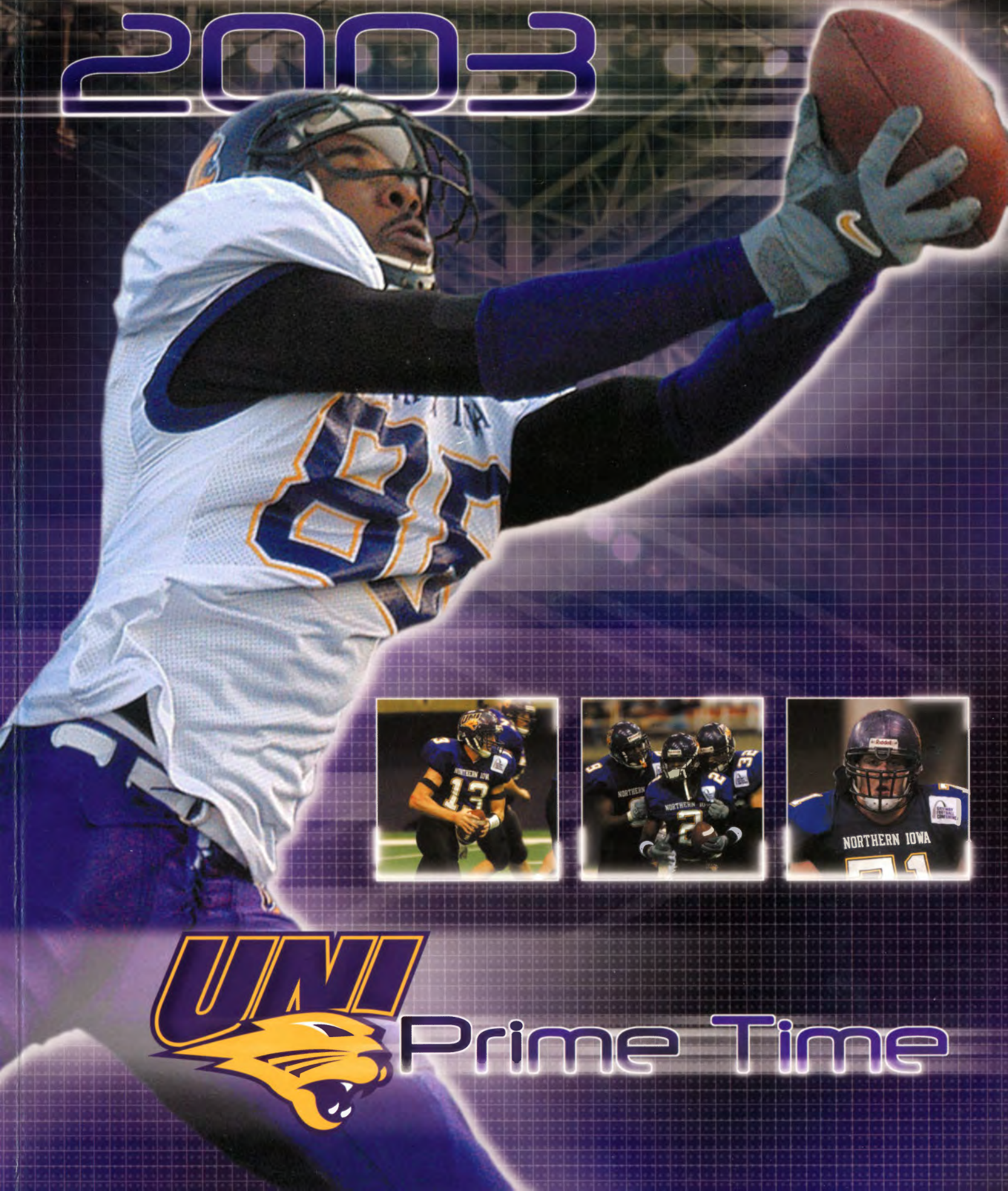

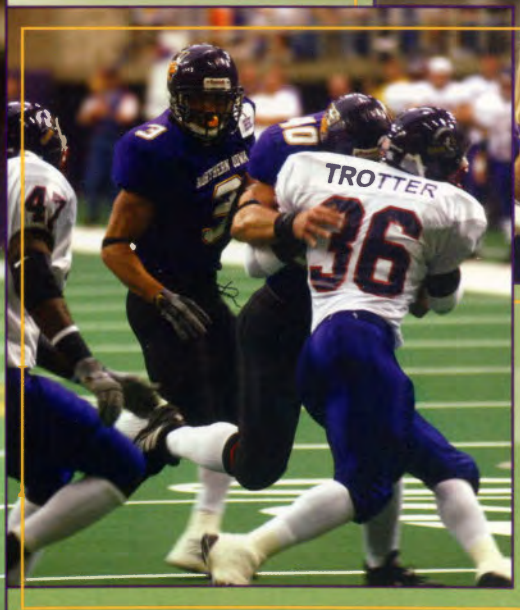

Center Brad Meester became UNI's highest pick in the NFL draft when he was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the second round, the 60th pick overall, in 2000.

Consider these facts:

- The two highest Gateway Conference NFL picks played at UNI.
- UNI had 11 players active in the professional ranks at press time, including seven in the NFL, one of which is St. Louis Rams' quarterback Kurt Warner.
- A Gateway Conference member has reached the 1-AA playoff semifinals in six of the past seven years and 10 times overall. UNI has five of those appearances.
- The Gateway has posted 23 wins against 1-A teams – UNI has won eight of those games. UNI is 8-11 against 1-A teams since 1985, including five against Big Eight Conference foes.
- UNI is 83-31 (.728) against Gateway Conference opponents, leading the league in wins.
- UNI has won 10 conference titles in 18 seasons.
- The Panthers had five players honored by the Gateway Conference for academics in 2002.



- 1996, 1999 & 2000 Walter Payton Award finalists.
- 1999 & 2001 Buck Buchanan Award finalists.
- UNI boasts the league's top two career reception leaders, the league's top three career receiving yards leaders, and three of the top four career TD reception leaders.
- UNI boasts the league's career leader in TD passes and passing yardage.
- UNI has the NCAA 1-AA's second-leading career receiver in yards.
- UNI has made 10 1-AA playoff appearances, five semi-final appearances.
- UNI has a 133-34-1 (.795) overall mark at home in the Dome.
- Best home field winning percentage in the Gateway at 43-10.
- League's first no. 1 national ranking in 1992.
- League-record 96 consecutive poll appearances from 1990-97. Since joining the Gateway, UNI has been ranked for 174 weeks, by far the conference's best.
- UNI boasts five Gateway Offensive Players of the Year, six Defensive Players of the Year, eight Coaches of the Year.
- Forty-eight Associated Press all-Americans since 1985.

Placekicker Mackenzie Hoambrecker led the nation in field goals and twice kicked five three-pointers in a game in 2002.

INTERVIEW POLICIES

The UNI Athletics Media Relations Office and the football coaching staff are eager to assist the media with player and coach interview requests. To help in this endeavor, it is asked that the media contact the Media Relations Office for all player and coach interviews. Players and coaches may be interviewed prior to or directly after practice during the season, but **requests must be made through the Media Relations Office ahead of time.** Phone 319-273-6354.

Coach Mark Farley or one of his assistants also will be available at the weekly Press Luncheons held each Monday in the back room of Pepper's Grill and Sports Pub in Cedar Falls. Farley also is available by phone between 11 a.m. and 12 noon weekdays. Phone 319-273-5674.

PRESS CREDENTIALS/PARKING

All requests for credentials should be made at least **three days in advance.** Credentials are left at the Northwest Entrance Will Call window of the UNI-Dome. Passes are not mailed. Only working press will be assigned seats in the press box. Those media representatives wishing to purchase tickets are urged to contact the UNI-Dome Ticket Office (319-273-DOME).

Parking is available in the Wellness Recreation Center lot located north of the UNI-Dome. Credentialed names will be left with the parking attendant. A parking pass is not required.

PRESS BOX

UNI's working facilities are located on the east side of the UNI-Dome. Access is available at either the north or south end staircases. The press box is reserved for **credentialed** sportswriters, radio personnel, statisticians, team filmers, and home and visiting coaching staff. Scoreboard and public address personnel also are housed in the press box.

VISITING RADIO

Permission to broadcast must be secured at least two weeks in advance from the Athletics Media Relations Director at 319-273-6354. UNI operates a reciprocal "trade-out" system for opponents' lines. Each station will be allocated up to three seats and passes. The broadcast space is located at the south end of the press box. Only one visiting station or network (designated by the visiting team) will be granted broadcast space. The visiting station's line number is 319-273-6491.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Working space for **television film crews** is limited. Cameras for working crews should be set up on the platform in the stands located just below the press box, while **team cameras** may be set up in the middle photo bay area in the press box.

PROFESSIONAL SCOUTS

Professional scouts will be accommodated in the press box as space permits during regular-season games only. Each professional club requiring space should contact the Athletics Media Relations Office at least three days in advance for credentials. Credentials are not mailed, but will be left at the Northwest Entrance Will Call Window of the UNI-Dome.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Game programs, flip cards, complete statistics, and pre-game notes are provided at each Panther game. Two telephones are available post-game in the press box working area, but **it is advised that media bring their own telephone sets if needed** since numerous lines are available. A light meal will be served at half-time.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

Following the 10-minute cooling off period, Coach Mark Farley and requested players will meet the media in the Panther Room, located at the northeast corner of the arena, concourse-level. The UNI locker room is open following the 10-minute cooling off period. Every effort is made to have the visiting head coach available for interviews in the Panther Room following Coach Farley. Final post-game arrangements can be made with the visiting sports information director and those arrangements will be forwarded to working media.

PRESS LUNCHEONS

UNI head coach Mark Farley or one of his staff will be in attendance at the weekly Press Luncheons held each Monday at 12 noon in the back room of Peppers Grill and Sports Pub on 18th Street in Cedar Falls. The Press Luncheons are open to the public.

The UNI-Dome Press Box is one of the best facilities at the 1-AA level and may accommodate over 100 working journalists.

GATEWAY TELECONFERENCES

The Gateway Football Conference will host a league-wide teleconference each Wednesday with each team's head coach participating, beginning September 3. To participate, call 913-981-5509. THE PANTHER SPORTS RADIO NETWORK

The UNI Radio Network found a new home on the airways in 2000. KXEL (1540 AM), a 50,000-watt station in Waterloo, IA, is the Panthers' flagship station. At press time, KRNT (1350 AM Des Moines), KNEI

(103.5 Waukon), K6LO (1300 AM Mason City), and KCZE (95.1 New Hampton) will carry all games live, while selected games will be carried by KLMJ (104.9 Hampton). KXEL, KRNT and KNEI also will carry Coach Mark Farley's call-in show. The games also are available on UNI's web site at www.unipanthers.com. Gary Rima handles the play-by-play, and Scott Peterson is the color analyst.

Gateway Football Conference

As the NCAA celebrated its 25th I-AA championship in 2002, a Gateway member celebrated its second as Western Kentucky rolled through the playoff field with unprecedented wins against the top three seeds, including a 34-14 thrashing of top-ranked McNeese State in the title game in Chattanooga, TN.

Two out of 25 doesn't seem like the Gateway would own braggin' rights. But Gateway members Youngstown State (3) and Southern Illinois (1) own additional titles prior to Gateway membership, meaning six I-AA championship trophies are housed on Gateway campuses, in addition to two (both by YSU) second-place awards. Only four I-AA leagues possess more than a single I-AA championship trophy, and the Gateway Football Conference is among that elite.

All signs point to continued national prominence for a league that enters its 19th season in 2003. In recent years, the Gateway has established itself as a leader among Division I-AA conferences. During the past six years, the league has two national championships (YSU in 1997 and WKU in 2002), and four other semifinal trips. The Gateway's 19-10 playoff mark in that span is better than any other league, and the Gateway has had three teams reach the title game, topped only by the Southern Conference's four championship game appearances since 1997.

Additionally, the Gateway is one of just three conferences (Atlantic-10 and Southern) to send at least 12 teams during the past six tournaments, and the GFC has had two representatives each of the past eight seasons. In addition, the Gateway is the only I-AA conference to have each of its members make the playoffs. As noted, SIU (1983), YSU (four times) and WKU (2002) have earned national titles.

The Gateway's success is not limited to the immediate past. During the decade of the 1990s, current members of the Gateway compiled a 34-19 mark in the I-AA playoffs, bettered only by the Southern Conference, whose members were 37-19 in that decade.

Last year, the league was an impressive 25-13 against non-conference teams, which included a 16-6 record against I-AA teams. Four of those six I-AA losses were against ranked teams, as the Gateway went 5-4 against the Top 25 last year. In addition, co-champ Western Illinois claimed the league's 23rd win against a I-A program as the Leathernecks beat Northern Illinois. Of the league's 13 losses in 2002, seven were to I-A teams.

Team accomplishments have helped solidify the Gateway as a I-AA elite, but individuals at the league's member institutions are the real source of pride within the conference. Last year, three Gateway student-athletes were finalists for the I-AA's top awards.

In addition, WIU's Don Patterson was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award, given to the nation's top I-AA football mentor. Patterson was the AFCA Region IV Coach of the Year, and despite not winning the region award, Jack Harbaugh took national AFCA Coach of the Year honors after his Hilltoppers earned the I-AA national crown. Thanks to strong coaching, the Gateway has reached and will maintain its place among the I-AA best.

During the past seven seasons, the Gateway has compiled a 165-107 record in non-conference games. Of the 107 losses, 84 came against ranked I-AA or I-A opponents. Said another way — only 23 times in those 272 games did a Gateway Conference team lose to a non-ranked I-AA team or to a non-I-A team. Notably, the Gateway has posted 41 wins against top-25 I-AA teams in the past six years alone.

Last year, despite tough scheduling, four teams in the Gateway Conference had winning records, matching an all-time high. The Gateway has had four teams with better than .500 records in the same season nine times now, including the past five seasons.

In 1997, YSU grabbed the crowned jewel for the Gateway, as the league had one of its most successful seasons. In addition to claiming the league's first national title, the Penguins finished the year ranked No. 1, marking the first time a league member has held that spot in a season-ending poll. WIU ended the season at No. 6, marking the first time the Gateway ended the year with two teams ranked among the top six. In 1999, the Gateway trumped that, as YSU finished the year No. 2, and Illinois State was No. 3. UNI, too, finished in the top 20 in both the Teamlink.com (17) and Sports Network (15) final polls. Last year, WKU added to the league's national championship trophy case with a 2002 I-AA crown, while both WKU (No. 1) and WIU (No. 5) finished among the nation's top five in the season-ending polls.

On the subject of national polls, the Gateway has had two teams ranked among the top 10 in the same poll 63 times (four times last year), with 62 of the 63 coming post-1996. In 1999, five Gateway teams (ILS, UNI, SIU, WIU, and YSU) were ranked in the same poll for the first time in league history. Prior to the Sept. 20, 1999, poll, the Gateway had never had five teams ranked in the Top 25 during the same week. Additionally, five Gateway teams appeared in the Top-25 rankings of Oct. 14, 2002. That marked only the third time in league history that five Gateway teams were in the Top 25 the same week (Sept. 3, 2001, and Sept. 20, 1999).

