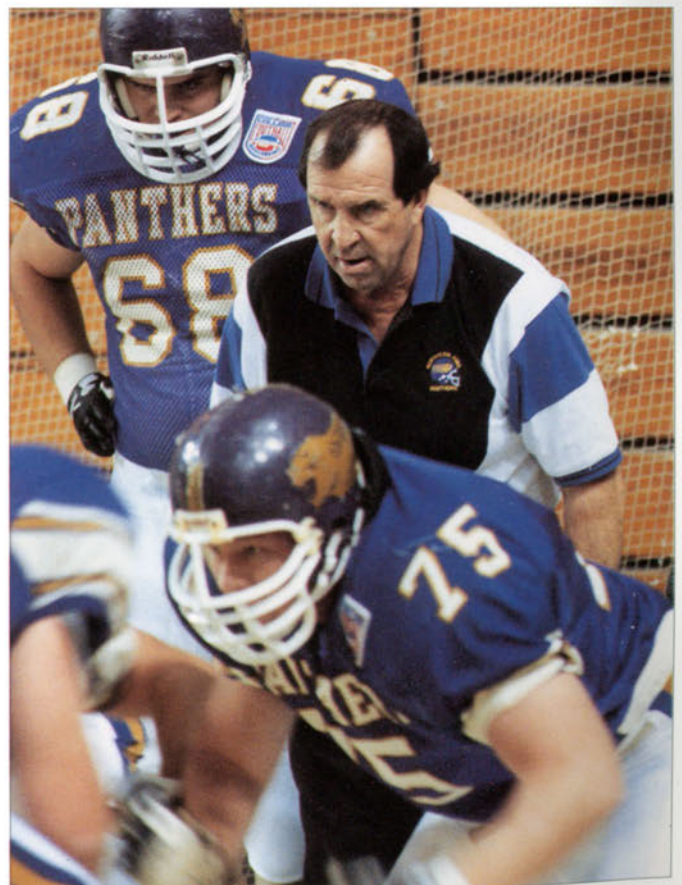

In accordance with recommendations from the Associated Press Sports Editor's Association, **complimentary passes will not be available** to the media. **Only working press** will be assigned seats in the press box. Those media representatives wishing to purchase tickets are urged to contact the UNI-Dome Ticket Office (319-273-6131). **Parking** is available in the Physical Education Center lot located north of the UNI-Dome.



SPOTTERS/STATISTICIANS

Spotters and statisticians must be requested at least **three days prior** to the game. One **FAX** machine is available in the Sports Information Office located on the west side of the UNI-Dome opposite the Press Box. It is recommended that members of the media bring their own electronic sending machines. It also is recommended the media install their own **phone lines**.

RADIOS

Radio stations should make their own arrangements for telephone lines after receiving permission to broadcast. Stations who wish to use the courtesy line should contact UNI SID Nancy Justis. - Northern Iowa has a three-game home winning streak. UNI's last home loss was Sept. 24, 1994, to McNeese State, 34-24. The Panthers had a 25-game home winning streak heading into the 1992 1-AA semifinal game against Youngstown State. The Penguins snapped the streak with their 19-7 win on December 12. UNI won all six home games in 1993 and prior to the MSU loss, had won 29 straight regular-season games in the Dome dating back to the 1989 season when it lost 22-14 to Mankato State in the first game of the year.
- UNI has been the top Division I program in the State of Iowa since 1985, compiling an 88-34-1 record (.720) since helping to found the Gateway football division.
- UNI is 35-3 at home under head coach Terry Allen and 101-27-1 since the Dome opened in 1976.
- Several Panthers will be under consideration for 1-AA all-America honors: senior linebacker Kevin Hammond, UNI's top returning tackler and an honorable mention all-Gateway selection last year; junior wide receiver Dedric Ward, UNI's leading receiver in 1994 and a first-team all-conference choice; senior tight end Matt Harken, also a first-team all-league selection last year; and junior running back Jeff Stovall, UNI's leading rusher and a second-team all-conference pick.
- Since joining the Gateway Conference in 1985, UNI is 88-34-1 (.720) overall. Against Gateway opponents, the Panthers are 48-11-0 (.814), leading the league in wins. UNI is 68-40-1 (.628) against 1995 opponents.
- UNI finished the 1994 season ranked 11th in the nation in the Sports Network poll and won the Gateway Conference title outright (6-0) for the fourth straight year after sharing the crown in 1990. It was the Panthers' ninth Top 20 ranking since 1984. The Panthers were ranked as high as third to open the season and fell to 14th for two straight weeks in November in the Sports Network poll.
- The Panthers broke three school marks and tied one in 1994. UNI's five consecutive wins against Illinois State and Southwest Missouri State is the highest for current wins over an opponent in a series. Before losing to McNeese State, UNI had won 29 straight home regular-season games. The Panthers played before two more UNI-Dome sellouts in 1994, versus MSU and ILSU; and their 14,736 home attendance average also is a record.
- Twenty players were named to all-conference teams, including nine first-teamers, and one was named first-team all-American. **Returning** all-conference players include tight end Matt Harken, offensive tackle Dan Bower, wide receiver Dedric Ward, placekicker Matt Waller, and nose tackle Brian

Moretz, first-team choices; running back Jeff Stovall, second-team pick; and wide receiver Jake Kothe, linebacker Kevin Hammond and nose tackle Ryan Behr, honorable mention picks. Offensive tackle Andy Pattee, running back Marvin Sims and defensive back Maceo Strickland were named to the league's first All-Newcomer team.

Linebacker Andre Allen was the only first-team all-American selection, named by AFCA, AP and the Sports Network, while he was a second-team choice by Don Hansen's Football Gazette. Defensive back Jason McCleary was a third-team choice by AP and the Football Gazette, while Ward, Harken, center D.J. Mumma, Waller, McCleary, Bower, Moretz and defensive back Myron Glass were honorable mention all-Americans by the Sports Network and Football Gazette.

- Head coach Terry Allen was the 1994 Gateway Conference Bruce Craddock Coach of the Year for the unprecedented fourth straight year. He has a .743 overall (55-19) and .833 league (30-6) record, leading all the league coaches in both categories.
- UNI had Gateway Players of the Week selected six times last year.
- Linebacker Paul Wolf and center D.J. Mumma were named the team's MVPs, while linebacker Scott Durlflinger was chosen to receive the Stan Sheriff Award, formerly the Oil Can Award, given to the player who keeps the team running the smoothest, motivated and who is the driving force behind the team. All three players have used up their eligibility.
- Linebacker Andre Allen was named the league's Defensive Player of the Year for the second straight year.
- Several football players also participate in another sport for the Panthers. Alonzo Clayton, John Harden, Ryan McCalley and Maceo Strickland participate in track, while Matt Waller and Steve Beard play baseball.
- UNI plays at Iowa on Sept. 9. The two teams have not faced each other since the 1914 season. The Panthers have had some success against current 1-A teams. They are 0-1 against Bowling Green (1947), 0-4 against Central Michigan (last game in 1970), 0-1-1 against Colorado State (last game 1926), 3-5 against Eastern Michigan (last game in 1968), 1-10 against Iowa, 2-13-3 against Iowa State (last game 1994), 3-0 against Kansas State (last game 1989), 0-1 against Minnesota (1987), 0-1 versus UNLV (1975), 2-1 versus Northern Illinois (1964), 0-1 against Oklahoma State (1990), 0-1 against Pittsburgh (1988), 4-11-2 against Western Michigan (1949) and 0-1 against Wyoming (1993). Most of the success has come in the last 10 years, with a 5-5 mark against 1-A teams since 1985.

THE PURPLE & GOLD, THE GRIDIRON, 100 YEARS

It was the third Saturday in October of 1895. Iowa State Normal School, a Cedar Falls institution that basically educated students to be teachers in two or fewer years, celebrated a victory in the first football game ever played on the campus. So, what of that era is left after 100 years?

Basically, the purple and the old gold — the fans, a few of whom may still be raucus — and a faculty and administration still concerned about ensuring that student-athletes must be students first and eventual graduates.

Some things — most obviously the facilities and equipment — have changed. One of the more subtle changes took a large portion of the first 100 years — the interest and recognition from the daily newspapers about what is going on surrounding this University's gridiron.

Back in 1895, the Normal Eye, the college's weekly newspaper now known as the Northern Iowan, virtually was the only source of information about the emergence of an athletic program designed to accommodate the prospective male teachers-to-be. After all, this was a campus that would be involved in bringing to the national education scene a

relatively new concept known as physical education.

As early as September of 1895, the Normal Eye published a note saying that greater interest than ever had been detected for "foote ball". The paper reported scores of two Iowa State (College, then) University games in its Oct. 5 edition and said Normal was looking to schedule two games.

The next week, Normal School football players were introduced to the campus in uniform and the Normal Eye asked, "What think ye now of our football players all dressed in full attire? They are all right."

A story one week later reported: "A Mr. John Adams sustained a broken collar bone...Mr. Adams has concluded not to play football again at least for a short time."

Then came the good news on Oct. 26 by way of a headline that could have been repeated 472 times during the next century — "Victory is Ours".

The Purple and Old Gold had ventured all the way to Cedar Rapids, met Coe College on the gridiron, overcame a 10-0 Coe lead and won its first football game in history, 12-10. A 70-yard touchdown run by a player named "Conway" tied the game at 10-10. "Conway" did what any modern-day running back might do after scoring the tying TD — he celebrated by throwing the ball back over his head.

Conway had crossed the goal before he parted with the ball, the touchdown counted and Normal was able to kick the game-winning conversion for the 12-10 victory. TDs, in those days, by the way, counted four points and conversions by either placekick or dropkick could add two more points.

NORMAL BEATS IOWA

Two years later, in 1898, Normal enjoyed a historic victory — historic because it's still the only one of its kind. Normal defeated the State University of Iowa 11-5, the highlight of a five-game season that would have been perfect except for a 0-0 tie the previous week against Upper Iowa.

The Panther-Hawkeye rivalry extended 10 more games until Iowa won 95-0 in 1914. The series laid dormant until Sept. 9 of this year when UNI is scheduled to play in Kinnick Stadium.

A NEW CENTURY

The 1899 season started with a 57-0 win over Coe. The lopsided loss by Coe was explained away because the team had "several" players weighing under 135 pounds. Normal had four TD runs of 50 yards or more in the first half. That was the only win, however, that season in six games, along with two ties. In fact, winning was an uphill battle over the next six years.

Charles Pell directed the team from 1902-05, recording winning records in all but the first campaign. A T.E. Jones and a Joe S. Wright were named "all-Iowa" in 1904. Dr. William C. Lang, professor emeritus of history at UNI, said in a history of the University that the 1905 season was free of serious injuries and "only once was it necessary to substitute" in the entire season. But the athletic board cancelled football in 1906 because "of new eligibility rules and because the character of the game as it is now played is undesirable".

Rowdy crowds not averse to violence were mentioned. President Theodore Roosevelt called Eastern football powers to the White House and threatened to end the game if they didn't "change its character". From the other coast came charges by President David Starr Jordan of Stanford of the "fraud" of one scholastic standard for athletes and another for non-athletes. "Anything-to-win" schools had invited "athletic professionalism" and "the football tramp". The Normal Eye said Normal "fostered the program because of the advantage to the student body" and not "primarily to turn out winning teams". The paper noted that only a fourth of the male students had been "deemed physically fit to participate in match games".

