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The Universe in Your Desk: Astronomy Resource Guide Available from Project STAR

Project STAR (Science Teaching through its Astronomical Roots) recently released the third edition of its astronomy resource guide "The Universe in Your Desk." Prepared by Darrel Hoff, the booklet is the culmination of over 40 high school teachers' efforts and is available to science teachers at no cost.

Included in the booklet are chapters dealing with astronomy activities, periodicals, textbooks, general reading lists for students and teachers and information on teaching materials such as maps, atlases, slide programs, films, videotapes and computer software. Three appendices add reprints from *Mercury* magazine and the *Astronomical Society of the Pacific* as well as sample activities developed by Project STAR.