Four Gateway teams were in the Top 15 of the ESPN/USA Today Coaches top-25 rankings of Oct. 1, 2001 (YSU-5; WKU-11; WIU-14; and UNI-15). That marked the first time in league history that four league teams were in the Top 15 the same week. Those four schools were each ranked in the Top 15 in the Sports Network and/or ESPN

coaches polls of Oct. 1, Oct. 8, and Oct. 15, giving the league four top-15 teams for three straight weeks. A minimum of four Gateway teams have been ranked in the same Top 25 poll 28 times in league history, including a league-record nine times in 1999.

Certainly, the Gateway will be hard-pressed to continue its non-conference success, particularly because the league schedules tough opponents year after year. For instance, the 2003 schedule features nine I-A teams.

Tough scheduling is not an aberration for the Gateway, as last year five schools had four or more games against top-25 I-AA foes, and all eight league schools played at least three ranked teams, while seven played at least one I-A opponent. WIU's 29-26 win at Northern Illinois was the league's 23rd win against a I-A program.

The original Gateway Conference was founded as a women's athletic organization in August, 1982, following the dissolution of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women. In September of that year, Patty Viverito was named the first commissioner of the newly founded conference, a position she maintains today. Before moving to its permanent headquarters in St. Louis, the Gateway spent three organizational months on the campus of Eastern Illinois University.

In July of 1992, the 10-team conference disbanded as its women's programs realigned with their men's teams in their respective conferences. The league assumed its new name on July 1, 1992, becoming the Gateway Football Conference, a NCAA I-AA football league comprised of seven Midwest institutions.

The Gateway Conference football division was born on August 21, 1985, when the Gateway Conference President's Council voted to add a I-AA football division for six of its members to the previously all-women's athletics organization. Founding members of the football division were Eastern Illinois, Illinois State, UNI, Southern Illinois, SMS, and Western Illinois.

The creation of the Gateway football division marked the first time in college annals that football was added to a women's conference. In June of 1986, Indiana State became the seventh member of the Gateway Conference.

In the 18 years of the football division, league membership has been stable as only three times since 1986 have there been fluctuations in league membership. Eastern Illinois left the Gateway to join the Ohio Valley Conference in 1996, while Youngstown State joined the Gateway for 1997 to return league membership to its original seven-member status. League membership reached an all-time high of eight members for the start of the 2001 season with the addition of Western Kentucky.

The Gateway is among eight I-AA conferences that receive automatic bids to the NCAA I-AA Championship. Those other leagues include the Atlantic-10 Conference (formerly the Yankee), the Big Sky Conference, the Mideastern Athletic Conference, the Ohio Valley Conference, the Patriot League, the Southern Conference, and the Southland Football League. The Gateway has had an automatic bid since 1986, as the I-AA Football Committee waived the league's two-year waiting period and granted the league an automatic bid after just one year.

The Gateway Conference is the only automatic I-AA qualifying conference that sponsors football as its only sport, as the league completed its service to women's athletics following the 1991-92 season. Although the league no longer sponsors women's sports, the Gateway has an historical place in the development of intercollegiate women's athletics.

The College Hill Arts Festival, held in July on the university's campus, showcases the works of more than 75 juried artists from around the Midwest. The Festival's recent recognition by Sunshine Magazine is testament to the popularity and success of the event.

Other exciting summertime events include the Fourth of July fireworks, Iowa State Trap Shooting Competition, the Cedar Falls Bible Conference and the Cedar Trails Festival.

Bicycling, rollerblading, dog walking, hiking and jogging are enjoyed throughout much of the year on the community's outstanding hard-surfaced recreational trail system. You'll weave through Cedar Falls' nationally recognized Great American Main Street, past museums, parks and the university campus, and alongside lakes and streams and the majestic Cedar River. Krieg's Crossing, the longest recreational trail bridge in the Midwest, is a feature you won't want to miss and during the winter months, much of the trail is groomed for cross country skiing.

Cedar Falls also has a wide variety of city parks to offer, including the innovative Paw Park, which is devoted to dogs. Black Hawk County Park and George Wyth State Park offer camping, boating, fishing and more. Hartman Reserve Nature Center provides a relaxing respite in the heart of the metro area and its ongoing educational programs assure a continued respect for these natural wonders. The Family Herb Tree also provides an entertaining and educational exposure to the mysteries of nature.

Visitors can experience the area's history first hand by visiting the Cedar Falls Historical Society's Victorian Home and Carriage House Museum, George Wyth House and Viking Pump Museum, Little Red School House Museum, Behrens Rapp Information Station and Ice House Museum for guided tours. The University Museums provide a window to the world through their many permanent and traveling exhibits and just north of town, Antique Acres preserves



agricultural heritage through displays in the permanent museum and demonstrations during the annual Old Time Power Show.

If you prefer a faster pace, you'll want to take in a day of drag racing at Cedar Falls Raceways.

The expansive UNI-Dome has become a city landmark and is home not only to the UNI Panthers' outstanding athletic teams, but it annually welcomes great events like the Iowa Boat Show, the Antique and Collectibles Show, Eastern Iowa Sports Show, Hawkeye Farm Show, and American Youth National Basketball Tournament, as well as a number of concerts, trade shows and special athletic events.

Cedar Falls is proud to be listed among travel writer John Villani's One Hundred Best Small Art Towns in America and it's no wonder as the arts are an integral part of everyday life in Cedar Falls. Visual arts are displayed in the galleries of the Hearst Center for the Arts, UNI's Kamerick Art Gallery and the streets of downtown Cedar Falls through the Garden's to Main Street Public Art Exhibit. The Gallagher-Bluedorn Performing Arts Center is an extremely popular destination, offering more than 300 performances each year. The Oster Regent Theatre also offers a variety of entertainment options, including Cedar Falls' special brand of community theatre.

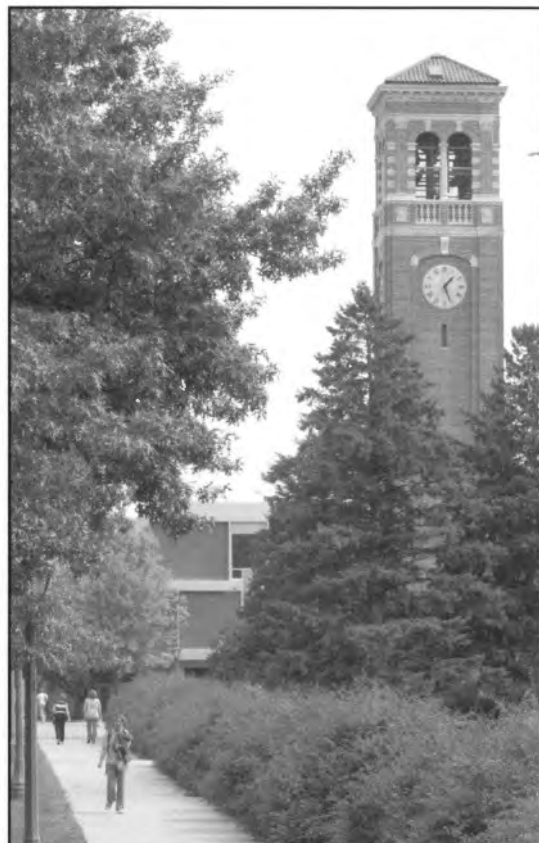

DR. ROBERT KOOB
University President

Dr. Robert Koob is the eighth president of the University of Northern Iowa. He began his tenure in August 1995, and he is the first UNI graduate to return to his alma mater as President. He has been distinguished at UNI for his efforts to promote and strengthen relationships between the University and the citizens of Iowa, and to fully integrate the use of cutting-edge technology campus-wide. These initiatives build on the

University's strengths of providing a strong liberal arts curriculum, excellence in teaching, scholarship, and service.

As President, he has focused on implementing the University strategic plan, articulating core values and progress indicators, and setting goals for the University, which is continually cited as one of the nation's top public comprehensive universities. His efforts have also produced extraordinary campus and community growth, including the new Gallagher-Bluedorn Performing Arts Center, the Freeburg Early Childhood Program, and two new facilities, which will begin construction in 2003 — the McLeodUSA Center and the Human Performance Center.



RICK HARTZELL
Director of Athletics

Rick Hartzell was named Director of Athletics at Northern Iowa August 9, 1999. In the four years since his appointment, the Panthers have celebrated outstanding performances in almost every sport. The volleyball team advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the first time in school history in 1999, and repeated the effort in 2001 and 2002; the wrestling team placed 11th in the NCAA Tournament, its highest finish

since 1994, and crowned its first Division I national champion in 2000 and again placed 11th this past season; while the men's track team has won both the conference indoor and outdoor titles. UNI's second-place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference All-Sports Championship race in 2001-02 was its highest finish ever in this competition. Other successes can be claimed across the board. In addition, UNI's student-athletes are graduating at a rate higher than the general student body.

Hartzell has been heavily involved in several facility upgrades, including the development of the McCleod USA Center, a new arena which eventually will house the men's and women's basketball programs, and volleyball and wrestling teams. Plans also are moving forward for a Human Performance Center that will house an athletics weight room, training rooms, team rooms, locker rooms and offices. The scope of the fundraising for UNI athletics has been widened under Hartzell's direction.

He also has stressed closer departmental involvement with the student body, and a new ticket package for the University community is one result of that interaction. The Panther Pass ticket package for UNI students enhances student involvement in the athletic program. Further, Hartzell completed departmental reorganization and a renewed outreach effort to the University and Cedar Valley communities.

At the press conference announcing his appointment, then UNI Vice President for Administration and Finance, John Conner, said, "Rick is a bright, articulate team-builder with a highly developed sense of the contribution

He is involved in numerous local organizations, including Cedar Valley's Promise, Cedar Valley United Way, Opportunity Works, Cedar Valley Economic Development Corporation, and the Waterloo Development Corporation. He also serves on numerous Trustee Boards, as he is known for his instrumental collaborating skills, strategic planning expertise, and creative ability to deal constructively with constant change. Most recently, he was honored as the Cedar Valley Business Hall of Fame recipient in recognition of his visionary skillfulness, economic development plans, volunteerism, and for his talent to build cohesive working relationships between private and public sectors.

Dr. Koob is involved in numerous state and national organizations, including the Iowa Empowerment Board, National Educational Advisory Committee, and the Commission on International Education.

He is a native of Hawarden, Iowa, received his B.A. in education from UNI in 1962, and a doctorate in chemistry from the University of Kansas in 1967. He has 16 years of classroom teaching experience ranging from high school science courses through Ph.D. level courses in physical chemistry. He and Yvonne have been married for 42 years, and they have seven grown children and 10 grandchildren.

intercollegiate athletics makes to the quality of the entire Northern Iowa community. He brings not only exceptional experience in athletic programming, but a strong personal relationship and loyalty to Panther athletics."

Prior to being named at UNI, Hartzell had been at Bucknell since 1988, directing a Division I program with 1-AA football consisting of 28 sports. Prior to his appointment at Bucknell, he was Director of Athletics and Chairman of Physical Education and Recreation at the University of Maryland-Baltimore County from 1985-88, directing a 19-sport program which moved from Division II to Division I during his tenure.

Prior to being named at Baltimore County, he was an Assistant Athletic Director for Football and Men's and Women's Basketball at Northwestern University from 1982-85; was an Administrative Assistant to the Director of Athletics and Assistant Baseball Coach from 1980-82 at the University of Iowa; and an instructor, assistant football coach and head baseball coach from 1977-80 at Coe College.

He recently received the All-American Football Foundation's General Robert Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award.

Hartzell is no stranger to UNI. He played football and baseball for the Panthers. He received his bachelor's degree in Physical Education and English from UNI in 1974, and his master's in Educational Administration in 1977.

He was a five-sport letterman at Klemme, IA, High School.

He has two children — Nate, 22, and Amanda, 20. Hartzell's personal interests include reading, fitness, auto racing and spending time with family and friends.

"I'm very excited to be here," Hartzell said at his press conference. "It's great to be home...It's an honor and privilege for me to be back...I'm really excited about where I think we can go with this program...I think the potential of this program in both the (Missouri) Valley and the Gateway is outstanding."



NICKNAME

It was 1931. The Northern Iowan student newspaper was called The College Eye. Cheerleaders were men and the UNI Panthers were known as the Iowa State Teachers College Tutors. In the fall of that year, a contest was sponsored by The College Eye and the men's Physical Education Department to change the name of the school's athletic teams.

The name that won was the "Purple Panthers," submitted by Burl Berry of Wellman, IA, and that's the name that has guided Northern Iowa teams for more than 70 years. Berry, who also happened to be that season's football MVP, won a briefcase from Berg Drug Company. The second-place winner received an alarm clock. It also is known that the name which took third place was the "Purple Grackles," submitted by students living in the same rooming house.

PANTHER MARCHING BAND

The UNI Panther Marching Band celebrated its 100-year anniversary in 2000. It all started in 1900 when eight students formed a Cadet Band, which performed for local events on campus and in downtown Cedar Falls. By 1929, under the direction of Myron Russell, the marching band numbered 120 men and women, and quickly was gaining prominence as a quality university marching band. In the years to follow, the band has been guided by an eminent list of directors, including Russell, Karl Holvik, Don Wendt, Jim Coffin, Paul Brizzi, Ashley Alexander, Paul Smoker, William Shepherd, John Vallentine, Dr. John Baker, and Christopher Woodruff.

Known for a classy and professional approach to performance, the band is recognized across the Midwest for its dynamic style, innovative drill and sensitive musical interpretation. The ensemble continues to thrill audiences at home football games in the UNI-Dome, as well as during road trips to other universities and NFL stadiums. The sounds of the "Panther Marching Band" can be heard on their first CD recording, "There's No Place Like Dome".

The band's pre-game and halftime shows contain hundreds of active frames or "moving sets" for the individual members of the band, coordinated to exciting music written by some of the leading arrangers in the country. Central to these field performances are sophisticated routines by the Northern Iowa Flag Line and Feature Twirlers, as well as professional dance choreography by the UNI Dance Team.

ILLUSTRIOUS HISTORY

Cedar Falls, IA, is the home of one of the finest 1-AA football programs in the nation. It's also home of one of the nation's premiere institutions of higher learning. Friends and fans of the UNI football team can relate many successes from the past century and more, but the last 15 years has produced some of the most exciting and successful seasons in history. There's no question the UNI football program arrived as a national power during the 1980s and it has seen continued success.

- 1985 First collegiate season.
- 1936 The Panthers embarked on their first full season of competition in the North Central Conference.
- 1939 The new Iowa State Teachers College Stadium was used for the first time on September 23 when Northeast Missouri State Teachers College invaded the local field. The Stadium was 300 feet long and 30 rows high and seated more than 6,000 fans. A permanent band shell, seating more than 100, and a press box handled a few more.
- 1940 A new electric scoreboard and clock was added to the ISTC Stadium. It was constructed so it could be dismantled and used for basketball and wrestling during the winter season.
- 1948 Night football became a reality at ISTC. Ninety-six sealbeam lights were used for illumination, 12 on each of eight poles. Cost of the lighting system was about \$12,000. Two of the Panther home games were under the arc lights – October 2 vs. Drake and October 16 vs. Western Michigan.
- 1976 The Panthers played their first season in the UNI-Dome, hosting Northern Michigan September 4.
- 1978 UNI joins the Mid-Continent Conference, along with Youngstown State, Western Illinois, Eastern Illinois, Northern Michigan and Akron.
- 1981 UNI moves up to the NCAA 1-AA level.
- 1985 The Gateway Conference, previously an all-women's league, added a football division.* The Panthers advance to their first 1-AA national semifinal game, losing to eventual national champion Georgia Southern, 40-33.
- 1987 UNI advances to its second 1-AA national semifinal game, losing to Northeast Louisiana State in double overtime, 44-41.
- 1992 The quest for a national championship saw the Panthers drop their third national semifinal game to Youngstown State, 19-7. The year was highlighted by UNI's first no. 1 national ranking, a position it held for five straight weeks.
- 1996 The Panthers finish 12-2 overall and defeat Eastern Illinois 21-14 and William & Mary 38-35 in the first two rounds of the playoffs before losing 31-14 at Marshall in Head Coach Terry Allen's final season.
- 2001 The Panthers advance to their fifth 1-AA national semifinal game and end the year ranked fourth in the nation in Head Coach Mark Farley's first season.