Thus, there was no football in 1906 and '07, but by 1907, a rule stating that athletes had to be "bonafide students" who attended classes at least 18 weeks, receiving credit, was recognized nationally,

So, in 1908 a fund of \$350 was raised to help finance the return to the gridiron at Iowa Normal. "New yells were produced, new songs developed and a special appeal went out for the girls to wear purple and old gold", supposedly only when attending games. Dr. Lang's book reports that the "majority (of players) had never stepped on a gridiron before and some had never seen a football."

Even though there was an "Iowa Conference" by the early 1900s and the basketball team was a member of what was known as the "Hawkeye Conference", the football team still was not competing in an organized league.

Two of the wins in 1909 were over Fairbank High School (54-0) and Charles City. Now known as Iowa State Teachers College, the school newspaper changed its name to the College Eye. Taking a logical journalistic view of the team's competition, it pointed out that Fairbank and Charles City had faced off three weeks earlier — "This shows more weakness of our opponents who did not seem to know much about the game than that our team is over brilliant".

Brilliant or not, Iowa Teachers took on its first ever out-of-state opponent in 1915 and walloped a similar teacher-training institution — Wisconsin-Platteville, 82-0. It also defeated Ellsworth College and Upper Iowa University that year, but lost to Dubuque, Loras and Morningside.

ISTC got through the 1918 World War I year winning one of its four football games. Twenty-five years later during World War II, the entire intercollegiate program was shut down for both the 1943-44 and 1944-45 seasons because only a handful of males were still on campus.

FOOTBALL MOVES INTO THE 'MODERN' ERA

ISTC took its first giant step into modern times when an extraordinary "big" man, though quite small in structure, arrived on the scene. L.L. Mendenhall's leadership in blending intercollegiate athletics and physical education dominated the campus for

the next four decades.

Mendenhall coached football from 1921-24, then stepped aside to devote fulltime to the directorship of both the PE and athletic departments. His successor at the gridiron helm, Dr. Paul Bender, also was a dominating force over the next 20 years, though he was head coach only from 1925-29. During Bender's reign, ISTC joined the Iowa Conference and the undefeated 7-0-1 team in 1927 gave the school its first conference title, a feat repeated in 1928 with a 5-1-3 mark.

L.W. "Mon" Whitford coached from 1930-32, compiling a 10-13-2 record, but it was 1936 before Mendenhall made one of his most memorable moves. ISTC joined the North Central Conference, still regarded as one of the outstanding Division II leagues in the country. Mendenhall also found a coach who had experience as a player in the league at South Dakota State — Clyde "Buck" Starbeck.

Starbeck would literally live and die on the ISTC gridiron — known as O.R. Latham Stadium — for the next 22 years. He lived and taught a fantastically successful, innovative offense — the spinning single wingback system — until his failing heart forced him off the field during the final game of the 1957 season. He left the field with a 7-0 lead over South Dakota in the first quarter and UNI went on to win 27-7. He died approximately six weeks later and was buried in Fairview Cemetery, almost in view of the north goalposts.

The new 2,000-seat stadium was to be open for Buck's team's first home game in 1936, but a tornado caused some damage and a change of plans. The first game ended up not being played until Oct. 7, appropriately against Coe College. The Panthers won 21-0 with the help of a 50-yard TD punt return by John Magovich.

His first game, however, was Sept. 8 at Iowa State with 38 single platoon players and two hallowed assistant coaches — A.D. "Art" Dickinson and Dave McCuskey. Dickinson is best known for his outstanding track program and McCuskey is viewed as one of the nation's outstanding wrestling coaches, particularly justified after leading the Panthers to a national championship in 1950. Oliver "Hon" Nordly, better known as the basketball coach in the '40s and '50s, also started out as an assistant football coach.

Starbeck's first squad included exactly two returning starters, a quarterback and a center. But he didn't actually employ a quarterback. His passer was a fullback, who handled the ball virtually every play, who handed it off to a halfback or a wingback going one way or another, kept it himself and ran up the middle behind the trap blocking of an unbalanced line, or dropped back and passed it to one of his ends or wingbacks. The quarterback did nothing but block, thus the "blocking back", unless the Panthers shifted into a balanced line, short punt offense, then the blocking back became the spin back.

His offense didn't produce a lot of yards in its 1936 appearance at Iowa State, in fact, less than 100, and it completed zero passes. But the Cyclones didn't gain 100 yards, either. They completed four passes and had only a four-to-three edge in first downs. The 0-0 tie between the two teams was their third in eight games.

The Panthers also opened against ISU in 1937. The Cyclones eventually opened up a 14-6 lead and went on to win 14-12. But the camera had made its debut into collegiate football and Buck spent the next 20 years rolling and rerolling a clip of a controversial play from that game that he contended gave ISU the win. The Cyclone

receiver who jumped up and caught the game-winning TD pass actually came down with the ball outside the endzone. Film turned out to be a major feature of football theory classes for the remainder of his career.

Buck's 1940 team that won its last eight games to finish 8-1, however, may have been his best. Known as the "Mighty Midgets", a tiny spinback from New York City, Charlie Pastorino, directed the offense.

The man found to succeed Starbeck, Bill Hammer, was comfortable both at the Rose Bowl and the National Collegiate Wrestling Tournament. He was the line coach for an Oregon team that represented the Pacific Coast Conference against the Big Ten's Ohio State on Jan. 1, 1958. Three months later, he was a member of the National Wrestling Rules Committee at the national tournament in Laramie, WY. His wrestling team finished in a three-way tie for 14th with ISTC and Penn State. Days later, he was in Cedar Falls preparing the Panthers in spring football practice.

SHERIFF SPURS CHANGES

Hammer was a West Coaster, however, and after only two years in the Corn Belt, he decided to move back. He'd fulfilled his commitment, leaving a winning record (10-8). More importantly, he left his

no. 1 assistant — former Cal Poly center Stan Sheriff.

ISTC became State College of Iowa in 1961 and University of Northern Iowa in 1967. Sheriff aspired or pushed for even more radical changes during his tenure and developed a host of players and staff who have made history.

- The first post-season or "bowl" game.
- The first post-season bowl victory.
- The UNI-Dome.
- A Division I athletic program with football scholarships ballooning from 40 in Division II to 65 and 70 in 1-AA.
- Assistants Dennis Remmert and Don Erusha and players-turned-coaches Bill Salmon and Terry Allen. And Dr. Darrell Mudra.

The latter took over the coaching reigns from Sheriff in 1983 when Sheriff decided to concentrate his energies on leading the athletic department after 22 years and 128 victories. He had taken on the additional duties of athletic director upon the retirement of Jim Witham.

Sheriff's head football coaching career started in 1960 with a perfect 9-0 record. At season's end, they found themselves in Excelsior Springs, MO, on Nov. 26, playing 9-1 Hillsdale College of Michigan in the Mineral Water Bowl. UNI led 6-0 at the half, but Hillsdale had an advantage. A member of the NAIA, it was playing under a free substitutions rule, denied the NCAA-member Panthers. Hillsdale went on to a 17-6 victory before an overflow crowd of 3,800 that included an estimated 600 Iowans.

SCI got its first bowl victory in Abilene, TX, on Dec. 13, 1964 — a 19-17 triumph against Lamar Tech in the NCAA-sponsored Midwest Regional Pecan Bowl. Randy Schultz, destined for a brief professional career in the NFL, gained 160 yards in 36 carries, scoring twice.

Three or four years later, UNI found itself in need of a new basketball arena, since



the Panthers were outgrowing the West (then known as the "Men's Gym. Sheriff got a tentative price tag on a facility seating about 7,000. Then he heard about the inflated, balloon-like arena that had been introduced as an architectural miracle of the future at the 1964 World's Fair in Tokyo. There already was at least one indoor arena in the nation capable of accommodating both football and basketball in Pocatello, ID, but it had a traditional roof and rafters.

Sheriff found an engineer who could give him a figure on the cost of the new balloon-roofed building — one that could accommodate both football and basketball and seat as many as 16,000 people. It turned out to be substantially less than the estimate on the smaller, traditional building. He went to work selling the dome idea and raising the funds necessary. By the time UNI earned its next post-season shot in an NCAA Division II football playoff against Western Kentucky in 1975, the UNI-Dome was rising from the earth across the street from O.R. Latham Stadium.

The final game ever to be played in O.R. Latham was conducted on that rainy afternoon in knee deep (rhetorical) mud (actually at least ankle deep). The Panthers lost 14-12, missing a 37-yard field goal attempt in the closing moments. Not a single home team won any of the four first-round playoff games that day. The UNI-WKU game since has been labeled the "Mud Bowl".

Bill Salmon, who went on to earn all-America honors, hit only six-of-20 passes for 93 yards, while his WKU counterpart completed only three-of-10 for 33 yards. A freshman who watched the game from the bench was Terry Allen. Neither Salmon nor Allen have ever left the UNI campus. After completing their eligibilities, both have served as assistants to three head coaches. Allen begins his seventh year as head coach this fall, while Salmon is his offensive backfield coach.

On Sept. 4, 1976, a UNI home record crowd of 12,000 watched Allen complete 11-of-23 passes in the first game in the UNI-Dome, but Northern Michigan, the defending Division II national champion, scored three times in the first five minutes of play on its way to a 41-7 victory. UNI went on to finish 3-3 in its inaugural year in the Dome, but losing there would not become a tradition. The Panthers start this season with an 83-25-1 UNI-Dome record.

In 1978, they became members of the Mid-Continent Conference, leaving the North Central after 42 years. The Mid-Continent became the Gateway in 1985 and by then, the Panthers had been classified 1-AA in football and Division I in all other sports for four years.

By then, also, Dr. Darrell Mudra, perhaps the gentlest, most scholarly winner in all of college football, had been literally hand-picked away from Eastern Illinois by Sheriff to succeed him at the helm. However, Sheriff was not around to see his 43-16-1 record from 1983-87. Sheriff moved on to become athletic director at Hawaii. He died on the

RUSS SMITH

For over 47 years, readers of the Waterloo Courier enjoyed the writing of Iowa State Teachers College graduate Russ L. Smith. He began working parttime with the Courier in 1942 after graduating from Waterloo East High School. He continued working at the various desks of the Courier through four years at ISTC, from which he graduated with a degree in physical education and social science. After graduation, he taught and coached baseball and basketball at high schools in New Hartford and Orange Township. While working for the Courier as a student, his beat was the Cedar Falls sports scene. As such, he covered ISTC events. He also served as sports editor on the ISTC's weekly "College Eye". In 1949, he became the Courier's third fulltime sports writer and in 1966, he became the paper's sports editor. He retired in 1990. He has received a lifetime "press pass" to Northern Iowa's sporting events.

job at the much too young age of 61. A memorial service on the UNI campus included naming the UNI-Dome's playing field for Stan Sheriff.

Mudra's team lost five games his first year and four his last year, when the Panthers reached the 1-AA semifinals before losing 44-41 in double overtime at Northeast Louisiana. However, there was one defeat in his UNI career that won't rest.

In 1987, UNI lost to Iowa State, 39-38, after owning a 38-21 lead in the fourth quarter. With the Panthers leading 38-36 in the closing minutes, the Cyclones successfully executed a controversial on-side kick, wound up with third-and-long yardage with only seconds remaining, then completed a 39-yard pass. They won the game on a 28-yard field goal.

THE CURRENT ERA

Mudra called it quits at the end of the 1987 season. Former Iowa State and Ohio State coach Earle Bruce was brought in for 1988, but he elected to return to 1-A football after only one 5-6 season. UNI played at ISU again on Oct. 8. Down 13-0 at the half, the Panthers rallied to lead 17-13 with 3:18 left in the game, but the 'Clones pulled out a 20-17 win.

