What's the *Outlook* for This Summer?

Outlook training workshops will be offered during each of the four weeks in June 1986. *Outlook* is an environment education enrichment program developed in Iowa for grades K-12.

The *Outlook* training program consists of one week of graduate work composed of two courses, each providing one hour of graduate credit. The courses provide a basis for understanding the *Outlook* approach to environmental education and methods of integrating *Outlook* into any existing curriculum. Grade level *Outlook* teaching materials are provided to workshop participants.

The courses are taught at the Conservation Education Center in Springbrook State Park near Guthrie Center, Iowa. The Education Center, which has air-conditioned dormitories, dining hall and lounge building, and classrooms, is located in a wooded area with nearby ponds and prairie remnants.

The training program is offered through the University of Northern Iowa Institute for Environmental Education. The cost of tuition, room and board, and *Outlook* materials is \$200 per person. Iowa participants will receive \$100 stipends and will pay only \$100. Each session is limited to 35 participants, so early pre-registration is required to insure first choice of dates. Final registration for each session will take place on Sunday evening between 6 and 7 p.m.