Dr. Sandra Williamson joined the UNI staff in 1978 following a merger of men's and women's athletics on campus. She was UNI's first Associate Athletic Director for Women and also assumed the duty of coaching the Panther women's basketball team from 1978-80. Prior to joining the Panther staff, she spent six years at Carroll College in Helena, MT, as the women's basketball and volleyball coach.

She graduated from Eastern New Mexico University in 1964, then taught at the high school level for four years. She went on to earn her master's from ENM in 1969, was a faculty member there one year, then moved to Carroll. She received her Doctorate degree from Northern Colorado in 1983.

Colleen Heimstead assumed some of the additional duties of academic advisor in the fall of 2002. She is in her fourth year as Compliance/Life Skills Coordinator after serving eight years as a UNI assistant women's basketball coach.

She came to UNI in 1992 as a graduate assistant and one year later, was elevated to fulltime status. She was the only coach retained in 1995 when Tony DiCecco was hired to lead the women's program.

Heimstead was a four-year letter winner at Southern Illinois University from 1988-92. The two-time captain played on two Salukis NCAA tournament teams. She received her Biological Sciences degree in 1992. She's a native of Elk Mound, WI.

CENTER FOR ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

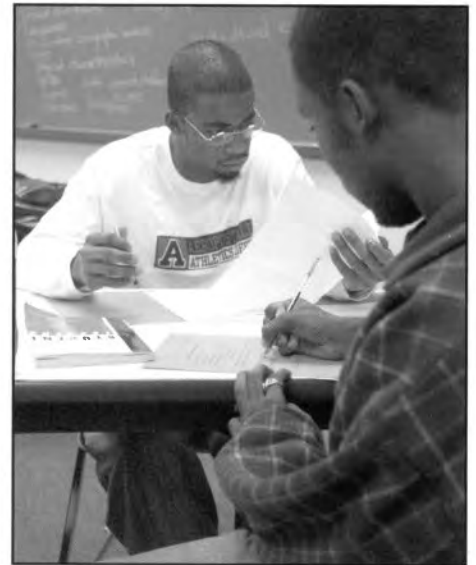

MICHAEL DAUGHERTY
Strength and Conditioning Coach

Michael Daugherty was named UNI's Strength and Conditioning Coach in August of 2002. At the time of his

appointment, he had served as an assistant at Brigham Young University since 2000.

At BYU, he had direct responsibility in the programs of women's basketball, gymnastics, men's and women's tennis, cross country and men's track and field. He also had daily supervision in football and Olympic sport workouts.

Prior to his position at BYU, he was a volunteer assistant at West Virginia from 1999-2000, a graduate assistant from 1998-99, and an intern from 1997-98. From 1996-97, he was an Exercise Specialist with Nova Care/Mercer Bucks Sports Rehabilitation and a teaching assistant at Noll Physiological Research Laboratory and Exercise Science Laboratory at Penn State from 1995-96.

Daugherty received his bachelor's in Exercise and Sport Science from Penn State in 1996 and his master's in Athletic Coaching with an emphasis in Strength and Conditioning from West Virginia in 1998.

He's a NSCA Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and is Collegiate Strength Coach Certified.

The UNI Strength and Conditioning program is a blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete.

Throughout the year, UNI athletes can spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game. During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Throughout an athlete's first year on campus, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measure of body composition and weight also are recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Programs are established for each player by Strength and Conditioning Coach Michael Daugherty.

The UNI sports medicine program features top-rate facilities and the outstanding services of sports and health care professionals.

The sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Merac strength-testing devices, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.

Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, not only in the Sports Medicine Lab but in the Wellness and Recreation Center, including swimming pools, Merac equipment, Stairmasters and various exercise bikes, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of fitness during recuperative time.

In addition, the UNI Student-Athlete Assistance Program (SAAP) provides confidential, professional and voluntary assistance and support to student-athletes regarding personal problems that are adversely affecting their academic or athletic performance. Student-Athlete Assistance Program (SAAP)

The University of Northern Iowa SAAP provides confidential, professional, and voluntary assistance and support to student-athletes regarding personal problems that are adversely affecting their academic or athletic performance. Educational programs also are offered to prevent problems and promote the general well-being of student-athletes. The SAAP offers education and assistance regarding alcohol/drug problems, emotional problems, family difficulties, health/physical problems, financial and legal problems and eating disorders, among others.

To ensure the SAAP's effectiveness and protect students' rights, the following guidelines govern the program:

*The academic or athletics status of the student will not be jeopardized by the student seeking assistance.

*The program must protect the privacy of the student by employing strict confidentiality measures. Any details of communication between students and Core Committee members or Athletics Department personnel may not be disclosed to any source without the prior written consent of the student-athlete.

*The decision to use the program must be voluntary.

*Unless the student-athlete consents otherwise, the person making a referral to a source of assistance at a student-athlete's request may disclose only the following information: how the student was referred to SAAP, and the reason for the referral.

The UNI-Dome, a unique, multi-purpose athletic facility built in 1976, has gained a reputation as one of the finest collegiate facilities in America. The Dome combines the features of a field house, football stadium and large auditorium. It contains accommodations for a variety of events, such as concerts, exhibitions, trade shows and convocations, in addition to football, basketball, softball, wrestling and track events. It has been host to the NCAA football play-offs, gymnastics and wrestling championships, high school football and basketball, the Iowa high school football playoffs, was the site of the 1997 NCAA national wrestling championships, and the past two years, was the site of the International Superstars Track and Field Invitational, featuring several world-class athletes.

The Dome's versatility allows for football and basketball games or track meets to be held the same day. Underneath the artificial football turf on a synthetic floor area are basketball and tennis courts and an eight-lane, 200-meter oval running track.

The turf was replaced nine years ago with a new AstroTurf manufactured by Balsam Corporation, the same material that lasted 16 years prior to the installation of the new. It's a premier surface which has been utilized by every Dome facility in North America with the exception of one and offers the best durability and playability of any material on the market. The former air-supported, teflon-coated fabric roof was replaced three years ago with a permanent structure.

Approximately 16,400 spectators can be seated for football games and track meets and, although normal capacity is 10,000 for basketball, seating can be expanded to over 20,000. For stage productions such as concerts, total capacity can reach 25,000.

The University, the community and the entire state of Iowa celebrated the UNI-Dome's 25th anniversary in 2001.



SHERIFF FIELD NAMED AFTER STAN SHERIFF

The UNI-Dome has been the home of the Panther football program since 1976, but the field itself was named Sheriff Football Field in the spring of 1993 in honor of UNI's former football coach and athletic director. Stan Sheriff was head football coach from 1960-82 and he also served as athletic director from 1970-83. From UNI, he went on to become athletic director at Hawaii, a position he held until dying of an apparent heart attack January 16, 1993, in Honolulu at the age of 60. Sheriff has been credited with the primary vision for the multi-purpose facility and has been given the most credit for getting the building constructed. At the time of his death, Fred Lewis, a staff columnist for The Honolulu Advertiser, wrote, "His (Sheriff's) diesel drive and far-reaching vision helped the (Hawaii) program scale milestone heights, all the while doing the near impossible in intercollegiate athletics today, operating inside the rules and in the black...Where others saw things as they had been or were, Sheriff was able to see them as they would be and plan accordingly...This was, after all, a man who in his previous job as athletic director at Northern Iowa sold the concept of a 16,800-seat, air-supported domed stadium to a disbelieving town." Former head football coach Terry Allen, who played for Sheriff, said, "Without what Stan Sheriff did, none of us at UNI would have what we have today."

The Human Performance Center

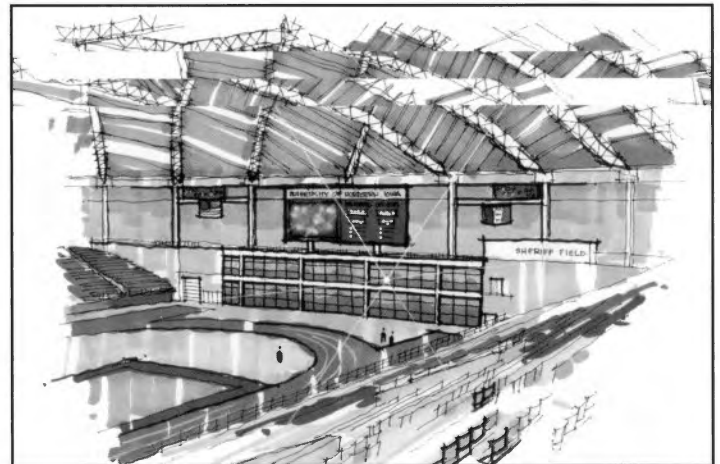
Quality field experiences and a strong training regimen are hallmarks of a UNI education. These standards and yet another exciting opportunity for community partnership lie at the heart of a new Human Performance Center being proposed as part of a facility adjoining both the north end of the UNI-Dome and the Wellness Recreation Center.

The vision includes a three-story, 50,000-square-foot facility which would include renovation of a portion of the current Physical Education Center locker rooms and construction of a glass wall to replace the north end of the UNI-Dome wall. Directly behind the wall will be a state-of-the-art weight room for athletes and improvements to the north end of the UNI-Dome will result in new space for entertaining Athletic Club members and other university supporters.

The first floor will include locker rooms, meeting rooms, storage space and coaches' offices. The second floor will house an athletic training center/human performance lab, operated in conjunction with the UNI Athletic Training Program, as well as offices for Cedar Valley Medical Specialists, a group of doctors specializing in orthopedic surgery and physical therapy. The third floor will house the headquarters for the National Program for Playground Safety and Camp Adventure.

The McLeod Center

It is impossible to imagine the UNI campus without the UNI-Dome. It began merely as a dream. Today, this facility stands as visible evidence of the dedication of alumni and friends who have helped build the facilities UNI students and programs deserve.

The new McCleodUSA Center will be a facility specifically built for the Panther volleyball, wrestling and basketball programs, will provide year-round training opportunities, will be located near the UNI-Dome and Wellness and Recreation Center to complete a state-of-the-art athletic and recreation complex, and will seat 5,000 to 6,000 to accommodate sports, concerts, exhibitions and other community events.

The Center will provide a focal point for students, faculty, staff, alumni and the community to come together to cheer the Panthers, will bolster the image of the university as a premier performance center, and will ensure continued success and growth of UNI's student-athlete tradition.

The Outdoor Track Complex

UNI's outdoor track complex was completed in time for the Panthers to host the 1998 Missouri Valley Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championships. The Panthers hosted that event once again this past spring.

Wellness/Recreation Center

This \$18.3 million facility, attached to the north side of the UNI-Dome, opened in the fall of 1997. It features the highest climbing wall in the Midwest, two pools, a running track, weight and fitness rooms, and basketball, volleyball and racquetball courts.

The West Gym

The West Gym currently is home to the Panthers' wrestling, women's volleyball and women's basketball teams until the McLeodUSA Center is constructed. The facility was remodeled three years ago with a new floor, locker rooms and lower bleacher seating.

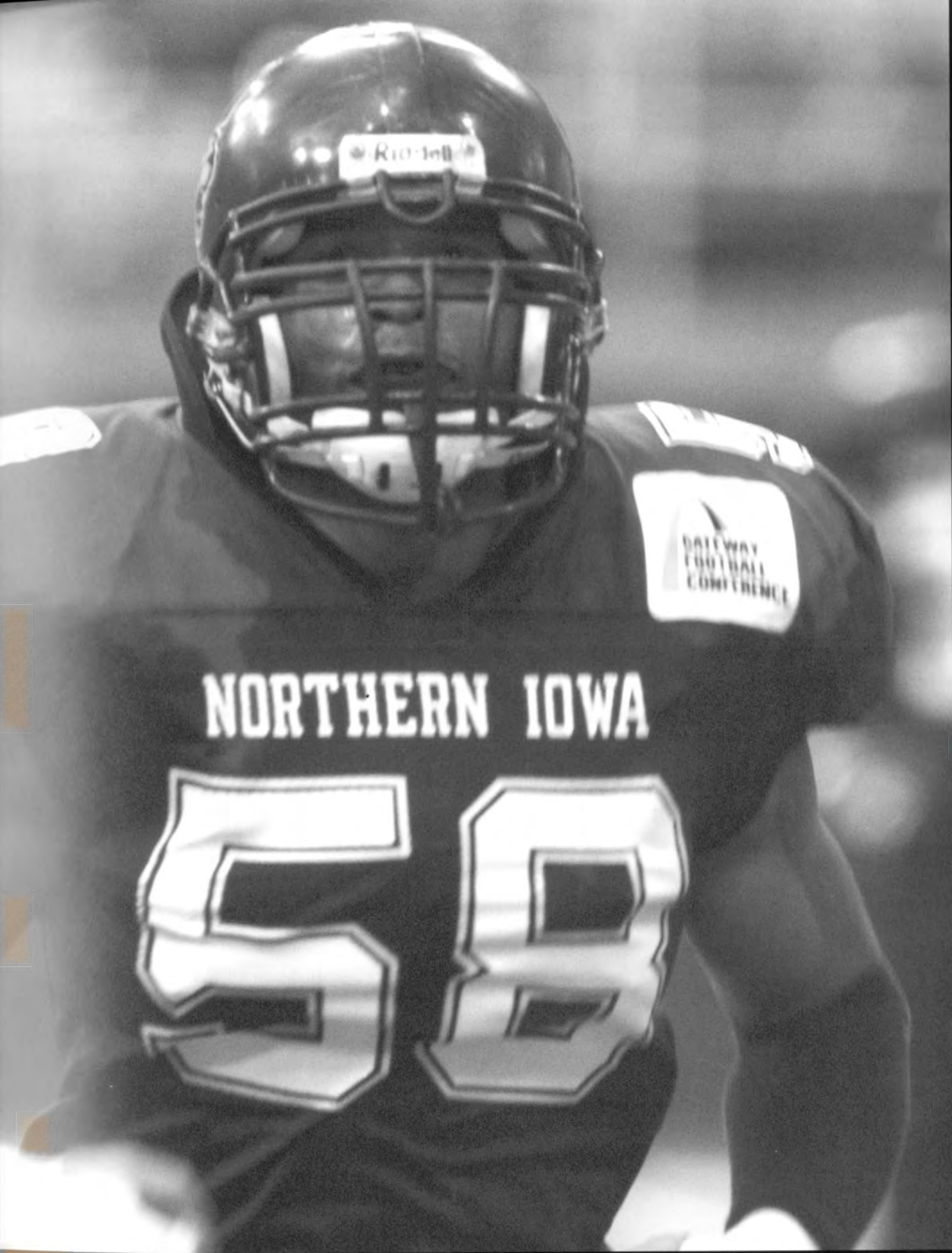

The University of Northern Iowa football team has run the gamut of emotions the past two years. In 2001, Head Coach Mark Farley's first season at the helm, the Panthers were one game short of playing for the national championship. Last year, after climbing as high as no. 4 in the polls, UNI finished with a disappointing tie for sixth place in the Gateway Football Conference. Middle ground, and low ground, never is acceptable in the Panther camp, only high ground. So what does 2003 have in store for the UNI faithful?