Terry Allen took over the reigns in 1989. His six teams have never lost more than four games a year. The Panthers finished 8-3 his first year and fell shy of bringing home the Gateway title. They've never failed since and as loop champion, or co-champion, have advanced to a post-season berth five straight years.

Allen's first encounter as head coach against the Cyclones resulted in one of UNI's widest margins of victories. Then they closed out their first century of football with a pair of moderately one-sided victories — 27-10 in 1992 and 28-14 last year. Since entering the realm of 1-AA football, UNI's performance against 1-A teams has been more than just "credible". In addition to wins over Iowa State, UNI has defeated Kansas State of the Big Eight three times — 10-6 in 1985, 17-0 in '86 and 10-8 in 1989. Losses have resulted despite respectable performances — 33-23 at Oklahoma State, 45-42 at Wyoming on a last-minute aerial bomb and 24-7 against Minnesota (under Mudra).

Allen also directed UNI to its first no. 1 national ranking in history, a position the Panthers held for five straight weeks during the 1992 campaign.

Now, as the Panthers look toward their second century on the gridiron, they can also take pride in the careers of such recent stars as Bryce Paup, James Jones, Willie Beamon and Kenny Shedd — names of more than just passing note to National Football League fans around the country.

Welcome to the second 100 years of Northern Iowa football. Let the rich tradition grow and glow.



A PANTHER CENTURY — A MILLION MEMORIES

My memory of Panther football began in 1939, some 44 years after the boys of the Iowa State Normal School defeated Coe 12-10. As a sophomore at LaPorte City High School, our coach brought us to Cedar Falls to watch then Iowa State Teachers College play its final game of the '39 season against North Dakota State.

I remember one player from that game, George Dutcher. George was a fine player, playing both quarterback and halfback in Buck Starbeck's single wing. George, who became a fine coach at Oelwein and West Waterloo High Schools, is the only player who earned a freshman numeral and four varsity letters for the Panthers. After lettering in '37, '38 and '39, the war interrupted George's career and at the age of 29, he came back to letter in 1945.

Little did I know on that cold and snowy 1939 day that in 1951, I would be back in the area broadcasting Panther games and Buck Starbeck would still be at the Panther helm. Unlike today, Buck's assistants were parttime, with help coming from basketball coach Hon Nordley, baseball coach Mon Whitford and track coach Art Dickinson, among others.

During the football season, I would lug my recorder to O.R. Latham stadium, and Buck and I would sit under the west stands and record for 15 minutes, the fruit of our efforts to be aired each Thursday night on KWWL radio. Buck coached many fine players and won eight North Central Conference Championships in his 20 years as Panther coach. Some of the players I remember best of that era would be LeRoy Dunn, Lou Bohnsack, Dick Beetsch, Bud Rowray and Ralph Capitani. Beetsch was a four-year starter in three sports — football, basketball and baseball — and I remember Capitani as a back who loved to throw the football and was the best passer I remember at UNI.

Buck Starbeck, I'm sure, wanted to die on the sidelines, doing what he loved best — coaching football. It was not meant to be as he died in December of 1957, when the Iowa snows covered his workshop, O.R. Latham Stadium.

I left the area following the 1956 season, not to return until 1974. As a result, I missed seeing a lot of the fine athletes during those 18 years — the Denny Rimmerts, Loren Busers, George Aslesons, Jerry Morgans, Randy Schultzs, the Danny Boals, and many of our other greats.

When I came back in 1974, broadcasting was an avocation, not a vocation, as I was with the Rath Packing Company in the sales promotion department. Stan Sheriff was in his 15th year as head coach and his fourth year doing double duty as athletic director. Bill Salmon was the quarterback and although UNI has had many fine signal callers, Bill ranks with the very best. His many TD passes to a fine receiver, Dave Schooley, electrified us all in 1974 and 1975.

1975 always will be remembered as the "Mud Bowl" year. UNI enjoyed a great 9-2 season and Iowa enjoyed a great Fall — right up to the eve of the Division II playoff game against Western Kentucky at O.R. Latham. Then snow and rain took over and on that Saturday afternoon, conditions could not have been worse. I remember looking west from O.R. Latham at a rising UNI-Dome — a dome not ready to host its first football game, which was to happen in September of 1976.

In a very memorable game, it came down to two fourth-quarter field goal tries before Western Kentucky prevailed 14-12. I have nothing but admiration for all who played, especially Jim Frandsen. It was Jim who had to try the field goals, unable to plant his foot and the ball sinking into the mud as the holder placed it down. He got both kicks up, but just couldn't get enough leg into it.

In visiting with Western officials in later years, we all chuckled about one of those field goal attempts. Dave Schooley, the holder, placed a towel on the

ground so the ball wouldn't sink into the mud. Western coach Jimmy Felix and the officials didn't think that was proper, so there went Dave's towel. Randy Buchwald, who played in the game, confirmed my memory of the towel incident.

The UNI-Dome was Stan Sheriff's dream and I never walk into that facility without saying a silent "thank you" for his dream, his perseverance, and his reality — and that goes equally for all those who stood with Stan to make the dream come true.

Two quick stories about Stan. When he was recruiting Kelly Ellis in the spring of 1977, I got a call at Rath from Stan saying he'd be at Rath in 30 minutes and he wanted to talk with Lucca. Lucca was Kelly's father and I hadn't the slightest idea of how to get Lucca and Stan together. But a friend of mine in plant personnel came to my rescue, pulled Lucca from his job, brought him to Stan and later, Kelly committed to the Panthers, having a fine two-sport career, football and track.

In 1979, Kelly ran for 382 yards at Western Illinois, an NCAA record that since has been broken — but even broken, it was a miraculous feat. I had a meeting at Rath that memorable day and good broadcasting friend, Kelly Neff, did the game for me. I have always regretted that I did not call the play-by-play on that historic day.

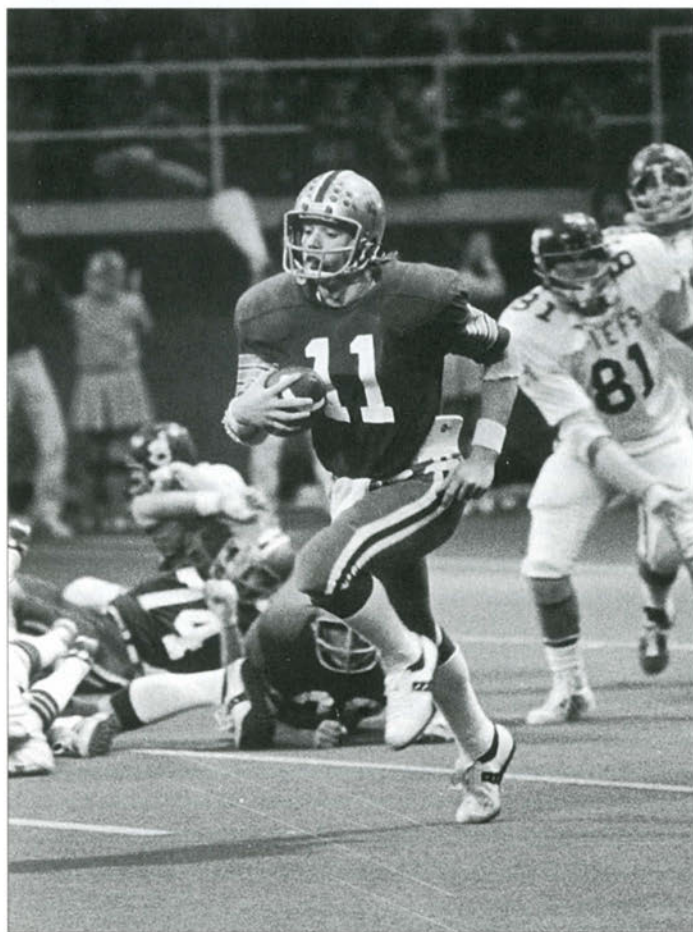
Stan coached his last game in 1982, forced to choose between coaching and being athletic director. The University felt the two jobs were too demanding to be handled by one man. When that last game at Youngstown State's new facility ended, I had tears in my eyes. The tears were still there as I left the press box, for I knew an era had ended, not as Stan would have liked, but a decision that was forced upon him. He had done so much for UNI athletics.

Besides thanking Stan for the Dome, I also thank him for recruiting Terry Allen. Terry came from Iowa City and although hampered by a shoulder injury his junior and senior years, he had a fine career at quarterback. He would stay on to coach for Stan, then for Darrell Mudra, who Stan hired in 1983, and then for the one year Earle Bruce coached at UNI. In my mind, Terry is one of the best young coaches in football and his six-year record as UNI's head man proves my thinking.

I'm sure Terry's coaching philosophy includes a page or two from every coach he worked for. Darrell Mudra was a very interesting personality. Besides being a

fine coach, he also was philosopher and somewhat of a historian. He also was a great motivator. In 1987, we had a great year and advanced to the semifinals of the 1-AA playoffs, meeting Northeast Louisiana in Monroe. We played a terrible first half and were down 35-14. For the only time in his five years as head coach, Darrell resorted to threats. He reminded his players their scholarships were not secure if they continued to play the second half as they did the first.

I was not in the locker room at halftime. My source is Kevin Willard, backup quarterback, who played that year and later joined me as color analyst on Panther broadcasts. We played the second half as if there were no tomorrow, which there wasn't, outscoring NLU 27-6 and tying the game in the last minute with a two-point conversion. Although we lost in double overtime, it was one of the great comebacks in Panther history.

I remember that game for another reason — the courage of one Mark Hanssen, our offensive center. Suffering from a stress fracture in his foot for several weeks, he still played. Seeing him in the hotel lobby, and hobbling with his foot brace, I asked him how he could do it. His answer — "Clare, I'm not sure I know how I do it". One of the many Panthers over the years who played through pain.

Another motivational incident occurred earlier that year. We were at Western

Illinois. The Leathernecks had played almost all their conference games prior to our arrival. We had played but one. As our kids came out to warm up, they noticed a Gateway Conference official holding the conference trophy. Knowing that if Western beat us it would win the title, our kids felt it was a bit premature to be handing out trophies. The Panthers played inspired football, scoring early and often. When the clock at Rock Hansen stadium ticked off the final seconds, UNI had routed the Leathernecks 52-7. The Panthers went on to an undefeated conference season and the trophy they first saw in Macomb now rests securely in the Panther trophy case in Cedar Falls.

Earle Bruce was an enigma and although I feel his coaching philosophy did not fit the Panther program he took over in 1988, I respected him. He was used to leading his team onto the field at Ohio State before some 85,000 fans. In Cedar Falls, it was before 9,000-12,000 fans. I'm sure that affected his ego. Although he suffered a losing season here, he did bring us national publicity.

Field goals are a vital part of football and UNI always has had fine kickers. The one who will be best remembered is Brian Mitchell. "Footer", as he was affectionately known, led the entire nation in 1990 when he kicked 21-of-22. The one he missed was at Oklahoma State. Watching on that warm night in Stillwater, I can still see that kick sliding slowly to the right and missing by no more than half a foot.

Naturally, Northern Iowa did not have a corner on the market for exceptional football players. I remember when Central Michigan came to town in 1953. It had a fine running back in Jim Padoley, who would go on to play for the Washington Redskins. I anticipated watching that young man play and was not disappointed, as he ran for four touchdowns and set up the fifth in a 34-20 Chippewa victory.

