and Business-Industry-Education days and in general on parent-teacherstudent relations.

"Happy students will result in contented parents who will fight for the school program," he said.

Annual feature of the Public Relations workshop is the Chuck Wagon Picnic sponsored by the Faculty Men's club at Teachers College. Workshop participants and faculty enjoy a chance to get together in this informal way. Charles Martin, executive secretary of the I.S.E.A., received the prize for the loudest sport shirt present.

A resolution passed by the workshop enrollees endorses the current study being made by the State Board of Education concerning possible establishment of an educational TV network in Iowa similar to the network of FM stations in Wisconsin.

The workshop is sponsored jointly by the Iowa State Education Association and the Iowa State Teachers College as it has been in the past.

# Twenty Foreign Teachers To Study Elementary

A contract has been signed with the U.S. Office of Education calling for an elementary education program for 20 foreign teachers at Iowa State Teachers College this fall.

Duration of the program will be from September 22 to December 20.

Under the program, the foreign teachers will attend two special seminars and will visit regular college classes. The government will pay the college regular fees plus a special fee to cover the cost of an extensive series of visits to school systems, other colleges, the state capitol, and other places of interest in the state.

Frank Martindale of the college education department will be the program coordinator and will be in charge of a seminar on the Administration of Elementary Education.

Miles Zintz, also of the college education department, will conduct a seminar in Elementary Education and will arrange for tours of Black Hawk county schools.

One seminar will meet two hours each week; the other five hours each week.

Plans call for the foreign teachers to live in residence halls on campus and to pay regular fees for room and board.

The college was granted authority June 27 by the State Board of Education to cooperate with the U. S. Office of Education in the establishment of the program at the college.

### What's the Name?

With the announcement that the new dormitory for upperclass women has been officially named "Sadie B. Campbell Hall," let's look at the names for the other TC residence halls—

#### LAWTHER HALL

.... was named for Miss Anna B. Lawther, who was for 20 years a member of the State Board of Education, from July 1, 1921 to July 1, 1941.

She was one of the organizers of the group which later grew into the American Association of University Women.

During Miss Lawther's time on the Board she saw three different administrations at Teachers College and worked with Presidents Seerley, Latham, and Price as a member of the Board's faculty committee.

#### BARTLETT HALL

. . . . for freshman women, was named in honor of Moses W. Bartlett, a member of the first faculty of the Normal School. He was a professor of English and for several years was head of the English department. He was on the staff here from 1876 to 1904.

#### SEERLEY HALL

.... for men, really needs no explanation of its name for alumni of Teachers College. It was named for Homer H. Seerley, for 42 years president of the college. His term began in 1886 and ended in 1928. When Seerley came to the then Normal School the enrollment was under 400 and the faculty numbered nine members. Under his direction the college grew to many times that size and became a leader in the nation's teachers colleges.

#### BAKER HALL

.... named for George T. Baker, is another men's dormitory. Baker was a member of the State Board of Education for 32 years, 1909-1941. He was president of the Board during his last year of serving the state. In the words of Archivist I. H. Hart, "Baker

# New Dormitory Named For Sadie B. Campbell

The newly constructed \$1-million women's dormitory at Iowa State Teachers College here has been named Sadie B. Campbell Hall in honor of the dean of women whose resignation after 23 years of service became effective July 1.

Announcement of the residence hall's name was made by President J. W. Maucker during the graduate-faculty-family picnic, a commencement week event at the college.

He read a resolution of appreciation adopted by the State Board of Education at its recent meeting. In the resolution the service Miss Campbell has rendered was extolled and the hall thereby named after her as a lasting memorial to this service.

Sadie B. Campbell Hall, which will house junior and senior women, will be ready for occupancy this fall.

Naming of the dormitory prompted the student weekly newspaper, *The College Eye*, to publish a one-page broadside extra edition which was distributed at the picnic immediately after the announcement was made.

The dormitory had been temporarily called North Hall.

The resolution, adopted by the State Board of Education is as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the State Board of Education formally tender, in connection with the acceptance of the resignation of Sadie B. Campbell from the position of Dean of Women of the Iowa State Teachers College, the following statement of recognition of her services:

In Grateful Appreciation This Citation is Presented to Sadie B. Campbell

In consideration of her twenty-three years of service as Dean of Women in the Iowa State Teachers College, a service unexcelled in efficiency and in fidelity to the ideals of enlightened womanhood, a service which has found expression in



the development of a program through participation in which the young women of the College have been enabled todevelop such attitudes and habits of gracious and wholesome living and of interest in intellectual adventure as will fit them to live democratically.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, as a lasting memorial to this service, the new hall for women on the campus of the Iowa State Teachers College be and is hereby named

#### Sadie B. Campbell Hall

In witness and confirmation whereof, the officers of the Iowa State Teachers College and of the State Board of Education have hereunto subscribed their names:"

The resolution was signed by President Maucker, Dwight G. Rider, president of the State Board of Education, and David A. Dancer, secretary of the State Board of Education.

Announcement of Miss Campbell's resignation had been made in January.

### Grid Panthers Lack Depth, Defensive Power

When this was written, Panther football Coach C. L. (Buck) Starbeck didn't know what to expect during the 1952 football season.

The veteran Panther coach has high hopes that he will have a nucleus of 12 lettermen for the year, well below the figure of 19 underclassmen who won letters a year ago. Service calls made huge inroads on the returnees, and several others dropped from school.

Generally, Starbeck feels his 1952 team should possess as much offensive punch as the 1951 unit which won three games and lost four, and finished third in North Central conference play.

