Three Teachers Honored at Dubuque Meetings

The Iowa Section of the American Chemical Society names an outstanding teacher each year in Iowa. This group for a number of years has used the Academy meeting as the vehicle for honoring the selection. John R. Penney of Mason City was selected by the 1964-65 committee headed by Dr. Richard Campbell of the Chemistry Department of the University of Iowa. Dr. Campbell made the award Saturday morning at the Academy meeting in Dubuque.

NABT has recognized outstanding biology teachers for the last four years as a part of its Outstanding Biology Teacher Award (OBTA) Program. This year the Iowa OBTA selection was honored for the first time at the Academy meeting. Sister Mary Antonia of Dubuque was selected by the NABT committee headed by Mr. Cameron Christensen of Rockwell City. Mr. Christensen was present to make the award.

The year 1965 marked the launching of a third teacher recognition program in Iowa. The Iowa Section of the American Association of Physics Teachers began a program for honoring a secondary physics teacher and chose to use the Academy meetings as the time for announcing the teachers selected. Mr. Vern Gundersen of Mason City was selected as the first recipient of this new award. Dr. David Nelson of Luther College at Decorah was chairman of the committee selecting the teacher. Dr. David Nelson was present to make the award. See you in Des Moines later this month. Plans indicate it may be one of the best fall meetings we have ever had!