I remember seeing Johnny Bright on a rainy day in 1951 at Drake Stadium running wild in a Bulldog 39-6 victory. Then there's Tracy Ham of Georgia Southern and the 1-AA semifinals in the Dome. He's by far the best option quarterback I ever saw and that see-saw GSU 40-33 victory will long be remembered.

Another quarterback who sparkled was Stan Humphries of Northeast Louisiana. Just last year, he led the San Diego Chargers to the Super Bowl.

There was a time when almost all the players in professional football came from "name" schools. That's not true today, as every roster is sprinkled with players from all levels of college football. Our own school can point to several, and I was privileged to work games in which they played. Each Sunday in front of the TV set, I hope for a glimpse of the Bryce Paups, the James Jones', the Kenny Shedd's, or the Willie Beamons — young people who had a great bearing on Panther football success.

Coaching in the modern era has advantages Buck Starbeck and those who preceded him could only dream of. One of these advantages is staff. Where Buck was sort of a one-man gang, Terry Allen has surrounded himself with great assistant coaches who are fine teachers of the game, excellent motivators, and who love and respect the kids who cast their lot with Northern Iowa.

Looking back over all those years since 1939, it's not the wins and losses I remember. It is the people. This 100-year football milestone at Northern Iowa is a tribute to the many fine coaches and the fine young men who at one time or another strapped on the pads and gave their best for the Purple and Gold.

1995 PANTHER PREVIEW

Northern Iowa is celebrating 100 years of organized intercollegiate football competition this fall. Beginning a 1995 campaign when replacements must be found for 20 seniors, and with only four returning starters on the defensive side of the ball, some might think now is the time to call upon the ghosts of Panther past.

Not so fast, says seventh-year head coach Terry Allen. A total of 14 starters return from last year's

11th-ranked team which won its fifth straight Gateway Football Conference title, earning its fifth straight 1-AA playoff appearance. Though most of the experience is on the offense, the defense has a lot of talent to build around. They just aren't household names.

"We have a chance to be a pretty good offensive team again with the return of a number of starters, including most of our offensive line, two tight ends,

our receiving corp, a couple of quality quarterbacks and perhaps our best backfield ever," Allen said. "However, we have inexperience on the defensive side of the ball. Losing four defensive backs and three linebackers, we had a right to be leery heading into spring drills."

Consequently, the defense was looked at through a microscope in the spring. Hardest hit was the defensive secondary, where all-American Jason McCleary, Myron Glass, who signed a free agent contract with the Buffalo Bills; Todd Harrington, who played with the Iowa Barnstormers of the Arena League; and Derrick Marbles are gone.

The next hardest hit area was at linebacker, where two-time all-American and Gateway Defensive Player of the Year Andre Allen, who signed a free agency with the Philadelphia Eagles; Scott Durlinger, Paul Wolf and Brad Remmert must be replaced. In all, UNI loses six of its top eight tacklers.

So who do you build a defense around? You begin with returning starters Brian Moretz at nose tackle (73 tackles), Kevin Hammond at linebacker (85 tackles) and ends Ryan Behr (48 tackles) and Cory Burkle (51 tackles).

On the flip side, the Panthers return five of their top six rushers and all five of their top receivers. Key returnees include rushers Jeff Stovall, Marvin Sims and Jason Hamrock, along with receivers Detric Ward, Matt Harken, Anthony Taylor and Jake Kothe.

Missing is four-year starting center D.J. Mumma and quarterback Brett O'Donnell. Sophomore Eric Lyons was the frontrunner to replace Mumma heading into fall drills, while the Panthers will be replacing a starting signal caller for the third year in a row. Stanford transfer Chris Berg, who backed up O'Donnell last year, will lead the offense.

Lyons will be surrounded by experience with the return of Dan Bower, Andy Pattee, Jon Pilcher, Chris Clapp and Josh Toben in the offensive line. All saw extensive action last year.

There's some good news and some bad news in the kicking game. Placekicker Matt Waller, the nation's second-leading field goal kicker in 1994, returns while punter Ryan Elsbernd, who averaged 39.5 yards a year ago, is gone. Junior Eric Walter handled most of the punting in the spring.

All positions have not been solidified because of the influx of players in the fall who were not in spring camp. A few of those people expected to make some noise during preseason include offensive lineman Mark Culver, a transfer from

North Iowa Area Community College; defensive back Ray Hornsby, a transfer from Mesa Community College; punter Kasey Kadolph of Springville (IA) High School; defensive back Otis Marchman of North Fort Myers (FL) High School; defensive back Earl Powell of Highland Community College; and linebacker Dannie Spann, also transferring from Highland.

The Panthers open the season September 2 at 1-AA power Stephen F. Austin, the only team that 1994 national champion Youngstown State did not defeat last year. Then it's on to 1-A intrastate rival Iowa, a renewal of a series which has lain dormant since 1914. UNI's first home game is September 16 against Lock Haven. The Gateway slate begins September 30 at Western Illinois.

"We go on the road for the first two weeks, and with the caliber of those teams, that makes the schedule very difficult," Allen said. "Stephen F. Austin is a pretty solid team early in the year (the YSU game was the opener last season). How we look against Iowa depends upon the development of our team. I'm confident our players will play hard — we'll see what happens.

"Our rotation in the league is back to where we have the most difficult games on the road. We open at Western Illinois, then we travel to the two other places that should be top contenders in Illinois State and Southwest Missouri State. Then you toss Idaho in there, and that makes for quite an interesting schedule."

ALLEN'S ASSESSMENT BY POSITION

Quarterback: UNI loses senior quarterback Brett O'Donnell, who started last year for the first time after backing up Kurt Warner. O'Donnell finished the season ranked 41st in the nation in total offense, completing 177-of-325 passes with 12 interceptions for 2,417 yards and 12 TDs. Backup Chris Berg threw only 19 times with eight completions for 22 yards, but he had a good spring, completing 15-of-22 passes for 205 yards in the spring game. Junior Steve Beard still is listed as the backup, though once again he spent the spring pitching for the Panther baseball team. Listed third on the depth chart is redshirt freshman Jon Miller,

who completed nine-of-14 passes for 81 yards in the spring game.

"We feel good about the quarterback situation with the caliber of guys competing for the job," Allen said. "Berg has gotten a better handle on the offense and he has good quickness. Beard has an excellent arm and the strength to stay in the pocket. However, both are lacking in game experience."

Running Backs: As mentioned, the Panthers return five of their top six rushers in Jeff Stovall (176-823, 8 TDs in '94), Marvin Sims (102-408, 3 TDs), Jason Hamrock (31-116), James Porter (25-110, 1 TD) and Troy Dooley (5-24). They lose third-leading ground gainer Sylvester Brown (62-393, 3 TDs).

Stovall played the last two-thirds of the season with a cast on his arm after breaking it in the third game of the year against Southwest Missouri State. He missed the next game against McNeese State, then received clearance to play with the cast. Three games after returning to action, he gained over 100 yards in three successive contests, with a season-high 137 yards against Western Illinois.

Sims, a transfer from Nebraska, did not play in the first three games last season after breaking a finger during preseason drills. He rushed for a

season-high 122 yards against WIU. He missed virtually all of spring drills in order to concentrate on his academics.

Dooley transferred from UCLA last year and seldom touched the ball. However, Coach Allen continually pointed to Dooley and Porter when speaking of players who stepped forward during spring drills. Dooley is expected to carry the ball more often this fall. Hamrock is listed at the A-back position heading into the fall.

"This is an area that we think is as strong as its been with the return to health of Stovall," Allen said. "We have other quality running backs in Sims, Hamrock, Dooley, Porter and Lance Hall. Redshirt freshman Travis Hemmen has moved into a backup role behind Dooley at halfback with the move of Hamrock to A-back."

Receivers/Tight Ends: UNI is in good shape here with the return of two-time all-conference tight end Matt Harken (33-373, 1 TD), the team's second-leading receiver; flanker Jake Kothe (20-252); leading receiver, split end Dedric Ward (60-1,083, 9 TDs); A-back Anthony Taylor (23-307) and tight end Lincoln Sharar (13-134, 1 TD). Stovall also caught 12 passes for 108 yards in '94.

and 18th in receiving yards in 1-AA. Kothe missed the last three games of the year with a knee injury.

"This is an area with quality frontline players, but depth is a concern," Allen said. "Ward is an exceptional athlete, Kothe has exceptional hands and Taylor has the ability to do things after he catches the ball that the others can't.

"Tight end is a good, strong position. Harken has developed into something special with his size and strength and catching ability. Sharar continues to improve. Our football team might be at its best when we have both these guys on the field."

Other players with potential include Greg Hawthorne at tight end, and Andy Lafollette is listed as Ward's backup heading into the fall.

Offensive Line: The Panthers return all starters in the offensive line except at center where four-year starter D.J. Mumma graduates. Returning are tackles Dan Bower and Andy Pattee, guards Jon Pilcher and Josh Toben, and Chris Clapp. College of DuPage transfer Andy Allen is listed behind Eric Lyons at center.

"This area has a chance to be very good," Allen said, "though we have a key position to fill with the loss of Mumma. We have five guys with a great deal of playing experience with Bower, Pattee, Clapp, Pilcher and Toben."

Placekicker: Junior Matt Waller returns after making 17-of-27 field goals and 24-of-26 extra points a year ago. He ranked second in the nation in field goals and was tied for 45th in scoring. He will be backed up by Waldorf Junior College transfer Sam Teetzen and sophomore Shane Held. Waller played baseball in the spring.

"We feel good with Matt returning," Allen said. "He's one that will only continue to get better. He has good leg strength and the commitment and athletic ability to be good."

Punter: Senior Ryan Elsbernd has used up his eligibility. Ranked 24th in the nation, he averaged 39.5 yards on 59 punts, with a long of 60. Redshirt junior Eric Walter, a transfer from North Iowa Area Community College, is the frontrunner coming out of the spring, but incoming freshman Kasey Kadolph is expected to challenge for the job.

Defensive Line: "This is another good area for us with the return of (nose tackle) Brian Moretz and ends Cory Burkle, Ryan Behr and Jeremy Linsenmeyer, which gives us flexibility," Allen said. "Burkle and Linsenmeyer have developed from their young stages and are getting bigger and stronger each year. T.C. Barney, Matt Kelley and redshirt freshman Dempsey Miller are competent backups and could make an impact this fall."

Moretz is the team's second-leading returning tackler, eighth high overall, with 73 tackles, including 48 solos. He also had six sacks. Burkle finished with 51 tackles and was tied with Andre Allen with seven tackles for loss for team high.

Linebacker: UNI historically has been known for a strong linebacking corp, but this area was hit hard by graduation. Missing will be all-American and league defensive player of the year Andre Allen, the team's second-leading tackler (112) and high sack man with 10; leading tackler Scott Durlinger (120 stops), third-leading tackler Paul Wolf (108) and reserves Marc Delaere (58) and Brad Remmert (39). The only returnee is Kevin Hammond, the squad's top returning tackler with 85 stops, including 60 solos. He also contributed eight sacks, three tackles for loss and one fumble recovery. Overall, he was fifth high on the team last year in tackles.

"Obviously, this area was hit heavy by graduation," Allen said, "but we have quality players waiting in the wings. Hammond at times was as effective as Andre, and he'll be our marquee player. We have a host competing for the other three spots. We're confident in Dannie Spann's ability (will report in the fall), along with returnees Tim Miller, Jay Heimsoth, Brandon Williams, Travis Schipper and redshirt freshman Christian Olsen."