"We're going into this season inexperienced," Farley said. "There remain a lot of unknowns. We had areas that needed to be solidified during spring ball. We made improvements in some of those areas, while other positions are still up in the air and will require more work in the fall once all the incoming freshmen and the rest of the transfers arrive on campus."

Areas of emphasis during spring drills included the offensive line and special teams. Only one starter returns in the line – senior tackle Ben Deike. All-American kicker Mackenzie Hoambrecker, who signed a free agent contract with the San Diego Chargers, and record-breaking punter Derrick Frost, who signed a free agency with the Philadelphia Eagles, both are gone. The wide receiver corps is thin in experience, including at tight end, and only one experienced quarterback will take the field. There are capable runners coming out of the backfield, but the fullback position is very up in the air. On the other side of the ball, two starters return in the line, all three starting linebackers return, and two starters in the secondary should retain their positions.

The Panthers return 31 of 57 lettermen, including the 10 starters. Those starters include defensive ends Ryan Arnold and Matt Mitchell, Deike, linebackers Jonathan Harrell, Titus Ivory and Casey Tierney, wide receiver Marlus Mays, quarterback Tom Petrie, and defensive backs Justin Sandy and Benny Sapp. There are no super stars in this list – none of the hugely recognizable names that has been the case in the past. Yet, the coaches remain optimistic the team can be successful with the talent in camp.

"We have a lot of depth in certain positions with capable players," Farley said. "Because there are no super stars by name, the strength of this team will be that the players are going to have to count on each other. We see it as a very positive position to be in.

"We feel very good about the potential of this year's starting lineup. There are a number of players that have taken upon themselves to reach the level of ability that is expected of them," Farley added.

Farley also is much more comfortable in this, his third year calling the shots. He believes this is the year much of his system will be in place after phasing out the previous staff's game plans, and the personnel is beginning to fit the system. The game plan may not look that much different to the fan sitting in the stands, but it is more in place in the huddle.

With all this inexperience and the unknowns, this isn't the year to be playing only five home games, but that's the deck the Panthers have been dealt.

"We're a road team this year," Farley said. "We need to take care of our home field when we have the opportunity, and we're going to have to take our team on the road and win at some very tough places. It takes a team to win on the road, and that again plays to the fact we have no real super stars at this time. We have good senior leadership and youth with potential talent. That combination needs to depend on the others to be successful on the road."

The Panthers open the season Aug. 30 at 1-A Iowa State, and have to play at 1-AA non-conference power Stephen F. Austin and host Northwestern State. Road league games will be very challenging at Illinois State, Southwest Missouri State and 2002 playoff teams Western Illinois and Western Kentucky, the defending national champion.

Quarterbacks

Unlike last year when there was a tight battle at quarterback heading into fall camp, there's no question who will be taking the first snap Aug. 30 in the season opener at Iowa State. Junior Tom Petrie is the only candidate with collegiate game experience and basically can be considered a two-year starter. He led the Panthers to a 6-2 mark in 2001 before ceding the role to Griff Jurgens because of a shoulder injury. Last year, he took over from Jurgens to start the final six games. He redshirted in 2000, so in reality, he's had three years on the turf.

Petrie has completed 215-of-419 passes (.513) for 2,693 yards and 18 TDs over the past two campaigns. He was named the league's Freshman of the Year. He also can be a factor holding the ball and was UNI's second-leading rusher last year due to injuries, gaining 322 yards.

"Tom Petrie is our quarterback," Farley said. "As a junior, this is the season we expect him to become a top level 1-AA quarterback. Behind Tom, there will be quality competition with two redshirt freshmen and three incoming freshmen competing for the backup job."

Nebraska transfer, sophomore Aaron Boettcher, wrapped up the spring as Petrie's top understudy. Redshirt freshman Grant Zielinski is listed no. 3 heading into the fall. Redshirt freshman Joe Ryan played baseball in the spring. Four incoming freshmen will have a chance to compete – Brady Foster of Mason City (IA) High School, Chris Parson of Moore, OK, High School; Eric Sanders of Oelwein (IA) High School and Chris Grooms of Dike-New Hartford High School. All four earned first team all-state honors within their respective classes.



Offensive Line

The offensive line was thought to be a strength of last year's team heading into the season. One veteran of the segment – all-American tackle Chad Setterstrom – signed a free agent contract with the New Orleans Saints. A lot has changed in a year with just one returning starter – senior tackle Ben Deike, a two-year starter and the leader of this important group.

Sophomore John Schabillon has been tagged the starter at center heading into the fall. After redshirting in 2001, he saw very limited action last season. Two-year letterwinner Walter Kelly so far has earned the starting job at the other tackle spot. Senior Ross Bohner is listed at left guard heading in the fall, while sophomore Jeff Bates is tagged at right guard.

Also competing for the starting role is Iowa Central Community College transfer Luke Stigler, along with redshirt freshmen Tyler Rawlins and Kyle Newlin, and juniors Doug Wilkinson and Joe Keller. There are several potential linemen who will appear on campus for the start of pre-season drills in August.

"Ben took on the role of leading this young group through spring drills," Farley said. "We made great progress throughout the winter and spring in terms of body strength. It's a group made up of sophomores becoming juniors, and this is where we hope to make the largest gains. We're also very pleased with Luke Stigler's, Tyler Rawlins' and James Moyer's progress."

Wide Receivers

First team all-conference choice Marlus Mays led the Panthers as a junior with 54 catches for 992 yards and five TDs. He's the only returning starter.

"Marlus had a great off-season," Farley said. "He's done everything we hoped for from a leadership standpoint. I expect him to have a special season. Eddie Galles, Justin Surrency and Bryan Butler are the guys I think will take the next step in their ability because they all have a year of experience."

Mays finished the season with five games of more than 100 yards receiving and ranked second in the league and 40th in 1-AA in receptions per game and was first in the Gateway and 19th in 1-AA in receiving yards per game. He

caught a career-high 13 passes for 219 yards, including an 80-yard TD reception, against Western Illinois.

Galles was the fourth-leading receiver in 2002, catching 18 passes for 217 yards and two TDs in six starts. Surrency played in nine games, catching five passes for 54 yards.

Graduating are the team's second- and third-leading receivers from last year in Ben Sanderson and tight end Ryan Walter, both of whom started all 11 games. Sanderson caught 33 passes for 411 yards and three TDs, while Walter made 22 catches for 223 yards, scoring once.

With Walter's graduation, tight end is another inexperienced slot. Sophomore Brian Cutright played in 10 games last year, catching four passes for 24 yards. Backing him up coming out of spring drills is Iowa transfer Andy Thorn, followed by juniors Beau Gibbs and Lee Reynolds. Thorn saw limited action with the Hawks in 2002 and played in four games in 2001 after redshirting the 2000 season. Reynolds played in eight games a year ago, catching just one pass for 16 yards.

The challenge during the spring was to develop the position and to determine how much of a factor the tight end would be in the Panther offense. According to Farley, the addition of Thorn and Gibbs has aided in that process.

Running Backs

The Panthers were expected to be deep and affective in their ground game a year ago with the return of their top six rushers, including Adam Bengé and Richard Carter. The two combined for 2,340 yards and 24 TDs in 2001. But Carter went down to a season-ending ankle injury in the second game last year, gaining just 75 yards. Bengé carried the load virtually by himself, compiling 1,133 yards and six scores, while quarterback Petrie ended up as the second-leading rusher with 322 yards.

Bengé has graduated. Carter returned to spring ball almost 100 percent healed. Also returning is sophomore Jason Breeland who carried the ball 24 times for 122 yards and one score and junior Jim Lizzi, who finished with 140 yards and one score on 31 carries.

The addition of sophomore North Dakota State School of Science transfer Terrance Freaney once again should give the Panthers a one-two punch coming out of the backfield. Freaney sat out last season to work on academics, but he was a first team all-region pick in 2001 after running for 1,429 yards. At Cedar Falls High School, he set the state's all-time career rushing record of

6,545 yards, a mark that was broken again this past season.

"We feel very comfortable at running back with Richard Carter returning and feel fortunate that he has been reinstated as a junior," Farley said. "We have Jason Breeland who has great speed and Jim Lizzi coming back from last year. The addition of Terrance Freeney solidifies this group with talent as well as depth."

What remains unsolved heading into the fall is the fullback position.

Two-year starter Mark Moothart now is a graduate assistant coach with

the Panthers.

"We need to continue to work on our style of offense based on our personnel, so fullback remains a question mark," Farley explained.

Defensive Line

UNI's defensive line will be a mixture of experience and relatively new faces. The dean of the line is senior end Matt Mitchell. The three-year starter finished 2002 as the team's fifth-leading tackler and tops in sacks and tackles for loss with 69 total stops, including 48 solos. He recorded eight sacks for 38 yards and nine tackles for 31 yards while also recovering two fumbles, breaking up three passes and getting one interception. He was a second team all-conference choice.

His bookend is junior Ryan Arnold who started seven of nine games played. Slowed by an early-season ankle injury, he recorded 18 tackles, including 11 solos.

Mitchell and Arnold will be backed up by sophomore John Hermann and redshirt freshman Joe Lobdell, respectively. Hermann saw limited action last season after redshirting in 2001.

The interior of the line lost veterans Terrell Morgan and Robert Hamre. Morgan was the team's seventh-leading tackler a year ago with 42 stops, including 29 solos, three sacks and two tackles for loss. Hamre made 40 tackles, including 31 solos. Stepping in to fill those shoes are junior Justin Heins and sophomore Kevin Stensrud. Both have been plagued by injuries in their young careers. Heins started just one of five games last year, while Stensrud started three of six games.

"Justin Heins and Kevin Stensrud are two gutsy players that can be very productive and they have shown to be just that on the field," Farley said. "Depth is what we need to continue to develop in Joe Lobdell and Nate Wirth. Joe had a very good off-season. We've lost some size in the line, which could be a concern. But we believe we are more athletic than the past two seasons."

Linebackers

Perhaps the most experienced segment of the entire team is linebacker where all three starters return, and they will be backed up by at least two players with previous time on the field.

Seniors Jonathan Harrell and Casey Tierney and junior Titus Ivory are the veterans. Harrell, a second team all-conference and All-Newcomer team selection, returns as the squad's second-leading tackler after recording 120 stops, including 68 solos, two sacks and seven tackles for loss. He forced one fumble and recovered three. Tierney was the third-leading tackler with 86, including 53 solos and four tackles for loss in nine games played, while Ivory made 63 tackles, 37 solos, five tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one recovery and two deflections.

Also seeing playing time are sophomores Justin Overman and Jordan Dreyer. Overman started four of seven games, recording 38 tackles, 22 solos, while Dreyer started the last game of the year and played eight total. He finished with 10 tackles. Overman is listed as back up to Harrell heading into the fall and Dreyer is listed behind Tierney. Redshirt freshman Andrew Williams should see action behind Ivory.

Also vying for playing time are sophomores Darin Heideman and Derc Albrecht, senior Gordon Szymanski and redshirt freshman Ross Hannam.

"We gained size at linebacker," Farley said. "We have the ability to be very good here. Casey could be as good a linebacker as any that we have had these past two years. This could be a breakout year for him. I have a lot of confidence in Overman and Dreyer. Harrell moved to inside linebacker during last season and became our leading tackler after the move. Between he and Casey, we should have a great combination of inside play. I'm also anxious to see how Ross Hannam can continue to progress for us."

Joining the team in the fall will be Iowa Central Community College transfer Danny Triplett, a 2002 first team all-region choice.

Defensive Backs

Two starters also return in the secondary in seniors, free safety Justin Sandy and right corner Benny Sapp. Sandy started all but one game a year ago and finished as the fourth-leading tackler with 82 total stops, 54 solos. He

also had 10 deflections, second only to Sapp's 11 breakups. Sapp recorded 39 tackles in 10 starts after transferring from Iowa. Both players had a team-high four interceptions apiece. Sandy was named second team all-conference, while Sapp was an All-Newcomer selection.

Missing is strong safety Jarvis Phillips, the team's leading tackler with 129 stops, 57 solos, three forced fumbles, six deflections and one interception, and corner Justin Jansen, who started nine games. Plagued by injuries, Jansen has elected not to return to football. He recorded 40 stops, two deflections and two interceptions.

Filling the slots are redshirt freshman Curtis Cooper at left corner and junior Tyler Johnson at strong safety. Johnson played in all 11 games last season, recording 13 tackles, one deflection and one interception. Backing up Cooper heading into the fall is junior Raishaun Henderson, who saw action primarily on special teams last year, while Johnson's immediate understudy is senior Jimmie Brown, who made 15 tackles as a Highland Community College transfer.

Redshirt freshman Matt Tharp was shifted to free safety from wide receiver in the spring and is listed behind Sandy, while redshirt freshman Alphonso Key is backing up Sapp. Also vying for position is junior Tom Berlin and redshirt freshman Ryan Manahl. Joining the team in the fall is Iowa Central Community College transfer James Idleburgh.

"Sandy and Sapp have been very good leaders for us throughout the off season," Farley said. "We are fortunate to have these quality players. We need Curtis and Alphonso to continue their progress as young players – their spring was very important for them. I think Tyler made a huge impression on everyone in the off season in terms of weight room and testing times. He and Raishaun were impact players for us this spring."

Special Teams

The Panthers took a huge hit on special teams with the loss of both Hoambrecker and Frost, and return specialist Ben Sanderson. Hoambrecker scored 93 points last season on 25-of-28 field goals, with a long of 59, and 18-of-19 extra points. Frost averaged 43.6 yards punting. Sanderson averaged 22.8 yards on 22 kick returns and 10.5 yards on 40 punt returns.

A lot of experimentation was gone through in the spring and no spots are totally locked up heading into the fall. Junior punter and kicker Cory Henke will get competition from incoming freshman Brian Wingert in the kicking area. The other punter in spring camp was freshman Adam Kos.

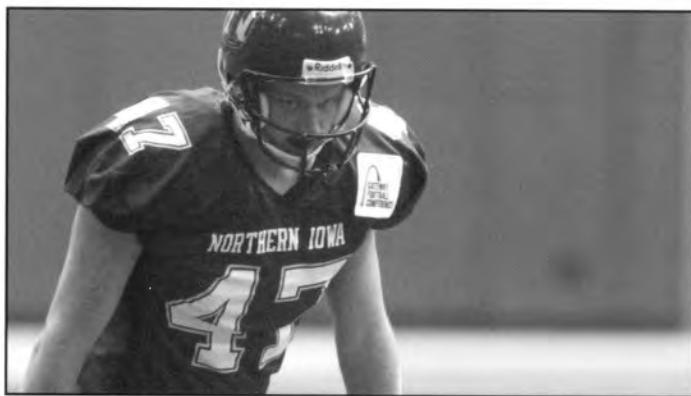
Justin Surrency, Benny Sapp, Marlus Mays, Richard Carter and Jason Breeland all could see time returning punts or kicks.

Also gone is snapper Nick Matsen and possibilities here are offensive lineman Ben Deike and defensive lineman Kevin Stensrud.

