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EXCELLENCE IN SCIENCE TEACHING AWARD PROGRAM PRIOR TO 1976

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The Iowa Academy of Science has a long and distinguished record of encouraging improvement in science education within Iowa's public and parochial schools. Evidence of this may be seen in its support of the Iowa Junior Academy of Science, *The Iowa Science Teachers Journal* and various Academy committees having as their major concern the promotion of science education. In past years, the Recognition and Awards Committee of Iowa Academy of Science has functioned to identify outstanding science and mathematics teachers in Iowa.

In the Sixty-ninth Session of the Iowa Academy of Science (1957), Mr. Steven Pattee, Biology Teacher at Roosevelt High School in Cedar Rapids, became the first Iowa Science Teacher to be recognized by the Academy for exemplary science teaching. The second award, made in 1958, went to Loren Grout of Mason City. Since 1959, fifty-five men and women have been recognized for their outstanding contributions in behalf of Iowa children and science education.

During the first eight years of the recognition program, the Iowa Science Teacher's Award was administered by the Iowa Section of the American Chemical Society. In 1965, this award was joined by awards in biology and physics. By 1969, the Excellence in Science Teaching Awards Program included biology, chemistry, earth science, mathematics and physics. From 1965-1969, the awards were administered by the Science Teaching Committee of the Iowa Academy of Science.

In 1968-1969, the Science Teaching Committee added a member whose responsibility would be to coordinate the selection and presentation of the various awards. Dr. Paul Tweeten, Science Coordinator with the Iowa Department of Public Instruction, was the first person to be Director of the Excellence in Science Teaching Awards. From 1969 to the present, David McCalley, Assistant Professor of Biology at the University of Northern Iowa, has been Director of the Program. The present coordinating committee for the Excellence in Science Teaching Awards Program is the Recognition and Awards Committee of the Iowa Academy of Science. The director of the awards program is an ex-officio member of this committee.

Of the five awards presented by the Iowa Academy of Science prior to 1976, three were sponsored by special groups. The biology award was sponsored by the National Association of Biology Teachers through its

Outstanding Biology Teacher Award Program, the earth science selection was sponsored by the Geological Society of Iowa, and the physics award was sponsored by the Iowa Section of the American Association of Physics Teachers. Currently the Iowa Academy of Science sponsors all remaining awards and the biology, earth science and physics award retain their special sponsorships.

Listed below are the recipients of the Excellence in Science Teaching Awards in biology, chemistry, earth science, mathematics and physics for the years prior to 1976. Not listed are recipients of the Science Teaching Awards from 1957-1964 since no records were available concerning the recipients of these awards, except for the Pattee and Grout awards made in 1957 and 1958. Some names are missing in the different awards categories. If anyone has records concerning these unlisted recipients please forward them to the author so that these individuals can be duly recognized for their past contributions to science education in Iowa. A distribution of the recipients of known awards is shown in Figure 1.

In 1974, the Academy gave a special posthumus award in physics to Milbert Krohn who had been killed in an airplane accident. Mr. Krohn had long been a leader in Iowa science teaching activities.