That 1951 team had plenty of running power, as it compiled a new Panther record for yardage gained. But the club lacked depth and consequently defensive strength, and Starbeck feels this year's team will face the same problem.

Spearheading the returnees are Lou Bohn-

sack, center, and end Mahlon Kaylor, both all-conference selections a year ago.

Other line veterans are tackle Bud Rowray, who handled all the punting a year ago, tackle Bob Genzen and guard Karl Rauch.

With that quintet, Starbeck hopes to use John Howell a sophomore end whom he termed the outstanding performer in spring drills; tackle Bob Boesen and Rod Geist, who missed most of last season because of illness; end Francis Riney, and guards Harlan Phillips, Bob Miller and Bob Case to form one good unit.

The backfield should be more than adequate.

A trio of lettermen—Jerry Magrane, Mark Bumgardner and Gene Woolhiser—return at quarterback. Veteran halfbacks are Doug Butler and Jim Miller. Art Landau, also an illness victim a year ago, will help. And fullback should be well manned with Bud Paulsen and Ralph Capitani, both lettermen, on hand. It was Paulsen who set a school record with a 99-yard touchdown run from scrimmage against Augustana a year ago. Both are good passers, essential in the Starbeck single wing.

At that, Starbeck says freshmen are certain to see action. His big complaint on that score is that he has not rounded up a big, rugged type of lineman among the newcomers, so essential to the defense in the two-platoon age.

But with Starbeck's know-how, and the spirit which he always instills in his teams, the club could be tough. They should at least surprise some favored foes, as the University of South Dakota and South Dakota State, generally considered the two teams who will battle for the league crown.

### Bill Koll Joins Teachers College Coaching Staff

Bill Koll, new head wrestling coach at Iowa State Teachers College, has the distinction of being the first new coach of a major sport at the college since 1937.

Koll joins a staff which is noted for longevity on the job. The new wrestling mentor is succeeding Dave McCuskey, who is now head wrestling coach at the State University of Iowa.

Koll, however, is far from unknown at Teachers College. In the three-year period immediately following World War II he was undefeated as a Panther wrestler.

He won national collegiate 145-pound titles in 1946, 1947 and 1948, and was chosen the outstanding wrestler of the NCAA meet each of the latter years. He was the U. S. 147.5-pound representative on the 1948 Olympic team.

After his graduation in 1948, he went on to receive his M.A. at Northwestern in 1950 and is working toward his doctorate at the University of Iowa. He served three years as wrestling coach at the University of Chicago and one year as Cornell College coach before being appointed to replace McCuskey May 28.

A native of Ft. Dodge, Koll is now 29. He was married to the former Barbara Johnson of Chicago on August 18, 1951. The couple has one son, Christopher Edward, born last July.

Just what awaits Koll in his first season is problematical. The new Panther coach will definitely have to get along on hold-over squad members, as new NCAA rules prohibit the use of freshmen.

Definitely missing will be Gene Lybbert, twice a national champ. Other possible stars face service calls.

The new coach, however, is almost certain to have 137-pound Bob Morris and 147-pound Jim Harmon on hand as a nucleus. Both of those boys were runners-up in last year's national collegiate meet.

## Complete First Step in Accrediting Grad. Program

The Teachers College graduate program, which began with the 1952 summer session, has passed the first hurdle in becoming accredited.

Dean of the Faculty M. J. Nelson, chairman of the graduate council here, said, "We were pleased to have word recently that we have successfully taken the first step in meeting the requirements for accreditation of the graduate program as outlined by the Commission on Colleges and Universities of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools."

First step in the two-year processs of accreditation consisted of submitting information on qualifications of the college staff.

The second and third steps are in the form of a survey—a self survey by the faculty of

the college and a report; and a visit by the examining committee of the North Central association.

About the time the first degree is granted the faculty survey is filed. Some time within a year after that, the examining committee will visit the campus to complete the third and last step in accreditation.

## COLLEGE ARCHIVES PRESENTED POEMS BY '02 GRADUATE

The College Archives have been enriched by the presentation by Willis T. Wolfe, B.Di. '02, of a volume of original poems entitled "Chimes." The title is taken from a poem inspired by the Campanile bells. Other poems describe local scenes of beauty and interest.

### Spring Commencement Held in Stadium



#### **Begin Addition to Auditorium Building**

Contracts for \$102,563 auditorium building alterations at Iowa State Teachers College have been awarded and work has begun.

Under the present plan, construction will consist of a fireproof stairwell on the north side of the auditorium building, additional classroom space and a rehearsal hall, making the college drama rehearsals independent of the auditorium stage.

The new construction work will be at the north end of the present auditorium and stage. It would be used on the stage floor level for drama classrooms and a rehearsal hall and on the second floor for women's dressing rooms and storage space.

The entire project would release classroom space now used by the college drama shop for storage and dressing rooms. This would make possible the installation of a psychoeducational clinic to the northeast corner of the drama shop as well as additional classroom space.

#### Shaw Plays Presented As 'Arena' Productions

College theatre-goers of northeast Iowa were offered something new in drama when the annual summer play production at Iowa State Teachers College here was presented "arena" style.

Two short comedies by George Bernard Shaw-"Overruled" and "The Dark Lady of the Sonnets"-were presented by the English and speech department, July 23-25, in the College Commons Ballroom.

Arena production, sometimes called theater-in-the-round, or centerstaging, places the actors and the playing area in the center while the audience sits around the play, viewing it from four sides.

Although this was the first arena production at Teachers College for the public, there are numerous successful educational and community theatres presenting plays in this style the year round. The director was Hazel Strayer.