"Special teams was a huge area of concern for us in the spring," said Farley. "We experimented with some players. Cory's spring was very important to him. I feel confident in his punting ability but his battle with Brian Wingert will continue into the fall. We also will look to our freshman class to add to a specialist group."

Home Sweet Dome: UNI was 3-3 at home in the UNI-Dome last season, just avoiding its first losing season in the building since 1988, when it was 2-3. It now has just a one-game win streak at home after defeating Southwest Missouri State 25-24 in last year's final game. The Panthers have gone undefeated at home in a season six times since 1990.

The Panthers had a 25-game overall home winning streak heading into the 1992 1-AA semifinal game against Youngstown State. The Penguins snapped the streak with their 19-7 win on December 12.

Prior to a September 24, 1994, loss to McNeese State, UNI had won 29 straight regular-season games in the Dome dating back to the 1989 season when it lost 22-14 to Mankato State in the first game of the year.

UNI is 133-34-1 (.795) in the UNI-Dome. Prior to 1998, the Panthers had two consecutive undefeated seasons in the Dome and were 6-0 in 2001. They were 3-0 at home in Gateway Conference play in 2001 and 1-3 last season. They now are 43-10 in home Gateway games, leading the league in home conference victories.

Tough Schedule: UNI's 2003 non-conference schedule has been rated the 14th toughest in 1-AA by Tony Moss, The Sports Network's Executive Director of 1-AA Football. "The Panthers open on the road against the (Iowa State) Cyclones, and also face two strong Southland opponents (Stephen F. Austin, Northwestern State)," he said.

Still the State's Top Team: UNI has been the top Division I program in the state of Iowa since 1985, compiling a 163-64-1 record (.717) since helping to found the Gateway Conference football division. UNI's 2001 11-3 record marked the 13th straight season it had won at least seven games, while last year's 5-6 mark represented the first losing season since 1988. Prior to last season, that stretch had seen the Panthers compile an impressive 115-44 record. Against Gateway opponents, the Panthers are 80-28-0 (.741), leading the league in wins.

One of last season's losses came to 1-A Oklahoma State. One victory was against 17th-ranked Youngstown State.

The Panthers finished the decade of the '90s as the fourth-winningest 1-AA program, with 89 wins, and they are 23-13 over the past three campaigns.

Title Race: The Panthers placed second in the Gateway Conference in 1997, breaking a string of seven straight shared or outright titles, tied for third in 1998, nailed down third place again in '99, placed fourth in 2000, won the title in 2001 and tied for sixth last season, their lowest finish ever. In all, UNI has won or shared the conference title 10 times in the league's 18 seasons.

OT No Way: UNI is 2-4 in overtime games. The Panthers are 1-1 at home in OT. Two of those extra period games were during the 1-AA playoffs, and the Panthers lost both of them – 27-21 at Boston University in 1993, and 44-41 at Northeast Louisiana in 1987. UNI defeated Cal Poly 29-26 in three OTs last season.

Halftime Lead Speaks for Itself: UNI's double overtime loss to Western Illinois in 1997 and the 20-17 loss in overtime to McNeese State in 1998 were the only times in the decade of the '90s when the Panthers surrendered a halftime lead (UNI led 9-0 at WIU and 7-0 against MSU). Prior to that, UNI had a 53-0 regular-season record when leading at the half.

UNI led third-ranked Youngstown State on the road 17-14 at the half in 2000, but went on to fall 28-24 in the last 1:17 of the game. The Panthers were 8-0 in 2001 when leading at the half and 4-2 last year.

Cutting it Close: In the history of the Gateway, UNI has more one-point wins (eight) in league games than any other league member. UNI is 8-3 in league one-point games. When the Panthers defeated Western Kentucky 24-23 in 2001 for the league championship, it marked just the second time in conference history in which there were two one-point decisions on the same day. In all, there have been 28 games decided by one point.

Poll Talk: The Panthers dropped out of the Sports Network Top 25 poll for the first time in 1998 the week of October 10. They remained unranked in the Top 25 polls until being ranked 25th at the end of the regular season by both the Sports Network and ESPN/USA Today after winning five straight games to finish the season. The Panthers had been ranked in a Division 1AA poll, either the NCAA's or the Sports Network poll, since September 24, 1990, a string of 96 consecutive polls, the longest streak in the nation, until dropping out of the ESPN/USA Today poll the week of November 3, 1997.

Bring 'Em On: UNI is 104-72-3 (.589) against 2003 opponents. The only teams on this year's schedule where UNI has a losing record against is 1-A Iowa State and Division II Northern Michigan. The Cyclones lead the series 15-3-3, while NMU leads the series 12-5.

Early Consideration: Several Panthers should be considered as all-America candidates, including senior linebacker Jonathan Harrell, wide receiver Marlus Mays and tailback Richard Carter.

Returning Conference Honorees: Eleven different players were named to 2002 all-conference teams, including three first-teamers. Returning all-conference players include first-teamer, wide receiver Marlus Mays; second-teamers include senior defensive end Matt Mitchell, senior linebacker Jonathan Harrell and senior free safety Justin Sandy. Harrell also was named to the league's All-Newcomer team, as was returning senior corner Benny Sapp.

Keep an Eye On: Preseason all-conference candidates should include tailback Richard Carter, offensive tackle Ben Deike, linebackers Jonathan Harrell and Titus Ivory, receiver Marlus Mays, defensive end Matt Mitchell, quarterback Tom Petrie, free safety Justin Sandy, corner Benny Sapp, and linebacker Casey Tierney.

Record Breakers: The Panthers set or tied several school records in 2002, including Adam Bengé's 1,133 rushing yards in a season, Mackenzie Hoambrecker's 59-yard field goal versus Southwest Missouri State (also a UNI-Dome record), his six field goals attempted against Cal Poly, while his five made goals versus Cal Poly and Youngstown State tied a school record (also tied a Gateway record). Derrick Frost's 52-yard punting average against Western Kentucky and his 43.6 season average were school marks, and Marlus Mays set a UNI-Dome record with his three reception TDs against Wayne State.

Weekly Honors: UNI had Gateway Players of the Week selected seven times in 2002, four times by Don Hansen's National Football Gazette, in addition to Mackenzie Hoambrecker being selected The Sports Network National 1-AA Special Teams Player of the Week and a 1-AA.org.College Sporting News 1-AA All-Star once.

NFL Bound: The Panthers have the two highest NFL picks in the Gateway, with center Brad Meester topping out in 2000 in the second round as the 60th pick overall. James Jones was the 57th pick overall in 1991, but in the third round, while wide receiver Dedric Ward was selected in the third round in 1997 as the 88th pick. Ty Talton was picked 137th, in the fifth round, in 1999. The Panthers had five active players in the NFL heading into the 2003 season at press time – wide receiver Eddie Berlin with the Titans, Meester with the Jaguars, Kurt Warner with the Rams, tight end Ryan Hannam with the Seahawks, and wide receiver Jake Soliday with the Cardinals.

Three players signed as free agents this spring – kicker Mackenzie Hoambrecker with the San Diego Chargers, punter Derrick Frost with the Philadelphia Eagles, and offensive lineman Chad Setterstrom with the New Orleans Saints.

Playing the Big Boys: UNI plays 1-A Iowa State August 30th, the 22nd meeting between these two schools. The Cyclones defeated UNI 45-0 in 2001 and 42-23 in 1996 after the Panthers had won two straight, the last time in 1994.



Knowing UNI Football

The Panthers have had some success against teams designated 1-A. They are 1-0 against Ball State (2001), 0-1 against Boise State (2000), 0-1 against Bowling Green State (1947), 0-4 against Central Michigan (last game in 1970), 0-1-1 against Colorado State (last game 1926), 4-5 against Eastern Michigan (last game 1998), 1-13 against Iowa (last game 1997), 3-15-3 against ISU (45-0 2001), 3-0 against Kansas State (last 1989), 0-1 against Minnesota (1987), 0-1 versus UNLV (1975), 2-1 versus Northern Illinois (last 1964), 1-0 against Ohio University (36-21 in '99), 0-2 against Oklahoma State (2002), 0-1 against Pittsburgh (1988), 4-11-2 against Western Michigan (last 1949) and 0-1 against Wyoming (1993).

Most of the success has come in the last 16 years, with an 8-11 mark against 1A teams since 1985.

The Gateway Conference has 23 1-A wins since 1985, and the league was 1-7 against 1-As last year.

Hot Out of the Shoot: UNI is 53-44-7 in season openers and 10-3 in the last 13 years. UNI defeated Division II Wayne State (MI) 34-0 in last year's season opener, its fifth straight victory to start the season. The Panthers open up at Iowa State this year on Aug. 30th.

Nationally Ranked: The Panthers ended the 2002 season ranked in the top 50 nationally in 1-AA in 10 individual categories. Adam Bengé was ranked 16th in the nation in rushing, Marlus Mays was 40th in receptions per game and 19th in receiving yards per game, Jarvis Phillips was 10th and Jonathan Harrell 21st in tackles, Ben Sanderson was 34th in all-purpose running, 33rd in punt return average and 45th in kick return average; Derrick Frost was seventh in punting, and Mackenzie Hoambrecker was 11th in scoring and first in field goals.

As a team, the Panthers were 46th in rushing offense, 14th in punting and 34th in punt returns.

Honoring Within: Team awards handed out at the annual banquet included placekicker Mackenzie Hoambrecker being named the team's MVP. Special teams MVP honors went to Ben Sanderson, while the Stan Sheriff Award, given to the player by the coaches who is the most inspirational, went to fullback Mark Moothart.

Turf vs. Grass: Over the past 12 years, UNI is 15-15 on natural grass, including 0-4 in 1997, 0-1 in 1998, 2-1 in 1999, 1-0 in 2000, 4-1 in 2001 and 1-0 last year after defeating Cal Poly. It is 26-16 on artificial surfaces on the road. Only two of this year's games will be played on natural surfaces – at Iowa State and at Western Illinois.

Staff Changes: D.J. Vokolek was named UNI's assistant head coach and in charge of the linebackers this spring. Secondary coach Rob Bolks was named recruiting coordinator with the departure of assistant Todd Eagen, Bill Inge was moved to the defensive line after coaching the linebackers last year, Ron Landphair was put in charge of the running backs after assisting with the defensive backs a year ago, while former fullback Mark Moothart was put in charge of the tight ends in his graduate assistant role.

Senior Good-byes: UNI said goodbye to 18 seniors at the end of the 2002 season, including tailback Adam Bengé, guard Brodie Brelsford, receiver DeMarus Davis, punter Derrick Frost, defensive tackle Robert Hamre, kicker Mackenzie Hoambrecker, guard Kris Jongejugd, quarterback Griff Jurgens, corner Moses Joseph, snapper Nick Matsen, fullback Mark Moothart, defensive tackle Terrell Morgan, center Ryan Ozburn, wide receiver Brad Richtsmeier, wide receiver Ben Sanderson, offensive tackle Chad Setterstrom, defensive tackle Zach Stien, and tight end Ryan Walter.

Streaking: The Panthers hold the league record for consecutive Gateway wins at 13, accomplished from 1993-95.

Driving the Ball: UNI's offense generally has been big on third downs, while its defense also has been up to the task. The Panthers converted nearly 43 percent (89-208) of its third downs in 2001, while the opponents were 78-of-194 for 40.2

percent. UNI completed 50 or more percent of its third down conversions four times in 2002, against Ball State, Southwest Missouri State, Western Kentucky and Maine. Here is a breakdown of conversions on third down in 2002:

UNI Players Cited Often: Eastern Kentucky has been represented a total of 22 times by 20 players on the AFCA (American Football Coaches Assoc.) Division 1-AA Coaches' All-America Team since 1979. The Colonels are followed by Appalachian State (14/10), Georgia Southern (14/11), Delaware (13/10), Grambling (12/11), UNI (12/9), Jackson State (11/10), and Holy Cross (10/9), among current 1-AA schools.

The Southern Conference is tops among all 1-AA conferences with 82 appearances by 71 players on the same all-America teams. Following the Southern are the Atlantic 10 (81/73), Gateway (52/49), Ohio Valley (48/45), Southland (47/43), Big Sky (45/46), Southwestern Athletic (37/35), Patriot (31/30), Mid-Eastern Athletic (22/22), Ivy League (18/18), Pioneer (8/8) and Metro Atlantic Athletic (2/1).

Good Starts: Of current Gateway teams, a league team has started conference play 4-0 19 times, including UNI in 2001. All finished second or better in the league standings. Sixteen of the 18 teams earned playoff berths, with 13 winning the GFC title. UNI started 5-0 in 1985, 6-0 in 1987 and '94, 5-0 in 1995 and '96, and 4-0 in 2001, and won the league crown each time.

Young Blood: Redshirt freshman quarterback Tom Petrie became UNI's first freshman to start at quarterback in 2001 dating back to at least 1949. He led UNI to a 6-2 record before ceding the starting role to junior Griff Jurgens due to shoulder injuries. He started the last six games last year and went 2-4.

Petrie was named one of eight finalists for 1-AA Freshman of the Year by Dopke.com, joining Portland State running back Ryan Fuqua, Alcorn State quarterback Donald Carrie, Sacramento State quarterback Ryan Leadingham, Southeast Missouri State quarterback Jeremy McDowell, Eastern Kentucky running back C.J. Hudson, Sacramento State receiver Fre Amey, and Delaware defensive specialist Sid Haugabrook. He also was named the Gateway Conference's Freshman of the Year.

On the Tube: When UNI defeated 17th-ranked Youngstown State 22-7 last season, it represented the Panthers' third straight win on Gateway television. They now are 3-2 overall when shown on the conference package. YSU had been undefeated in seven games on Gateway TV.

UNI Versus the Top 25: The Panthers own a 41-25 record over teams ranked in the 1-AA Top 25 since 1985. UNI defeated 17th-ranked Youngstown State 22-7 and lost to no. 8 Western Illinois 35-12 last season.

Scoring Against OSU: When UNI drove 44 yards in eight plays on its first possession against Oklahoma State last year, culminating in a five-yard TD run by Adam Bengé, it was the first score against the Cowboys by a 1-AA team in three contests.

Non-Conference Success: The Panthers won their fourth non-conference game of the 2002 season at Cal Poly. UNI is the only original Gateway member to win at least two non-conference games each year. The Panthers now are 83-37 against non-conference teams since 1985.



On The Map UNI senior offensive tackle Chad Setterstrom was the featured 1-AA player in USA Today last August.

Gateway Openers: UNI now is 12-6 in Gateway Football Conference openers.

GFC Ranked vs. Ranked: There have been 42 times in which two Gateway teams ranked in the top 25 played one another. The home team is 24-18, while the higher-ranked team is 23-19. Eight times the meeting involved teams that were both ranked in the Top 10.

UNI has played in five of those games when the two teams have been ranked in the Top 10, and has a 3-2 record in such contests. The third-ranked Panthers defeated fifth-ranked Southwest Missouri State in the Dome in 1996, 38-31; no. 3 UNI defeated no. 8 Western Illinois 30-6 at home in 1996, no. 10 Illinois State defeated third-ranked UNI 47-28 in Normal, IL, in 1999, no. 9 Youngstown State defeated no.

