- Notes.—1. Students from High Schools should file official statements showing the work completed in high school.

Those who have had no high school work should file the County Certificate or an official statement from the City Superintendent or the County Superintendent showing the

completion of the Eighth Grade work.

3. Graduates of Four Year Courses in Non-Accredited high schools need to take entrance examinations in one-third of each group of high school subjects presented or they may validate the high school credits by taking work here in secondary subjects selected by the College Examiner. Those who have not completed a four year course in high school may make up the remaining units by taking secondary work offerd in the Elementary Normal Courses and in the Rural Teachers Course.

# THE COLLEGE DEGREE COURSES

Details of the Requirements For The Degree Bachelor Of Arts
In Education.

The Plan of the Course.—This degree course requires credit for 180 term hours distributed thru four years, each divided into three twelve week terms. A term hour consists of one hour a week for twelve weeks. A student's work for a term consists of 15 term hours. An additional hour a day is permitted in vocal music, instrumental music, drawing, elementary manual training, elementary domestic science, penmanship, or other art subject.

The Major Study.—Each student in the course must select a major study not later than the beginning of the Junior year. A major consists of 30 term hours of work in the study chosen, but the student may elect up to 60 term hours in the major. When the major is selected, the head of the department becomes the adviser of said student during the pursuance of the course. The following are the major studies offerd:

- 2. Public Speaking.
- 3. Latin.
- 4. German.
- 5. French.
- 6. Mathematics.
- 7. Physics.
- 8. Chemistry.
- 9. Earth Science.
- 10. Biological Science.
- 11. History.

The Minor Study.—After consulting the student, the adviser selects a minor study which must include not less than 15 term hours nor more than 30 term hours in the study selected. When the major and minor are chosen from the same group as hereafter outlined, not more than a total of 75 term hours can be taken in the two elections combined.

# Groups of Subjects Recognized.

The following groups of subjects are recognized in arranging the work for an individual course of study leading to a degree.

- I. The Professional Group.
- II. The English Group.
- III. The Foreign Language Group.
- IV. The History, Government, and Economics Group.
- V. The Science and Mathematics Group.

- VI. The Home Economics, Drawing, Physical Education or Manual Arts Group.
- The Primary, Kindergarten, Public School Music, or Commercial Group.

# Regulations Governing Groups And The Arrangement Of Studies In The Course.

When the Major study is determined by the student, the head of the department becomes the adviser and the entire course is pland. The adviser decides the minor study. The student decides the quantity taken in both major and minor studies beyond the minimum. The possible maximum varies with the amount of work offerd by the several departments. No combination of Major and Minor studies can exceed 75 term hours if both are selected from the same group.

# The Master of Didactics Degree Course For College Graduates.

## I. Professional Course-45 term hours.

This course includes a full year's work in Education and Teaching and is pland to suit individual needs by the Head of the Department of Education, who becomes the student's adviser. With the facilities here for a study of the rural and city school systems this year's work is very rich in development and training.

# II. Professional Course with Electives-45 term hours.

- 1. Education, 15 term hours.
- 2. Teaching, 10 term hours.
- 3. Elective with the approval of the adviser, 20 term hours.

# III. Professional Course as Special Teachers-45 term hours.

This course is pland by the Head of the Department of Education to give training to college graduates who wish to prepare in the line of experts in rural education, in normal training in high schools, in public school music, in physical education, in manual training, in home economics, in drawing, in commercial, in kindergarten, or in primary teaching.

# The Critic Teachers Course.

This course is pland for the special development, education, and training of critic teachers for normal training high schools and for work as teachers in the training department of state normal schools. The following conditions govern the admission, study, and graduation from this course.

I. The Entrance Requirements.—The applicant must have completed a diploma course of this college, or its equivalent.

# II. Required work for the Critic Teachers Certificate .-

1. Time-Two years.

 Satisfactory completion of 15 term hours of critic training credit (college credit on this course only) and 30 term hours of other college work approved by the Director of the Training School.

 During these two years, critics in training are allowd to carry 5 term hours each term in addition to the critic

training work.

# THE DIPLOMA COURSES

The Plan Presented.—These courses represent the latest conception of organization to meet the needs of special training for different fields of public school work and yet place regard upon collegiate scholarship as an essential to efficient preparation. Graduates of these courses are admitted to the Junior class in the Degree Course without conditions, provided they have complied with all the entrance conditions demanded in that course.

Conditions of Admission.—Admission to diploma courses requires 15 units, as follows: 3 units of English, 1 unit of Algebra (thru quadratics), 1 unit of Plane Geometry, 1 unit from the History, Government, and Economics group, and 9 units Elective, selected from those outlined for admission to the Degree Course.

Honors Conferd.—Appropriate diplomas granted by the Faculty are conferd for completing the courses outlined. These diplomas will show the special qualifications of the graduates and will commend them as traind teachers. The Educational Board of Examiners agrees to grant second grade state certificates to all graduates who complete one of these courses and who show credit for 10 term hours in Psychology, 5 term hours in School Management, 5 term hours in History of Education, and 10 term hours in Teaching as required at the Teachers College. These state certificates authorize the possessor to teach in any school in Iowa and give the teacher's specialization. For persons who may graduate from any of these diploma courses without having met all these requirements in Psychology, Education, and Teaching, a third grade state certificate will be granted, the second grade state certificate being obtainable whenever the deficiencies occurring have been removed.