Heading into the fall, Miller is listed at no. 1 at one outside position, with Hammond at the other. Heimsoth and Williams are tapped for no. 1 on the inside.

Defensive Back: The hardest hit area in terms of graduation losses is the defensive secondary.

"This has been a very difficult area for us to get a handle on with all the losses and the illness of Steve Salinas," Allen said.

All four starters have used up their eligibility. Salinas was expected to be an important cog in the rebuilding of the segment but he succumbed to cancer in his native Texas.

Frontliners at safety heading into the fall are sophomores Marcus Easter and Maceo Strickland. Strickland was a dominant force on special teams a year ago. A talented group of young competitors are vying for the corner positions, led by redshirt freshmen Tyree Talton, who walked on with the basketball team last year, and John Harden. Redshirt freshman Steve St. Meyer, sophomore James Penelton, junior Mike Morrison and senior Jeff Helgeson are listed as backups.

ALLEN'S TEAMS

- Won 55 games with only 19 losses overall, the highest win total in the Gateway Conference. Since 1985, the first year of competition for the Gateway football division, UNI has won 48 league games and lost 11, also the highest win total in the league.
- Appeared in eight playoff games. In Allen's total tenure with the Panthers, either as an assistant or head coach, UNI has appeared in 15 post-season games, all at the 1-AA level. The Panthers have appeared in more 1-AA post-season games than any other team in the Gateway.
- Under Allen, shared the Gateway title in 1990 and won the crown outright in 1991, 1992, 1993 and 1994. During his entire coaching tenure, UNI has won seven outright league titles.
- Produced 84 all-conference selections, including 40 first-teamers, four Defensive Players of the Year and one Offensive Player of the Year in the last six years.
- Produced 28 all-Americans as a head coach and has coached three others as an assistant. He also has been involved with coaching three players currently active in the NFL.
- Played before all six of the UNI-Dome's sellout crowds, including the Dome's first sellout in 1990, two sellouts in 1992, one in 1993 and two in 1994.
- Finished in the nation's top 20 all six years, and in the top 20 eight times since the formation of the Gateway in 1985.
- Tied a school record with 10 wins in 1990 and 1992 (records include regular-season games only).

Northern Iowa head coach Terry Allen, the Gateway Conference's Bruce Craddock Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive year in 1994, is one of the nation's brightest minds in college football today.

During his 21-year relationship with the Panther football program, Allen has worn just about every hat imaginable on the way to being named head coach.

Allen as a player, an assistant and now as head coach has played a key role in the establishment of UNI's nationally-recognized football program and the overall excellence associated with it.

Despite being one of the youngest individuals in the nation to be named head coach at the time of his appointment, Allen's experience in the coaching ranks was far from limited. He has served under three different UNI coaches — Stan Sheriff, Darrell Mudra and Earle Bruce — and also has experience professionally with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League.

He continues to believe he can relate in special ways to his players because of his personal ties to Northern Iowa, and he's never been selfish in the running of the Panther program. And he has helped mold a staff comprised of other former UNI standouts and seasoned veterans from the professional ranks.

"I feel very strongly about the staff I have been fortunate to work with here at UNI," he says. "I still try to focus on the fact that this is the players' team and I'm really just there to accommodate that."

Having come to UNI in 1975 as a recruited athlete out of Iowa City (IA) West High School, where he was an all-state quarterback, Allen began an association with the University during a period that easily can be described as the most productive in Panther football history. He took just a few snaps that first year, which was best known for UNI's playoff game (known as the "Mud Bowl") against Western Kentucky in old O.R. Latham Stadium. The UNI-

Dome was rising from the earth across the street.

Allen started the next three years, marred in 1977 by a broken collarbone which kept him off the field for three games. He still holds school records — he's tied for rushing touchdowns in a game (4) and holds the record with 32, he holds the record for total offensive attempts in a season (397), four touchdowns scored in a game (4) and 24 points scored in a game, also shared. Four team records also were set while Allen was over center.

He's in possession of yet one other record. Allen is the only person who has been involved in every UNI football game ever to be played in the UNI-Dome.

Over the past 16 seasons, he has gone from being a graduate assistant in 1979 under Sheriff, to a fulltime aide under Sheriff, Mudra and Bruce. He was recruited as a player because of his technical expertise in following the Houston veer offense. As an assistant coach, he aided the receivers, running backs and quarterbacks, and he called the offensive plays under Mudra.

Along with Mudra and current assistants Walt Klinker and Bill Salmon, the Panthers advanced to two 1-AA national semifinal games and five more berths in the last 11 years, including advancing to the semifinals in 1992 when they were ranked third. Also during 1992, the Panthers received their first no. 1 national ranking, a position they held for five straight weeks.

In 1991, UNI was ranked fourth and advanced to the quarterfinal round, and in 1990, UNI was ranked 11th and advanced to the first round of the playoffs. It was ranked 20th in 1989, barely missing another post-season call. In

1993, the Panthers finished 13th in the Sports Network poll and lost a double-overtime decision to sixth-ranked Boston University. This past season, UNI was ranked 12th heading into the playoffs and finished 11th in the poll, losing a 23-20 squeaker to Montana in the first round of the playoffs.

Allen makes no bones about where his heart lies, despite his hometown of Iowa City and his father's

association with the University of Iowa Hawkeyes, where Bob Allen was the Iowa swimming coach.

"I'm a UNI guy," he always has said. "It's a goal of every college coach to be able to coach his alma mater. I'm proud to be an alum of this institution, to have been an assistant coach here and to carry on in its tradition."

Allen brought his own style to the Panthers when he

took the helm, but, obviously, the three previous mentors have had some effect.

"Sure, I listened to them all," Allen said. "I took in what they each had to say, but I do not rely on one particular philosophy. It's obvious that Darrell Mudra turned over a particular style of offense to us, and the members of the staff who remain here are comfortable with that."

Allen said he feels his teams should be based around Iowa talent.

"I feel strongly about the caliber of athlete in this state," he says. "I realize that we have to do some recruiting out of state, but the bulk will be made up of Iowa talent."

Allen was born June 27, 1957. In

GATEWAY COACHES — PAST AND PRESENT

The Gateway Conference’s and each member school’s success has helped keep coaching staffs intact, as just 17 head coaches have been at the helm of Gateway teams during the league’s first 10 seasons. In fact, the six coaches who return from last season have averaged about seven years at their schools. Dennis Raetz of Indiana State leads all conference coaches as he enters his 16th year with the Sycamores. Northern Iowa head coach Terry Allen has been awarded the Gateway Coach of the Year honor four straight years. The award is named in honor of the late Bruce Craddock, who died of liver cancer at the age of 46 in February of 1990. Craddock coached seven seasons at Western Illinois, compiling a 41-35-1 record. He earned league coaching honors in 1987 and 1988.

WALT KLINKER
Offensive Line

A former Big Eight center at Colorado, Klinker has been a member of the Panther staff 12 years. He was hired by Darrell Mudra, was retained by Earle Bruce and now,

Terry Allen. He played at Colorado from 1959-61 and was voted the best two-way center in the history of Colorado football. Klinker began his coaching career at the high school level. He was on the Colorado staff one year before coaching at Claremont Men's College in California two years. He spent the next nine years in the college ranks — five years at New Mexico, one year at Fresno State and one more year back at UM. Prior to taking the UNI job, he was an administrative assistant in the Wyoming athletic department. Klinker's bark is widely known to be more dangerous than his bite. During his UNI tenure, he has coached 28 all-conference selections and five all-Americans.

ARDELL WIEGANDT
Defensive Line

Wiegandt rejoined the Panther staff six years ago after serving as a volunteer assistant under Darrell Mudra during the 1987 campaign. Prior to returning to UNI, he was defensive coordinator for the Ottawa Roughriders and before that, he held the same position with the Montreal Alouettes. From 1985-86, Wiegandt handled the defensive line one

year and the linebackers one other for the Buffalo Bills, where he met current UNI assistant Dick Moseley. Other coaching assignments included stints with Wyoming (1983-84), the Calgary Stampeders (1972-82), the Birmingham Vulcans (1974-75) and at North Dakota State (1969-73) — everything from defensive coordinator and offensive coordinator positions, to the offensive and defensive lines and linebackers. Wiegandt played under Mudra at North Dakota State from where he graduated in 1966. He was instrumental in convincing Moseley to join the Panther staff. He has coached 11 UNI all-conference selections, including James Jones, currently active with the Denver Broncos, and two all-Americans.

BILL SALMON
Running Backs

One of four Panther assistants with extensive UNI backgrounds, Salmon is without a doubt one of the all-time greatest quarterbacks in the school's history. He joined the Panther staff 12 years ago. Salmon led the Panthers as a player to the 1975 NCAA Division II playoffs. Known for his excellent throwing arm and football knowledge (he called about 75 percent of his own plays), he was superb at

Defensive Secondary

Former Green Bay Packer outside linebacker coach Dick Moseley was hired three years ago.

Moseley had been on staff with the Packers since 1988, after previously coaching the Buffalo Bills' defensive backs from 1985-87. He also coached two years in the USFL — 1983 with the New Jersey Generals and 1984 with the Pittsburgh Maulers. Prior to joining the pro ranks, he spent 13 years at the collegiate level and nine years in the high school ranks. He coached the secondary at Colorado from 1979-81, was the secondary coach and defensive coordinator at Minnesota from 1972-78, coached at Wichita State in 1971, and his first collegiate job was with his alma mater, Eastern Michigan, from 1968-70. Moseley originally pursued a professional baseball career after graduating from Eastern Michigan in 1956. He spent two years in the Dodger organization, which saw him reach the Class A level at Elmira, NY. While coaching at EMU, his secondary led the nation in pass interceptions with 29 his first year. At Minnesota, his Gopher defense set a record for takeaways in 1973 with 38 and later established a Big Ten mark by not permitting any touchdown passes during the 1975 season. A native of Detroit, Moseley, 59, received his master's degree from Michigan in 1962. Ten of his UNI players have received all-conference honors, and he has coached three all-Americans.

After competing in the shadows of some of the best linebackers to ever play at Northern Iowa, like Andre Allen, William Freeney, Bryce Paup and Mark Farley, senior outside linebacker Kevin Hammond is ready to establish himself as a leader on the 1995 team.

Hammond moved with his family to Burnsville, MN, from Seattle, WA, when he was 10 years old. Football didn't really interest him as a kid growing up.

"When I was younger, around 10 and 11, I wanted to play the running back-type position, but because of my size, they wanted to put me on the line," Hammond said. "I told my friends that they could keep football. Also, a lot of my friends at that time weren't playing football, so it just wasn't a big thing in my life."

In fact, football didn't become a part of Hammond's life until his junior year in high school, when his father urged him to go out for the team.

"If it wasn't for my dad, I wouldn't be playing football," Hammond said. "It turned out for the better, because I was able to get a scholarship and come to college."

In high school, Hammond's favorite sport was wrestling.

"A lot of high school coaches thought I would be a better wrestler than football player in college. UNI even talked to me briefly about wrestling," Hammond said. "To be honest, football isn't my favorite sport because you have the injuries, fatigue and your bones are hurting. But there isn't anything like winning. Nothing like being out there and helping the team win."

So what attracted Hammond to the UNI football program as a high school senior?

"I love the Dome. I think my ideal place would probably be an outdoor stadium, but because of the area we are in, the Dome is perfect," he said. "So that's the main reason I came here. Besides, we win."

Win the Panthers have. Hammond has been part of three conference championships in each of his three seasons and he's looking for a fourth this year, which would be UNI's sixth straight league title.