6 UNI 29-20 in Cedar Falls in 1999 and 14th-ranked UNI defeated 12th-ranked WIU 17-14 in Macomb, IL, in 2001.

Playin' the Best: All eight Gateway schools ranked in the top 32 of the toughest schedules at the 1-AA level. UNI's 2002 schedule ranked as the 29th toughest slate

Movin' Up the Ladder: Senior tailback Adam Bengé finished his career as the league's eighth all-time leading rusher with 3,406 yards. Senior placekicker Mackenzie Hoambrecker finished his career with two of the conference's longest field goals, including his league-leading 59-yarder booted in the final game against Southwest Missouri State.

MARK FARLEY

**Head Football Coach
(UNI '86)**

Mark Farley is entering his third season as head coach of the UNI Panthers and has never felt more at home. Once known as the "walk on from Waukon" when he wore a Panther football uniform, Farley returned to his alma mater as its head football coach when he was announced as Mike Dunbar's replacement in a Press Conference held April 3, 2001.

"This is home to me," he said.

"Through football, I've been presented with great opportunities in my life and this is by far the best experience. I am so excited for this opportunity."

In his first season, Farley led the Panthers back to the 1-AA elite. UNI finished 11-3 overall in 2001, placed first in the Gateway Football Conference with a 6-1 mark, and advanced to the 1-AA national semifinals for the fifth time in school history. It was the Panthers' first conference title and playoff appearance since 1996.

During the season, UNI defeated five ranked 1-AA opponents and 1-A opponent Ball State, which went on to defeat Motor City Bowl-bound Toledo later in the year. The Panthers finished the season ranked fourth in both The Sports Network and ESPN/USA Today final 1-AA polls.

The conference and the nation took notice. Farley was named the league's Bruce Craddock Coach of the Year and American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region 4 Coach of the Year. He placed third in the Eddie Robinson Award balloting, an honor given to the top 1-AA coach by The Sports Network. He received 16 first-place votes, the most of any candidate. He sits atop the Gateway Conference with the best record of all rookie coaches. Last year's 5-6 season did not live up to pre-season expectations following the success of 2001. Injuries, graduation and inexperience on the defense took a toll.

"We had too many interceptions, too many fumbles, and with the inexperience of the defense, we couldn't close games," Farley said. "The total focus (during the off-season) was on what we needed to do for this year in recruiting. We needed to strengthen our weaknesses. We're working toward a balance. (The first year), we lost too much on defense. This year, the offense and special teams take a hit."

Farley grew up not far from Cedar Falls, IA, and the UNI-Dome, in a small community called Waukon. He was a three-sport standout at Waukon High School. He played quarterback his junior year and tailback his senior year, while at the same time playing strong safety. He was a forward on the basketball team (all-conference two years) and a pitcher and short stop for the baseball team (all-conference three years). Despite his success, he wasn't highly recruited and he took a year off before pursuing his college degree.

His job as a truck driver brought him through Cedar Falls each Monday, when he'd drop in to check out the Panther football team. In the fall of 1982, he walked on to the team, redshirting that first season. He received the Special Team Award his second year, then became a starting inside linebacker three years. He earned honorable mention all-American honors twice, was named Gateway Conference co-Defensive Player of the Year, was selected as a team co-captain, and was named a two-time academic all-American. He led the team in tackles three consecutive years.

During Farley's three years as a starter, UNI compiled a 27-7-1 record and advanced to the 1985 1-AA semifinals.

"When I came in (to the UNI-Dome), I wanted to play," Farley said, "and I went to school and I found out how important school is in the area of academics. When I came up (for his interview), I wanted to stop back (at the Dome). I came to the doors and I stood on that balcony on the concourse and I just wanted to get that

energy from the Dome, because there's still something about this place. When I looked at the banners and remembered the players that were here, we can be proud of this university in football."

Farley went straight from a player to a graduate assistant for two years under Coach Darrell Mudra and then was elevated to a full-time assistant. Between 1987-96, he was the position coach for such former UNI greats as Bryce Paup, James Jones, William Freeney and Andre Allen. Paup and Jones went on to play in the NFL, of course, while Allen and Freeney played in the Arena League and CFL. Four times Farley's players were named league Defensive Players of the Year.

In total, he coached five UNI all-Americans and 22 all-conference selections the first time around. He also was the staff's punt return specialist. That segment had a NCAA average ranking of sixth from 1989-1993, with two second-place statistical rankings. He also served as the team's Strength and Speed Coordinator as he was a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and a Certified Level 1 Coach of the U.S. Weightlifting Federation. He designed and coordinated the reconstruction of UNI's strength facility and implemented individualized computer weight training programs.

With the success of individual players, the Panther program grew into a national power under Mudra and then, Terry Allen. UNI won seven consecutive Gateway titles, made seven straight 1-AA playoff appearances between 1990-96, eight total, including advancing to two semi-final games. The Dome was packed with several sellouts.

In an interview following Farley's hiring, Mudra, a former head coach at Florida State, now retired and living in Florida, said, "I had three helpers who went on to become NFL head coaches. Farley is as good as any coaching prospect I worked with. I just feel like (UNI) couldn't have hired a better guy. He's a perfect fit for that situation. I think he's bright - real bright. Probably the most important thing is, he's really involved in football. If you cut his head open, nothing would come out but footballs. He's real intense."

Jones, a 1991 NFL third-round pick by the Cleveland Browns, said of Farley in a post-hire interview, "He makes athletes get the most out of themselves. One thing all of us under him did was work hard. That's the way he coached it, and that's what he expected out of you. He was just one of those coaches you just wanted to go out there and play your hardest for. He'll probably still have (that) energy when he's 65. That's just Coach Farley."

When Terry Allen left the Panthers in 1997 to become head coach at the University of Kansas, Farley was one of UNI's assistants to follow. Farley was the Jayhawks' inside and outside linebackers coach. In Lawrence, he coached two all-

Big 12 players, one all-American and five Players of the Week. He produced the KU all-time sack leader for season and career and recruited the 1999 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year. He was rated as one of the top recruiters in the Midwest by MoKan Recruiting Service. He also assisted with the punt return and block specialists. His players blocked or returned a punt for a touchdown against 11 of the league teams at least once.

UNI assistant Rob Bolks coached Farley as a prep and rejoined him on KU's staff.

"In my opinion, (Farley) was the best recruiter we had at Kansas," he said in an interview prior to being re-hired at UNI. "In a way, he was like a bulldog, he did such a thorough job recruiting kids."

At the press conference announcing Farley's appointment, UNI Director of Athletics Rick Hartzell, himself a UNI alum, said, "It took me about an hour to find out what all of you knew a long time ago. Before it was over, we both had tears in our eyes about what (UNI) means to us. There are a whole lot of Panthers out there in the world that are really proud today."

Having worked under, or played for, three of the best football minds in Mudra, Earle Bruce and Allen, there's little doubt Farley knows football. But it's also his passion, not only for the game, but for the University of Northern Iowa, that after just one season already carried the Panthers back to the glory days and the 1-AA playoffs, something which hadn't been accomplished the previous four years.

"This program is not broken," Farley said upon his appointment. "They've (previous staff) done a good job in it. We just want to take it a step higher, raise the bar to our expectations at the University of Northern Iowa. We want to win the Gateway – we WILL win the Gateway. We have to reestablish ourselves. People are scared to come in (the UNI-Dome). We want to fill this place. You don't know how exciting it was as a player and as a coach when (the crowd) all stood up, 16,000 people, with keys ringing all the time on kickoffs. That's neat. I love it when the opposing team stands at that doorway down there and that is all happening."

"I want our players to feel that, because that is a special feeling, and that is why we're here and that's what we're after to achieve, because if you win the Gateway, you can win the national championship, that's how tough this conference is."



Farley also is a players' coach, a coach willing to listen to his players, but who also sets high standards for his team. He set the tone in his first meeting with the squad.

"The first thing that we talked about was this program," he said. "This program is the most important thing. It was here before we were here, and it will be here after we leave. Right now, we represent this program and this university. We represent the community, we represent the state, and we will do everything that we can to put UNI football at the level we're proud of and always have been at this university. When I'm talking about the program, I'm talking about alumni. This place is important to them, just as it is to me."

"Our players will represent the university and the community and I will hold them to that, because this is our program as a community and as a state, and we're at Northern Iowa and we're proud to be here."

Explain your thoughts on UNI's aspirations for a national championship.

"There is only one door that has not been open through all the great years of UNI football and that is the doorway that opens to a national championship. To attain that level for this University and our program would finalize for many that their university finished what they themselves had started. Our tradition-rich program would be complete."

What are your thoughts on returning to the University of Northern Iowa?

What about the recruiting of student-athletes?

"The core of our program will be the development of freshmen from the state of Iowa. We will then go beyond our borders to find the difference-maker that will impact our program and solidify our talent needs. I will always maintain that we can compete at our level of excellence with recruited freshmen that have an attitude, work ethic, and desire to be the best at what they do. The intangible of desire and love for your school and teammates are developed over time and will be the attributes that will extend the great tradition of UNI football."

Head coach Mark Farley isn't the only member of UNI's coaching staff that has returned home to his roots. Bill Salmon is a native of Cedar Falls, a graduate of Cedar Falls High School, and a UNI football alum.

Highly regarded as one of UNI's best quarterbacks ever, Salmon (SAHL-mun) rejoined the Panther staff in 2001 as Associate Head Coach, Offensive Coordinator and assistant in charge of the wide receivers after spending the previous four years as the Offensive Coordinator, and running backs coach his final two years, at the University of Kansas.

"It's still UNI," he said upon his return to the Cedar Valley. "Still football. Still people I know. It's easy. This is home."

Salmon started three years at quarterback (1973-75) for the Panthers and was known for his excellent throwing arm, quick release, great quickness, speed, football knowledge (he called about 75 percent of his own plays), and was superb at running the Panther veer attack. He ran as good as any running back, and was not afraid to do so.

He was a third team all-America selection and North Central Conference Offensive Player of the Year following his senior campaign when he led UNI to the NCAA Division II playoffs. He set a multitude of school records, including throwing for 4,342 regular season career yards and gaining 5,371 yards in total offense. He was drafted in the 10th round by the Minnesota Vikings, but an off-season knee injury ended his playing career.

Former UNI Athletic Director and Head Football Coach, Stan Sheriff, call Salmon "the greatest and smartest quarterback I've ever coached. He can throw the ball a mile, runs like any back and could even kick if we asked him to. I've never seen a quarterback with as much talent, confidence, poise and knowledge as Bill Salmon has. But it's his take-charge attitude and game-breaking capabilities which really makes him great."

Salmon first served as a UNI assistant from 1983-96, coaching the wide receivers and running backs. He was Farley's first appointee when he was hired at UNI.

"Trust is the no. 1 reason," Farley has said when describing why he wanted Salmon on his staff. "I was a defensive coach and I wanted someone I could turn the offense over to, and let them control that phase of the game."

Widely known as a throwing team in the past, Salmon somewhat shifted UNI's focus in 2001 from the pass to the run because of the talent available. The Panthers averaged 289.5 passing yards and 149.5 yards rushing in Coach Mike Dunbar's last year at the helm. In 2001, the Panthers averaged 164.9 yards passing and 191.4 yards on the ground. The Panthers ran for 161.7 yards and passed for 200.6 yards a year ago.

He now has coached 13 Panther all-conference selections and four all-Americans, including wide receiver Detric Ward, who was a third-round selection in the 1998 NFL draft by the New York Jets.

His wife's name is Kim. He was born Jan. 27, 1954, in Des Moines, IA, and graduated from Cedar Falls (IA) High School in 1972, where he was an all-conference, all-district, all-state and team MVP.

Getting to Know Coach Salmon

***Who provided the greatest inspiration to you growing up and why?** "My brother. He was the best high school basketball player in the state. I never could shoot, though. I always blamed it on him, because all I did was rebound his shots and pass it to him when I was little."

***Who were your favorite sports heroes growing up?** "Besides my brother, any quarterback in the NFL, whoever was having a good year at the time."

***What did you want to be when you were little?** "One of those NFL quarterbacks."

***What made you decide to get into coaching?** "To be able to stay involved with this great game."

***What do you personally get out of coaching?** "I love the kids, and I still feel the adrenaline before a game."

***Who would you really like to meet, or have met while they were alive?** "I've met her. My wife, Kimberly."

***What is the most memorable sporting event you have ever attended or been a part of as an athlete or coach yourself?** "As a player, the infamous 'Mud Bowl'. Coaching - it had to be at Texas A&M when I thought the press box was going to fall over when the crowd did its rocking back and forth and the press box was moving with it. (Coach Terry Allen) couldn't figure out why I was laughing while I called the plays. I must be one of those people who laughs when scared."

***Top players you've coached.** "At UNI, there have been a lot, so I don't want to leave anyone out, but one guy that might come as a surprise to some is (tight end) Brian Baker. He could catch anything. He has the best set of hands on anyone I've ever seen. Now when it came to blocking, that was a different story. Brian may not make that list."

D.J. "Dennis" Vokolek was named assistant head coach and in charge of the linebackers in March.

Since 2000, Vokolek had been the defensive coordinator at the University of Nebraska-Omaha.

The 2000 defensive unit finished first in the North Central Conference in total defense when the team won the league title and participated in the NCAA Division II playoffs. The 2001 team also advanced to the playoffs.

From 1997-99, Vokolek coached the linebackers and served as academic coordinator at UNO. The 1998 defensive segment finished second in the league in total defense and was first against the run. That squad also advanced to the playoffs.

Between 1993-95, Vokolek was a graduate assistant at UNO. He spent the 1996 season as the defensive secondary assistant and recruiting coordinator at Wayne State College. He also has been a physical education instructor at both UNO and Wayne State since 1994.

Vokolek was a three-year team captain as a defensive back and linebacker at Nebraska-Kearney, earning all-Nebraska NCAA II honors each year. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Biology in 1992 from Kearney and his master's in Physical Education from UNO in 1996. He and his wife, Pam, have two children – son Travis and daughter Leah.

He takes over the linebacker corps from Panther assistant Bill Inge, who has been re-assigned to the defensive line.

A key ingredient in UNI's past successes on the field and the team's recent resurgence is the passion and vested interest in the Panther program by the coaching staff. One more ingredient to that mix was added two winters ago with the re-hiring of Rob Bolks as a secondary assistant. He assumed the additional duties of Recruiting Coordinator this spring.

Bolks returns to UNI after previously serving the Panthers as a defensive back-field aid and recruiting coordinator from 1985-88. During that tenure, the Panthers earned Gateway Conference titles in 1985 and '87, when they reached the national

semi-finals both years. UNI was ranked fourth in the final 1-AA poll those years. During those four campaigns, UNI recorded a 33-15-1 record.

Prior to being re-appointed to the staff, Bolks was Director of Football Operations at Kansas under former UNI mentor Terry Allen beginning in 1998. He spent the 1997 season as Defensive Coordinator and secondary coach at Northern University High School in Cedar Falls, and prior to that, was Defensive Coordinator and secondary assistant at Idaho State University from 1994-96.

Additional experience includes serving as linebacker assistant at Western Illinois from 1992-94, graduate assistant and linebacker coach at Vanderbilt for the 1991 season, defensive backfield coach in 1989 at Murray State, and head coach briefly in 1985 at Butler County Community College after serving as Defensive Coordinator and secondary coach there beginning in 1983.

He also was an assistant at Independence Community College from 1981-82 and at Highland Community College in 1980. From 1977-79, he was head coach at Allamakee Community High School in Waukon, IA, when he coached Farley as a prep.