# THE GENERAL TEACHERS COURSE.

This course is organized to give two years of instruction and training to high school graduates who desire to become principals, supervisors, or grade teachers. It is in conformity with the requirements for the second grade state certificate.

Note: Each subject represented here is given credit on the course when the student has received 85 per cent on the Uniform County Certificate. When 75 per cent has been received, one term's work is required in each subject. When less than 75 per cent has been received two term's work is required in geography, arithmetic, language and grammar, and United States history.

Note: When 85 per cent has been obtaind in the Uniform County Examination that subject is given credit on this course. When taken in class one term's work is required in civics and economics and two term's work in algebra and physics.

- (4) Observation and Teaching, one term.

(5) \*Domestic Science, two terms.

Notes: The observation and Teaching here outlined consists of demonstration teaching in the training department and in work done in the demonstration rural schools maintaind by the Teachers College. This term's work will be provided during each term of the college year so that the graduating class may be divided into suitable sections.

The subjects of study represented by this course are all on the program of recitations each term of the year so that a student can come any term and get credit work.

Uniform county certificate examinations are given at the institution on the same dates as are required by law at the county superintendents' offices.

These courses will be taught so as to give the teacher in training practical efficiency in educating the boys and girls of the farms of the state. The practice in teaching will be broad in its scope and notably efficient in its extent.

# Special Students.

Preparation for the examination given by the State Educational Board of Examiners for special teacher certificates.

Teachers of twenty-one years of age and those who may be holders of a first grade uniform county certificate are admitted to such classes in special courses in primary, kindergarten, public school music, manual training, home economics, drawing, or commercial studies as will probably prepare them for the examinations that are required by the state for the obtaining of such recognition. Credits earnd in this way do not count on a course toward graduation. Such persons should make all arrangements with the Registrar before appearing for work in order to have their studies properly adjusted.

# SPECIAL COURSE IN VOICE, PIANO, ORGAN AND ORCHESTRAL INSTRUMENTS

Conditions of Admission.—Students are admitted to these special music courses on liberal terms as to preparatory training and are encouraged to begin early enough to develop the skill and capability for professional artistic success that are so notably demanded in teachers of these kinds.

To become a candidate for graduation, the student must have attaind to the scholastic qualification required of secondary schools for full college entrance. These scholastic conditions may be acquired in any good secondary school or may be accomplished in the normal courses at the College.

Conditions of Graduation.—A special Music Diploma will be awarded to such persons as complete satisfactorily any one of the courses here outlined, it being understood that skill and capability as musicians are also qualities to be attaind. On account of these conditions the exact time required to complete any one of these courses can not be stated in school years. The candidate must have sufficient proficiency in the special line chosen to secure the recommendation of the professors in charge of the work in order to apply for graduation. The courses as here mapped out, outside of the attainment in capability as a musician, can be satisfactorily completed in two years.

# VOICE, PIANO AND ORGAN COURSES.

These courses are pland to train students for capability as performers and for becoming special teachers.

The requirements for graduation are as follows:

- 1. Two lessons a week for at least two years in the major course, all this work to be done if possible under the instructor recommending for graduation.
- 2. Satisfactory public performance of a recital in the major study, the program to be of moderate difficulty.
- 3. Two years of a "minor" course in music (Piano, organ, voice or any of the instruments taught in the orchestral department). It is understood that two lessons a week in the minor for one year shall not be the equivalent of two years' study.

- 4. Harmony equivalent to the texts of Chadwick or Bussler.
- 5. Two terms of Music History.
- 6. One five hour course of general culture each term, except the Senior year. This course to be selected by the personal adviser of the student, and to be of college grade in case the student has no entrance deficiencies.
  - 7. Literary Society work is recommended but not required.
- 8. A certificate of Musical Proficiency will be granted to those who complete the piano, voice, or organ work alone.

# VIOLIN AND OTHER ORCHESTRAL INSTRUMENTS.

This course is pland to train a student for capability as a performer and for becoming a special teacher.

The requirements for graduation are as follows:

- 1. Violin instruction sufficient to enable the pupil to render a program the equivalent of a Beethoven Sonata, the Mendelssohn Concerto and similar works, to the satisfaction of the head of the department.
  - 2. Two years of piano (one lesson a week).
  - 3. Two years of harmony—the equivalent of Chadwick or Bussler.
- 4. Two years of ear training and dictation in relation to the harmony.
  - 5. Orchestra and Ensemble during the course.
  - 6. Two terms of Music History.

The diploma of the College will be given when the student has satisfactorily completed this course, together with the requirements for college entrance. A certificate of Musical Proficiency will be granted to those who complete the violin work alone.

All students shall take at least one scholastic branch each term they are enrolled unless they are excused by the head of the department.

The courses for all other orchestral instruments including Oboe, Flute, Clarinet, Bassoon, Cornet, French Horn, Trombone, Tuba, Cello, Double Bass, and Harp are identical with the violin course. It is possible, however, to finish the courses of some of these instruments in less time than that of the violin.