"I believe we have the best coaches in the conference," Hammond said. "All of our coaches at some point have had some interactions at the professional level. They know what they are doing and that's the reason for our success. In years past, we have often had small teams and have competed well against bigger teams such as Iowa State and Wyoming."

Hammond, who was not redshirted as a freshman,

found the transition from high school football to the college game both physically and mentally challenging. Not only was he adjusting to the college level, he also was learning a new position. In high school, he played defensive end and was moved to outside linebacker as a freshman at UNI.

"It was weird for me at first. I only had three calls in high school — 40 rush, 40 base and eagle," Hammond said. "When I got here, I was having to drop back into pass coverage and give my defensive end different stunts to run. I also had to adjust to the different formations and offenses. One of the reasons I couldn't play more my freshman year was because I didn't understand the system. I believe I had just as much athletic talent as

anyone who was starting."

It was his athletic ability and aggressive play on the field which has earned Hammond the playing time the past three seasons.

"I'm more of a physical person — I like hitting," Hammond said. "I'm so used to bumping up with guys. I was real aggressive as a freshman and I have been able to put that towards football."

Hammond sports an unusual number on his jersey.

"I originally wanted to be number 22. That was my high school number, but (Jason) McCleary had it," he said. "When I got here as a freshman, they gave me number 45, which wasn't a bad number. I just noticed a lot of guys who were linebackers at Texas A&M and Miami had single-digit numbers and that influenced me to get number three."

This season will be a challenge for not only Hammond, but also the defensive coaches and the players. With the loss of many key players, talented but younger players will be filling in along side Hammond.

"I'm going to have to step up and make a lot more plays," Hammond said. "Our offense is going to have to take control, where in years past it was the defense that always helped the offense. Now it is going to be the other way around. I'm going to have to step my game up and help the other guys around me pick their

game up.

"The first couple of games will be shaky, but with game experience, they (younger players) should get better and better each game," Hammond said.

Hammond doesn't have to lead the team in tackles or grab all the headlines, however.

"I just want to have a respectable defense," he said.

Hammond, a strong outside linebacker, doesn't see himself changing to the open side for his final season.

"I think I'm going to stay on the tight end side, because if you can't hold down the tight end side, then your defense is nothing," Hammond said. "When I play up against the tight end, I can often keep the line at the line of scrimmage and allow other people to make the tackles."

Hammond doesn't feel it is necessary to be in on every stop. He will concentrate on helping other players get involved in the defense.

"I want to set myself up to make tackles, but I also want to help other guys get confidence and help them make tackles," Hammond said. "Most of the time you will see me on the strong side, but every now and then as a changeup, I'll go to the open side. It's going to be hard, but I believe we will work through it. The coaching staff will put different schemes together to put me in position to make plays."

With a strong senior season, Hammond's future could include football, but if it doesn't, he knows the decision to attend college was the best move he ever made.

"My academics are on schedule, but I still don't know what I want to actually pursue yet," he said. "I figure if I leave here with a degree, I'll be in better shape than most of the other guys who didn't go to college at all."

Imagine yourself in this situation. You're in the opposing defensive backfield and you need a stop on the next play. The ball is snapped — it's a pass. You rush to tackle the receiver and realize you've got a 6-6, 260-pound tight end coming straight at you. You have only seconds to run the other way, or pray that someone else gets to him first.

Now you know how it feels to play against Matt Harken.

As an all-conference and all-state performer just down the road from Cedar Falls at Waverly-Shell Rock High School in both football and basketball, and now a college football standout, Harken may be considered by some to be a "hometown hero".

"I wouldn't go that far," Harken responded. "I played down here in high school, so people know who I am. The biggest thing I noticed when I go home is that people who never cared about UNI football are big fans now."

Considering his past successes at the high school level, it's easy to understand why Harken found it difficult to come into a program like UNI's and sit on the bench his first year. "It was hard to be a scrub for the first time in my life," he said. "In high school, you're the best, the team stud. Here, everyone is the best. You have to do the little things."

Every player's college career has to start somewhere, however. Harken's road to success began in the hot, humid climate of Louisiana, against I-AA power McNeese State.

"The game started at 7 p.m. and it was still 95 degrees," he recalled. "My parents drove all the way down to watch me. I was very excited, but I've never been one to get real jittery. When they snapped the ball, and I was able to handle the guy across from me, I knew I'd be all right. Football is a team game — you can't worry about your own emotions at the time."

A senior now, Harken has made quite an impact in the two years since he broke into the starting line up. His sophomore year, he started all 12 games, filling in for Mike Anderson who was slowed by injuries. He went on to become the team's fourth-leading receiver with 24 catches for 308 yards and one touchdown.

"Matt came into an ideal situation," stated tight ends coach Todd Eagen. "He's a great possession receiver. He's got a good concept of defensive coverages, and he gets open. He's a huge target, which helps the quarterbacks. He's also one of our best blockers. Matt's the whole package at his position."

The fact that he's a huge target is pretty obvious, but he didn't always have the mass to match the height. His freshman year, Harken weighed in at 215 pounds, a far cry from his current bulk of 260. I was so surprised by this myself, I asked him if it was an error in his file.

"Nope, it's not a typo," he assured me. "I've really put on 50 pounds since I've been here. I never lifted a weight in high school. I relied on pure athleticism to get the job done. My redshirt year, I realized athleticism wouldn't be enough."

"Matt's size increase came about because of his work ethic and Coach (Mark) Farley's weight program," stated Eagen. "He's one of the people who's done a super job in the weight room. He had the natural growth potential, and just added to it."

Harken's added size hasn't hurt his speed and

quickness, however, as Eagen is quick to point out.

"For a guy 260-270, he's not bad when it comes to quickness. He runs a 4.9 40-yard dash, which is pretty decent. He's not slow by any means."

A huge target with good speed, what more could you ask for. Good hands? Well, he has those, too.

"I've played tight end since I was in seventh grade. That's where I was meant to be. My ability to catch the ball is what's kept me from having to play offensive tackle," Harken explained.

Aside from helping the Panthers on the field, he also helped make Eagen's transition from the defensive side of the ball to the offensive side easier.

"When Matt first came in, I was coaching the defensive line. When I moved over, I guess he inherited me. Matt's a very coachable kid, and I kind of grew with him. As a former defensive lineman, I was unfamiliar with the tight end position. He helped me as much as I've helped him. He's the kind of kid you love working with," Eagen said.

"Matt's a quiet leader, not the rah-rah type," Eagen added. "He leads by example, through his work ethic and constant improvement."

Despite his football prowess, Harken almost ended up somewhere else — playing basketball.

"I loved basketball in high school. Morningside offered me a scholarship to play basketball there, and I took a visit to Colorado State. In the end, I decided to stick around home. Coach (Terry) Allen was really up front with me. He said he wanted me to play for him, offered me a full ride, and asked if I had any questions. I liked his up-front attitude.

"Besides," he added, "the opportunities for a six-foot, seven-inch center in college aren't that good. I thought I'd have a better chance in football. I just love to compete, it

doesn't matter what sport."

Harken not only competes on the playing field, he does so in the classroom, as well. It's a trait he attributes to his participation in football.

"Football really teaches you how to structure your time. It's also added competitiveness to my life, especially in academics. I get upset if I get a bad test grade or something like that, so I bear down harder on my studies. I think I've gained a competitive edge."

What does Matt Harken do when he's not snagging passes or cramming for exams? He plays sports, what else?

"I don't have a hobby like woodworking or something like that. I'm a physical education major, so I like to do things associated with sports. I like to bike, golf, play basketball and softball, anything that involves physical activity."

It's no secret that the Panthers have lost some key players on defense — all-American linebacker Andre Allen, for example. Harken doesn't think this will have any adverse effects, though, provided the younger guys step up.

"I expect good things from this team. We've had great athletes on defense since I've been here. The defensive guys are really playing hard now. They all come from winning programs, and a great winner is a great winner, no matter what. There are lots of starters back on offense, too. We've got a great staff, and they give us the opportunity to win every game. It may take some time for people to step up, but once they do, we'll be alright."

Eagen agreed that it may take some time for the defense to get past its inexperience.

"There could be more pressure on the offense," he stated. "It's kind of a reverse role this year. Before, the defense had to carry us the first three or four games. This year, we may have to put all kinds of points on the board, especially in the first two games or so."

In a career full of highlights, it should have been tough for Harken to pick just one. With no hesitation, though, Harken thought back to the moments right after the Panthers' 28-14 victory at Iowa State's Cyclone Stadium.

"My most memorable moment in my football career was after the Iowa State game last fall. I had my dad in one arm and my mom in the other, both telling me how proud they were of me. It was a very touching moment for me."

In addition, Harken named his father as the person he most readily looks up to.

"My dad is my hero. Growing up, you don't realize what you've got at home. Without him, I wouldn't be here today. He worked his butt off to give me the opportunities I've had. I respect him for that."

After graduation, Harken said he'd like to stay in the UNI football program as a graduate assistant, and maybe coach some day.

"I'd like to stay in the program, the way Coach Allen and Eagen did. I've coached high school basketball for the past couple of years, so high school coaching is an option. I'm really not sure yet, but I know I'd like to stick around here. UNI has an excellent program."

Eagen doesn't think Harken should shut the door on the possibility of playing professional football, though.

"Matt can take this thing as far as he wants. I think he could make a career out of this. He's gifted with size, great hands, and a blue collar work ethic. But, if he decides to come back, he'd make an excellent coach. He's a top quality kid."

Last year was a season to forget for Northern Iowa's Jeff Stovall. After bursting onto the scene as a freshman and gaining 1,191 yards, a broken arm slowed him down in 1994. His injury, which he suffered in the third game of the season, caused him to miss only one game, but it limited him to only 823 yards.

"It was the first time I had to miss games because of an injury," Stovall said. "It didn't feel too good to see everybody else having fun. I was standing on the sidelines with a broken arm. It wasn't any fun at all. It kind of messed up my whole year."

Stovall's football career began in the fifth grade, but lasted only a year until he picked up the game again as a sophomore in high school.

"The first time I started playing football was in the fifth grade," he said. "I was playing on the offensive line and I didn't like that, so the following year I didn't play. I didn't play again until I was a sophomore in high school."

"I was put on the offensive line because I was a bigger kid. There was a certain weight for each position and I didn't want to play on the offensive line. That isn't the fun part of the game to me."

Stovall didn't see much action in that sophomore year.

"As a sophomore, I played fullback and strong safety," he said. "I didn't get a lot of playing time because I was on the varsity team in Gary, IN, and the competition was pretty tough. I moved to Beloit (WI) my junior year. I played fullback there and everything started to click right away."

During his junior year, Stovall blossomed into a highly recruited football player. UNI, however, didn't show an interest in him until late in his senior year.

"UNI started recruiting me in the beginning of January of my senior season, when other schools were sending me letters when I was a junior," he said. "UNI was basically waiting to see what was going to happen, because I was one of those students having trouble with the ACT. They knew Division I schools would start falling off me because my grades weren't up to par. UNI got me because I passed the test the last time I took it."

Stovall came to UNI with the intentions of playing cornerback.

"When I came in (as a freshman), I weighed 180 pounds and was 5-10. I was pretty fast," he said. "I told the coaches I wanted to play cornerback or I didn't want to come here. So they agreed to let me play that position."

After a redshirt season, it became apparent Stovall would be better suited for a running back in the Panther system.