Besides coaching Farley in high school, Bolks has coached such former UNI greats as Eddie Grimes, James McFadden, Al Speicher and Cedric Hill while they played at Independence; and Butler County 1985 UNI signees Pat Bullock, Keith Majors and Kevin Pew.

Bolks served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Iowa State, from 1974-77 under Earle Bruce. He played defensive back for the Cyclones, including in 1971 when they played in the Sun Bowl and in the 1972 Liberty Bowl under Head Coach Johnny Majors. He earned five letters total at ISU, two in football and three in track. He graduated from ISU in 1974.

Bolks was born May 16, 1952, in Sioux City, IA. He's a 1970 graduate of Boyden-Hull High School in Hull, IA. He earned 15 varsity letters there in four sports and was a two-time state champion hurdler. He is married to the former Lori Shaner of La Porte City, IA.

Free safety Justin Sandy received second team all-conference honors last season under Bolks' tutelage, while strong safety Jarvis Phillips was named honorable mention all-conference and to the Gateway's All-Newcomer Team.

WILLIAM "BILL" INGE

**Defensive Line/
Special Teams Coordinator
(Iowa '97)**

Bill Inge returned to the field when he was hired by Head Coach Mark Farley in 2001. He was moved from linebackers to the defensive line this spring. A four-year letterman at Iowa from 1993-96, Inge spent three years following graduation as the Hawkeyes' Recruiting Coordinator, working through the Office of Athletic Student Services. But he missed the on-field action.

"I look forward to working with the kids and getting to know them," Inge said upon his UNI appointment as assistant in charge of the Panther linebackers.

A 1996 Iowa co-captain, he started 31 games over his final three seasons, including 11-of-12 games as a senior. He was part of a defensive unit that ranked among the best in the Big Ten in 1996, a team that posted shutouts in two of its final three games, including a 27-0 win over Texas Tech in the Alamo Bowl.

Inge recorded 41 solo tackles and 26 assists as a senior, including 16 tackles for loss and 10 quarterback sacks. He forced three fumbles and recovered two. He was the team's defensive MVP against Michigan State and Ohio State. He was selected the ESPN Player of the Game in a 31-0 win over Wisconsin and was selected to play in the Hula Bowl following his senior campaign.

He ended his career with 173 total tackles, including 37 tackles for loss, and 24 sacks. He earned honorable mention all-Big Ten honors as a senior and academic all-Big Ten recognition.

In addition, he earned the coaches' Appreciation Award for defense as a senior and the coaches' Hustle Award as a junior. In his last two seasons, Iowa was 17-7 overall, including wins in the Sun Bowl and Alamo Bowl.

Inge earned his bachelor's degree in Sport, Health, Leisure and Physical Studies in 1996 and his master's in Athletic Administration in 1999.

"I hope to bring knowledge and experience of playing the (linebacker) position," he said in an interview following his hiring at UNI. "But I also want to teach (the players) the three aspects of life (a great experience on the field, and a focus on academics and citizenship). Our goal is to create men that will be assets to society."

Inge coached UNI's Adam Vogt in 2001, who earned Gateway Conference Defensive Player of the Year honors, first team all-conference accolades, and was named first team all-American by the Associated Press and The Sports Network, and honorable mention all-American honors by Don Hansen's National Weekly Football Gazette. Carlos Dallis was an honorable mention all-conference pick. Last season, Jonathan Harrell was named second team all-conference and to the league's All-Newcomer Team.

He was born Dec. 17, 1973, in St. Louis. He is single.

He was a two-year starter at running back and defensive back at Mount Ayr. The team made the state playoffs both his junior and senior years, when he was named first team all-conference both seasons.

Prior to being named at UNI, he was a defensive graduate assistant working with the linebackers in 1999 and the secondary in 2000 at Southern Miss. The Golden Eagles won the Conference USA title in 1999 and were the GMAC Mobile Alabama Bowl champions in 2000, when their defense was ranked second in the nation in total defense, eighth in scoring defense, fifth in pass defense and fourth in pass efficiency defense. The 1999 team was ranked 13th in the ESPN/USA Today final poll and won the Liberty Bowl championship.

From 1996-98, Landphair was Assistant Head Coach and Defensive Coordinator at Bondurant High School in Bondurant, IA. That team recorded a 16-11 record, including 8-1 in 1997, the first winning season in 12 years. There were five all-state selections in those three years and the team set 30 school records.

Two of his former players have gone on to play in the NFL – linebacker T.J. Slaughter with the Jacksonville Jaguars and defensive back Raymond Walls with the Indianapolis Colts.

He was born Feb. 25, 1974. His wife's name is Allyson. The couple has a 3-year-old son, Jake Justice.

RICK NELSON

Offensive Line (UNI '83)

Rick Nelson is the fourth former Panther player on this year's staff. He was hired in February of 2000 as offensive line coach.

Nelson was a two-year letterman for UNI as an offensive lineman when he played from 1980-83. He received his bachelor's degree in 1984 and served as the Panthers' Strength and Conditioning

coach and graduate assistant for two years before going to Garden City Community College as offensive coordinator and strength coach. The Bronc Busters placed second in the Jayhawk Conference in 1987 and captured the title in 1988.

From Garden City, Nelson moved on to Gateway Conference foe Southwest Missouri State, serving as offensive line coach from 1989-99. He was head football coach and physical education instructor at Woodward High School in Woodward, OK, in 1999.

While playing for the Panthers, Nelson was a member of the 1984 and '85 conference championship teams which advanced to the 1-AA playoffs. At SMS, he was a member of a staff that broke 35 offensive records. He coached four Bear offensive linemen who signed with the NFL. Six of his SMS players were named all-American, 20 were named all-conference, four were selected Academic All-Americans, and two were named to the Gateway Conference All-Decade Team. Two of the SMS teams won consecutive conference titles and advanced to the 1-AA playoffs during his tenure.

Panther offensive linemen Aaron Buss and Brad Harms, an NFL free agent, received first team all-conference honors, and Chad Setterstrom was a second team choice under Nelson's tutelage in 2000. Setterstrom was a first team all-league choice and a third team all-American by The Sports Network and Don Hansen's National Weekly Football Gazette in 2001, while Ben Deike was an honorable mention all-conference pick. Last year, Setterstrom was named first team all-league and second team all-American by Don Hansen and third team by The Sports Network.

Nelson received UNI's "Oil Can Award" in 1983, given by the coaches to the player showing ability, performance, attitude and leadership. As a prep at Urbandale (IA) High School, he was selected to the Iowa High School Boys Athletic Association All-State Football Team, Central Iowa All-Conference, and Urbandale's MVP in 1978.

He and his wife, Jamie, have two children – Nick, 18, and Wes, 14.

MARIO VERDUZCO

**Quarterbacks
(San Jose State '88)**

When first-year head coach Mark Farley went looking for a quarterbacks coach, he couldn't have landed a better technician than Mario Verduzco.

Verduzco spent five years (1996-2000) working with the signal callers and as recruiting coordinator at Rutgers University in Piscataway, NJ, the last

season as head quarterback coach. During his tenure at Rutgers, he developed what has been described as one of the best Quarterback Schools in the country, when young players from around the country spent four days learning the skills, both mentally and physically, of quarterbacking.

His prize pupil, Rutgers quarterback Mike McMahon, quarterbacked the Detroit Lions and is a former Quarterback School participant.

Verduzco himself learned the trade from the best, working under head coach Terry Shea at San Jose State and at Rutgers. Shea moved on to coach with the Kansas City Chiefs in the NFL.

Prior to being named at Rutgers, Verduzco was Associate Head Coach, Offensive Coordinator, and quarterbacks and receivers coach at De Anza College in Cupertino, CA, beginning in 1991, moving up to head coach from 1994-95. While coaching at De Anza, he spent time with arguably one of the best NFL coaches in history as both Bill Walsh and his mentor, Shea, conducted a private NFL quarterback camp at De Anza.

Verduzco began his coaching career at Soquel (CA) High School in 1977 before moving on to Gavilan College as Offensive Coordinator and quarterbacks and receivers coach in 1987. From 1990-91, he served as graduate coach at San Jose State before moving on to De Anza.

The cousin of former Illinois and British Columbia record-setting quarterback Jason Verduzco and uncle of former Yale quarterback Bobby Verduzco, he graduated from San Jose State in 1988 with a degree in Human Performance. He received his masters in Biomechanics and Exercise Physiology from SJS in 1990. That's when he authored the book "Quarterbacks Born or Made? The Biomechanics of the quarterback position: An integrative approach".

Upon his appointment at UNI, Verduzco said, "I think (the Panther quarterbacks) have enjoyed having me come in. I don't know a lot of things, but I know three things – there is a God, I'm not God, and the best thing there is in the world is coaching quarterbacks."

Farley said "Mario coaches quarterbacks like I coach linebackers. He's real detailed. He's in-depth about angles."

Verduzco's tutelage paid off big time in 2001. UNI true freshman quarterback Tom Petrie was named the Gateway Conference's Freshman of the Year and to the league's All-Newcomer Team.

Verduzco was born on May 23 in Pittsburg, CA. His wife's name is Cate and the couple has an eight-year-old son, Charles.

Getting to Know Coach Verduzco

***Who provided the greatest inspiration to you growing up and why?** "My mom, Sara. 10 children – seven boys, three girls. She lost her eldest son, Charles, an all-American football player, in 1965 at the young age of 25 while he was coaching football at Merced Junior College. He fell asleep at the wheel coming from football practice. Her second eldest son, Leo, was diagnosed with Schizophrenia at the age of 18 and for all intents and purposes, could not be around the family. Her youngest and favorite brother, William, unexpectedly passed away in 1968. In a period of four-to-five years, she lost two of the most precious things in her life – two of her sons, as well as her favorite brother."

***Who were your favorite sports heroes growing up and why?** "Darryl Lamonica and Joe Namath."

Before arriving at Villanova, he worked at Syracuse University and Ohio State.

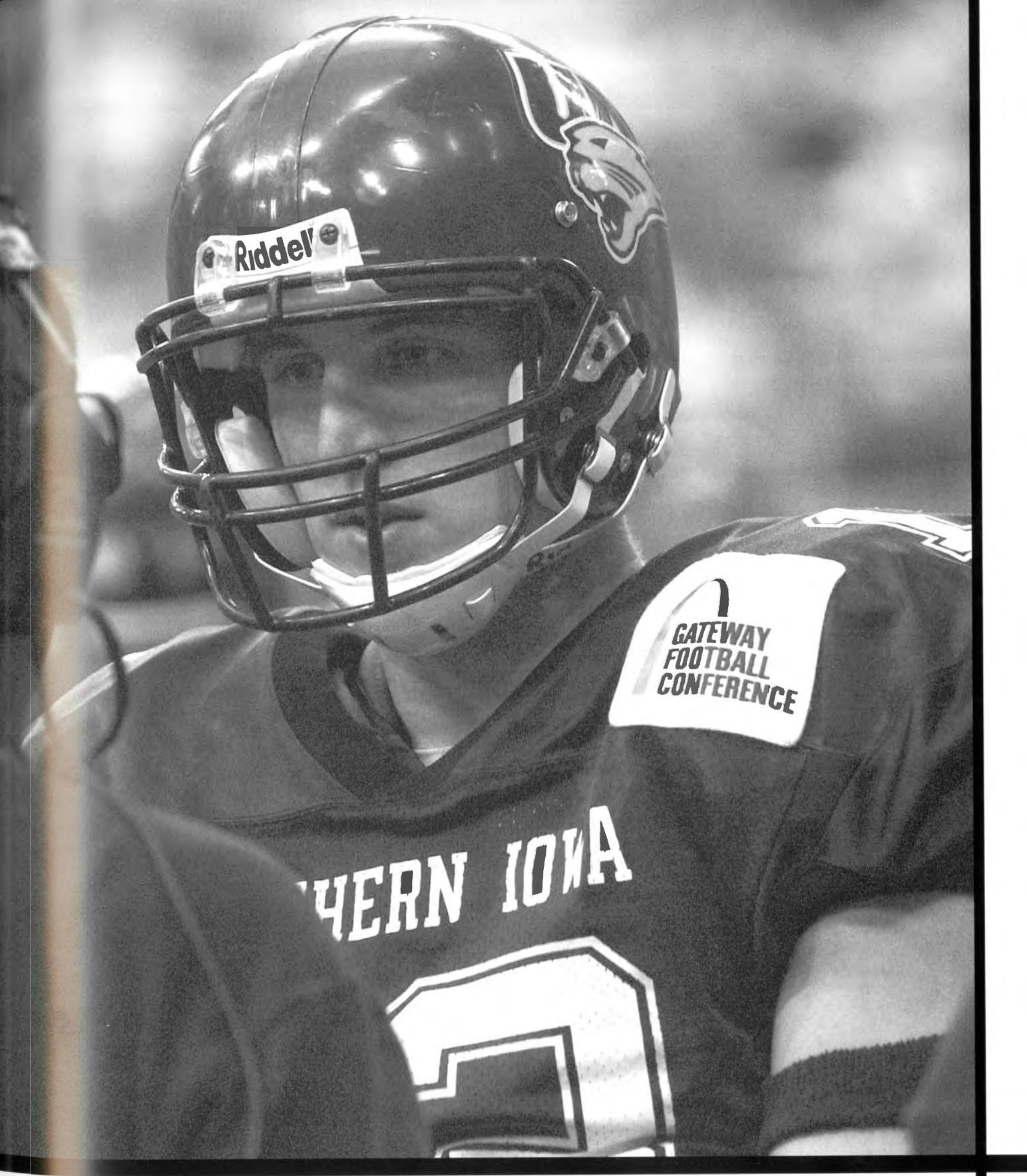

UNI opened the season with a win over Division II Wayne State (MI), the second consecutive season-opening win over the Warriors. This was the first Panther shutout since defeating Southern Illinois at home 13-0 in 1995. UNI now is 53-44-7 in openers and has won five straight.

Junior wide receiver Marlus Mays was named the Gateway's Offensive Player of the Week after recording a career-high 144 yards on five catches with a long of 80, scoring three TDs. Senior Ben Sanderson caught three passes for 27 yards and was big on special teams, returning five punts for 85 yards, including a 51-yard TD return that ended all scoring with no time left in the third quarter. Senior tailback Adam Bengé rushed 23 times for 170 yards, seven yards shy of tying his career high. Iowa Central Junior College transfer Jarvis Phillips recorded a team-high nine tackles from his strong safety position.

UNI's young defense held the Warriors to just 174 total yards, 58 rushing, and just seven first downs and two-of-17 third-down conversions. UNI gained 521 yards, 292 on the ground.

UNI's first scoring drive on its first possession took only eight plays and 44 yards, culminating in a five-yard run by Adam Bengé. This was the first score against the Cowboys by a 1-AA team in three contests. But UNI ended the first quarter with only 30 total yards, while OSU gained 183 despite being whistled for five penalties for 58 yards.

OSU tied the game at seven with 1:25 left in the first quarter on a one-yard pass play. UNI's Matt Mitchell had intercepted a Cowboy pass earlier but the Panthers couldn't capitalize, and OSU returned a punt for a TD that was called back because of a penalty. OSU took the lead for good with 27 seconds left in the first period on a 29-yard interception return. The Panthers trailed 28-7 at the half. Mackenzie Hoambrecker's 42-yard field goal with 2:40 left in the game ended all scoring at 45-10.

