There, she teaches courses in rhetoric, professional communication, digital media, disciplinary communication across the curriculum, and organizational culture. Her research interests include narrative and anecdote as forms of professional communication, and technology-mediated communication

genres. Most recently, John Wiley & Sons Publishing named Lamberti as Co-Editor of a new book series, *Engineering Transformation: Conflict, Crisis, Adaptation*.

Kevin T. Leicht

Dr. Leicht is Professor and Chair of the Department of Sociology at the University of Iowa as well as the Director of the Iowa Social Science Research Center. At present, his research is examining gender inequality among professionals, transaction-cost approaches to career decision-making, the development of economic development programs by the U.S. states, and the causes and consequences of corporate restructuring. He teaches courses in the sociology of work, organizational theory, economy and society, political sociology, and social stratification.