"When I got redshirted, I gained 20 pounds and went up to 200 pounds. They (coaches) like their cornerbacks to be around 170 or 180. The decision was for me to play where I could play soon and that was the running back position."

Not going to a Division I-A school did not upset Stovall.

"Competition here is a lot harder than high school, but I wouldn't say it is much different than a Division I-A school," he said. "The only thing different is size, and size is not a big factor on turf. On turf, the big factor is speed. We played Wyoming my redshirt freshman year and they only beat us by three points, so basically they couldn't stop us from scoring, either."

This year, Stovall and the rest of the Panthers will get a chance at another Division I-A school with Iowa the second game on the schedule.

"It could be just another game (Iowa), but I would consider it a big game because I don't want to go into there unprepared and get blown out," Stovall said. "That would be kind of embarrassing. The key to a good year is to win that first game at Stephen F. Austin. Then we go to Iowa. We would hate to take two 'L's' in a row."

In this, his junior season, Stovall will be looked upon as a leader.

"It's kind of hard making the adjustment from being a player to being a leader," he said. "Last year, I was looking up to people like Brett O'Donnell and Andre Allen — they were leaders. But now it's my turn to be a leader and I'm going to take up that role and do it the best that I can. I don't have any goals for the season. I'm just going to try to lead by example on the field, just take what comes to me and hope it's a lot."

Stovall and the rest of the Panther offense will be guided by their third quarterback in three years. Even

though Stovall's main duties are to run with the ball, making the adjustment to another quarterback will be challenging.

"It bothers me a little bit because once you get used to taking the ball from one quarterback, now you have to adjust your steps and take it from another person," he said. "The quarterback can't adjust his steps, you have to play around him because he is the leader."

The open communication with the players and coaches has made Stovall's experience at UNI an enjoyable one.

"The coaches are good guys to be around," he said. "They communicate with you well, especially the running back coach (Bill Salmon). I really admire him. I look to him as being my leader. I like the way he communicates with me."

"It's like a family atmosphere here at UNI. We all stick together and it's all a lot of fun."

Stovall enjoys the game of football but has a good perspective on where football stands in his life.

"Football is something I call entertainment," he said. "It's real fun and it's just a game. My life right now is being a college student. I'm getting ready to get out of here and face the real world. I don't want to be dependent, I want to be independent. Right now, I'm kind of dependent."

This season looks to be an exciting one for Stovall and the rest of the Panther running backs. When Stovall was injured last year, Marvin Sims stepped up and filled in admirably. Also look for James Porter to challenge for carries and playing time.

"It's coming to my junior year and it's the main year to explode," Stovall said.

A few years ago, Northern Iowa receivers Coach Wes Anderson was skimming through the Des Moines Register (the sports page, of course) when something caught his eye.

"I saw this article about a kid from Cedar Rapids (IA) Washington (High School)," Anderson recalls. "He was the conference MVP, had great stats and all, so I got hold of one of his game films. This guy made plays that the normal high school athlete couldn't."

The inspiration for Anderson's excitement was none other than current UNI flanker Dedic Ward. In his first two seasons, the 5-10 junior has posted numbers that already have earned him comparisons with another Panther great, all-American flanker/return specialist Kenny Shedd.

Comparisons like these can be a double edged sword, however. Luckily, Ward has managed to keep things in perspective.

"It's great when someone can compare you to a player like Kenny," he said. "I really look up to him and the things he did. But I try to do my own things — do them better than he did."

Anderson also feels that Ward must be his own player.

"I hope they'll quit doing that (comparing). He came in right after Kenny left. Right away, he was labeled the kid who would fill Kenny's shoes," Anderson explained.

Anderson is quick to point out that both players have distinct styles, each effective in their own way.

"You have to realize that they're two different players. Kenny had the great speed, quickness and leaping ability, but his routes weren't as polished as Dedic's. Dedic has the great hands and precise routes that Kenny lacked. He's also got great speed and the ability to make big plays. He's the most 'complete' receiver I've ever had here," Anderson said.

All this attention may have overwhelmed other young stars, causing them to develop egos the size of the UNI-

Dome. Ward, however, realizes that there are good and bad aspects of football stardom.

"It's both positive and negative," he said of his notoriety. "It's negative in that people stereotype you as a jock, but it's good that we're doing something positive for the school. We're not on the street doing drugs or something like that."

Contrary to what people might expect, football isn't Ward's first love. Coming out of high school, he had his sights set on the court, not the field.

"My senior year, I wanted to play college basketball," he said. "It's my favorite sport, but Coach Anderson told me I'd have a better chance to play football, that I'd have more opportunities."

When he finally decided on a collegiate football career, Ward found out that the skills learned for the high school game wouldn't do at this level.

"The biggest difference between college football and high school football is that everyone's a lot faster here.

Their techniques are a lot better, too. You learn the fundamentals in high school, and perfect them in college. I had to adjust on the run because I played a lot as a

freshman. The veteran players helped me out, and Coach Anderson taught me how to read defenses better," he stated.

In the beginning, Ward's future potential is what got him recruited. He wasn't expected to be an impact player so soon, but then again, how many freshmen are?

"You never expect a freshman to have the impact Dedic had, especially at our level," stated Anderson. "As a smaller school, we don't always get the blue chip players. When he reported to spring camp, I knew right away he'd have an impact. After the first few drills, I

could tell he had that talent and ability."

For the third straight season, Ward will have to work with a different quarterback. This may present a problem for some receivers, but he is optimistic.

"I had a great time with (Kurt) Warner. It was different adjusting to (Brett) O'Donnell last year, and now Chris Berg. We'll work out a lot over the summer. Once we get our timing down, we'll be alright," he said.

Anderson doesn't foresee any problems, either.

"There should be no affect. His job is to make the quarterback better. You always have to adjust to the signal caller," Anderson said. "He's been able to make adjustments in the past, and should continue to in the future."

Along with a different quarterback comes a young defense, as many key players have been lost to graduation. For the first time in several years, the Panthers on the other side of the ball will be relatively inexperienced. This shouldn't have any adverse effects on the team, according to Ward, provided the guys are able to step up.

"Our defense carried us in most of our victories the last couple of years. These guys are very inexperienced, but they're also very talented. The offense might feel pressure to produce, but I think the defense will be alright after the first couple of games," Ward said.

When he's not on the field running deep posts and 10-yard curls, Ward makes time for his hobbies and the important people in his life.

"I like to collect hats and sports cards and hang out with my friends and family whenever I can," he said. "My parents are a big influence on me. They support me and attend almost every game I play."

Ward feels football has helped him develop as a person as much as it has helped him as an athlete.

"It's allowed me to meet lots of people," he said. "The guys on the team really stick together — the veterans are leaders in the community. I'd like to follow in their footsteps."

A psychology major, Ward plans on attending graduate school in pursuit of a doctorate degree — if the pros don't come calling first, of course.

"Pro football is an option that I'm not closing the door on," he stated. "But it takes lots of hard work to reach that level. I need an education first, so I have something to fall back on."

Anderson also is realistic about Ward's future, pointing out that he shouldn't count on a pro career.

"Size could be a factor," he said. "He's got great speed, etc., but at that level, size becomes much more important. Remember, he's still got a lot of time left here. If I were a pro scout, though, I'd draft him."

"Dedic deserves lots of credit," Anderson added. "He's worked on some of his weaknesses, he's bulked up, and has improved his intelligence and attitude towards the game. Lots of players don't do that. Dedic is still improving his natural ability."

Still improving, huh? That's a scary thought.

Running back **Randy Schultz** played football for the State College of Iowa from 1963-65. He became the first SCI player to be drafted by the pros, going in the fifth round to the Cleveland Browns. He played for the Browns from 1966-67 and the New Orleans Saints two more seasons.

Phil Minnick played for the Panthers from 1961-64 at linebacker, fullback and guard. Upon graduation, he played linebacker for five years with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Canadian league. A captain, he was named to the Canadian All-Star teams in 1966 and 1969. Knee surgery forced the early end to his career.

Loren Buser played for SCI from 1963-65. He was drafted by the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian league, where he played two seasons.

Current assistant coach **Bill Salmon** was drafted in the 10th round by the Minnesota Vikings in 1976 but an off-season knee injury eventually led to the end of his playing career.

All-American offensive guard **Mike Timmermans** was drafted in the 17th round by the Green Bay Packers in 1976.

Quarterback **Steve Sandon** was drafted by the New England Patriots in the 11th round in 1982.

Linebacker **Peter Burns** played one year with the Cleveland Thunderbolts of Arena Football in 1993.

Despite an abundance of offensive line talent, the Dallas Cowboys kept free agent **Steve Wright** as one of 18 athletes who made the Rookie Class of 1981 because of "the potential he displayed in training camp." He was traded to Baltimore in 1983 and became their starting right guard. He signed with the Michigan Panthers in December of 1984, with his contract assigned to the Invaders following consolidation. In the spring of 1987, he was picked up by the Los Angeles Raiders. He announced his retirement in June of 1994. He played tight end and tackle at UNI.

All-American placekicker **Brian Mitchell** signed his first professional contract in 1994 with the Shreveport Pirates of the CFL after graduating in 1992, but was released during preseason camp. He played with the St. Louis franchise of Arena Ball this summer.

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN IOWA

The University of Northern Iowa emphasizes outstanding undergraduate education, with complementary graduate programs at the master's, specialist's and doctoral levels. Building on its historic strength in teacher education, the University has developed a number of outstanding programs in its various Colleges. UNI also participates in the bachelor of liberal studies program offered by the Regents Universities, and its Division of Continuing Education and Special Programs sponsors classes off-campus in centers throughout the state. Enrollment on its 860-acre campus stands at about 13,000 students from every county in Iowa, 40 states and 48 foreign countries.

UNI's heritage and philosophy place great value on providing a student-centered educational experience. The University nurtures a premiere learning environment — it is small enough to offer its students individualized attention, yet large enough to provide a variety of resources and opportunities as well as distinguished faculty. The University prides itself on being a great teaching university, and most courses are taught by full-time faculty members (over 600) who are committed to helping students grow intellectually and personally.

UNI was founded in 1876 as the Iowa State Normal School. In 1909, it became Iowa State Teachers College. In 1961, the name was changed to State College of Iowa, and in 1967, the Iowa Legislature acted to change the status of the institution to that of a university under its present title.

While maintaining its primary emphasis on teacher education, the University has continued its metamorphosis toward a multi-purpose institution, with nationally acclaimed programs in many disciplines. UNI's accounting program continues to be ranked among the best in the nation. UNI student groups ranging from chemistry to conservation to public relations have been recognized by their respective national groups for the excellence of their programs.

UNI's outreach also extends to the Iowa business community through programs of the External Services Division of the College of Business Administration, including the Institute for Decision Making, Small Business Development Center, Small



Business Institute, Management & Professional Development Center, Market Development Program and Industrial Site Location Program. The Iowa Waste Reduction Center provides free, non-regulatory consulting services on waste management to the state's small and medium-sized companies. The Iowa Plastics Technology Center and the Center for Applied Research in Metal Casting are among UNI's newest service programs designed

to diversify, expand and strengthen Iowa's economy.

UNI offers a wide variety of cultural programs, lectures and conferences. The Continuing Education division, often in conjunction with the University's Office of Conference and Visitor Services, also cooperates with business and industry in programs of study and development on the campus.

“There are many reasons why a student-athlete should make UNI his choice. One reason is that we compete in one of the most successful 1-AA conferences in the nation — the Gateway. Another reason is UNI's academic reputation. But the process needs to work both ways. The student-athlete has to fit in with our football program and aspire to the same personal and team goals which we feel will benefit him. However, UNI also has to be a fit for the student in terms of his educational and career goals.