UNI quarterback Griff Jurgens was intercepted four times and completed just 12-of-31 passes for 94 yards. He was replaced late in the third quarter by Tom Petrie, who was three-of-seven passing for 15 yards. The last time a UNI starting quarterback was held to under 100 yards passing was on Oct 6, 2001, when Petrie gained just 80 yards on eight-of-11 attempts in a 27-3 win over Southwest Missouri State.

UNI also lost one fumble and was penalized 10 times for 87 yards. OSU turned the ball over twice. Besides Mitchell's interception, Justin Sandy picked off a pass with 12:37 left in the game. OSU's all-American candidate, Rashaun Woods, caught nine passes for 175 yards.

He carried the load on the ground with his sidekick, junior tailback Richard Carter, sidelined for the season. Bengé's 172 yards was his second 100-plus rushing effort of the season and was just five yards shy of tying his career high.

Defensively, UNI intercepted the Lumberjacks four times — two each by junior corner Benny Sapp and senior free safety Justin Jansen. Sapp recorded five solo and one assisted tackles to go along with two deflections. His first swipe came in the third quarter and nine plays later, UNI went up 24-21 on Bengé's eight-yard run. Senior Mackenzie Hoambrecker was named the Gateway's and Sports Network's Special Teams Player of the Week after leading the Panthers to a 29-26 triple overtime victory over winless Cal Poly. He opened all scoring with a 40-yard field goal with 11:25 left in the first quarter following a fumble recovery by UNI's Terrell Morgan on the CP 45. The home team led 13-10 at the break after several ties and lead changes on a 41-yard field goal with 4:57 left. Hoambrecker's 38-yard attempt with 31 seconds remaining sailed wide.

The third quarter remained scoreless and UNI fell behind 20-10 with 12:22 left in the game. Adam Bengé left the game in the fourth quarter after sustaining a concussion earlier and sophomore Jim Lizzi pulled UNI back to within 20-17 with 4:05 left in regulation when he scored on a two-yard run. Hoambrecker sent the game into overtime on a career-high 57-yard field goal with 14 seconds left. He outlasted CP's kicker in the three OTs.

Hoambrecker's 57-yarder tied a school record for distance and matches the Gateway's second-longest in league history. He tied a school and league record with the five goals and his six attempts was a school mark. Only twice previously has a Gateway kicker notched five three-pointers in a game.

Marlus Mays caught a career-high 10 passes for 149 yards. Lizzi finished with 13 carries for 45 yards. In OT alone, he rushed 10 times for 31 yards. Junior corner Benny Sapp picked off his third interception of the year, and junior corner Justin Sandy got his second interception to go along with five solo and two assisted tackles, one fumble recovery and two breakups.

UNI snapped a two-game losing streak against 17th-ranked Youngstown State and was the Panthers' third straight win on Gateway television. The Panthers never trailed. Mackenzie Hoambrecker's first field goal followed a fumble recovery by Matt Mitchell on the YSU 34. His 44-yarder followed a YSU fumble caused by Benny Sapp's strip and Titus Ivory recovered the ball on the UNI 17. Hoambrecker was named the Gateway's Special Teams Player of the Week for the second time this season after scoring 16 of the team's 22 points. He re-tied the school and conference record with his five field goals made in five attempts, becoming the first player in league history to kick five field goals in a game more than once. Adam Bengé had been held to less than 100 yards the previous two games but broke out of the slump to run for 147 yards.

After giving up 836 rushing yards the previous three games, the Panthers held YSU to 104 yards on the ground, 94 yards less than its average. P.J. Mays, the league's and nation's second- and fourth-leading rusher, respectively, was held to just 47 yards. UNI is the only team that Mays has never been able to score against on the ground in his career.

Mitchell was named the league's Defensive Player of the Week after accounting for 16 stops, including seven solos, three assisted tackles, four for loss and two sacks to go along with one forced fumble and a recovery. Senior wide receiver Ben Sanderson added to the "special" special teams play by averaging 11.9 yards on eight punt returns, long of 21, and 29 yards on two kick returns, long of 46. His 46-yarder returned to the YSU 49 occurred right after YSU scored its lone TD to pull within 16-7. Eight plays later, UNI went up 19-7. Senior punter Derrick Frost averaged over 40 yards for the third week in a row, this time 46.2 yards with a long of 51.

The Panthers let another game slip away after leading 21-17 with 5:11 left in the game. It was the second week in a row UNI gave up a lead with just five minutes remaining. UNI led 10-0 at intermission, but the score should have been much higher. UNI turned the ball over four times in the first half, twice on interceptions and two fumbles. Despite the miscues, the Panthers gained 243 yards, 179 rushing, in the first half alone and gave up just 56 yards, including only 17 through the air.

UNI seemingly won the game on a 16-yard pass from Tom Petrie to Marlus Mays on a fourth-and-four down with just 2:09 left in the game, but the officials called him out-of-bounds on the catch. Subsequent viewing of the film shows Mays with both feet in-bounds. ISU then ran the clock down until forcing an intentional safety.

UNI senior Adam Bengé rushed for 156 yards, giving him over 1,000 yards for the second straight year. Senior tight end Ryan Walter caught a career-high eight passes. Senior punter Derrick Frost averaged 45.8 yards on four punts with a career-long 75-yarder.

The loss ended UNI's school-record 11-game win streak against the Sycamores and was UNI's first loss in Terre Haute since 1990. The Panthers' four losses in league play are the most ever since joining the Gateway. They also snapped a 13-year streak of winning at least seven games.

UNI assured itself of its first losing season since 1988 with its loss to eighth-ranked WIU and snapped a 13-year streak of winning at least seven games. The Panthers lost three home games for the first time since 1998. The last time UNI lost three games in the UNI-Dome was in 1988.

Trailing only 14-6, UNI's Adam Bengé fumbled the ball on WIU's 10 yard line and it was returned 90 yards by Cornell Middlebrook for the TD. 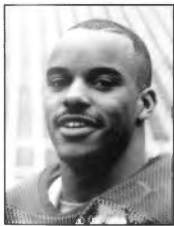

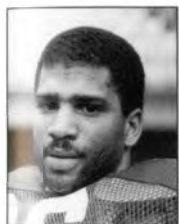

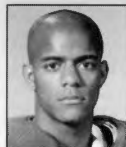

Wide receiver **Eddie Berlin** was drafted in the fifth round by the Tennessee Titans, the 159th pick overall and the 21st receiver taken in the 2001 NFL draft. Berlin set school and Gateway Conference career records with 249 receptions.



Tight end **Ryan Hannam** became UNI's 12th NFL pick when he was chosen last spring in the fifth round by the Seattle Seahawks. Hannam was a two-year starter for the Panthers. He was an honorable mention all-American by Don Hansen's National Weekly Football Gazette.



Offensive tackle **Chad Setterstrom** signed a free agent contract with the New Orleans Saints this spring. Setterstrom was a first team all-conference choice and second team all-American by Don Hansen's National Weekly Football Gazette and a third team choice by The Sports Network. He played in the 2003 East-West Shrine Game.



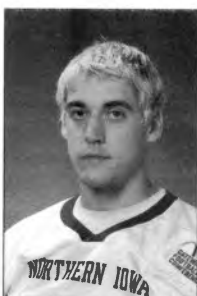
Defensive back **Daryon Brutley** signed a free agent contract in the spring of 2002 with the Buffalo Bills. He was taken in the third round by the Berlin Thunder of the 2003 NFL Europe free agent draft. Brutley was named second team all-conference and to the Gateway All-Newcomer Team in 2001. He played only one year for the Panthers after transferring from Southern Mississippi.



Strong safety **Ken Harris** signed a free agent contract with the San Francisco 49ers in May of 2002. Harris transferred to UNI from Pittsburgh in 1999 and played in 2000 and 2001. He was the team's third-leading tackler in 2001 with 126 total.



Wide receiver **Jake Soliday** played most of his career in the shadows of Eddie Berlin and Mike Furrey, but he finished his career as a Don Hansen's National Weekly Football Gazette honorable mention all-American receiver and return specialist, and a first team all-conference receiver and second team return specialist. He signed a free agent contract with the Arizona Cardinals last spring.



Punter **Derrick Frost** signed a free agent contract with the Philadelphia Eagles this spring. Frost, a second team all-conference choice in 2002, set school records for average in a game (52.0) and season (43.6) this past fall.



All-American placekicker **Mackenzie Hoambrecker** signed a free agent contract with the San Diego Chargers this spring. Hoambrecker finished his collegiate career setting school records for longest field goal (59), goals attempted in a game (6), and goals made in a game (5), which also is a Gateway Football Conference record. He played in the 2003 Paradise Bowl.



Two-time all-American wide receiver **Dedric Ward** was the 88th player drafted overall, taken in the third round, by the New York Jets in 1997's NFL draft. He moved over to the Miami Dolphins in 2001 and signed a free agent contract with the New England Patriots in May. He had 159 career catches for 2,196 yards and 11 TDs in his NFL career heading into this season. Ward became 1-AA's second-leading career receiver behind Jerry Rice after playing

for the Panthers from 1993-96.



Wide receiver **Mike Furrey** signed a free agent contract May 1 with the St. Louis Rams. An all-American who played for the Panthers from 1997-99, he signed a free agent contract with the Indianapolis Colts after his senior year in 2000 but was released. He also spent time in the New York Jets training camp in 2002 before heading to the Arena Football League's New York Dragons. He played the 2000 season with the Las Vegas franchise of the XFL. In 2002, he led the Dragons with 74

catches for 1,055 yards and 27 TDs on his way to being named the 2002 All-Ironman. He was leading the league with 108 receptions for 1,574 yards with just three games left on the schedule this spring and had 46 TDs (tying a league season record) with 288 points.



Brad Meester became UNI's highest pick in the NFL draft when he was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the second round, the 60th pick overall, in 2000. He was a two-time all-American center for the Panthers.



Defensive back **Jerome Peterson** played only the 1999 season for the Panthers after transferring from Nebraska. He was a second team all-conference choice and was named to the All-Newcomer Team. He has gone on to play for the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League.



1994 UNI starting quarterback **Kurt Warner** signed with the Iowa Barnstormers of the Arena League in 1995 after being cut by the Green Bay Packers. He signed with the St. Louis Rams in 1998 and played with Amsterdam prior to being named the NFL's and Super Bowl's Most Valuable Player in 1999 and 2001.

Two-time all-American linebacker and Gateway Conference Defensive Player of the Year **Andre Allen** signed a free agent contract in 1995 with the Philadelphia Eagles, but didn't survive the cut. He played for the London Monarchs of the World Football League six years ago, was with the Iowa Barnstormers of the Arena League in 1997 and was traded to Nashville in 1998.

*Defensive end **Willie T.C. Barney** played for the Panthers from 1993-96 and signed a contract with the Roughriders of the Canadian Football League in 1997. He played briefly for the Iowa Barnstormers in 1998.



Defensive back **Willie Beamon** signed a free agent contract in 1993 with the New York Giants. He played several years there before moving over to the

Kansas City Chiefs in 1996, then returned to the Giants. He's currently inactive.

*Linebacker **Peter Burns** played one year with the Cleveland Thunderbolts of Arena Football in 1993. He was a four-year letterman from 1989-92 and led the Panthers in tackles in 1992 with 163.



Loren Buser played for SCI from 1963-65. He was drafted by the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian league, where he played two seasons.

*Wide receiver **Alonzo Clayton** signed with the Quad City Steamwheelers of the AF2 in November of 2000. An all-conference pick with UNI, playing from 1994-97, he played for the Peoria Pirates of the Indoor Football League in 2000. He was in the Cincinnati Bengals' mini camp in 1998 before suffering an injury.

*Running back **Troy Dooley** played for the Panthers from 1994-96 after transferring from UCLA. He signed with the Iowa Barnstormers of the Arena League in 1997, but later was cut.

*Linebacker **William Freney** signed with the Hamilton Tigercats of the Canadian Football League in 1993. He signed a contract with the Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1994 and played with the Iowa Barnstormers of the Arena League until a shoulder injury sidelined him in

1995. He spent the 1996 season with the Minnesota Fighting Pike of the Arena League.



Without waiting for the NFL draft, defensive back **Joe Fuller** signed with the Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1985, where he played four years. He then played briefly with the Minnesota Vikings, the San Diego Chargers, the Green Bay Packers, the Ottawa Roughriders and with the Shreveport Pirates of the CFL. He then played for the Minnesota Fighting Pike of the Arena League. He's no longer playing professionally.

*After signing a free agency with the Buffalo Bills in 1995, defensive back **Myron Glass** signed with the Rhein of the World League of Football in 1996. He played for Milwaukee of the Arena League in 1998. Glass played for the Panthers from 1991-94.

*Offensive lineman **Brad Harms** signed a free agent contract last spring with the Washington Redskins after being named a first team all-conference choice and an honorable mention all-American by Don Hansen's Weekly Football Gazette.

*Defensive back **Todd Harrington**, who played for the Panthers from 1991-94, signed with the Iowa Barnstormers of the Arena League in 1995. He's no longer active.



Drafted in 1991, **James Jones** was selected by the Cleveland Browns in the third round as the 57th pick overall. He moved over to the Denver Broncos in 1995 and began playing for Baltimore in 1997. He was traded to the Detroit Lions in 1999 and retired prior to the 2001 season.

*A four-year letterman for the Panthers from 1991-94 and first team all-conference selection at defensive back his senior year, **Jason McCleary** signed with the Iowa Barnstormers in January of 2001. An injury cut short his debut season.

***Phil Minnick** played for the Panthers from 1961-64 at linebacker, fullback and guard. Upon graduation, he played linebacker five years with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Canadian league. A captain, he was named to the Canadian All-Star teams in 1966 and 1969. Knee surgery forced the early end to his career.

*All-American placekicker **Brian Mitchell** signed his first professional contract in 1994 with the Shreveport Pirates of the CFL after graduating in 1992, but was released during preseason camp. He also spent time with the St. Louis franchise of Arena League.



Bryce Paup, a line-backer at UNI, was picked by the Green Bay Packers in the sixth round of the 1990 draft. He signed with the Buffalo Bills in 1995, when he was named the NFL Defensive Player of the Year. He played for Jacksonville through the 1999 season and with the Minnesota Vikings in 2000. He retired prior to the 2001 season.

*Assistant coach **Bill Salmon** was drafted in the 10th round by the Minnesota Vikings in 1976 but an off-season knee injury eventually led to the end of his playing career.

*Quarterback **Steve Sandon** was drafted by the New England Patriots in the 11th round in 1982.



Running back **Randy Schultz** played football for State College of Iowa from 1963-65. He became the first SCI player to be drafted by the pros, going in the fifth round to the Cleveland Browns. He played for the Browns from 1966-67 and the New Orleans Saints two more seasons.

*Wide receiver and return specialist **Kenny Shedd** was drafted by the New York Jets in the fifth round of the 1993 draft. He signed with the Chicago Bears in 1994, but didn't make the final cut. He played for Barcelona of the World League of American Football before signing with the Oakland Raiders in 1996. He was picked up by the Washington Redskins in 2000. He's no longer playing.

*Defensive back and return specialist **Tyree Talton** was drafted by the Detroit Lions in 1999 in the fifth round in a trade. He was claimed off waivers by the Oakland Raiders in October of that year, then was reclaimed by Detroit later in the season. After being released in 2000, he was drafted by the New York-New Jersey franchise of the XFL.

*All-American offensive guard **Mike Timmermans** was drafted in the 17th round by the Green Bay Packers in 1976.

The Cowboys' seven turnovers were more than they had given up in all of its previous three games.