“The fact is that at UNI, our student-athletes can get that higher degree at one of the best public institutions in the Midwest, if not the nation, and still have a great opportunity to play football for a winning program. You can't find a better staff at the 1-AA level, or play in a better facility, or compete in a more exciting offense and defense than here at UNI.

“I'm concerned, and the entire athletic department staff is concerned, about graduating our student-athletes. We take the time to make sure the 'fit' works both ways. That way, the student is not only prepared for the academic challenge, but the football challenge, as well.”

UNI FACILITIES: AMONG 1-AA'S BEST

Facilities play an important role in helping UNI's student-athletes make the most of his or her collegiate career. The Panther football facilities are among the nation's finest at the 1-AA level.



NO PLACE LIKE DOME

The UNI-Dome, a unique, multi-purpose athletic facility built in 1976, has gained a reputation as one of the finest collegiate facilities in America. The Dome combines the features of a fieldhouse, football stadium and large auditorium. It contains accommodations for a variety of events, such as concerts, exhibitions, trade shows and convocations, in addition to football, basketball, softball, wrestling and track events. It has been host to the NCAA football playoffs, gymnastics and wrestling championships, high school football and basketball, the Iowa high school football playoffs, and will be the site of the 1997 NCAA national wrestling championships.

The Dome's versatility allows for football and basketball games or track meets to be held the same day. Underneath the artificial football turf, on a synthetic floor area, are basketball and tennis courts and an eight-lane, 220-yard oval running track.

The turf was replaced three years ago with a new AstroTurf manufactured by Balsam Corporation, the same material that lasted 16 years prior to the installation of the new. It's a premier surface utilized by every Dome facility in North America with the exception of one, and offers the best durability and playability of any material on the market.

Approximately 16,400 spectators can be seated for football games and track meets and, although normal capacity is 10,000 for basketball, seating can be expanded to over 20,000. For stage productions such as concerts, total capacity can reach 25,000.

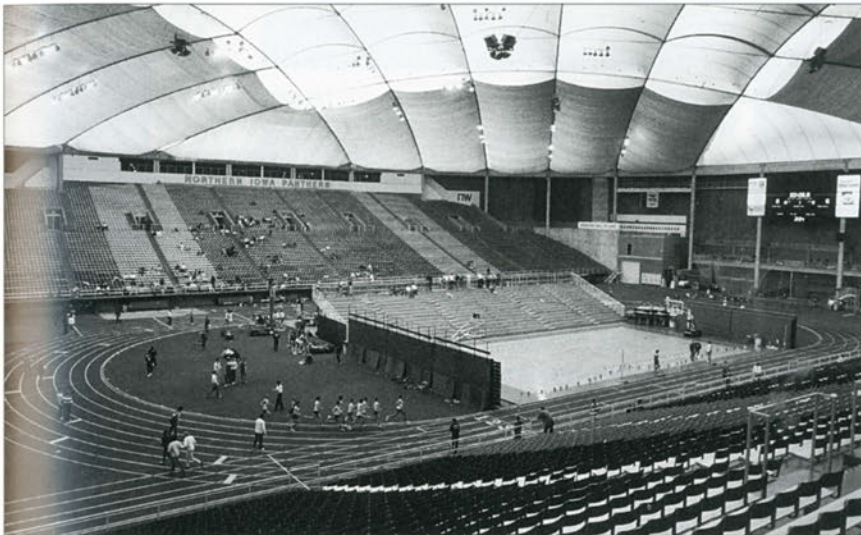

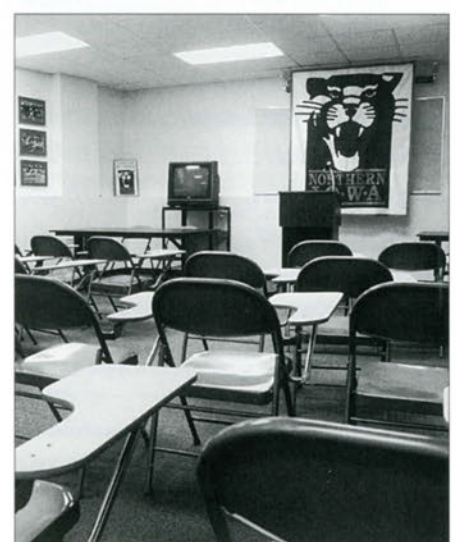

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR CHRIS RITRIEVI



Christopher Ritrievi is in his fourth year as Northern Iowa Director of Athletics.

Prior to his appointment at UNI, Ritrievi had been Associate Athletic Director at Stanford University. He has served in athletic fundraising capacities at Pennsylvania and Princeton, where he also was an assistant wrestling coach, and at Bowling Green State.

During his tenure at UNI, the intercollegiate athletic program has celebrated its first Missouri Valley Conference championship teams, five straight Gateway Football Conference titles, the three highest football attendance figures in history, including the first advance football sellout; hosted its first NCAA post-season volleyball match, and will host the 1997 NCAA Division I wrestling tournament.

The department continues to operate on a balanced budget, no easy task in today's world, and its student-athlete graduation rates continue to meet or exceed those rates of the student body as a whole.

Ritrievi is serving as vice president for the Missouri Valley Conference athletic directors this year and is a member of the MVC long-range planning committee and the financial committee for the Gateway Football Conference.

The 39-year-old native of Levittown, PA, is a 1979 graduate of Princeton with a degree in economics. He received his masters in business administration from Lehigh University in 1983. He earned three letters in wrestling at Princeton.

Ritrievi is married to the former Stephanie Homeyer, who grew up in Wellsburg, IA.

The Gateway Football Conference enters its second decade of football competition this season after celebrating a decade of excellence with the conclusion of the 1994 football campaign.

The original Gateway Conference was founded as a women's athletic organization in 1982 following the dissolution of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW). In September of that year, Patty Viverito was named the first commissioner of the newly-founded conference, a position she maintains today. Before moving to its permanent headquarters in St. Louis, the Gateway spent three organizational months on the campus of Eastern Illinois, the original president institution of the league, a role that will be filled this season by Northern Iowa.

In July of 1992, the 10-team Gateway Conference disbanded when its women's programs realigned with their men's teams in their respective conferences. The league assumed its new name on July 1 of '92, becoming the Gateway Football Conference, an NCAA 1-AA football league comprised of seven Midwest schools.

On August 21, 1985, the Gateway Conference Presidents' Council voted to add a 1-AA football division for six of its members to the previously all-women's athletics organization. Founding members of the football division were Eastern Illinois, Illinois State, Northern Iowa, Southern Illinois, Southwest Missouri State and Western Illinois. The creation of Gateway football marked the first time in college annals that football was added to a women's conference. In June of 1986, Indiana State became the seventh member of the Gateway Conference football division.

Gateway football quickly became a national force on the NCAA 1-AA scene. The strength of the fledgling league was confirmed in July of 1986 when the NCAA 1-AA Football Committee voted to waive the league's two-year waiting period and grant the Gateway an automatic bid to the national championship playoffs after just one season of play.

The first 10 seasons of Gateway football have been marked by continual successes. Last season, Northern Iowa represented the league in the playoffs, losing at Montana in a first-round game, while Western Illinois also won eight games and finished among the nation's top 25 teams. UNI advanced to the 1-AA semifinals in 1985, 1987 and 1992, falling by a touchdown or less to the eventual national champion in '85 and '87. Eastern Illinois

has reached the quarterfinals twice and Southwest Missouri State has done it once. Six of the seven league schools have been to the playoffs since 1982.

The Gateway continues to be one of the best 1-AA conferences in the nation as it plays one of the most difficult non-league slates in the country. After a slow start last season, the league compiled a 16-19-1 non-conference record, but eight of those games were against 1-A schools on the road. For the second time in four seasons, UNI defeated Iowa State in Ames. Southern Illinois' lone win was against No. 16 Western Kentucky in Bowling Green, while Illinois State played four teams ranked in the top 20 and posted a tied against 17th-ranked Middle Tennessee in the season finale.

Historically, the Gateway has been among the elite in 1-AA. In 1991, the Gateway Conference was perhaps at its greatest as, for the third straight year, two Gateway teams advanced to the playoffs. And the league compiled the best non-conference record in all of 1-AA football at 24-12-2 — the second-best in Gateway history, trailing only a 24-12-1 slate in its first year in 1985.

In addition, the Gateway has been well represented in national polls in each of its 10 years. In 1992, UNI achieved the Gateway's first No. 1 national ranking, as the Panthers were ranked No. 1 by the NCAA and the Sports Network for five straight weeks. They ended the year ranked No. 3 and Western Illinois appeared in the final NCAA poll at No. 20.

In 1991, the Sept. 23 NCAA poll had four conference teams in the Top 20 — Illinois State, UNI, Southern Illinois and Southwest Missouri. It was the first time in league history that four Gateway teams were in the Top 20 the same week. Six of seven league teams were either

in the Top 20 or among schools earning mention at one time or another during the year.

The final poll in five of the past six years has had at least two Gateway members among its Top 25. Last year, UNI finished 11th and WIU 24th in the Sports Network poll.

Besides the Gateway, five other conferences receive automatic bids to the 1-AA playoffs, including the Big Sky,

the Ohio Valley, the Southern, the Southland and the Yankee Conferences.

The Gateway and the Yankee Conferences are the only two leagues now that sponsor 1-AA football as its only sport.

The 10 founding schools now belong to two different conferences. Eight members have joined their men's programs in the Missouri Valley Conference, including Bradley, Drake, Illinois State, Indiana State, UNI, Southern

Illinois, Southwest Missouri State and Wichita State. Eastern Illinois and Western Illinois realigned their women's teams with their men's teams.

LEAGUE PERSONNEL



The only commissioner to govern the Gateway Conference, **Patty Viverito** enters her 11th year directing Gateway football after guiding the league to national prominence in the 1980s. She also serves as senior associate

commissioner for the Missouri Valley Conference, entering her fourth season in that capacity this fall.

A nationally respected administrator, Viverito currently serves on the prestigious NCAA Executive Committee, is the chair of the NCAA Committee for Women's Athletics, is a member of the NCAA Basketball Officiating Committee and the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse Committee.

The 43-year old Chicago native was selected following a nationwide search in 1982. She has an extensive background in athletic marketing and administration, formerly serving as an account executive for the Tidewater Tides minor league baseball team and as special projects director at the University of Texas from 1979-81.

Viverito earned her bachelor's degree from Northern Illinois and her master's degree in sports management from Massachusetts.

Ed Tschannen, a past president of the Big Eight Conference Officials Association, enters his 10th year with the Gateway.

The quality of officiating in the conference has gained national recognition as a Gateway crew officiated the 1989 and 1993 NCAA 1-AA

Championships, in addition to numerous 1-AA playoff games since Tschannen's arrival.

A former Big Eight official, Tschannen served as athletic director at St. Louis' McCluer High School from 1957-81. During his tenure, in addition to high school games, he officiated contests for the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association from 1959-67 and games in the Big Eight from 1969-81.

He has worked eight postseason college games, including two Sugar Bowls, five playoff games and the 1977 Grantland Rice Bowl. In addition, he has worked numerous state championships in 20 years of prep officiating. From 1981-86, he served as an observer for the Big Eight Conference. He owns and operates the T-Shots golf driving range in North St. Louis County.

Tschannen, 69, earned his bachelor's degree in education from Southeast Missouri State and his master's from Washington University.
